One step forward, one back

These days, it seems like every time the state breeding and racing industries manage to take a step forward, they soon are forced to take a step back. The positive news is that in mid-May the New York State Division of Lottery issued a new request for proposals (RFP) for prospective Aqueduct video lottery terminal (VLT) operators so a firm can be selected to run the proposed gaming facility. On the other hand, the state's breeding and racing industries are now being compelled to absorb yet another blow inflicted by New York City Off-Track Betting Corp.

First, the more optimistic half of the story. The Lottery's RFP is specific, detailed, and crystal clear on a number of points where previous efforts have foundered, such as the specifics of the process, requirements the bidders must satisfy, and the criteria by which the proposals will be judged. Most importantly, the division has laid out a timeline for the various phases of the selection process. The key points on the timeline are these: The due date for a \$1-million entry fee from the bidders is June 1; the due date for proposals is June 29; and the date by which the division will announce its recommendation is August 3. The estimated opening date for the facility is 12 to 18 months after the award.

The bidding process has been modeled after standard state procurement rules, and the evaluating committee, headed by Lottery Director Gordon Medenica, will include Lottery personnel and a representative from the Division of the Budget. The committee also will seek advice from experts in various fields. Although state law requires final approval of the selection by Gov. David Paterson and leaders of the state Assembly and Senate, no lobbying will be permitted.

In addition to the refundable entry fee, bidders are obliged to make a minimum offer of \$300-million for the contract. Each bid will be judged on a 100-point scale, rating such things as experience, financial capability, marketing plan, and speed to market. This action on the Aqueduct VLTs does seem like a significant progress from where we were after the collapse of the last selection process in March.

Also in mid-May, however, New York City OTB revealed that it is moving forward with its plan to defer payments on out-of-state handle and breakage to all industry entities, including the Breeding and Development Fund, effective as of April. This means that for the month of April, for example, the Fund will receive only just over \$100,000 of the amount it should normally receive

from New York City OTB—nearly \$324,000 (31% paid and 69% deferred). Needless to say, this is devastating for all beneficiaries of the Fund and will have a detrimental effect on everyone involved. New York City OTB's move also is another serious setback for the racing industry, on top of the collapse of the New York Racing Association loan bill in the Legislature. Although the outlook is uncertain at this point, the New York State Racing and Wagering Board is taking a proactive approach to the situation. It is no longer approving any simulcasting contracts for New York City OTB until it is satisfied that the corporation can meet its financial obligations to the industry.

The expectation is that this will get the corporation's attention, since the move will hit it directly in the pocketbook. As ever, NYTB will keep you informed about this developing situation on our website and in our weekly e-newsletters.

Another month, more uncertainty

After the New York City Off-Track Betting Corp. stepped away from the precipice of closure and said in mid-April that it would seek to remain operational for another year, attention turned to strategies for keeping the New York Racing Association afloat.

Gov. David Paterson has proposed a \$17-million state loan to forestall a cash-flow crisis for NYRA as it approached Belmont Stakes (G1) weekend and its Saratoga Race Course meeting.

The New York Senate Racing, Gaming, and Wagering Committee met on May 4 but took no action on the measure pending an analysis by legal and legislative authorities.

NYRA and horsemen, meanwhile, continued to brace for the worst.

"There is going to be a serious cash-flow problem before the end of June," said Rick Violette Jr., president of the New York Thoroughbred Horsemen's Association and a NYRA board member. "The leaders in New York should decide if they want racing or not."

NYRA's board met on April 30 and painted an extremely gloomy outlook of the industry's future in New York if the state somehow fails to approve the loan.

New York City OTB already owes NYRA \$15-million and now

wants to delay certain statutory payments to the track operators and breeders. In addition, the state continues to make no headway in its agonizingly slow process of selecting an Aqueduct gaming operator, which would boost NYRA financially.

"NYRA is already checking under seat cushions and turning its pockets inside out looking for money," Violette said. "That's not a pretty scenario. This isn't posturing. It isn't even a threat. It's reality. If NYRA says it's going to close its doors, it will. NYRA will not be the fraud that New York City OTB was by threatening to shut down and then deciding to stay open."

Under Paterson's plan, NYRA would get \$17-million of the \$250-million earmarked for construction of Aqueduct's racino. NYRA would pay back the money once the facility opens and starts generating revenue.

