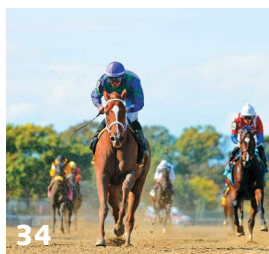
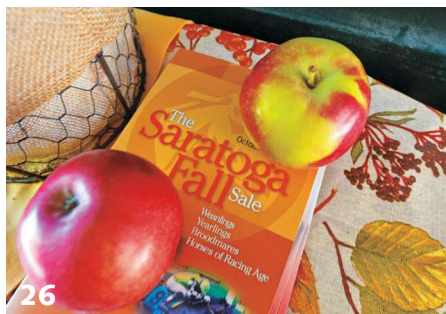

Q & A with Tom Law

MANY of the country's state-bred breeding programs put on a stand-alone day of racing to spotlight the state's product. A handful might put on two. The very rare few feature three.

New York stages three racing programs restricted to New York-breds and the third, the original and the most popular of the trio—the Empire Showcase—went down for the 21st time Oct. 18 at Belmont Park. The Empire Showcase featured eight stakes worth \$1.7 million, and it followed the already run Big Apple Showcase in the spring at Belmont and the Saratoga Showcase in the summer at Saratoga. The Empire Showcase was inaugurated in 1994 and typically goes a long way toward determining the champions bred in New York.

Tom Law, managing editor of *This Is Horse Racing*, recently caught up with New York Thoroughbred Breeders' executive director Jeffrey Cannizzo to discuss the past, present, and future of Showcase Day events and the 2014 edition of the Empire Showcase.

TIHR: What makes the Empire Showcase card stand out from the other two special New York-bred days?

JC: The Empire Showcase Day is the original championship day for New York-breds. For decades this day determined many of the state-bred champions for each division. It was the first \$1 million day for New York-breds; therefore, it has the most prestige for our program. This year the day is worth \$1.7 million in purses.

TIHR: Any significant changes?

JC: We added one new race—the Empire Distaff for fillies and mares going 1 $\frac{1}{16}$ miles and for a purse of \$250,000. It's a natural fit and will help the older female division and our bloodstock market. We then added to the Empire Classic, making it worth \$300,000 to enhance the marquee race for New York-breds as it should be. Lastly, we upped the purses for both 2-year-old stakes to \$250,000, making them the defining races for our juveniles.

TIHR: Discuss what makes big days like Empire Showcase, Big Apple Showcase, and Saratoga Showcase so special.

JC: These multi-million dollar days help define the term "Showcase." The intent is to show off the best state-breds. NYRA has also included various state-level agricultural programs to help make these days the best of what New York has to offer. It's the same principle that tracks use these big single-day events to draw fans and handle, so it benefits NYRA. Typically these days are some of NYRA's top days for handle, usually in the top five on the year. People who follow New York racing see these days as a way to determine our own champions for each division. The black type gives value to breeders. The purse structure provides value to owners and bloodstock agents. Overall, everyone wins.

TIHR: In May you said you'd like to see the Showcase Days continue to grow with participation. Considering there are 82 horses entered in the eight stakes, how would you assess the Empire Showcase card heading into Saturday?

JC: Eighty-two horses entered says it all for eight stakes races. The field size is what you would hope for. Horsemen target this day year after year for New York-breds as they should. Our improved 2014 stakes schedule, which was laid out well in advance for the entire year, helped create a year-long program for each division leading up to this day. The great part is that the schedule will continue all the way until the last day of the year for New York-breds.

TIHR: Nineteen of the 82 horses entered competed on the inaugural Saratoga Showcase Day card and 19 competed on the Big Apple Showcase card. How important is it to have those repeat competitors?

JC: It builds competition and helps de-

velop a fan base for these horses. This type of model is actually what the national picture needs in some fashion further than what we have today. People love to develop favorites and follow them. It's a racing circuit, with quality.

TIHR: This summer marked the first Showcase event at Saratoga. Can you give that event a grade and explain why?

JC: I'd give it a B+. Simply because we should always keep improving and never be stagnant. The handle was good, attendance was solid—both of which were an increase from the same day in prior years at Saratoga. Therefore, it worked for NYRA and for the New York Thoroughbred Breeders. I want to see greater participation to the point where we average 10-horse fields, as we are this weekend on Empire Day. I'm confident it will happen with our increasing foal-crop size.

TIHR: We also talked about expansion back in May, possibly for a Showcase Day every quarter. Any possibility of that in the near future?

JC: In the upcoming weeks Martin Panza and I will be laying out the 2015 New York-bred stakes schedule. At that point we will evaluate what worked in 2014 and what we can make better and/or develop.

TIHR: This is a repeat from May but worthy of another response. Where would you like to see the Showcase racing programs in five years?

JC: Again, my goal is to have these days on national television in five years. There is a possibility that Empire Showcase Day 2015 could very well be broadcast on one of NYRA's efforts with Fox Sports 1.

TIHR: Talk about the priorities for the NYTB in 2015 and beyond.

JC: NYTB is focused on 1) protecting breeders' and horsemen's interests with purses and breeder awards via casino gaming; 2) long-term planning for NYRA at its three racing venues; 3) New York-bred race days; 4) increasing the value of New York-breds, both in the sales ring and on the racetrack due to the previous points. 🐾

SIMMARD

DEAR BREEDERS,

I am writing to you once again about "SIMMARD." There are, as you know, certain proven methods that breeders everywhere rely on for success. However, even with these practices in place, the truth is that the ultimate outcome of our breeding efforts – whether we like it or not – is largely determined by nature. Which is why, as breeders, we need to learn as much as we can about those proven breeding practices in order to help tilt the odds in our favor. The past is often prologue to the future, and it is necessary to assimilate the lessons learned to have the highest chance of breeding a great racehorse and even the **ULTIMATE CHAMPION**. There are numerous crosses that have already proven to work well and produce great race horses...

SIMMARD is one of the most remarkable sons of Dixieland Band, a line that has worked before and is working now by producing top horses.

The great love affair that Dixieland Band and his sons have with the Mr. Prospector line has flourished for decades. The strong history of this winning combination is seen in the repeated pairing of Dixieland Band with Mr. Prospector sons and daughters including Forty Niner, Distinctive Pro, Gulch, Seeking the Gold, Machiavellian, Carson City, Smart Strike, Gone West, Mr. Greely, Allen's Prospect, Thunder Gulch, Two Punch, Crafty Prospector, Fusaichi Pegasus, Marquetry, Fortune Prospector, Pollard's Vision, E Dubai, and City Zip.

There is an especially potent connection between Dixieland Band with granddaughters of the great Fappiano via Quiet American daughters, Unbridled daughters and granddaughters, and Unbridled's Song daughters. Broken Vow and Eddington are proven to get a top horse when connected with the Dixieland Band line.

There is a great connection with daughters of A.P. Indy and his sons starting to do the same; with Deputy Minister daughters and granddaughter by sons of Deputy Minister; and with Storm Bird via Storm Cat and sons, daughters, and granddaughters.

Simnard is inbred to Northern Dancer through Dixieland Band and through Nijinsky II, the sire of his granddam, State. **With the story of Union Rags as evidence, Simnard should excel when crossed with Gone West daughters that have Nijinsky II.** The powerful cross between Nasrullah and Pricequillo is very much alive

when you cross Simnard with daughters of Gone West. You get this explosion of power, speed and stamina that can never be forgotten. Just remember Secretariat! There are hundreds of stakes horses carrying inbreeding to Nijinsky II...there is a great connection between Nijinsky II and Pleasant Colony, Blushing Groom and Private Account, and there is also potential in the combination of that line with Roberto, through Arch and Lear Fan, and with Forli. These are great combinations that can produce a good horse and a classic winner (I can give you more names that you can study if you email me at Dormellito Stud).

