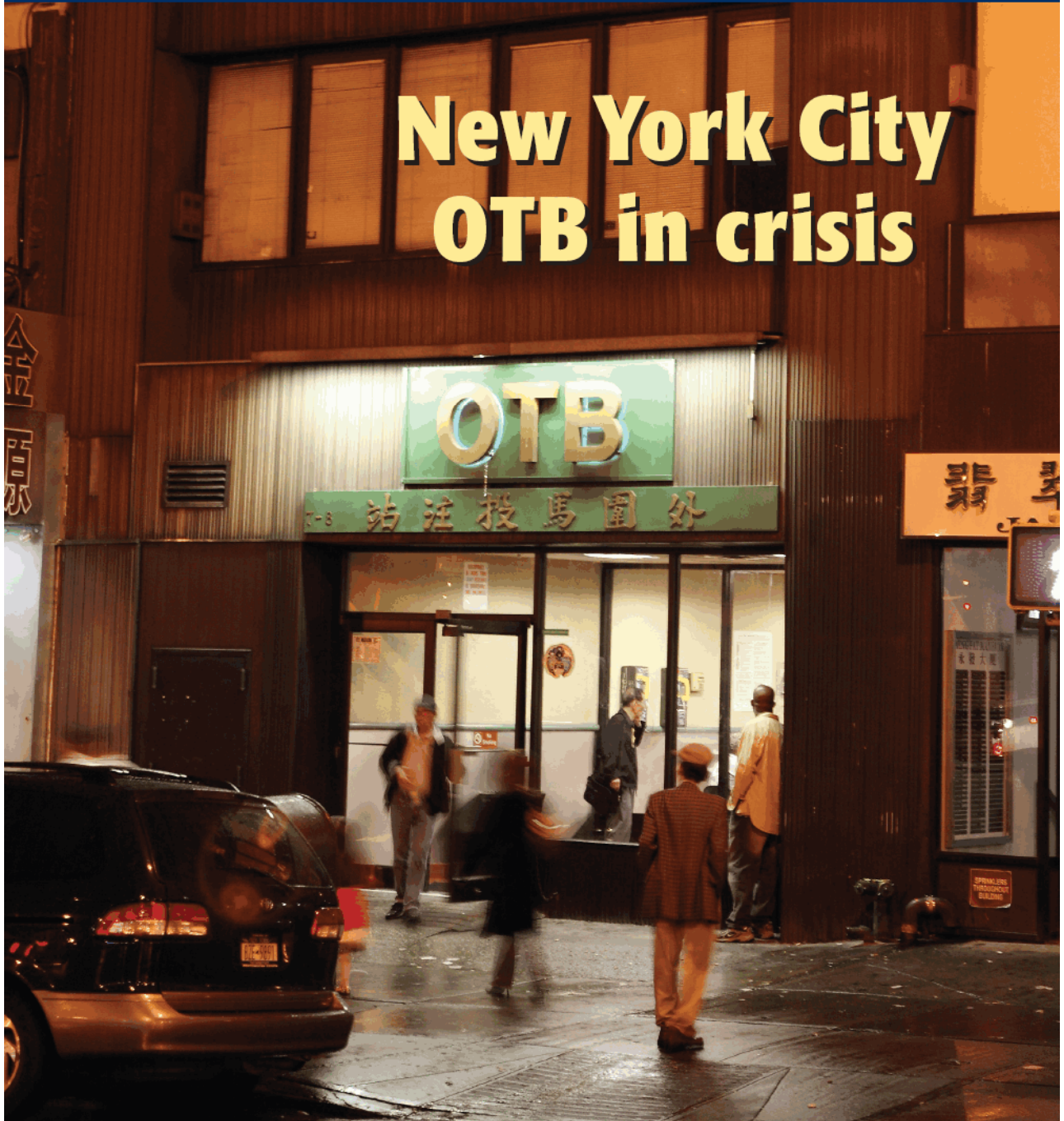

A break for New York breeders

Negative news has grown old for us all. We each share it, contest it, and try to look forward with optimism to what lies around the corner. New York City Off-Track Betting Corp. will get fixed. Video lottery terminals will go online.

Why should we be optimistic? Because of what is at stake financially; New York state finally has to address each issue. There will be light at the end of this tunnel.

This month I'm happy to report a positive change, one that will have a positive impact on your pocketbook and will further promote the New York-bred. Let's call it a New York Breeder economic stimulus.

I'm happy to announce a reduced rate to nominate your foals to the New York Stallion Stakes Series. Now for just \$200, your New York-sired foals can be fully nominated to the series, if paid by December 1 of the weanling year. This applies to this year's crop of 2009 foals and future crops. Saratoga results surpass expectations

Attendance and handle both dropped for the 36-date Saratoga Race Course meeting, but New York Racing Association officials said they were pleased the totals exceeded dire predictions at the Saratoga Springs track.