"We weren't really in a position to move on it," a Senate staffer said. "We really need to know what the ramifications are going to be. We need more information. Outside bond counsel is reviewing it. They're trying to determine how much money can actually be floated over in a loan. It involves a lot of technical things."

"We're just in a position right now of waiting," he said. "Then we can green light it."—Paul Post

Freud to shuttle

Two-time leading New York sire Freud will become a shuttle stallion for the 2010 Southern Hemisphere breeding season.

The 12-year-old Storm Cat horse, who stands for \$6,500 at Sequel Stallions New York, will be based at Alberto and Renata Stein's Haras La Leyenda in Buenos Aires, Argentina.

The leading New York stallion in 2008 and '09, Freud had another big day on May 2, when Franny Freud, one of his top earners, won the New York Stallion Park Avenue Stakes and his son General Maximus took the New York Stallion Times Square

Stakes. From six crops of racing age, 127 of Freud's 194 starters are winners (65.5%), and his progeny have earned \$1,065,997 this year through May 5.

Freud's leading earners are New York-breds Logic Way (\$482,749) and Franny Freud (\$476,029).

New York-breds play a significant role in NYRA's racing program, especially at Belmont Park

New York-breds fill Belmont races

Native New Yorkers account for more than 30% of races at both prime meets

Belmont Park is springtime on the sidewalks of New York and golden days for the Elmont track's championship season each fall. But the spacious, sprawling track on Hempstead Turnpike also is a bona fide home for New York-bred racehorses.

Native New Yorkers accounted for almost one-quarter of all

races at Saratoga Race Course last year (*New York Breeder*, November 2009), a statistic that emphasizes how important New York-breds are to the New York Racing Association racing program. New Yorkers are an even bigger factor at both Belmont meetings, where roughly three of every ten races are exclusively for state-bred runners.

Their races filled well, exceeding the overall average field sizes at both the spring-summer and fall meets, and they were well funded. Take away the stakes money from each of the meets, and New York-bred races featured an average purse that was larger than that for the average for the meet overall.

These are some of the conclusions drawn from an analysis of New York-breds' place in the racing programs at Belmont's two meets. Even more so than Saratoga, the data from the Belmont meets drive home the point of how large a role New York-breds play in NYRA's racing program and how vital they are to the overall well-being of racing in the Empire State.

Belmont spring-summer

The season from late April to late July encompassed 607 races last year, including the \$1-million Belmont Stakes (G1). Races limited to registered New York-breds accounted for 182 of those races, or a hair under 30% (29.98%).

Those 182 races over 64 spring-summer dates, which were exactly double the number of restricted races run at Saratoga's 36-day meet, had total purses of \$7,450,500, or an average of \$40,937 per race. The overall average per race at the 2009 Belmont spring meet was \$47,613, but that figure was distorted by purses for 69 stakes races, which accounted for 37% of the entire purse structure and averaged \$154,880.

By contrast, New York-bred stakes races were 17 of the 69 total stakes (24.6%), and they averaged a shade under \$75,000. Take away the stakes money, and Belmont paid an average purse of \$34,880. Without its stakes money, the New York-bred races averaged \$37,436. As will be seen later, the relative advantage of New York-bred purses was even greater at the fall meet.

Another indication of how well the New York-bred races were funded was the median purse of \$43,000, which meant that half of all races had purse levels above that amount.

The high average and median were achieved by a concentration of allowance, optional claiming, and maiden special weight races that paid \$41,000 or more.

Other than the stakes races, the best-paid New York-bred races in the spring 2009 meeting were the 24 optional claiming races, which had an average purse of \$45,291. Close behind were allowance races at \$45,010, and the maiden special weights paid an average of \$42,769.

The 58 maiden special weight races by far were the largest single category of races carded by NYRA Director of Racing P. J. Campo, followed by 39 allowance races. Claiming races, both maiden and open, accounted for a total of 42 races, or 23.1% of all New York-bred races. By comparison, the overall meet had 43.8% claiming races. The open claimers, most for \$15,000 tags, averaged \$18,846 in 13 races, and 29 maiden claiming contests averaged \$18,103.

The NYRA condition book relied on the tried and true New York-bred runners, meaning races for horses three and older. Only nine races for two-year-olds were carded, and races limited to three-year-olds were even scarcer, with seven contests. In all, 94 open races for three-year-olds and older were on the menu, and 72 races were restricted to fillies and mares three and up.