Now, with some tremendous first crop foals resulting from crossing Simnard with mares that carry sons or daughters of Nijinsky II, and with other mares that carry Prince John, a great son of the great Princequillo, we are seeing that Simnard's genetics are a force to be reckoned with. With so much potential, anything can happen...so tell me, what are you waiting for???

TRAVERS, WOODWARD WINNER ALPHA TO NEW YORK FOR 2015

Alpha, a son of leading sire and fellow Darley stallion Bernardini—and the first horse to win both the Travers Stakes and the Woodward Stakes (both gr. I) since Lemon Drop Kid in 2000—has been retired and will stand in 2015 at Becky Thomas' Sequel Stallions in New York.

Alpha will stand for a fee of \$8,500 live foal, stands and nurses.

Alpha won his first start at 2 by six lengths at Saratoga for trainer Kiaran McLaughlin and Sheikh Mohammed's Darley and impressed his connections so much that he next appeared in the Champagne Stakes (gr. I) at Belmont Park under the royal blue silks of the Maktoum family's Godolphin Racing. Alpha finished a creditable second to eventual classic winner Union Rags.

Alpha returned at 3 with consecutive stakes wins at Aqueduct Racetrack, taking the Count Fleet Stakes by 2½ lengths and galloping to victory by 3¼ lengths in the Withers Stakes (gr. III), a win that would prove to be the first of a hat trick last achieved by his own sire nearly 10 years ago. He was also runner-up in the Resorts World Casino New York City Wood Memorial Stakes (gr. I) that season.

At Saratoga later that summer, Alpha again emulated his sire by winning the Jim Dandy Stakes (gr. II) en route to a dead heat victory with Golden Ticket in the time-honored Travers, a win that completed the Alpha/Bernardini hat trick.

Alpha added a second victory at the highest level in the Woodward last year. He amassed a lifetime bankroll of \$1,815,667 and during his career defeated 13 grade I winners.

Bred in Kentucky by Darley out of the stakes-winning Nijinsky II mare Munnaya, Alpha retires with a 6-2-1 record from 22 outings.

Alpha is a half brother to four stakes horses. His third dam

is Canadian champion Kamar, 1990 Kentucky Broodmare of the Year and the dam of Canadian champion Key to the Moon and multiple grade I winner Gorgeous, and Kentucky Oaks (gr. I) winner and grade I producer Seaside Attraction.

"No other stallion son of Bernardini has won more grade Is and with a physical and pedigree to match, we have no doubt he will thrive in New York," said Charlie Boden, head of sales at Darley America.

"We are committed to New York, and they have the best regional breeding program in the U.S. Our stallions have received great support there, and Alpha has the record to suit."

'SOPHIA' MAKES IT THREE FOR CONGAREE

Don't Tell Sophia won the grade I Juddmonte Spinster Stakes Oct. 5 at Keeneland to give her New York-based sire Congaree his third career grade I winner. A winner of seven stakes, Don't Tell Sophia won the Chilukki Stakes (gr. II) last year at Churchill Downs and has earned \$979,295 in 22 starts. She joins the ranks of Congaree's multiple grade I winner Jeranimo, an earner of more than \$1.5 million, and Killer Graces, who triumphed in the 2011 Hollywood Starlet Stakes (gr. I). Congaree stands at Saratoga Stud. His 2014 fee was \$7,500.

DAYATTHESPA DELIVERS IN GRADE I FIRST LADY

New York-bred Dayatthespa earned her second grade I victory over the Keeneland turf course with a powerful performance Oct. 4 in the one-mile, \$400,000 First Lady Stakes.

Trained by Chad Brown for owners Jerry and Ronald Frankel, Steve Laymon, and Bradley Thoroughbreds, Dayatthespa was starting for just the third time this year but had put together strong back-to-back races at Saratoga, having finished second in the Aug. 2 Fasig-Tipton De La Rose Stakes to Filimbi, and defeating fellow New York-bred grade I winner Discreet Marq in the Yaddo Stakes on Saratoga Showcase Day Aug. 24. Filimbi and Discreet Marq were among the nine fillies and mares in the First Lady.

Dayatthespa (7-2 second choice) stalked pacesetter Istanford while under a tight hold. On the far turn the chestnut targeted the leader, took over in upper stretch, and edged clear to a 1¼-length victory in 1:35.21.

The 5-year-old City Zip mare, who will be offered at the Fasig-Tipton November sale, turned the tables on last year's First Lady winner Better Lucky, who had prevailed by a head over Dayatthespa last year. She also became a millionaire in the bargain having increased her earnings to \$1,188,892.

Dayatthespa now boasts a record of 10 wins and four seconds in 17 starts. Her nine stakes victories are headed by her 2012 score in the Queen Elizabeth II Challenge Cup Stakes

(gr. IT) and a pair of grade III wins. Dayatthespa was voted champion New York-bred 3-year-old filly and turf female in 2012.

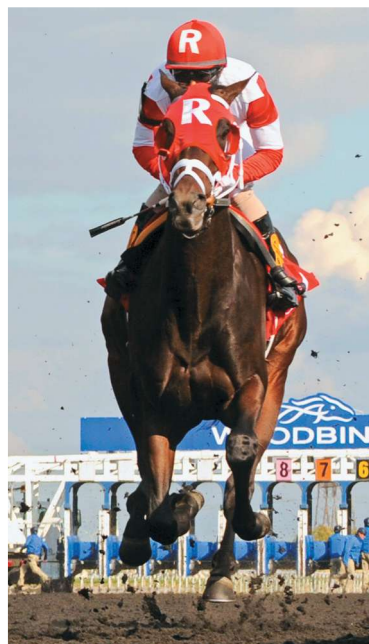
Bred by Castellare DiCracchiolo Stable, Cracchiolo, and Goldsher and foaled at Empire Stud near Hudson, Dayatthespa was purchased by Sarazen Stable for \$50,000 at the Fasig-Tipton New York preferred yearling sale in 2010. Her dam M'Lady Doc, an unplaced daughter of Doc's Leader, is a full sister to Phi Beta Doc, a grade III winner and turf course record-setter at Saratoga and at Colonial Downs.

International Star Brightens Woodbine's Grey Stakes

New York-bred International Star (by Fusaichi Pegasus) lived up to his name Oct. 5, shipping across the border to win Woodbine's \$138,983 Grey Stakes (Can-III), a 1⅙-mile race for 2-year-olds on Polytrack. As part of the "Road to the Kentucky Derby" series the Grey Stakes offered 10 points to the winner toward a berth for the "Run for the Roses."

Trained by Mike Maker for Ken and Sarah Ramsey and supplemented to the race, International Star was making his first start since finishing second in the With Anticipation Stakes (gr. IIT) Aug. 28 at Saratoga after encountering traffic in upper stretch. In two prior starts he had not finished worse than second, winning his debut handily at Belmont June 21 and chasing a lightning-fast Bustin It around the track in the Rockville Centre Stakes July 13.

International Star, who has earned \$190,028 from two wins and two seconds in four starts, was bred by Katharine M. Voss and Robert T. Manfuso and purchased by the Ramseys as a yearling for \$85,000 out of the Fasig-Tipton Midlantic yearling sale last September. International Star's dam, Parlez, is a multiple winner by French Deputy and the dam of stakes winner Fools in Love (by Not For Love).

2015-2016 NYTB ELECTION PROCESS BEGINS

Nominating petitions were mailed to all voting level NYTB members in October. Petitions and curricula vitae for candidates for board directors of New York Thoroughbred Breeders must be received in the NYTB office by the end of business on Thursday, Nov. 13, 2014.

After the Nominating Committee reviews the petitions and verifies a candidate's eligibility, the full election ballot will be mailed. Any voting-level member (individual, joint, or corporate) in good

standing on November 1, 2014 is eligible to vote and will receive a ballot. All ballots must be returned in the enclosed reply envelope addressed to the accounting firm of Whittemore, Downen & Ricciar-delli, LLP (WDR) in Queensbury, NY and must be received by WDR by the end of business on Tuesday December 16, 2014. WDR will tabulate the ballots and inform NYTB of the winning candidates.