Attendance for the 2009 meet was 854,413, down 2.1% from 872,627 last year for a daily average of 23,734, compared with 24,240 a year ago.

On-track handle dropped 2.2% to \$112,005,880, down from \$114,563,754 in 2008 for a daily average of \$3,111,274 compared with \$3,182,327 last year. All-sources handle, which includes money bet on Saratoga races from simulcast outlets across the country, was \$513,837,237, down 1.7% from \$522,530,643 in 2008.

In early September, Equibase reported an 11.1% decline in wagering nationwide through the first eight months of the year and a 12.4% percent drop in wagering in August compared with the same month last year.

"By any measure, the 2009 Saratoga meet was an overwhelming success," NYRA President Charles Hayward said. "Performances on the track were led by a history-making Woodward [Stakes (G1)] victory by Rachel Alexandra, and attendance and total wagering far exceeded our expectations."

On the track, Linda Rice became the first female to win a training title at the Spa as her 20 wins topped four-time Eclipse Award winner Todd Pletcher by a single victory. It was the first training title of any kind for Rice, 45, who opened her own stable in 1987.

"It means the world to me," said Rice, who picked up all 20 victories in races that were carded on grass. "It has been a lot of work and a long time coming. It's a real honor to compete at the greatest racetrack in the world and come out with the training title.

"I don't think you can go into Saratoga and think you're going to win the training title. It was a lot of fun. Todd [Pletcher], Steve Assmussen, Billy Mott, Kiaran McLaughlin—they're great horsemen; they have very nice horses and nice stables. It's not easy to win a

training title at Saratoga, period."

Ramon Dominguez captured the jockey title for the 36-day meet with 45 wins. Alan Garcia was a distant second with 40 victories.

Dominguez set a modern-day record for victories at the Belmont Park spring-summer meet with 98 wins and was the leading jockey at Aqueduct's inner-track winter and spring meetings.

"I'm very happy to be able to finish ahead—this is the meet that everybody wants to win," Dominguez said. "I'm just grateful. Everybody in New York has been very supportive, and my business has been pretty big, so I just hope that continues."

Kentucky-based owners Ken and Sarah Ramsey were the leading owners for the second straight year, collecting 13 wins from 60 starts.—*Steve Bailey*

New York institutes new rule for oxygen therapy

The New York State Racing and Wagering Board has voted to require state racetracks to refuse entries for horses that have received a hyperbaric oxygen therapy treatment within one week of post time.

The board announced the new policy, which is endorsed by the New York Racing Association, on July 28. Joe Mahoney, public information officer for the Racing and Wagering Board, said guidelines for oxygen treatments previously were covered in a catchall rule that did not specifically address hyperbaric oxygen therapy.

Hyperbaric oxygen therapy chambers are used by some trainers to accelerate healing in a horse that has been injured or has an infection.

"If a horse needs hyperbaric oxygen therapy to get from the starting gate to the finish line, it shouldn't be in the race," John Sabini, Racing and Wagering Board chairman, said in a statement. "Purified oxygen does not exist naturally in a horse.

"We are clarifying now that these types of treatments are in the same category we reserve for equine drugs. We are very concerned that, within a certain window, these treatments could

give a horse an unfair advantage in a race while jeopardizing the horse's health."

The new rule also applies the same restrictions to all other forms of purified oxygen treatment.

Sabini said the directive was created after the operator of a hyperbaric therapy chamber sought approval from NYRA to set up the equipment at Saratoga Race Course. NYRA refused the request, so the operator set up the equipment at an off-track location in the city of Saratoga Springs.

The board now is requiring the operator to provide a log of all horses getting the treatments.

"Promoting integrity and transparency for the betting public and ensuring horse health are among my highest priorities," Sabini said. "Putting limits on when a racehorse can get hyperbaric oxygen therapy is a step in the direction of greater integrity.

"I am aware that some veterinarians promote the use of hyperbaric oxygen therapy. Our rule does not prohibit racehorses from undergoing this therapy. We're just saying they can't have it within one week of a race."

Horse of the Year Commentator retired, has Spa send-off

Commentator's bid for a third Whitney Handicap (G1) victory fell short by three lengths on August 8, and the reigning New York Horse of the Year was retired the following day by his owner, Tracy Farmer. Before he headed off to retirement in Kentucky, he was honored by the New York Racing Association with a Saratoga Race Course tribute on September 6.

The eight-year-old Distorted Humor gelding won 14 of 24 lifetime starts and earned \$2,049,845. Trained by Racing Hall of Fame member Nick Zito, he is the third New York-bred to surpass \$2-million in purse earnings, joining 2003 Kentucky Derby (G1) and Preakness Stakes (G1) winner Funny Cide and Say Florida Sandy.

Bred by Michael Martinez out of the Storm Bird mare Outsource, Commentator won the Whitney in 2005 and '08, and he also scored dominant, front-running victories in last year's Richter Scale Sprint Handicap (G2) and Massachusetts Handicap.