The two races for three-year-old fillies both were stakes, and they had the highest average of any age category, \$87,000. Three

of the five open races for three-year-olds were stakes, and those five races averaged \$57,200. The two-year-old open races averaged \$41,500, and two-year-old fillies raced five times for an average purse of \$41,800.

Close behind them were the averages for fillies and mares age three and up, at \$40,456, and open races for horses three and up, at \$39,390.

Older runners also were prized because they showed up in abundance. Overall, the New York-bred runners averaged 8.1 starters per race, while the overall meet average was 7.6. The filly and mare races for New York-breds had the largest average field with 8.4 starters per race, while the open races for horses three and older rounded to 8.0 starters per race. Open three-year-old races had the smallest average field, 6.8 starters.

The largest average fields showed up for allowance races, 8.7 starters per race, followed by maiden special weights at 8.6 and optional claimers at 8.1. The smallest average fields were the 17 New York-bred stakes races, averaging 6.7 starters per race.

Campo made generous use of Belmont's turf courses in writing races for New York-breds last spring. In all, he carded 87 races on the grass, although 21 were moved to the main track because of wet conditions.

Freud, New York's leading sire for the past two years, easily was the top sire of New York-bred runners at the 2009 Belmont spring-summer meet with 11 individual winners and 12 wins. His closest rival was Gold Token, who had seven winners with one win each. Hook and Ladder had six individual winners, and Western Expression had five. City Zip, Officer, and A. P. Jet each had four winners each.

The broodmare rankings may well give a sign of who will be some of the top broodmare sires in coming years. Topping the list was Deputy Minister, who had four wins from four winners. Tallying four wins from three winners were Belong to Me, Mt. Livermore, and Pleasant Tap.

Belmont fall

Belmont's fall season emphasizes high-quality stakes races; more than half of its \$18.4-million in total purses went into the stakes program. It also has a strong New York-bred flavor, and the New Yorkers also had an impressive stakes program in the fall. The 99 races restricted to registered New York-breds were 31.7% of the meet's 312 contests over the 33-date meeting.

The New York-bred races offered relatively full betting fields. The average fall field was 8.9 starters, compared with the overall meet average of 8.3 starters per race.

The native New Yorkers raced for sizable purses, which averaged \$49,972 per race. That figure was below the overall meet average of \$58,865, but—as in the spring—the stakes money was the difference. Without the \$9.3-million in fall stakes money, the overall average purse was \$34,880. The New York-bred races had an average purse of \$38,824 when its stakes money was excluded. Reflecting the high quality of Campo's condition book, the New Yorkers had a median purse of \$43,000 for the fall meet.

Unlike the spring-summer season, at which stakes races were less than 10% of the overall New York-bred schedule, more than 15% of the fall meet's 99 restricted races were stakes. And, the stakes purses averaged \$112,400, well above the spring meet's \$74,912 average. The stakes races also filled well, averaging 8.7 starters in those 15 races.

As in the spring-summer meet, the largest category of races was maiden special weight contests, which offered an average purse of \$43,422 for 36 races. Those races also filled the best of any category, with 9.3 starters per race.

Allowance races were the second-most common category of race for the New York-breds, with 17 races and an average purse of \$44,882. The allowance races had the second-largest fields, with an average

of 8.8 starters per race. The best-paid races after stakes were optional claimers, with 13 races offering an average purse of \$46,077. The optional claimers had the smallest average fields among the New York-bred races, averaging 8.3 starters.

Also similar to the spring-summer season, claiming races were a relatively minor factor in the Belmont fall program for New York-breds. Seven open claimers averaged \$19,571 each, and 11 maiden claimers went for an average of \$18,091 per race. Their respective average fields were 8.6 and 8.7 starters per race.

Older runners predominated in the fall racing scheme, accounting for more than 70% of all New York-bred races, but two-year-olds had a significant place in the program. Belmont's fall season offered 37 open races for three-year-olds and older, and 33 races were restricted to fillies and mares three and up. Those races offered respective purses of \$53,270 and \$45,788 per race.

Belmont offered 14 open two-year-old races and 14 restricted to juvenile fillies. The open races, with an average purse of \$50,329, attracted average fields of 9.2 starters. The juvenile fillies raced for \$49,507 per race and averaged 8.8 starters. The fall program offered only one race for three-year-olds, a filly stakes contest.