LEADING SIRE BLUEGRASS CAT TO BALLENA VISTA

Bluegrass Cat, New York's leading sire by winners and earnings since moving to New York in 2012, will relocate from Rockridge Stud to Donald L. and Karen Cohn's Ballena Vista Farm near Ramona, Calif., for the 2015 breeding season. Ballena Vista Farm acquired the grade 1 winner in conjunction with WinStar Farm.

Bluegrass Cat earned more than \$1.7 million for his owner/breeder WinStar Farm. He was a multiple graded winner at 2 and the winner of the Haskell Invitational Stakes (gr. 1) at 3. He was second in the Kentucky Derby Presented by Yum! Brands, Belmont Stakes, and Travers Stakes (all gr. 1) before retiring to stud at WinStar Farm in 2007.

Bluegrass Cat ranked second among North America's freshman sires by earnings ahead of Bernardini and War Front, and was the number two second-crop sire of 2011 with more than \$3.4 million in earnings. His five crops to race have produced 22 stakes winners.

A foal of 2003, Bluegrass Cat is by Storm Cat out of A.P. Indy's multiple graded stakes producer She's a Winner, a full sister to the dam of WinStar's Kentucky Derby winner and leading freshman sire Super Saver.

Bluegrass Cat will complete his Southern Hemisphere season at Norman Fox's Haras Lacala in Uruguay before moving to Ballena Vista Farm.

A pair of chestnut fillies from the first crop of grade I winner Dublin topped the New York-bred offerings at the Fasig-Tipton Midlantic fall yearling sale Sept. 29 in Timonium.

A January filly, bred by James Moloney and Peter Reynolds, sold for \$65,000 to EJ Stable. She is the second foal out of Florida-bred Heaven's Grace, an unplaced full sister to graded stakes-winning sprinter This Ones for Phil (by Untutttable) and a half to 10 other winners, including another stakes winner, Tap Dancer (by Sword Dance).

Darren Kreski, agent, signed a \$63,000 ticket for a daughter of Dublin bred by Patrick Heraty, William Duignan, and Tranquility Investments. Foaled Feb. 3, 2013, the filly is out of She's Mahogany, a placed daughter of Woodman who has produced seven winners of eight foals to start, including grade III-placed Au Moon (by Malibu Moon).

New York-bred yearlings participated in the across-the-board declines at the one-day Fasig-Tipton Midlantic sale. Fifty individuals sold of 77 offered, including three private sales, for a 35% buy-back rate. The New York-bred average price was \$13,396 and median was \$7,750.

Roy and Gretchen Jackson have been involved in the Thoroughbred business since 1978. Breeding and racing as Lael Stables off their farm in Pennsylvania, they are best known as the breeders and owners of Barbaro, the ill-fated winner of the Kentucky Derby Presented by Yum! Brands (gr. I) in 2006. It should be noted they also bred George Washington, winner of the Stan James Two Thousand Guineas (Eng-I) the same day. As a member of The Jockey Club and a director of the Breeders' Cup, Jackson is a major stakeholder in the industry.

In the fall of 2011, the Jacksons' Lael Stables bought a portion of All In Stable's Willcox Inn, a two-time graded stakes-winning son of Harlan's Holiday—De Aar, by Gone West. All In Stable includes Marette Farrell, John Adger, Jack Hodge, Marty Nixon, and Ron and Al Lepinski. Having added one more graded stakes win to his résumé while placing in several others, Willcox Inn has been retired and will stand his first season at Saratoga Stud in 2015 for \$5,000. Roy Jackson took some time from his busy schedule to speak with Evan Hammonds of *New York Breeder*.

Roy Jackson

When you bought into Willcox Inn, a son of top sire Harlan's Holiday, were you thinking about his potential as a stallion?

We were really more focused on the racing part of it at the time, but we were hoping he might be able to stand someplace after his racing career was over since he was a multiple graded stakes winner.

How did you decide to stand Willcox Inn in New York?

We had some interest from other places and some foreign interest that John Adger and Marette Farrell and I talked over. We didn't particularly want him to go overseas and thought that New York would be the best place for him since the New York breeding program is showing so much more potential right now. We thought it was the best situation for Willcox Inn—as versatile as he was—to stand in New York and have the best chance of improving himself as a stallion.

How did you decide on Saratoga Stud?

I've known the O'Cains (Dr. C. Lynwood and Suzie) for a while. I knew they had recently moved to a new place near Saratoga Springs, and it seemed like a good fit based on all of the success they've had in the past. John Adger is involved with us and has known the O'Cains for a long time. John was involved in working up the stud deal.

Will you be supporting the horse?

I know Adger is going to send some mares to Willcox Inn. We will send a mare or two, as well. We haven't really sat down and talked about next year yet, but the situation in New York is a real positive. The New York-bred program is the most interesting state-bred program going. There is some revitalization in Maryland, and those two are the best in the

East right now. New York—with its high maiden purses and the stakes program—it's just an outstanding program.

You are on a lot of industry boards. What is the biggest issue you are wrestling with?

I would say the main thing, from my standpoint, is that we come together and be like the rest of the world and we race without any medications on race day. It's a controversial topic now, but I think people are coming to realize we're putting ourselves in a bit of a corner. You are seeing fewer European buyers come over here and buy at the sales. The time has come to be with the rest of the world. I think it's a win-win situation for the horses, the jockeys, the betting public, and racing in general. 🐾

NYTHA Presidential Election

THE LAST DECADE HAS proved to be one of the most challenging in the history of the New York Thoroughbred Horsemen's Association. But we have made real progress, thanks to the hard work and dedication of a terrific board of directors.

The turbulent water surrounding the New York Racing Association's bankruptcy, which posed a significant threat to \$25 million of our purse money, was successfully navigated by the NYTHA board. When it looked like the final division of video lottery terminal revenue was set in stone, we negotiated an increase in net proceeds from 5.5% to 7.5%, raising the horsemen's share from \$44 million to \$60 million in purse money every year.

New York boasts the highest daily purse structure in the country, but challenges continue. The NYRA Reorganization Board is due to unveil its plan for reprivatization. Our seat at the table has allowed us to underline the importance of year-round racing in New York. Any significant disruption of winter racing would erode the job base, and those jobs are the single-most important argument in favor of the continued investment of VLT revenue in our industry. It would severely cut the racing opportunities for New York-breds, which would discourage investment in the New York breeding program. The elimination of year-round racing would cripple the New York breeding industry.

Saratoga is important to the Capital Region, but year-round racing is vital to New York state. Aqueduct should not be closed or sold unless:

1) The revenue from its sale is transferred to NYRA to finance a state-of-the-art "new Belmont Park" capable of showcasing our sport for decades to come and able to host racing year-round.

2) There is an ironclad commitment to the continued investment of VLT revenue for our industry and the thousands of jobs it supports.

Despite the increase in purse revenue, doing business in New York is extremely expensive. That's a big obstacle to attracting new owners and trainers to New York tracks. The cost of doing business here, especially given the drastic increase in workers' compensation premiums, makes it particularly difficult for trainers with small and mid-sized outfits to keep up with expenses.

To address this issue, we have begun the process of creating a self-insurance "captive" program. Several major insurance companies are interested, and we are gathering loss experience information as we speak. We will issue a Request for Proposal, and this plan is projected to produce a savings of at least 30%-40%.

The battle over Lasix (Salix) continues. NYTHA's position has not wavered. Any decision regarding Lasix should not be based on politics, international pressure, or public perception. That decision should be based exclusively on what is best for the horse. Absent a reasoned and researched alternative, we continue to support the race-day use of Lasix to protect our horses from exercise-induced pulmonary hemorrhaging (EIPH).

Our stance on Lasix in no way indicates a resistance to medication reform. The National Uniform Medication Program was spearheaded by NYTHA and

our Thoroughbred Horsemen's Association partners. This has been bolstered by a multiple medication violation penalty system, designed to penalize more severely repeat offenders; and an accreditation system for the laboratories that do the industry's testing. This is a work in progress that still demands our full attention.