On its September 6 program, NYRA named the fifth race, an overnight stakes race for New York-bred three-year-olds and up, "The Commentator."



Commentator appeared in the paddock before the race and then headed to the main track. After parading for fans in front of the stands, Commentator was led into the winner's circle to enjoy an edible key to the city prepared by Glen Sanders Mansion Bakery in his favorite flavor, peppermint.

"I want to thank NYRA and the fans of New York for supporting Commentator," Zito said. "It has been special to bring him to Saratoga for so many Whitneys, and we almost pulled it off for his third [win]. It has been a tremen-

dous honor. The fans know how hard it is to keep a horse going that long and to run at that high level, and that's what we did. He brought his game every day. It's bittersweet. It's sad, but it's happy."

"Commentator had a spectacular racing career, and he saved some of his best performances for Saratoga Race Course," said NYRA President Charles Hayward. "We were thrilled to give the fans a chance to see him one more time on the Saratoga track and would also like to commend Nick Zito, along with Tracy and Carol Farmer, for their classy and professional handling of the horse."

Going for broke

New York City OTB restructuring is critical for industry

In terms of brick-and-mortar locations, the days of a New York City Off-Track Betting Corp. outlet seemingly on every Big Apple block will end after the current bankruptcy restructuring.

But in some ways the currently state-owned corporation hopes to expand as it looks to survive. A key source of funding for New York racing and breeding, the betting behemoth's Chapter 9 bankruptcy lists \$228-million of debt. Still, New York City OTB Chairman Sandy Frucher believes a new business plan can return the corporation to solvency.

While the OTB corporation figures to reduce its 57 simulcast branches in five New York boroughs, Frucher would like to see the agency expand its availability online, at restaurants, and in hotels. Hotel outlets would rely on a swipe card and availability of 24-hour signals, perhaps even virtual racing, which Frucher said is already legal in New York.

"We could go head-to-head with pornography and win," said Frucher, former chairman of the Philadelphia Stock Exchange and former chief labor negotiator for New York state.

While Frucher has remained optimistic, New York City OTB will face significant changes that figure to affect racing and breeding on the state and national level. The OTB operation will cut outlets and employees. Frucher also is interested in changing complicated laws that currently award New York Thoroughbred and Standardbred tracks a cut from OTB wagers on out-of-state simulcasts.

Frucher called for more cooperation between the tracks and the state's five other regional OTB corporations, two of which are struggling. He noted costs could be lowered by sharing tote operations, combining operations, and working together. The six OTB corporations handled \$1.529-billion on Thoroughbred racing last year.

"The six regional OTBs and the tracks all compete with each other," Frucher said. "Most states work together on a strategic plan."

A plan also might include increased takeout. "Unfortunately the amount of money that goes back to the bettor is 80%, so you're really only dealing with 20% [of handle]," Frucher said.

Key reorganization

For some racing fans outside the Big Apple, their impression of New York City OTB is based on the "Seinfeld" episode in which the character Kramer cashes a big score at a small, seedy outlet. Later he is mugged.

While such outlets provide comic fodder, the failure of New York City OTB threatens the entire racing industry. Due in part to some of those seedy outlets, \$1 of every \$17.11 wagered on Thoroughbred racing last year in the U.S. was made at a New York City OTB outlet.

When New York City voters approved off-track betting in 1963 and the New York Legislature authorized OTB in '70—with the goal of cutting into organized crime's bookmaking operations—the government and the racing industry worked to carve out their take in the public-benefit corporation. Taxes and surcharges are numerous and complicated. Frucher pointed out that New York City OTB paid fees to Standardbred track Yonkers Raceway for 18 months even though that track was not running.

New York City OTB is the largest handle provider for the New York Racing Association. Bennett Liebman, executive director of the Government Law Center of Albany Law School, said that, for any out-of-state track that sends its signal into New York City OTB, typically the handle on that signal is the largest of any out-of-state location. Last year, New York City OTB handled \$797,626,300 with 63.6% of that figure on out-of-state races.

Besides paying fees for NYRA races, New York City OTB pays fees to state tracks for out-of-state simulcast races. Those fees, split with horsemen, have helped NYRA offer an attractive purse structure over the years.

On the other hand, New York City OTB fees to out-of-state tracks are typically very low. With the leverage of its large revenue source, the corporation has negotiated low fees with out-of-state tracks, typically 2% or less.

While racing handle dropped 7.3% in the U.S. in 2008 and continues to slide this year, typically off-track operations have managed to fare better than racetracks, which face added expenses of producing the product. For instance, the other New York OTB corporations are not in as bad of shape as New York City OTB.

As New York Gov. David Paterson noted in announcing the Chapter 9 reorganization, "it takes a certain level of ineptness to lose money in a gambling situation."