Campo's condition book offered plenty of opportunities on the grass for New York-breds, 46 in all, although 15 were moved to the main track because of wet conditions. The 31 grass races averaged ten starters per race, and they had an average purse of \$54,435 per race.

The New Yorkers did not abandon ship when their races came off the turf; those races had an average of 8.7 starters and an average pot of \$49,320. The 53 races written for the main track offered an average purse of \$47,545 and had 8.3 runners per race.

Among sires of New York-breds, Read the Footnotes had the most wins, five, from four winners. Checking in with four wins from four starters were Freud and Hook and Ladder. A. P. Jet had three individual winners, and Grand Slam had three victories from two individual winners.

Franny kicks it up a notch for Freud

Filly becomes first North American graded stakes winner for her sire

The stud career of Freud, New York's leading sire of 2008 and '09, steadily has trended upward over the past few years, exemplified by the recent news that he will shuttle to Argentina's Haras La Leyenda for the 2010 Southern Hemisphere breeding season.

There hardly could be a better illustration of his dominance of the New York-bred ranks than the results of state-bred stakes at Belmont Park on May 2, when daughters Franny Freud, So N So, and Freud's Notebook ran one-two-three in the New York Stallion Park Avenue Stakes and son General Maximus won the New York Stallion Times Square Stakes.

The record of Franny Freud is exceptional, however, even for Freud. Franny Freud became Freud's first graded stakes winner on April 7 with her victory in the Beaumont Stakes (G2) at Keeneland Race Course.

Bred in New York by Anthony Grey, Franny Freud races for a partnership of Grey, Paul Pompa Jr., and Stephen Yarbrough. She had won outside New York-bred company before the Beaumont.

After breaking her maiden at Belmont in May 2009, trainer John Terranova shipped her to Woodbine for two starts. After finishing second in the My Dear Stakes, she defeated eventual Canadian co-champion two-year-old filly Neglige in the Ontario Debutante Stakes.

Franny Freud returned to New York to win the Lady Finger Stakes at Finger Lakes and the New York Stallion Fifth Avenue Stakes, clinching honors as New York's champion two-year-old filly. Second to Amen Hallelujah in the Santa Ynez Stakes (G2) in her first start at three, Franny Freud came back to score a 4/4-length victory over Chantilly Nayla in the Beaumont, making it clear she can run with just about anybody.

Franny Freud is the best of 18 stakes winners from 273 foals age three and older (6.6%) by Freud, who stands at Sequel Stallions New York, in Amenia. A full brother to North America's leading general sire in 2009, Giant's Causeway, Freud proved his talent in Europe without ever quite reaching his full potential.

Highly tried

Freud was tried very highly as a two-year-old by trainer Aidan O'Brien, finishing fifth in both the Darley Dewhurst Stakes (Eng-

G1) and Racing Post Trophy (Eng-G1) in 2000. Freud won a mile weight-for-age race at the Curragh as a three-year-old but placed seventh in the Entenmanns Irish Two Thousand Guineas (Ire-G1). Returned to sprinting, he ran third in the 2001 Cork and Orrery Stakes (Eng-G2) at Royal Ascot before disappointing in his final five starts, all high-class sprints.

Race record aside, Freud's principal attraction as a stallion prospect was his pedigree, particularly his relationship to his year-older brother.

Winner of nine of 13 starts and more than \$3-million, Giant's Causeway earned the sobriquet "the iron horse" with victories in five consecutive Group 1 races in England and Ireland at age three in 2000, including the Coral-Eclipse (Eng-G1), Champagne Lanson Sussex (Eng-G1), and Esat Digifone Irish Champion (Ire-G1) Stakes. Giant's Causeway ended his career with a gallant second by a neck to eventual Horse of the Year Tiznow in the 2000 Breeders' Cup Classic (G1).

Giant's Causeway sired European classic winners Shamardal and Footstepsinthesand, both now hot young sires, in his first crop. Through May 5, he had sired 80 stakes winners, including Grade 1 or Group 1 winners Ghanaati, Aragorn (Ire),

My Typhoon (Ire), First Samurai, Heatseeker (Ire), and Eskendereya.

A medium-sized, attractive horse, Freud is built like his dam, Mariah's Storm, by Rahy, but has the coloration of his sire, Storm Cat. The most expensive commercial sire in the world for nearly a decade, Storm Cat led the American sire list twice and has sired 174 stakes winners, including accomplished sires Forest Wildcat, Hennessy, Forestry, Harlan, Stormy Atlantic, Tale of the Cat, and Bernstein.