We must also press forward with our two aftercare initiatives, TAKE THE LEAD and TAKE2. TAKE THE LEAD has helped find homes for more than 100 retired racehorses in its short existence. TAKE2, co-founded by the New York Thoroughbred Breeders, sponsors classes for registered Thoroughbreds at horse shows across the country. Promoting second careers for our athletes, the program has exploded, with more than 500 Thoroughbreds competing at over 100 horse shows this year.

NYTHA's day-to-day operations present different demands. We look to strengthen our effectiveness in Albany as we keenly track the mid-term elections. We will maintain our commitment to the backstretch community, contributing \$450,000 annually to support the health care and social services provided by the Backstretch Employee Service Team; and granting \$200,000 toward higher education for backstretch workers and their children through our scholarship program.

The NYTHA board is proud of our accomplishments, but there are many challenges yet to be faced. I look forward to taking on those challenges, with the support of New York's horsemen.

Violette graduated from Lowell University in Massachusetts and began working on the backstretch at Suffolk Downs. He was assistant to Emile Allain at Woodbine Race Track in Canada for two years and then went to New York to be an assistant to David Whiteley. He started his own public stable in 1983. Violette has served as chairman of the New York Jockey Injury Compensation Fund for more than a decade.

Statements by Rick Violette Jr. and Terry Finley

AS GOES NEW YORK racing, so goes the industry across the nation.

New York racing has the best horses, riders, owners, and trainers in North America. Our leadership should set the standard for racing across the globe.

I'm running for president to help make the New York Thoroughbred Horsemen's Association (NYTHA) a world-class organization.

For eight years current NYTHA president Violette has promised New York owners/trainers that help is on the way to get this crisis under control. Creative and smart racing leaders have implemented real compensation reform in California, Louisiana, and other states.

- What matters is having a board and members not duped into believing the "Lasix issue" is the only important matter on the table—this is NOT a single issue election—as Rick Violette would like you to believe. We must develop collaborative solutions to issues like race-day medication and out-of-competition testing. It is also important to have an open-minded, rational leader with the right temperament—not one who antagonizes those with opposing views—as Violette does on a regular basis.

- What matters is enhancing our relationships with the governor's office, the New York Racing Association, the New York legislature, the New York State Gaming Commission, and others in Albany who will be critical partners to

manage the coming franchise restructuring, the future of video lottery purse contributions, and stabling matters.

Yearlings help turn up the volume at the Fasig-Tipton Saratoga mixed sale



Mixing It Up

VERSION THREE OF THE Fasig-Tipton Saratoga fall mixed sale offered a new format—107 cataloged yearlings—and two days of selling—Oct. 6-7—and solid results. Still, the weanling segment of the market remained the strongest as pinhookers and end users made their way to upstate New York in search of top New York-bred prospects.

The return of the mixed sale in 2012 signaled the overall Thoroughbred marketplace was on the rebound and the state-bred breeding and racing program was strong and deep enough to produce quality offerings. Last year's edition was robust to say the least, with 50% more horses being sold, the gross rising 73.9% and the average advancing 15.6%.

This year's sale, with nearly 100 more horses going through the ring and coming off yet another successful preferred yearling sale in August, more than held its own with the additional yearlings added to the mix.

"The sale part was the easy part—it was getting all those horses ready and over to the sale that was the hard part," said Chris Bern-

hard from the top consigning group of Rhapsody Farm and Hidden Lake Farm. "I thought the format was excellent. I thought it was a broad spectrum of horses between some well-bred mares and some yearlings that were pretty horses but didn't make the cut for the preferred sale. I think the yearlings in particular sold better than what they would have in August."

Consignor Harry Landry felt the same way: "I wasn't sure how I was going to feel about the yearlings but I had some sell very well. There were some buyers who

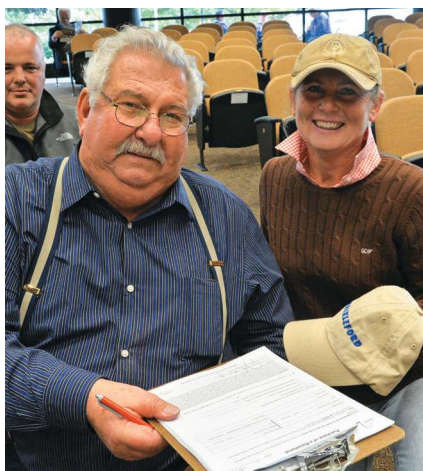

generally just buy yearlings there looking at weanlings, and the weanling buyers were looking at some of the yearlings. It gave the people that had a long way to come more of a reason to."

The most excitement was generated by the weanlings. This year 153 weanlings were offered, a sizable 62.8% increase from last year's 94. The gross of \$1,693,200 surpassed last year's \$1,565,200 (8.2%) and the average of \$22,279 was up 5.3% from a year ago and up 37.1% from the 2012 sale.

"There was tremendous demand and interest for the weanlings that the buyers perceived to have both pedigree and physical conformation that would make them desirable next year for pinhookers, but also there were some end users there buying weanlings, which was nice to see both of those segments active in the marketplace," said Boyd Browning, president and CEO of Fasig-Tipton.

The weanling segment was topped by a chestnut colt, from the first crop of classic winner Shackelford, who was purchased by Palermo Farm for

\$150,000. Pinhooker J.J. Crupi signed the ticket.

Bred by Mares Rule II and foaled Feb. 11 at Rhapsody Farm near Plymouth, N.Y., the weanling is the first foal out of the multiple winning Flatter mare Spanish Post. Spanish Post was purchased by Elaine Peck's Rhapsody Farm and Bernhard's Hidden Lake Farm for \$30,000

at last year's Keeneland November sale. She is out of the stakes-winning Spanish Play, a half sister to grade II winner River Boat and to the dam of multiple graded stakes winner Silver Timber.

Palermo also secured the top-priced weanling filly for \$65,000. From the first crop of The Factor (by War Front), the filly is out of Divorce Settlement, by Stormin Fever. She was consigned by Sequel Stallions New York, agent.

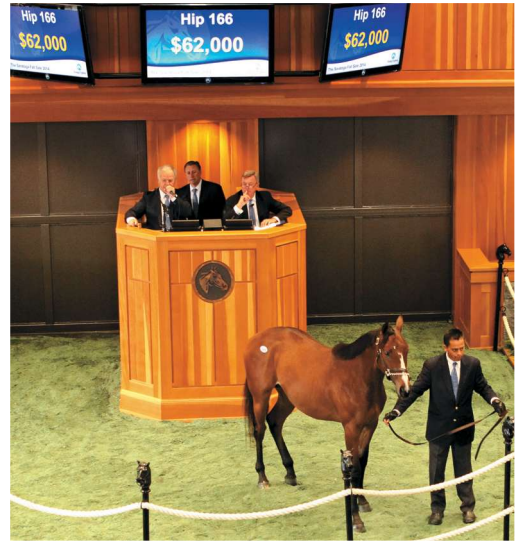
Ken and Sarah Ramsey spent \$90,000 for a dark bay or brown colt by Spring At Last out of the stakes-producing E T Phone Laura. A Feb. 20 foal, the colt was consigned by Catalyst Bloodstock, agent, and was bred by John Hicks, William Hart, and Henry Higgitt.

Buying for JSM Equine, Justin Casse went to \$85,000 for a son of Into Mischief from the Sequel Stallions New York consignment. The colt is out of Back in the Shade, a stakes-placed daughter of Put It Back.

were offered, 42.1% more than last year's 233. The gross of the sale, \$3,206,100, was down 4.7% with the average dipping 11.3% to \$16,672, which falls in line with the 2012 average of \$16,249. The median fell 9.1% from \$11,000 in 2013 to \$10,000 this year.

The figures stand up, considering there were questions about the yearlings. Despite the fall sale helping some yearlings that weren't quite ready for the August sale for any number of reasons, some felt many of the offerings would not be as attractive, considering they fell outside the "preferred" marketplace earlier in the year.