Liebman pointed out that rent is higher in New York City, as are taxes. New York City OTB has provided numerous union jobs that politicians have been reluctant to eliminate. Those labor contracts were negotiated by New York City, which ran the OTB operation until the state took it over in June 2008 under a threat of a shutdown by Mayor Michael Bloomberg.

New York City OTB is now paying about \$600-million in employee benefits, which Frucher said would continue. But it is clear that many of the corporation's 1,300 employees will lose their jobs in the restructuring.

Frucher would like to see the entire state's OTB setup streamlined. "How many presidents of OTBs do you want to pay for?" he asked.

Because Chapter 9 bankruptcy involves government entities, there is no liquidation of property. In announcing the Chapter 9 bankruptcy—the first in New York state's history—Paterson said the current business model is not working.

"This was designed to fail," Paterson said. "This has to start running like a business, not like whatever you would call it now."

The state is owed \$40-million. New York City OTB plans to hold off on any state debt payments to continue operations. Otherwise, it would run out of operating money between December and March. NYRA is owed \$14-million. The city is owed \$9-million.

Looking to the future

While each entity has its own story, the industry has watched NYRA file for Chapter 11 bankruptcy protection in November 2006 followed by New York City OTB's Chapter 9 filing this year. Earlier this year, North America's largest racetrack owner, Magna Entertainment Corp., filed for Chapter 11.

With handle expected to fall by more than \$1-billion for a second straight year, it is clear that racetracks, off-track outlets, and advance-deposit wagering outlets no longer can stand heavy cost burdens.

Frucher believes betting cards, similar to debit cards, that allow the user access to self-service wagering will help New York City OTB reduce labor costs while proving attractive to players. He would like to reduce the number of OTB parlors to only the most profitable while increasing these self-service machines in bars, restaurants, and eventually hotel rooms.

Some of these plans could be done in a partnership with the state's Thoroughbred and Standardbred tracks as well as the other regional OTBs.

Frucher also is calling on lawmakers to allow the regional OTBs to retain money to improve their infrastructures, betting machines, and promote operations. For now, New York City OTB is assuring its customers it will continue operations.

Liebman does not think NYRA and New York breeders should count on a strong return of cash flow from the New York City entity, which contributed \$386-million to the Thoroughbred and Standardbred industry in the four years ending in 2008. In 2008 alone, New York City OTB paid \$54,501,563 to New York Thoroughbred tracks.

First, state laws could be rewritten to reduce the percentage commitments to the racetracks. In the Chapter 9 proceeding, the court will work with New York City OTB and debtors before determining a reorganization plan. Leases probably will be canceled; employee contracts will be terminated or renegotiated. If the plan includes changes to mandated payouts, those law changes will be presented to the Legislature for a vote.

Second, Liebman cautioned that New York City OTB's plans might overestimate revenue. A reduction in outlets may result in some patrons halting play if their neighborhood OTB is axed. Moreover, New York City OTB will find plenty of national competition when it enters the advance-deposit wagering market.

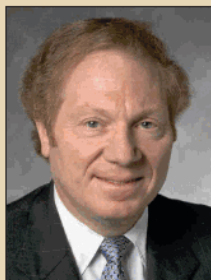
Double whammy for breeders

Barry Ostrager, president of New York Thoroughbred Breeders Inc., noted in August that the state's breeders and the racing industry they support have been hit with a double whammy.

Video lottery terminals (VLTs) authorized for Aqueduct still have not been implemented almost eight years after legalization, and now New York City Off-Track Betting Corp. is not paying its bills, including payments to breeders.

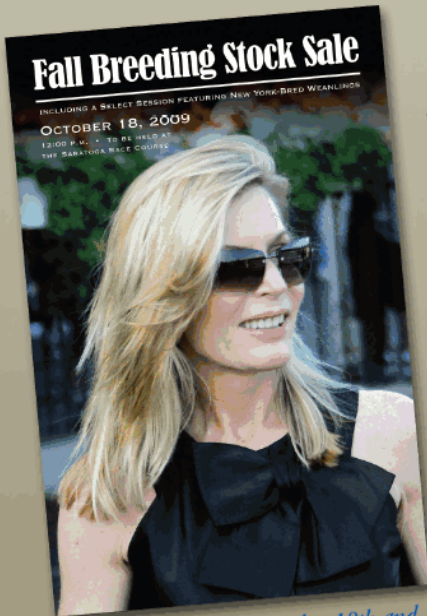
As a result of the difficulties within the New York industry, he said, many owners have taken their horses to neighboring Pennsylvania, whose lucrative gaming operations have boosted purses and provided generous breeders' awards.

"Our industry, which has a \$2.5-billion impact on the New York state [gross domestic product], is in a severe state of contraction owing to the failure of the state to implement VLTs at Aqueduct and the general state of the national economy," Ostrager told *The Saratogian*. "The New York City OTB situation simply has to be promptly and effectively addressed. The advantages of such a filing [Chapter 9 bankruptcy authorized by Gov. David Paterson] is that it would enable New York City OTB to streamline its operations, terminating many of its unprofitable leases in New York City, and perhaps work out sensible pension buyout arrangements with a significant number of its employees."