Mariah's Storm won ten of her 16 starts, including two Grade 2 and four Grade 3 races, and is a half sister to French Group 2 winner Panoramic (GB), by Rainbow Quest, and Japanese stakes winner Air Zion, by Groom Dancer. Mariah's Storm's fourth dam, Itsabet, by *Heliopolis, is ancestress of the rapidly growing family that includes Grade 1 winners Banks Hill (GB), Intercontinental (GB), Heat Haze (GB), Cacique (Ire), Champs Elysees (Ire), Leroidesanimaux (Brz), and Country Star.

Freud also sired Peruvian champion Zeide Isaac and graded stakes-placed winners Logic Way, Quick Little Miss, and Meriwether Jessica.

Another full brother to Freud and Giant's Causeway, Tumblebrutus, has done well in Chile, while a third, Roar of the Tiger, sired last year's promising two-year-olds Bear Tough Guy and Gator Prowl in his second crop. Freud's full sister, You'resothrilling, also was a high-class filly, winning the Irish Thoroughbred Marketing Cherry Hinton Stakes (Eng-G2) in 2007.

Second generation

Franny Freud is a second-generation New York-bred, the fourth named foal out of the D'Accord mare Frankly Fran. Bred by George Seelbinder, Frankly Fran won four of 21 starts, including two allowance sprints at Finger Lakes as a four-year-old, and earned \$36,635.

Frankly Fran's second foal, Semichi, by Brushed On, is about as tough and sound as they come, winning 13 of 64 starts and earning \$197,732 to date. Unfortunately, Franny Freud is her last foal.

Frankly Fran was a half sister to stakes winners Look of the

Lynx, by Forest Wildcat, and C B Account, by Personal Flag. Look of the Lynx won the Half Moon Stakes and earned \$258,739. Her fourth and final foal is stakes-placed three-year-old Scandola, by Afleet Alex. C B Account earned \$212,721.

Frankly Fran's sire, D'Accord, a beautifully bred Grade 2 winner by Secretariat out of Canadian Horse of the Year Fanfreluche, by Northern Dancer, sired 21 stakes winners, including graded winners North East Bound, Lady d'Accord, Warfie, Montreal Red, and Yesterday's Kisses. D'Accord's daughters have produced 33 stakes winners to date, including group or graded winners D'Wildcat, Buy the Sport, Club Royal, Transient Trend, Solo Survivor, Wandering, and Unky and Ally, in addition to Franny Freud.

Frankly Fran's dam, Las Manitas, by Faraway Son, placed in three stakes and is a half sister to stakes-placed Grub, by Mr. Prospector. Las Manitas' dam, Maimiti, by Never Bend, also was stakes-placed, but is a full sister to stakes winner Maikai and to stakes-placed Bequa, and a half sister to stakes winners Hula Chief and Brave Dance, both by Chieftain.

Franny Freud's fifth dam, Imperial Hill, by Hill Prince, was a stakes-winning three-quarter sister to Secretariat's dam, Somethingroyal, by *Princequillo. Since D'Accord was a son of Secretariat, that means Franny Freud's dam, Frankly Fran, is inbred 4x5 to Secretariat's second dam, Imperatrice.

Franny Freud herself is inbred 4x3 to Secretariat, since Freud's sire, Storm Cat, is out of the brilliant Secretariat mare Terlingua. Her pedigree also carries close-up duplications of Northern Dancer (4x4), Bold Ruler (5x6x4), and *Nasrullah (6x6x5x5) for an inbreeding coefficient of 3.96% through the first six generations, well above the average for the breed.

Silver Timber piles up more gold

Prime Timber gelding collects his fourth graded victory in a year

Silver Timber continues to improve with age, and the seven-year-old Prime Timber gelding notched his fourth graded stakes victory in a year on April 30 when he closed resolutely to win the \$119,100 Churchill Downs Turf Sprint Stakes (G3) by a neck on the Kentucky Oaks (G1) undercard.

The New York-bred also has turned into an exceptional claim for trainer Chad Brown and owners Michael Dubb and High Grade Racing Stable. Claimed from Invictus Farm and trainer Linda Rice for \$25,000 in April 2009, Silver Timber has earned purses of \$309,951 since being taken from a Gulfstream Park claiming race.