"I thought with the addition of the yearlings this year that there was a reasonable market for them, so all-in-all, it was a successful sale," said Browning. "I think it gives people confidence that if you have a later-maturing yearling or you have a little injury or just need a little bit more time, you've got a legitimate option to bring that yearling to October in Saratoga, for sure."

Forty-eight yearlings sold, good for an average of \$12,717.

Dan Hayden went to \$62,000 to procure the highest-priced yearling, a son of Girolamo—Fast Heart, by Lion Heart, from the Shamrock Hill Farm, agent, consignment. Fillies by Put It Back (\$55,000) and Noonmark (\$42,000) also shone.

"You keep adjusting to what people want," said Bernhard. "The yearling segment was uncharted waters. It was nice to see that there was a market for those horses that were pretty and vetted and weren't going to be stars at the preferred sale. Some of the horses in the other consignments sold for a lot more than I thought they would have in another sale, so I was kind of excited about that."

Browning pointed out that the broodmare market, which had been spotty in years past, held "more demand than I honestly thought there would be going in."

High Quality, a 7-year-old Elusive Quality mare, topped the segment with a \$60,000 final bid from Keith Crupper, agent for PTS Ranch. She was sold in foal to New York-based stallion Mission Impazible.

"It's intriguing that people want the product but they don't want the factories," Landry said.

Carolyn Vogel spent \$60,000 for the 2-year-old filly Birthday Girl (Curlin—Birthday Wire, by Birdonthewire), which was the highest figure for a horse of racing age. Wes Carter was the consignor.

"This is the third year we've done this, and I think we have established a niche in the marketplace and, hopefully, we'll continue to see a better-quality-bred horse in New York, which is what the market wants and actually demands," Browning summarized. "The New York breeders are cognizant that the quality and the program should continue to grow." 🐾

Tri-Bone Stables' Effinex wins the Empire Classic over So Lonesome

Long-Distance Dedication

Bred to go long, Effinex wins the Classic; Princess Violet wins inaugural Distaff

AS CO-OWNER AND TRAINER, the pair of Dr. Russell Cohen and Jimmy Jerkens have a unique relationship. Jerkens trains Tri-Bone Stables' homebred Effinex (which Cohen is a part of, along with his two brothers and mother). Cohen, a long-time practicing veterinarian on the New York Racing Association circuit, has tended to several of Jerkens' runners, including the top-two finishers in the 2014 Travers Stakes (gr. I), V. E. Day and Wicked Strong.

The seeds of that relationship came to fruition for Tri-Bone Stables as its 3-year-old son of Mineshaft—What a Pear, by E Dubai, closing stoutly through the stretch, got up by a determined neck to take the centerpiece of Empire Showcase Day—the 39th edition of the \$300,000 Empire Classic Handicap.

There was little doubt in Cohen's mind that the tri-combo of transferring Effinex to Jerkens' tutelage approximately three months ago, the contest's nine-furlong distance, and his colt's breeding was primarily responsible for the breakthrough performance.

"I was trying to produce a two-turn horse (with this pairing) that could run at a grade I level," said Cohen. "The match was an absolute snap for me. Mineshaft was a (medication-free) horse with classic breeding (by A.P. Indy). I've bred to that

family for three generations. It was all pretty much medication-free. I was absolutely impressed by Mineshaft as a runner. I watched him run. The way he did it. The way he ran around two turns. I've been trying to emulate that breeding. At times I've been unsuccessful at it. But I've tried. This is the first horse that I've gotten (Effinex) that's an honest two-turn horse...and the farther he goes the better."

Cohen seemingly proved that in the Empire Classic by turning the tables on a pair of rivals, Sioux and So Lonesome, who had recently gotten the better of Effinex, one at a shorter trip. On Sept. 28, a victorious Sioux, the betting favorite in the Empire Classic, defeated Effinex (finished third) by 10 lengths in a one-turn mile. And on Aug. 24 at Saratoga, So Lonesome out-hoofed runner-up Effinex to the wire by four lengths on a speed-favoring track in the Albany Stakes on Saratoga Showcase Day at 1 1/8 miles.

In the Empire Classic, Patricia Schuler's front-running So Lonesome bounded to a clear lead early, racing the opening six panels in 1:11.31. Effinex, beneath rider Angel Arroyo, settled just off the inside in mid-pack among the field of nine. Put to a drive at the five-sixteenths pole, Effinex cut the corner on Belmont Park's sweeping far turn before angling out to take dead-aim on So Lonesome through the sandy stretch.

With 70 yards remaining, a resolute Effinex stuck his nose in front before registering a neck victory at the line. It was another 5 1/4 lengths back to the rest of the field, which never seriously threatened.

Effinex stopped the timer in 1:48.51, having raced the final eighth in :12.59.

"Today he ran with Wicked Strong's blinkers," said Jerkens. "Since I've gotten him (in late June), he's gotten stronger... We didn't have a lot of time to get him ready. We threw a lot of work at him, and he handled it

and ran very well."

Cohen was both exuberant and emotional after leading his colt into the winner's circle.

"We were three brothers (growing up) and called each other 'boneheads.' That's how we got the name Tri-Bone Stables. We started (the stable) close to 30 years ago to keep this family together," said Cohen, as he and his family members waved around rubber dog bones. But Cohen was also dressed in a horse-themed necktie that belonged to his late father, Ira, who passed away three years ago. "He loved this business, absolutely loved it. His mantra was 'never give up.'"

Effinex earned his third victory from 10 starts. Under Jerkens' guidance he is 1-1-1 from three starts. The colt's earnings now stand at \$328,350.

So Lonesome, a 3-year-old gelding by Awesome Again, was bred by Waterville Lake Stables. Hailing from the barn of trainer Tom Bush, So Lonesome did all of the hard work in setting the pace on

a day in which the track, labeled “fast,” was not particularly kind to speed types.

Michael Dubb, Bethlehem Stables, and Gary Aisquith's Beautyinthepulpit (by Pulpit) garnered the minor spoils in third position. Saratoga Snacks, Eye Luv Lulu, Awesome Vision, Sioux, Sinistra, and Empire Dreams completed the order of finish.

Favored Princess

Females took the spotlight on Empire Showcase Day during the inaugural running of the \$250,000 Empire Distaff Handicap at 1 1/16 miles.

When trainer Mike Hushion coaxed longtime breeder/owner and former NYRA CEO Barry K. Schwartz into naming a filly after the trainer's granddaughter, it only made sense that the pair would have picked out a rather promising one. Hence, the New York-bred ranks now have the athletic and talented homebred Princess Violet (Officer—Lady Rapper, by Grand Slam) with which to contend.

"Barry and myself usually discuss what's going to work best for the mare," said Peter Moore, who has been working with Schwartz for a decade now and foaled Princess Violet himself. "We don't try to make mares go any farther than they have themselves (on the racetrack). With (a) Grand Slam (mare), you're going seven furlongs. And with Officer (as a sire), you're probably better going under a mile. That was the best cross we could give this mare."

After rebounding from a minor ankle issue beneath Hushion's patient handling,

Long-Distance Dedication



Three-year-old Princess Violet wins the Empire Distaff by 5½ lengths

Princess Violet prepped for the Empire Distaff just 13 days prior with a blow-out win going 6½ furlongs against open company over this same surface.

Over the summer Princess Violet had competed in a pair of graded stakes. She finished second, 9¼ lengths behind the division-leading Untapable, going 1⅙ miles in the Mother Goose Stakes (gr. I) at Belmont. That was followed by a disappointing seventh-place finish sprinting in the Prioress Stakes (gr. II) at the Spa.

Three-year-old Princess Violet broke from the gate in the Empire Distaff as the 6-5 favorite with jockey Jose Ortiz in the irons. She fell into a perfect stalking trip, racing in fourth position behind a trio of front-runners who took turns pushing each other on the lead through an opening half-mile in :46.51.