In step with the market

Preferred sale's sharp decline is representative of current reality

A 20% drop in total sales at the 2009 Fasig-Tipton New York-bred preferred yearling sale on August 15-16 in Saratoga Springs was a dose of reality for the Thoroughbred market.

Just a week earlier, the Humphrey S. Finney sales pavilion was the scene of an economy-defying rally when the Fasig-Tipton sale of selected yearlings experienced a 45.6% increase in total sales from 2008 and an 11.1% increase in average price.

It was one of the best Saratoga sales in history despite one of the worst global and Thoroughbred economies.

But as all but the most optimistic sellers knew, the preferred sale is a considerably different marketplace. And as the results showed, the struggles that the industry has been suffering over the past 12 months are very real.

The industry has a shortage of buyers right now, and that imbalance in supply and demand has been made worse for commercial breeders who paid boom-market stud fees in 2007 but are selling into the burst bubble of '09.

The results of the preferred sale showed 107 horses sold from 198 offered, for total sales of \$4,353,500. Average price of \$40,687 was a 25.2% drop from last year while median declined 40% to \$27,000. Buy-back rate improved slightly from 47.4% in 2008 to a still high 46% this year.

"At the end of the day these results are kind of indicative and consistent with the results we saw [at the Fasig-Tipton Kentucky July sale of selected yearlings] and what most of us expected going into the yearling season," said Fasig-Tipton President Boyd Browning Jr.

New York-based trainer Seth Benzel, agent for Whitehall Stable, signed the ticket for the sale-topping Medaglia d'Oro colt for \$275,000.

"Medaglia d'Oro is the hottest sire out there," Benzel said. "The family line is strong, and we thought as an individual he had the most potential of anything in this sale to accomplish the most. To us, the sky is the limit with this type of horse."

"[President] Jim [Pippo] and Whitehall have stepped up and

shown they're part of this game and willing to go that extra mile to get a good horse."

The colt, named Main Principal, is out of Argentine Group 2 winner Miss Mary (Arg), a full sister to Argentine champion and U.S. Grade 1 winner Miss Linda (Arg) and Argentine champion miler Mr. Nancho (Arg).

The late John Hettinger bred the sale topper, and Thorndale Farm consigned the colt on behalf of Hettinger's Akindale Farm.

"It was very fitting the sale topper was owned by Akindale Farm, given John Hettinger's many years of support and contributions to the New York breeding program and Fasig-Tipton," Browning said.

Denali Stud was leading consignor by total sales with 15 sold for \$883,000. Todd Quast, agent for Paul Bulmahn's Ocala-based GoldMark Farm, was leading buyer with five purchases for \$420,000, including the sale's top-priced filly, a \$200,000 Sky Mesa filly out of stakes winner Mandy Mack, by Native Prospector.

Becky Boyd's Peacock Ridge consigned the filly on behalf of a partnership with breeder New Dawn Thoroughbreds.

Quast stayed in town after GoldMark bought three horses at the

selected sale, making GoldMark one of the few end-users who shopped both sales.

"We spent a little more time up here this year," Quast said. "Paul [Bulmahn] enjoys coming up here, and we figured the New York-bred program is going to get better and better, so we thought we'd participate. We're just starting out with the four we bought here last year."

Ten horses sold for \$100,000 or more this year, compared with 16 last year. Kentucky sires dominated the top-prices list. You had to go down to the 23rd-most expensive horse to find a New York stallion, a Freud filly consigned by Sequel Stallions New York and purchased by GoldMark for \$55,000.

Only 22 yearlings (11% of those offered) could be classified as profitable for their breeders based on advertised stud fees.

"I think what we saw at the preferred sale was obviously a continued correction in the market," said Todd Venetz, general manager of the New York Breeders' Sales Co. "What's obvious but sometimes difficult to stomach is that a lot of people bred on yesterday's dollars and are selling in today's world. Unfortunately until the entire market adjusts itself, that's going to make it tough."

"On the plus side, some farms are starting to work with people who bred to their stallions, revisit the contracts, and helping them out. Twenty-four months ago, the horse economy was a completely separate place."

The New York Breeders' Sales Co. will hold its fall mixed sale at Saratoga on October 18. Originally scheduled for two days, the auction was reduced to one day because of reduced entries.

"We lost 150 to 200 horses, but our quality is through the roof. We've got some sires we've never been able to place a hand on in the past, and I honestly think the weanlings will be super strong," said Venetz, who believes the buyers' market has a positive side.

"The situation is a little tough right now, but I'm confident it's

going to turn around. It's not that people aren't racing horses anymore, but the end-users are in a position of strength. They have the ability to be very picky in what they choose and to buy horses at much lower prices than they could in the past. This is the best time ever to get into racing. You can buy a pretty nice horse for a reasonable price right now."