He is winning at the Grade 3 level, and he flashed world-class speed in the Churchill race, setting a course record of :55.45 for five furlongs on firm turf. Off his Shakertown Stakes (G3) victory at Keeneland Race Course on April 10, Silver Timber went off as the Turf Sprint's 2.70-to-1 favorite.

Ridden by Julien Leparoux, Silver Timber rated in midpack behind Central City's sizzling pace of :21.25 for the first quarter-mile and :43.57 through a half-mile. After shrugging off Starfish Bay, who had grabbed a narrow lead at the top of Churchill's stretch, Central City appeared as though he might carry his speed over the five furlongs. But Leparoux tipped out Silver Timber for a clear run at the furlong pole, and the gray or roan gelding powered to the lead inside the sixteenth pole. Chamberlain Bridge closed well on the outside to take second, a nose in front of Central City in third.

"I got a perfect trip, a very good trip," Leparoux said. "My horse had a lot of speed already and they were very, very fast from the gate. So I knew they were going fast, but I was comfortable all the way."

Bred by Sez Who Thoroughbreds, Silver Timber won for the fifth time since the claim. He won a Belmont Park six-furlong optional claiming race on May 15, 2009, before earning his first career graded victory in Belmont's Jaipur Stakes (G3) in July. Second by a neck in the Commentator Stakes at Saratoga Race Course, Silver Timber then shipped to Keeneland for a victory in the Woodford Stakes (G3). The owners took a shot at the Breeders' Cup Turf Sprint, in which he finished sixth, beaten 4¼ lengths by California Flag, and then gave him an extended break until the Shakertown.

"He's the best, his trainer is the best, and Julien is the best," Dubb said. "I'm just a passenger along for the ride."

"We are aware of [the course record], and we're not surprised. He won at Keeneland last time out and was only about 80%. He is just now fully cranked. We claimed him hoping he would be a useful New York state-bred, but he's far exceeded expectations."

Silver Timber won for the 11th time from 32 starts and boosted his career earnings to \$540,519, with \$509,628 of that total on the turf. He is out of the winning Alwuhush mare River Princess.

Big day for Freud, Terranova

Talk about parallel situations.

John Terranova II had two starters in the New York Stallion Stakes on May 2: Franny Freud in the \$100,000 New York Stallion Park Avenue Stakes and General Maximus in the \$100,000 New York Stallion Times Square Stakes.

Both are by two-time leading New York sire Freud; both drew the sixth starting position; both went off as odds-on favorites; both won by open lengths.

Of course, there were a few differences.

They had different jockeys. Garrett Gomez rode Franny Freud for owners Paul Pompa Jr., Stephen Yarbrough, and Winter Park Partners; Javier Castellano was aboard General Maximus, owned by Michael Imperio and Elizabeth Loftus. Another difference is that Franny Freud is the established star, while General Maximus may well be an emerging star.

Franny Freud, a three-year-old Freud filly bred by Anthony Grey, richly deserved her 0.25-to-1 odds after winning the Beaumont Stakes (G2) at Keeneland on April 7. In the Park Avenue, she pressed So N So for the first quarter-mile, took the lead approaching the half, and pulled steadily away to a 7¼-length victory over Donald Newman's So N So, also by Freud. Freud's Notebook finished third. Franny Freud covered the Park Avenue's 6½ furlongs in 1:16.15 and boosted her career earnings to \$476,029.

"She's gotten better and better as she's grown and matured," Terranova said. "There are races up here at Belmont like the Prioresse [Stakes (G1) at six furlongs on July 4] that we'd consider. We'll see how she comes back, but it looked like she did that really well. She's a special, special girl."

General Maximus, bred by Jill and Dominique Imperio, made his first start for Terranova and handled the Times Square with aplomb. Castellano immediately put the 4-to-5 favorite on the lead, and the three-year-old Freud colt opened a five-length advantage at the furlong pole before winning by 3¼ lengths over Make Note, with Game Token third. General Maximus ran the 6½-furlong distance in 1:16.49 on a fast track.

Out of the Good and Tough mare Modern Toughness, General Maximus won his first two career starts and then finished fourth in a tough Gulfstream allowance race on February 27 for trainer Joseph Imperio. After a brief break, he was turned over to Terranova.

