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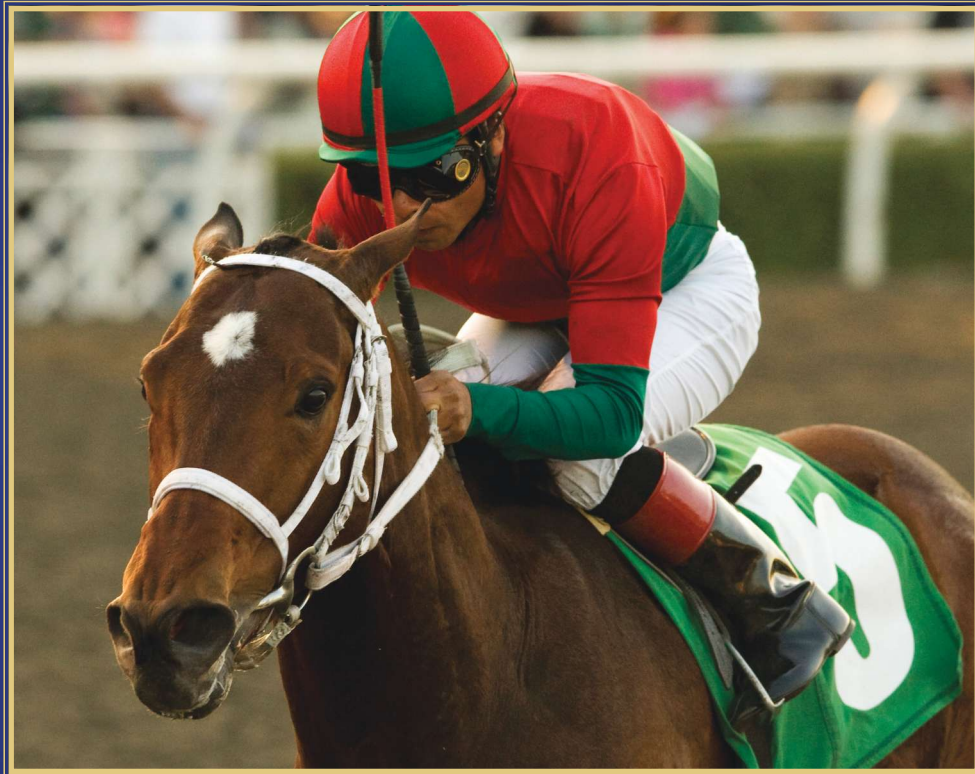

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Legislation Brings New Revenue for Breeders

If you don't read to the end of the voluminous 223-page Upstate New York Gaming Economic Development Act—a.k.a. New York's expanded gaming bill—you will miss what is arguably the most important provision of the law for breeders.

Toward the end of the document, in an amendment to Section 1012 of racing, pari-mutuel wagering and breeding law, the legislation takes up the issue of "multi-jurisdictional account wagering providers," better-known as "out-of-state advance deposit wagering providers" or ADWs.

ADWs, which began to enjoy popularity in the late 1990s, are the fastest-growing segment of pari-mutuel betting in the United States. It was reported at the 2011 The Jockey Club Round Table that ADW providers account for roughly 20% of total handle in the country and, at its current growth rate, the figure could reach 44% in 10 years. The "Big Three" are TVG, TwinsSpire.com, and XpressBet.com.

In 2010 I prepared a financial analysis and white paper on ADWs on behalf of Thoroughbred breeders, who have never before had a share of revenue from ADW handle wagered on racing in New York. After we presented this material to legislators, key industry leaders and various other groups advanced the discussion, and the state charged the Racing and Wagering Board (RWB) with issuing a report on the impact of ADWs accepting wagers from New York State residents. The RWB report (September 2012) recommended that ADWs be licensed and required to make payments to the

state and to the racing and breeding industries.

In the new legislation ADWs will now be required to pay a 5% charge on the handle wagered by New York State residents. This charge will be divided among the State (10%), OTBs (40%), and racing/breeding (50%). Of the racing/breeding share, 20% will go to breeders' funds, to be split 60-40 between Thoroughbred and harness funds. In short, the Breeding and Development Fund will receive 6% percent of the ADW surcharge.