"I thought she was in the right spot (during the running of the race)," said

Hushion. "The only thing that had me worried was the distance."

As the field turned for home, Hushion's only "worry" was quickly minimized. Ortiz spun Princess Violet four-to-five paths wide for clear sailing. Then,

when he asked the filly for run, the response was immediate. She elongated her succinct strides and simply inhaled the rest of the field, drawing off through the stretch as much the best.

Princess Violet won by 5½ lengths, stopping the timer in 1:43.81.

"We really didn't want her on the lead because we were afraid someone would take premature runs at her. So we were glad to have targets," said Hushion. "(Jose Ortiz) said she felt better than ever. After today, (going two turns) is certainly not out of the question."

Princess Violet notched her fourth win from seven starts and boosted her bankroll to \$332,810.

Her dam, Lady Rapper, is currently in foal to Candy Ride.

"(Lady Rapper) has been very good to us. She had great conformation but nagging ankle problems. So we couldn't get her to the races. (Barry and I) figured we'd put her into the broodmare band with the idea that she'd have to prove herself. And she did. She gave us Baime, by Star Dabbler. That horse ran very well at Finger Lakes," said Moore, who had high hopes for Princess Violet from the beginning. "Princess Violet was a very good-looking (yearling). In my book she was an A conformation-wise. She was a lovely foal, sensible (in her mind) and very athletic."

Brous Stable, Wachtel Stable, and Team Penney Racing's Flipcup rallied from far back in the field to claim the runner-up position in the Empire Distaff. The 3-year-old daughter of Milwaukee Brew, from the barn of Hall of Fame trainer Bill Mott, finished willing for Hall of Fame jockey John Velazquez.

Richard Greeley's Carameaway, a Mitch Friedman-trainee, finished third. Lady Gracernote, Storied Lady, Unbelievable Dream, Dreaming of Cara, Sunny Desert, and Penymine completed the order of finish. 🐾

Letter Perfect

Ostrolenka, Quezon draw clear in 2-year-old stakes on Empire Showcase Day

FOR OWNER/BREEDER ERIC FEIN, winning the \$250,000 Sleepy Hollow Stakes on Empire Showcase Day at Belmont Park Oct. 18 was a family affair.

Named for the Polish town in which Fein's father was born, odds-on Ostrolenka coasted to a 2½-length win, easily repelling a mild bid from Bullheaded Boy to get his second victory from three starts.

Trained by Todd Pletcher and ridden by John Velazquez, Ostrolenka ran the one-turn mile in 1:37.39 over a fast track. Fein finished third in the 2007 Sleepy Hollow with Big Truck.

The victory was the first stakes win for the offspring of broodmare Pumpkin's Pride (by Louis Quatorze), who has thrown nothing but winners since Fein's brother Scott claimed her for \$10,000 in 2003. Though she raced for them only once before getting injured, she may be among the Fein family's finest equine acquisitions.

A 2-year-old bay colt, Ostrolenka is the fifth foal out of Pumpkin's Pride, all of them New York-breds. Two more of them

have broken the six-figure earnings mark: Sammzilla earned more than \$142,000 while the multiple stakes-placed Great Gracie Dane banked more than \$340,000.

Ostrolenka is the first of Pumpkin's Pride progeny by Musket Man, the horse Fein and partner Vic Carlson campaigned to a win in the 2009 Tampa Bay Derby (gr. III) and Illinois Derby (gr. II) and third-place finishes in the Kentucky Derby Presented by Yum! Brands and the BlackBerry Preakness Stakes (both gr. I). Musket Man stands at Elite Thoroughbreds in Louisiana. Ostrolenka is also freshman sire Musket Man's first winner and first stakes winner.

After a seventh-place finish in his first outing over a sloppy track in Saratoga, Ostrolenka found better footing at Belmont in late September, romping to a 14½-length win against maidens. Though Fein declined to talk about next starts, saying he'd wait to talk to Pletcher, it seems likely that Ostrolenka will be tested outside the state-bred ranks sooner rather than later.

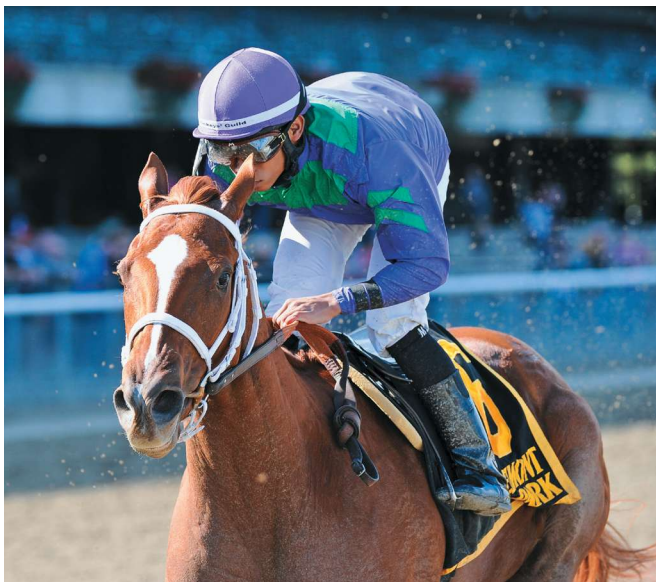
Fein maintains a small breeding operation of about a half-dozen mares in New York, his broodmare band comprising horses that he's raced. In 2012 he bred exclusively to Musket Man, and the majority of his mares reside in New York.

"I support New York and that's the name of the game for me," said the Long Island native who grew up going to the racetrack. "If any of the babies could get the heart that Musket Man had, that's all I was hoping for."

Another One in the Q

The \$250,000 Maid of the Mist Stakes for 2-year-old fillies went to Quezon, now two-for-two for owner Marc Keller and trainer Robert Ribaldo.

Coming off a six-length victory in an off-the-turf muddy maiden race at Belmont, in which she was entered as a main-track-only, Quezon confirmed her talent over a fast track at Belmont,

cruising to victory by an identical margin. Under a confident ride by Manuel Franco, she ran the mile in 1:38.38, impressively surprising her owner.

"I was pretty comfortable she could get a mile," said Keller. "I was comfortable we would be on the board. Winning this way? No."

Bred by Apache Farm, Quezon is by Tiz Wonderful out of the Olympio mare Kalookan Dancer. Keller purchased her at the Fasig-Tipton Saratoga sale of New York-bred preferred yearlings for \$90,000, consulting as usual with bloodstock advisers Niall Brennan and Mike Ryan, and with Ribaldo, his longtime trainer. Keller purchased three New York-breds at the sale this year.

Quezon is named for a province in the Philippines, a moniker that makes

use of the filly's fortuitously named dam and Keller's idiosyncratic approach to naming his horses.

"The first filly that I won a real race with was Qualique, so now all fillies that I name have a 'Q' in them," he said.

He further explained the name Kalookan Dancer derives from a Filipino tradition named for Caloooca, a city near the capital Manila.

A Bronx native who grew up, he said, betting at the track, Keller talks self-

deprecatingly about his ability to pick out horses at a sale, consigning most of the credit to Ribaldo, Ryan, and Brennan, but he spoke confidently about his filly's pedigree after Quezon gave sire Tiz Wonderful, recently sold to stand overseas, a second winner on the Belmont card.

"He's going to be a major sire," Keller declared. "Unfortunately, he's going to do it in Korea."

Ribaldo had been thinking about a six-furlong race in November for the chestnut filly's next start, a move he's reconsidering after Quezon's convincing victory while stretching out.

"It doesn't make much sense to drop her back, and the East View is a long way off," he said, referring to the race at a mile and 70 yards for New York-breds at Aqueduct Dec. 14. "We might just pack it in, or maybe we'll take her to Florida."

Both Keller and Ribaldo noted the recent successes of New York-bred horses, particularly fillies, in open company, making the decision about what to do with them for the winter a little harder.

"You left them in New York," said Keller, "which we've always done up until now."