Frequent Grey days at tracks

New York native Anthony Grey is the breeder of Wishful Tomcat, Uncle T Seven, and Franny Freud

In winner's circles at New York tracks and elsewhere, Anthony Grey's name has been coming up a lot lately. No fewer than seven times this year, the announcement of the winning connections in stakes competition has included the phrase "bred by Anthony Grey."

In April, May, and June, Grade 3 winner Wishful Tomcat reeled off three consecutive victories in state-bred stakes at Aqueduct and Belmont Park. In March, his half brother Uncle T Seven captured the \$100,000 New York Stallion Stakes Times Square Division at Aqueduct and in August won the \$150,000 Cab Calloway Division at Saratoga Race Course.

In August and September, two Grey-bred two-year-olds grabbed

the spotlight. Fanny Freud won the \$142,487 Ontario Debutante Stakes at Woodbine and the \$150,662 Lady Finger Stakes at Finger Lakes, while Jung Man Scott ran second in the With Anticipation Stakes (G3) on the grass at Saratoga in his third lifetime start.

Through August, Grey-breeds had 122 starts, 20 wins, and earnings of \$685,598 in 2009. Taking into account early September winnings and performances of other horses that Grey has bred in partnerships, the total earnings approach \$900,000. In addition, Grey has an 11%

interest in Freud, New York's leading sire, and a 2.5% interest in Read the Footnotes, New York's leading second-crop sire. Without question, Anthony Grey has built a formidable equine portfolio in a relatively few years.

Although first introduced to racing through trips to the track with his father, Grey developed an especially strong and abiding interest in racing as a senior at Chaminade High School in Mineola in 1975, when he was classmates with future trainer Stephen L. DiMauro, son of trainer Stephen A. DiMauro. This was the year of the elder DiMauro's headiest successes, when he conditioned champion two-year-old filly Dearly Precious and champion three-year-old male Wajima. DiMauro himself was voted an Eclipse Award as the year's outstanding trainer.

Although this was an inspiring introduction, Grey did not actively enter the breeding business until 2002. When the Internet stock bubble burst and the markets for both stocks and Thoroughbreds tumbled, the elder DiMauro suggested to Grey that it would be an excellent time to put money into the Thoroughbred business.

Through his association with the DiMauros, Grey also was aware of the opportunities offered by the New York program. By this time, Grey had also been introduced to Jack Werk, owner of Werk Thoroughbred Consultants and the creator of eNicks. As a bond trader, Grey was intimately familiar with probability, and he was immediately drawn to the concept of nicking.

The basic tenet of nicking—that A nicks or better account for a statistically much greater percentage of stakes winners than exist in the Thoroughbred population at large—seemed to Grey to be a powerful tool for increasing the probability of success. Grey had also developed a working relationship with Becky Thomas of Sequel Stallions, both with the prospect of buying broodmares and investing in Freud's career at stud.

The dispersal sale of Diane Perkins' Wimborne Farm in Kentucky in 2002 was pivotal. Perkins and her late husband had bred, campaigned, and stood Lord At War (Arg), and Grey was convinced of his value as a broodmare sire; in 2000, his daughter Primarily was named Canadian Broodmare of the Year.

Working with Thomas and planning to breed his purchases to Freud, Grey approached the dispersal looking for good Lord At War

mares who nicked well with sons of Storm Cat such as Freud.

He made a short list of ten to 12 mares and then relied on Thomas' expertise to inspect the horses and decide on an ultimate bidding strategy. At the dispersal, Grey purchased for \$15,000 his best broodmare, Holy Wish, the dam of Wishful Tomcat and Uncle T Seven. His strategy from the start was to buy pregnant mares, bring them to New York to foal, and then breed them to Freud. He currently has approximately ten mares.

Although he started by breeding for the commercial marketplace, two years ago Grey changed his strategy. Frustrated by not getting what he regarded as fair prices for good yearlings and two-year-olds at the sales, he formed Winter Park Partners with the game plan of taking his homebreds to the track to prove themselves and then offering them for sale. The strategy seems to be paying off, whether he sells the horse outright (as was the case with Wishful Tomcat, whom he sold to IEAH Stables and partners) or retains an interest, as with Franny Freud (now owned jointly by Paul Pompa Jr., Stephen Yarbrough, and Winter Park Partners).

When the Internet stock bubble burst and the markets for both stocks and Thoroughbreds tumbled, the elder Steve DiMauro suggested to Anthony Grey that it would be an excellent time to put money into the Thoroughbred business.

Grey uses a variety of trainers in New York, again with an eye toward increasing his chances for success; different trainers will have varied bases of clients who may be interested in purchasing two-year-olds and racing them in New York.