Industry estimates put annual ADW handle for New York State residents between \$200 million and \$400 million. This will mean \$600,000 to \$1.2 million of absolutely new-found revenue for the Fund.

This new-found revenue for breeders from ADWs has been under discussion for more than a decade and in the works for the last three years. I am very pleased that breeders will now get a fair share of revenue generated by the horses they breed.

So, on the eve of an historic Saratoga race meet, I feel very good about the earning potential and the growth in value of the next few generations of New York-breds. Regardless of the outcome of the state-wide referendum on the expanded casino legislation in the fall, the revenue stream the Fund receives from the Aqueduct casino will increase this October, as planned, to 1.5% (from 1.25%), and revenue for purses will increase to 7% (from 6.5%). All this adds up to the continuation of a robust New York-bred marketplace and on-going opportunities for breeders to earn meaningful awards.

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WIRED BRYAN

Anstu Stables' New York homebred Wired Bryan upset the \$300,000 Sanford Stakes (gr. II) for 2-year-olds at odds of 7-1 July 21 at Saratoga Race Course, running away from his rivals through the stretch by 5¼ lengths.

Racing second on the turn on the inside with Shaun Bridgmohan aboard, the gray or roan son of Stormy Atlantic was let loose in the lane while recording a six-furlong time of 1:11.06 over a fast track.

The Sanford gave trainer Michael Dilger, a former assistant to Todd Pletcher until this year, his first stakes win with his first stakes starter.

"Sorry, I'm hoarse," the elated Dilger, 35, of Mulingar, Ireland, said after the race. "I was cheering a little bit. He's New York bred; there were no restricted stakes races until later on in the year. The timing fit to run him here."

The race carried a \$100,000 graded stakes bonus for the winning connections, making the winning purse \$220,000.

Wired Bryan is 2-for-2 in his career after humbling a state-bred maiden field by 7¼ lengths going five furlongs at Belmont Park June 19. He has earned \$256,000. The winning colt is out of the stakes-placed Runaway Groom mare Red Melody, who was purchased as a 2-year-old for \$180,000 by Pletcher on behalf of Anstu Stables' owners Stuart and Anita Subotnick. The mare has produced four other winners, including stakes-placed Run Red Run. Wired Bryan is her first stakes winner.—*By Jack Shinar*

Amberjack Clears Next Hurdle in New York Derby

Indygo Shiner colt one away from Big Apple Triple sweep

The \$160,800 New York Derby went swimmingly for Amberjack.

Named for a species of Atlantic fish, the 3-year-old son of Indygo Shiner skipped away in the slop at Finger Lakes Casino & Racetrack July 20 to take home the second leg of the Big Apple Triple for John Fort's Peachtree Stable and trainer Mike Hushion.

Bred in New York by Dixie Farm out of the Crafty Friend mare Free as Tristan, the colt need only capture the Aug. 21 Albany Stakes going 1⅛ miles at Saratoga Race Course to sweep the series for New York-bred sophomores—plus pick up a \$250,000 bonus offered by the New York State Thoroughbred Breeding & Development Fund, Finger Lakes, and the New York Racing Association.

Only one horse, Tin Cup Chalice in 2008, has won all three races in the Big Apple Triple since it began in 1999.

Fort bought Amberjack as a yearling for \$185,000 at the 2011 Fasig-Tipton Preferred New York-bred yearling sale held in Saratoga Springs. The chestnut colt was first put into training with Dale Romans, but after January was moved to Hushion's stable in New York.

"He has always been a good training horse, and the jockeys don't have to fight him," Fort said. "But we didn't know quite how good he was until he won this race."

The Big Apple Triple began June 1 at Belmont Park with the \$125,000, seven-furlong Mike Lee Stakes, which Amberjack won by 1¾ lengths in 1:21.64 under

Junior Alvarado. The New York Derby was the third straight win for Amberjack since May. He went into the Mike Lee off a victory in a May 11 \$62,000 allowance going a mile at Belmont.

Well-handled by jockey Jose Espinoza in the New York Derby, Amberjack broke alertly to contest the early lead but settled well into a stalking spot third on the rail as Smooth Bert and Street Lord went up to contend for pacesetting honors. Smooth Bert kept the advantage by a head for a legitimate quarter in :23.59 and a half in :47.36, but Amberjack was preparing to shift out with plenty of run as three-quarters went in 1:12.40.