While Keller has an eye on taking his filly from the state-bred ranks, he's in no hurry to push her.

"At some point," he said. "She'd still have to get a little better." 🐾

Patience...with Speed

5-year-old Moonlight Song goes gate-to-wire in the Hudson; La Verdad continues her roll

THE SPRINTS ON THE Empire Showcase Day card Oct. 18 at Belmont Park produced a pair of stars on the racetrack and gave light to several individuals who helped their equine partners get there.

Albert Fried Jr.'s homebred Moonlight Song didn't make it to the races until he was 5-years-old. That delay was due to a number of soundness issues. Both his owner and his trainer, Charlton Baker, showed extreme patience in bringing the now 7-year-old gelding to this point.

His connections' patience was rewarded as Moonlight Song, a son of Unbridled's Song, scored a gutsy 1½-length gate-to-wire victory beneath jockey Joel Rosario in the \$150,000 Hudson Handicap, defeating 10 talented rivals in the ultra-competitive event.

"Charlie (Baker) has done a phenomenal job with this horse because soundness was always a problem," said Jenny Carpenter, who is the manager of Fried's farm near Rhinebeck, N.Y., which currently is home to 45 horses. "He had one thing after another because he's such a big horse. Gelding him really seemed to help as well."

Moonlight Song cut a swift pace over a track that wasn't truly supporting speed. He raced an opening half-mile in a swift :45.18, stifling several challenges along the way. Then, through the sandy Belmont Park stretch, Moonlight Song simply refused to yield.

"He broke running, and Rosario slowed him down enough to save some horse," said Baker. "He's got a lot of speed. But it seemed like nobody else wanted the lead today, so we inherited it."

Moonlight Song raced the 6½-furlongs in 1:15.58. He has now won seven of 16 starts and has earned \$414,294.

"This is my best horse in the barn. So I wake up to something great every morn-

ing,” said Baker, one of only a few African-American trainers in New York.

Carpenter, who originally hails from New Zealand, has been with Moonlight Song every step of the way. She began working for Fried 22 years ago as an exercise rider and was the very first to breeze Fried's champion sprinter Affirmed Success (by Affirmed), who was also a gelding.

“Unbridled's Song was an easy choice for us at the time,” said Carpenter, who foaled Moonlight Song and participated with Fried in choosing the mating that produced him. “We always use the Werk Nick program and on paper it fit together really well. Moonlightandbeauty (Moonlight Song's dam) produces huge, monstrous foals. I'm proud Mr. Fried does everything he can to see his horses reach their potential. Perhaps not many owners would be willing to give an (unraced) 5-year-old this opportunity.”

Gary Barber's Big Business, a David Jacobson-trainee, was the runner-up in the Hudson while Long Island Racing Stables, Sunrise Stables, and EBX Racing Stable's West Hills Giant finished third.

LA VERDAD CONTINUES

Sheila Rosenblum's sensationally fast 4-year-old filly La Verdad (Yes It's True—Noble Fire, by Hook and Ladder), captured the \$150,000 Iroquois Stakes by a diminishing 1¼ lengths, capping an amazing year in which she has won five stakes, including the Distaff Handicap (gr. II) at Aqueduct. However, none of that would have happened without the resolve of her breeder, Mark Vondrasek of Eklektikos Stables.

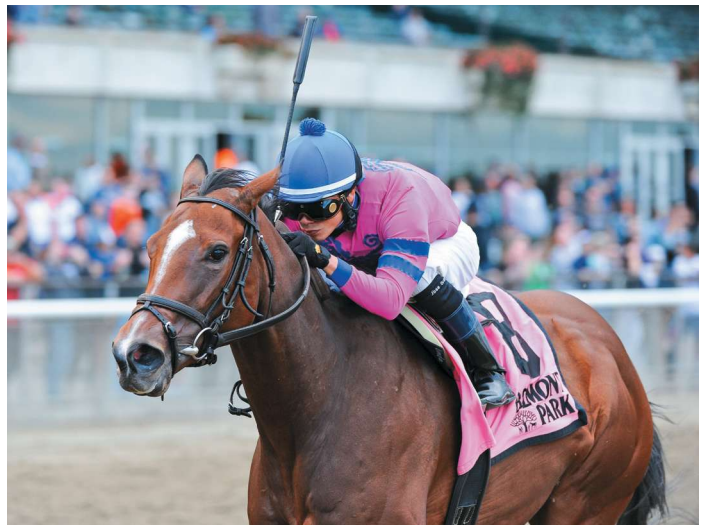
“Noble Fire was a big mare who was really quick out of the gate. In the Ruthless (at Aqueduct), she cracked a sesamoid bone. It was bad. They

even brought out that little screen (in case she needed to be euthanized on the racetrack). By the next day the vet said she had only a 50/50 chance to survive,” said Vondrasek, who was passionately rooting for her recovery daily. “She wasn't in tremendous pain, and eventually, she pulled through. Thankfully, I was able to breed her.”

Vondrasek sent Noble Fire to Cuvee, which produced the lightning-quick N. F.'s Destiny, who survived a horrific injury with a barn door as a yearling that caused him to run with his head cocked to the right.

“I wanted to get a little more distance into the next foal. So I called Three Chimneys, and the numbers came out pretty well with Yes It's True,” said the breeder, who sold La Verdad to Rosenblum privately.

It was retired superstar jockey Ramon Dominguez who told Vondrasek not to give the filly a cliché name with the

word “true” in it. So the breeder asked Dominguez to translate the word into Spanish for him, and the name La Verdad was chosen.

The final time for the Iroquois was 1:17.13. The Linda Rice-trainee has now won 10 of 15 starts, with earnings of \$777,700.

Rosenblum also owns La Verdad's younger half sister, Hot City Girl (by City Zip).

Trainer Jimmy Iselin, Charlotte Assoulin, and Eli Gindi's Willet (by Jump Start) finished a fast-closing second up the rail in the Iroquois. Bacon Barn's Risky Rachel (by Limehouse) checked in third. Both of those runners are from dams sired by Distinctive Pro. 🐾

On the Marq

Discreet Marq bids farewell to racing; Kharafa takes the Mohawk

ONE OF THE HORSES who has symbolized the resurgent New York breeding program, multiple graded stakes winner Discreet Marq, came home Oct. 18 with a win in the \$200,000 Ticonderoga Stakes on Empire Showcase Day.

In the summer of 2013, the distinctive gray/roan filly headed west to win the Del Mar Oaks (gr. IT) for owner/breeders Patricia and Frank Generazio and trainer Christophe Clement and has raced primarily in open company—specifically grade I company—since.

Competitive but winless through 2014, Discreet Marq got back to the winner's circle and became a millionaire in the Ticonderoga. Stalking longshot leader One Time Only, the 4-year-old filly took the lead heading into the far turn and drew off to win as she liked, geared down by jockey Irad Ortiz Jr. The margin of victory was three lengths; the final time, 1:44.36 for the 1½ miles over a “good” turf course. Jockey Taylor Rice on last-place finisher Mah Jong Maddnes lodged a claim of foul against the winner, but the result stood.

By Discreet Cat out of To Marquet (by Marquetry), Discreet Marq is the third generation bred by the Generazios, who watched from their home in Florida with mixed emotions.

“She looked so beautiful today,” said Patricia. “We enjoyed this so much. It was just incredible.”

Despite their own active breeding operation, the Generazios have elected to enter Discreet Marq in the Fasig-Tipton Kentucky November sale, a decision Patricia admitted was not an easy one to make.

“It’s very difficult,” she said softly. “But we feel as though she probably deserves to go to better stallions. I can’t imagine her not running. I can’t imagine anyone else owning her.”

Discreet Marq retires with a record of 7-5-3 from 19 starts and earnings of \$1,067,900. In addition to the Del Mar Oaks, she won the Sands Point Stakes (gr. IIT) and placed in four other graded stakes, losing by a half-length or less in three of them.