"He spent the winter at GoldMark Farm in the care of Todd Quast and Karl Keegan," Terranova said. "They did a great job with him, and we've had him a couple of weeks now, breezed him the one time, but he came in awesome shape. He's just a really talented colt and looks like the real deal."

Remembrance: Michael T. Martin

New York owner-breeder campaigned three champions,
but friends remember his glowing personality

Michael Townsend Martin, who died on April 17 at age 68 after a three-year battle with cancer, was the co-breeder or owner of three New York-bred champions and served as the president of the New York Thoroughbred Horsemen's Association in the 1990s.

Close friends, however, remember him not so much for the milestones of his life as for his endearing personality. He had a megawatt smile that could light up any room. He marveled at the accomplishments of others and belittled his own. He possessed an astonishing life force. He loved sports, especially racing, and supported many charities.

Mike Martin's life also embodied a rare principle: He never confused wealth with worth.

To be sure, Martin was born into wealth. He was the great-grandson of Henry Phipps, partner with Andrew Carnegie in the Carnegie Steel Co. His father was investment banker Townsend B. Martin, a founding member of the New York Jets who also was a racing enthusiast. The elder Martin started his stable in 1935 and raced Bolingbroke, three-time winner of the Manhattan Handicap in the early '40s. Townsend Martin also raced Sunrise Country, fifth to Decidedly in the 1962 Kentucky Derby.

His son inherited his love of horses and sports. Educated at Choate School, he attended Rutgers University, where he met a lifelong friend and associate, William N. Garbarini. A year older than Martin, Garbarini was on scholarship at Rutgers, and he noted early in their relationship that wealth did not figure into Martin's estimation of people. Martin joined Garbarini's fraternity at Rutgers and roomed with him.

"We had a ball," Garbarini said.

Martin left Rutgers to serve in the U.S. Navy and then entered sports management. He was an assistant general manager of the Jets during the Joe Namath era, including the team's 1969 Super Bowl victory.

At 34, he was the youngest professional sports general manager when heading the New York Cosmos, which won North American Soccer League championships in 1977 and '80. He founded his own sports consultancy, SportsMark Inc., in 1990.

He carried on the family racing operation after his father's suicide in 1982, and his partner in many endeavors was Garbarini, who has headed New Jersey-based executive recruiter W. N. Garbarini & Associates for 26 years.

They shared a passion for racing, and Garbarini entered horse syndication in the 1970s. He and a partner developed Highcliff Farm in Delanson in 1980 and sold it to Carl Lizza Jr. and Joe Bartone in '89.

Many of Martin's and Garbarini's horse operations were based at Highcliff. Martin raced Scarlet Ibis, the 1988 New York-bred champion two-year-old male who stood at Highcliff. He also owned Rush Chairman Bill, who was bred by Garbarini and awarded two-year-old male champion honors in 1992. Martin and Garbarini were the co-breeders of White Ibis, the champion two-year-old male in 2001 who raced in the silks of Garbarini's Quarter Keg Stable.

Any friend of Garbarini was a friend of Martin. Through an

employee of his search firm, Garbarini befriended the employee's brother, an avid racing fan who followed their stable's horses. It did not matter to Martin that the brother was a New York City doorman.

"He treated that guy like he was royalty," Garbarini said. "He would always lift people up. He was always there for anyone who needed him."

Martin's passion for charitable ventures was no less than his love of horses and horse racing.

"There was literally no charity that he wouldn't support," Garbarini said.

Martin and his wife of 30 years, Jean Meyer Martin, maintained homes in Manhattan and Longboat Key, Florida, and he was active in several Florida-based charities.

He served as board chairman of Mote Marine Laboratory in Sarasota, and for health reasons he declined the chairmanship of Ringling College of Art and Design in Sarasota. He also was a trustee of the Lemur Conservation Foundation in Myakka City, Florida.

Martin was diagnosed with late-stage throat cancer in 2007, and his life force defied the usual prognosis. In his battle against metastatic cancer "he was a lion," Garbarini said. "He was the last guy you'd think of as a lion, but he fought the cancer like a lion for three years."

As the end neared, Martin wound down his racing stable. He gave his last horse, the unraced Scarlet Ibis mare Suki, to Suzie O'Cain, a close friend and co-manager of Highcliff with her husband, C. Lynwood O'Cain, D.V.M.

Suki was the dam of Martin's stakes-placed homebred Pennington, named for Pennington School in New Jersey, which was one of the breeder's charitable beneficiaries. Suki was in foal to Highcliff-based Congaree and foaled a New York-bred colt on March 9.