Grey is especially proud of Holy Wish; Wishful Tomcat became her first graded winner when he won the 2008 Discovery Handicap (G3). Among Grey's 15 homebred foals of 2009, he singles out Holy Wish's colt by Silver Train as the one he is most excited about.

His enthusiasm also extends to Holy Wish's female offspring. He kept her unraced daughter Holy Freud to breed and went out of his way to acquire her first daughter, Plinking, who was born before he bought Holy Wish, toward the end of her racing career. Plinking is the dam of Jung Man Scott, by Freud.

Grey certainly is methodical in his approach to the breeding business, but he does allow himself a few flights of fancy. He confesses to a weakness for alliteration; for example: Fiona Freud, Friendly Freud, Fast Footnote, Franny Freud, and Fresh Footnotes.

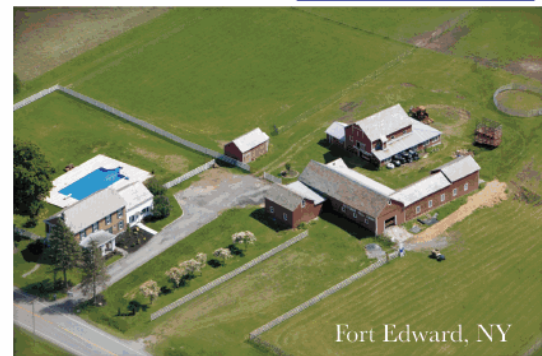
Then there is The Dream. He said he once dreamed that he was going to win the Kentucky Derby (G1) with a gray horse. He has bred to some stallions with a tendency to produce gray or roan offspring, in the hope that a gray will take Grey to the Churchill Downs winner's stand.

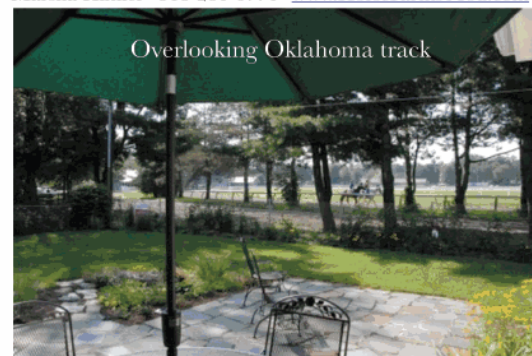

Legacy of the Blues

Multiple stakes winner Mor Chances is a grandson of Cure the Blues

In the autumn of 1986, the author fell in love.

When I arrived at Giltown Stud in company with my then-employer, Pillar Stud owner William duPont III, the primary object was supposed to be Secretariat's son General Assembly, but the other half of what turned out to be a package deal was Cure the Blues.

Tall and somewhat light, Cure the Blues was perfectly balanced and correct, but he had terrible feet. The elegant stallion had been a brilliantly fast front-runner who won his first six starts, including the Laurel Futurity (G1), before quarter cracks in those bad feet derailed his racing career.

Cure the Blues proved a far better sire in the U.S. than General Assembly, eventually ending his stud career at Miller Stud in Unadilla, New York, with 84 stakes winners from 874 foals (9.6%). Cure the Blues' best American-based sire son, American Chance, also ended his career in New York, and he is the sire of this year's most prolific of New York-bred stakes winners, Mor Chances.

Bred by Mike and Penny Lauer, Mor Chances failed to meet his reserve on a final bid of \$3,500 at the 2005 Keeneland September yearling sale and began his racing career the following year with Mike Lauer as owner and trainer. Mor Chances placed second in his second start at two and then ran sixth to Chief Officer in the 2006 New York Breeders' Futurity.

He did not make it back to the races until June 2007 and won his maiden victory in his third start back. For the next year, Mor Chances raced steadily in allowance and optional claiming company, winning occasionally, but he posed no threat in his sole stakes effort.

Halfway through that period, he was sold privately to SAB Stable, but his racing career changed on September 21, 2008, when trainer Richard Dutrow Jr. claimed him for \$50,000 from an optional claimer on behalf of Sullivan Lane Stable.

American Chance horse returns to his best form in High Ice Stakes at Belmont

Two months later, Mor Chances began a four-race stakes win streak by capturing the New York Stallion Thunder Rumble Stakes. Victories in the 2009 Kashatreya, Hollie Hughes, and Kim's Chance Stakes earned Mor Chances a start against open company, and he acquitted himself well, finishing third to the brilliant miler Bribon (Fr) and Discreet Treasure in the Westchester Stakes (G3) on April 29.

He finished third to Redefined and Meriwether Jessica in the Dedicated Rullah Stakes on his return to New York-bred company

but bounced back to his best form in his most recent start with a determined victory over Law Enforcement in the High Ice Stakes on June 18.

Mor Chances is one of 31 stakes winners from 432 foals (7.2%) sired by American Chance, who died on October 19, 2004, at Haras La Providencia in Argentina, where he shuttled in '03 and '04. American Chance stood his final Northern Hemisphere season in New York at Empire Stud in Hudson after standing the previous two years at Questroyal Stud in Claverack.