To Marquet is currently in foal to Ghostzapper, and the Generazios have a weanling and a yearling full brother to Discreet Marq, though none of them are gray, a color to which Patricia admits that she's partial.

"We went to look at our babies in Ocala last week, and I said, 'I can't believe we don't have a lot of grays,'" she said laughing. "But we're extremely happy about To Marquet, and I'd love to see Discreet Marq's sister be gray."

Generazio noted with more than a hint of nostalgia the possibility of Discreet Marq coming back home after the sale if her reserve isn't met, but she's also pragmatic.

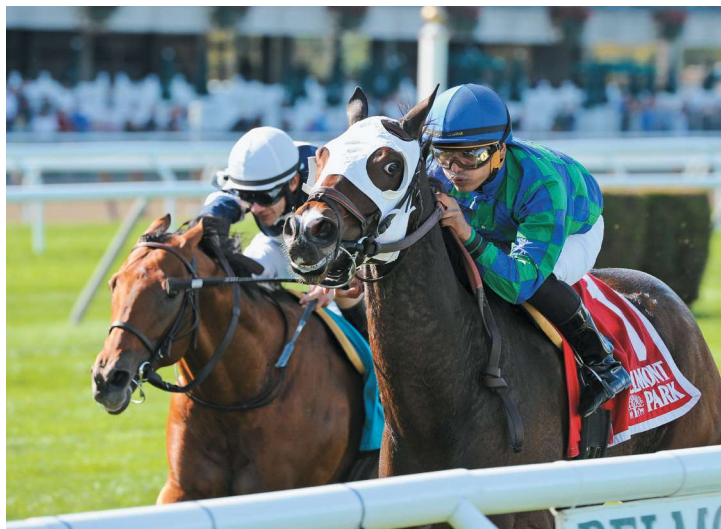
"It all comes to an end," she said. "We've had other good ones before, too."

One to Get

What a difference a year makes.

Kharafa finished 10th in the 2013 Mohawk Stakes, making his first start for new connections after the death of his owner and breeder Lawrence Durocher. He was coming off an emotional win in the Ashley T. Cole Stakes, his first stakes win, attended by Durocher's daughter, Kate, a few months after her father's death.

This year, taking on a field of graded stakes winners in the \$200,000 Mohawk, Kharafa cruised to a confident victory

under jockey Angel Arroyo, who picked up the mount from his grieving cousin Luis Saez, home in Panama following the death of his brother Juan in a riding accident at Indiana Grand Racing and Casino.

Kharafa was purchased privately last fall by Paul Braverman, who owns the 5-year-old gelding in partnership with Timothy Pinch. Unable to be at Belmont because of a travel commitment, Braverman made sure to get an early flight so that he could arrive at his destination in time to watch the race.

"We got here just in time to see it," said Braverman.

By Kitalpha out of the King of Kings mare Exquisite Cassie, Kharafa ran the 1 $\frac{1}{16}$ miles on turf in 1:45.01, winning by 1 $\frac{1}{4}$ lengths.

"We were supposed to have Luis Saez today, and we're really proud of Angel," said Braverman. "Our thoughts are with Luis."

Braverman purchased Kharafa on the recommendation of trainer Tim Hills, who called him to say Kharafa was going to be sold.

"He said to me, 'Paul, this is a horse you want to get,'" Braverman recalled.

In nine starts for Braverman, Kharafa has won three times,

all of them stakes, with four top-three finishes. The Mohawk victory pushed his earnings to \$653,497.

Kharafa spent last winter with Hills at Gulfstream Park, where he finished eighth in the Appleton Stakes (gr. IIIT) in March, but Braverman expects to give him the winter off this year.

"We took him to Florida to give him a rest; he really earned it last year," explained Braverman.

"We probably brought him back a bit earlier than we should have, and he got into a tough race and didn't get out well. This year he'll go to Craig Wheeler's farm at the end of the season."

Braverman has been so happy with Kharafa that he purchased his full sister at the Ocala Breeders' Sales Co.'s August yearling sale for \$25,000. Her name is Saratoga Sassy.

"She's being broken right now," he said, "and we hope to have her running late next summer or early fall." 🐾

TAKING HIS SECOND STEP against stakes company, Good Luck Gus stepped on the gas on his way to a 5¼-length run-away win Oct. 4 in the \$252,098 New York Breeders' Futurity at Finger Lakes Gaming and Racetrack. Trainer Rudy Rodriguez had the bay colt shipped to Finger Lakes from his base at Aqueduct, and the trip paid off with a first-prize check of \$151,259 for Michael Dubb, Bethlehem Stables, and The Elkstone Group.

Away well under Wilfredo Rohena, the 9-5 favorite tracked pacesetter and 37-1 longshot Fallfire through early splits of :22.47 for the opening quarter-mile and :45.86 for the half-mile of the six-furlong Futurity. Third early and improving to second position on the backstretch, Good Luck Gus, equipped with blinkers for the first time, made his bid midway through the far turn. The colt took over in upper stretch and kicked clear, widening his margin of victory while being ridden out. His final time over the "good" going was 1:11.87.

Thank You finished second and was followed by Fallfire, who outran his odds to finish third. The order of finish was completed by Pierce's Prize; the filly Dunn Listening, winner of the Lady Finger Stakes on Sept. 6; Deputy Busterstone; and Summer Brother.

Morning line even-money favorite Bustin It was an early scratch, as was longshot Smilingsundae, another filly.

Good Luck Gus powers his way to win the New York Breeders' Futurity

Good Luck Gus broke his maiden second time out July 28 at Saratoga. He stepped up to stakes company on New York Showcase Day at the Spa and ran fourth in the 6½-furlong Funny Cide Stakes. The winner that day, Upstart, would go on to run second to Daredevil in the \$500,000 Champagne Stakes (gr. I) Oct. 4 at Belmont.

"He was working very well and seemed a lot more focused with blinkers," Rodriguez said of Good Luck Gus. "This win was very special for us."

The win was also special for Ashford Stud, the home of Good Luck Gus' sire, Lookin At Lucky. A two-time champion and the 2010 Preakness Stakes (gr. I) winner, Lookin At Lucky ranks second on the first-crop sire list thanks to Good Luck Gus, who is his leading earner with \$217,059 in the bank.

The win is equally special for his ownership group that is having a spectacular year with their runners. In addition to Good Luck Gus, Dubb, Bethlehem Stables, and The Elkstone Group scored at Saratoga with Condo Commando in the Spinaway Stakes (gr. I) and with Abraham, winner of the Michael G. Schae-

fer Memorial Stakes at Indiana Grand Race Course the same day as the Futurity. Dubb, Bethlehem Stables, and Gary Aisquith have also won a pair of grade I races with Belle Gallantey, a \$35,000 claim last December, and three stakes with Lion D N A.

Dubb, with the assistance of agent Kim Valerio, purchased Good Luck Gus from the consignment of the Taylor Made Sales Agency for \$97,000 at last year's Fasig-Tipton New York-bred preferred yearling sale in Saratoga Springs.

Good Luck Gus was bred by Fred W. Hertrich III and is out of the Deputy Minister mare Tacticmove.

Hertrich bought Tacticmove carrying the Futurity winner for \$35,000 at the 2011 Keeneland November sale. Despite a lackluster racing career that lasted one start, Tacticmove brought some pretty powerful bloodlines to Hertrich's broodmare band. A half sister to two stakes winners including grade II winner Cat Fighter, Tacticmove is out of Strategic Maneuver, winner of the Spinaway and Matron (gr. I) stakes in 1993. Sold after her racing career for \$800,000 to Betty Moran's Brushwood Stable, Strategic Maneuver was a prolific broodmare, as her yearlings sold for more than \$6 million. Strategic Maneuver died Sept. 24.

Hertrich heads an enterprise that operates car dealerships in Delaware, Maryland, and New Jersey. Hertrich's breeding program has produced successful runners such as European champion Shamardal and grade I winners Boys At Tosconova and Street Boss. Boys At Tosconova stands at Questroyal North near Stillwater. 🐾