O'Cain wanted to memorialize her friend and his nearly half-century relationship with Bill Garbarini. She named the colt Mike and Bill.

"I thought it was the greatest thing I can do," she said. "Mike was the perfect owner. He was always appreciative, always humble. He always made people feel good about themselves."

EXPLANATION OF INDEXES

Racing Index (RI)

RI is based on the average earnings per start for all runners in the United States, Canada, England, Ireland, France, Italy, Germany, Puerto Rico, and United Arab Emirates. RI is determined by calculating the average earnings per start, divided into males and females, of all starters in each individual country, and the average for each individual year is by definition 1.00. Median RI, however, is much lower. Actual distribution of RI is detailed below.

Sire Index (SI)

The Sire Index (SI) is an average of the Racing Index (RI) of all foals by a sire that have started at least three times. For SI to be calculated, a sire must be represented by a minimum of three crops and 25 starters lifetime.

AUCTION INFORMATION

Auction information is for North American sales from 1980 to the present and includes the following:

- Subject horse (stakes winner): All auction activity—yearling, yearling, two-year-olds in training, or horses of racing age sales—found after the winner's name under the first dam.
- Sire of stakes winner: The sire's lifetime and current year yearling auction information is reported, with number of crops offered at yearling sales (lifetime), number of yearlings sold

(lifetime), and average price (lifetime, including yearlings sold in current year), followed by information for the current year. (Current year information is reported beginning October 1; current year information from January 1 through September 30 is in the previous year's auction information.)

- Dam of stakes winner: most recent sale, either as weanling, yearling, or two-year-old in training. Also reported is most recent sale as broodmare (including covering sire) or broodmare prospect, plus any sale of the dam while subject horse was in utero (including covering sire).

Breeding Rules

To qualify for registration as a New York-bred, the mare must foal in New York state and meet the following domicile requirements:

Resident Mares: Must be continuously in residence in New York state from within 90 days after last cover in the year of conception and thereafter remain in residence until foaling the following year, with no breed-back required.

Non-Resident Mares: Must foal in New York state and be bred back to a registered New York-based stallion and remain for a continuous period of 90 days after foaling.

New York State Breeding and Development Fund NY-Breds Award Program

Breeder, owner, and stallion owner awards are based on purse money earned (1st through 3rd) while competing in pari-mutuel races run in New York state.

BREEDER AWARDS

In 2009, the New York State Thoroughbred Breeding and Development Fund paid \$6,300,452 to breeders of registered New York-breds. A breeder is the owner of the mare at the time the mare foals in the state of New York. Breeder awards are determined by covering stallion. If the New York-bred is by a registered New York-based stallion, the award is up to 20% of the purse earned for a first-place finish and up to 10% for a second- or third-place finish.

If the New York-bred is by an out-of-state stallion or non-registered stallion, the award is up to 10% for a first-place finish and up to 5% for a second- or third-place finish. All breeder awards are capped at \$10,000 per horse per race.

STALLION OWNER AWARDS

In 2009, the New York State Thoroughbred Breeding and Development Fund distributed \$2,370,035 in stallion owner awards. Stallion owner awards are paid to owners of registered New York-based covering stallions (at time of conception) at up to 7% of earned purses from 1st through 3rd positions. All stallion owner awards are capped at \$10,000 per horse per race.

OPEN OWNER AWARDS

In 2009, the New York State Thoroughbred Breeding and Development Fund paid \$1,107,667 to owners of registered New York-breds who earned purse money in open-company races. Owner awards for registered New York-breds sired by a registered New York-based stallion is up to 20% of purses earned from 1st through 3rd positions in races run for a claiming price of \$30,000 and upward, with a cap of \$20,000 per horse per race.

If the New York-bred is by an out-of-state stallion or non-registered stallion, the award is up to 10% of purses earned from 1st through 3rd positions in races run for a claiming price of \$30,000 and upward with a cap of \$20,000 per horse per race.

NEW YORK-BRED RACES

More than 52 stakes races exclusively for registered New York-breds are run at New York Racing Association racetracks (Aqueduct, Belmont Park, and Saratoga Race Course) and Finger Lakes racetrack with total purses worth nearly \$5-million. In 2009, more than 900 overnight races exclusively for registered New York-breds were held at the four New York racetracks.