American Chance was one of the best American-based sons of Cure the Blues, winning ten of 37 starts and earning \$847,977, including the 1992 Jersey Derby (G2) and '94 Forego Handicap (G2). A versatile horse who set a track record at Ellis Park for 6½ furlongs in 1:15, he possessed enough stamina to last the 1¼ miles of the Jersey Derby and was classy enough to run second to Harlan (and ahead of eventual champion sprinter Cherokee Run) in the 1994 Vosburgh Stakes (G1).

Mor Chances' earnings of \$431,927 for his nine wins in 29 starts through August 31 make him the

sixth-leading money earner for American Chance. The sire's best offspring, the multiple Grade 2 winner Bending Strings, earned \$870,612. She is one of nine graded winners by American Chance, a list that includes 2005 Woodford Reserve Turf Classic Stakes (G1) winner America Alive. American Chance boasts another recent 2009 stakes winner in Silvercup Baby, winner of the Union Avenue Stakes on August 24 at Saratoga Race Course.

American Chance also succeeded on his two sojourns to Argentina, siring 2008 General Lavalle (Arg-G3) winner Circle Road.

Miss Winmor

Mike and Penny Lauer, who are based primarily in Kentucky, transferred Mor Chances' dam, Miss Winmor, by Northern Baby, to New York as a result of WinStar Farm's program of foaling offspring of Distorted Humor in New York. In 2003, Miss Winmor foaled her subsequently gelded colt Starhumor, by Distorted Humor, in New York, and she was bred back to American Chance. Miss Winmor remained in New York to foal Mor Chances before being sent back to Kentucky for breeding.

Starhumor has earned \$114,300 through August 31. Miss Winmor's 2006 foal, the Indiana-bred Tenmor, by Tenpins, has earned \$115,734 and won the Hillsdale Stakes.

Miss Winmor acquitted herself well on the racetrack, winning four of 19 starts and running third in the 1994 Rambling Rose Stakes, with career earnings of \$42,459. The Lauers purchased Miss Winmor for only \$8,000 at the 1995 Keeneland January mixed sale a few months after their filly Blushing Maggie (owned in partnership with Fred Hall) finished second, one place ahead of Miss Winmor, in the Rambling Rose.

Canada whose seven stakes victories included the Alberta Derby. She also produced stakes winner Churchbridge, by Expelled, and was the second dam of New York-bred stakes winner Mt. Majesty, by Raffle's Majesty.

Cure the Blues' best American-based sire son, American Chance, also ended his career in New York, and is the sire of this year's most prolific of New York-bred stakes winners, Mor Chances.

Winmor Miss' dam, Creature Comfort, by Ack Ack, was a daughter of the excellent racemare Fortunate Isle, by *Ambiorix, winner of the 1963 Milady Handicap. Fortunate Isle produced only one minor stakes winner, but her daughter Laredo Lass, by Bold Ruler, was the dam of Grade 1 winner Mitterand, by Hold Your Peace, dam in turn of Grade 2 winner and good sire French Deputy.

Another daughter of Laredo Lass, Negative Pledge, was the dam of Grade 3 winner Collect Call, by Meadowlake, whose Grade 2-winning son Old Fashioned, by Unbridled's Song, retires to stud next year.

Mor Chances' grandsire Cure the Blues was from the same family as Secretariat, and ironically American Chance was from the same family as General Assembly. His dam, American Dance, by Seattle Slew, was a daughter of General Assembly's talented half sister Expressive Dance, by Riva Ridge.

The sire line of Cure the Blues lives on in Argentina through the outstanding New York-bred Incurable Optimist, but Mor Chances is an apt reminder of the brilliance of his grandsire. The legacy of Cure the Blues lives on through Mor Chances.

EXPLANATION OF INDEXES

Racing Index (RI)

RI is based on the average earnings per start for all runners in the United States, Canada, England, Ireland, France, Italy, Germany, Puerto Rico, and United Arab Emirates. RI is determined by calculating the average earnings per start, divided into males and females, of all starters in each individual country, and the average for each individual year is by definition 1.00. Median RI, however, is much lower. Actual distribution of RI is detailed below.

Sire Index (SI)

The Sire Index (SI) is an average of the Racing Index (RI) of all foals by a sire that have started at least three times. For SI to be calculated, a sire must be represented by a minimum of three crops and 25 starters lifetime.

Breeding Rules

To qualify for registration as a New York-bred, the mare must foal in New York state and meet the following domicile requirements:

Resident Mares: Must be continuously in residence in New York state from within 90 days after last cover in the year of conception and thereafter remain in residence until foaling the following year, with no breed-back required.

Non-Resident Mares: Must foal in New York state and be bred back to a registered New York-based stallion and remain for a continuous period of 90 days after foaling.