The winner, a 6-5 favorite, split rivals and swept by strongly with a three-wide move while inhaling Smooth Bert, drawing away through a 1:37.89 mile to post a 6½-length victory. Final time for 1¼ miles was 1:44.42.

West Hills Giant finished third, followed by Go Get the Basil, Tequila Hero, and Street Lord.

Amberjack's record now stands at four wins and a third from six starts, with earnings of \$255,355.—*By Claire Novak; Emily Walden contributed to this story.*

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NEW YORK-BRED FILLY TOPS OBS JUNE SALE

A filly by former New York sire Read the Footnotes topped the New York-bred offerings at the Ocala Breeders' Sales Co.'s 2013 June sale of 2-year-olds and horses of racing age, selling to Klaravich Stable for \$120,000.

Hip 372, named Read It and Weep, was the second lot offered July 19 during the second and final session of the sale. Consigned by Omega Farm, the gray or roan filly worked an eighth-mile in a snappy :10½ in the under tack show. Omega Farm previously purchased the filly as a yearling at the Fasig-Tipton Kentucky July yearling sale for \$55,000.

Bred by Delahanty Stock Farm, where she was foaled, Read It and Weep is the second foal out of Bauhaus Bourbon, a winning Delahanty-bred daughter of Behrens, whose half sister Malt Or Mash (by Black Minnaloushe) is a stakes winner in England. Their dam, Florida-bred Southern

Tradition (by Family Doctor), is a multiple graded winner campaigned by Delahanty Farm. She earned \$379,125.

Read the Footnotes stood for Sequel Stallions from 2006 to 2011 before relocating to Oklahoma.

The opening session July 18 had another standout in Hip 335, a speedy chestnut filly by More Than Ready. Purchased by Patrick Hoppel as a yearling for a mere \$8,500 at the Fasig-Tipton Midlantic Eastern fall yearling sale, the filly brought \$90,000 after posting a co-bullet quarter (with two others) in :20¾. She was purchased by Linda Rice for Duffryn Run Farm.

Bred by Joseph Boff and foaled at Mill Creek Farm near Stillwater, N.Y., the filly is out of African Skyline, a Kentucky-bred six-figure earner by Saint Ballado out of grade I-placed Why Go On Dreaming (by Danzig). Third dam Heatherthen (by Forceten) is a multiple grade I winner, track

record-setter and millionaire (\$1,022,699).

African Skyline has produced three winners, including Seiun Asian, a Lion Heart colt who has earned \$351,255 racing in Japan. Barren in 2012, African Skyline currently has a weanling colt by Afleet Alex.

Over the two session of the OBS June sale, 44 of the 56 New York-breds that passed through the sales ring changed hands, including one private sale. The \$24,500 median price impressively outperformed the general population of the sale where the record-breaking \$20,000 median represented a 33.3% increase over last year. The New York-bred average of \$23,898 did not manage to keep pace with the overall sale, where the number, also a new record, was up 35% to \$33,859. The 21.4% buy-back rate for New York-breds was better than the sale's 23.9%.

HEAVY BREATHING TO ENTER STUD AT DUTCHESS VIEWS FARM

Heavy Breathing (Giant's Causeway—Takesmybreathaway, by Gone West), a 4-year-old full brother to last year's leading and record-breaking New York freshman sire Frost Giant, will enter stud in 2014 at Dutchess Views Farm near Pine Plains, N.Y., for a fee to be announced at a later date.

Bred in Kentucky by Manganaro and purchased by Starlight Partners for \$150,000 as a Keeneland September yearling in 2010, Heavy Breathing won his first two career starts on dirt at Gulfstream by a combined 12 lengths. He finished third in his next start, the grade III Vinery Racing Spiral Stakes on Turfway Park's Polytrack. Two starts later he was second by a neck in the Lamplighter Stakes on turf at Monmouth Park. He retires with two wins, two seconds and a third from seven starts and earn-

ings of \$124,441.

Todd Pletcher, who trained the colt for Starlight, said, "A very attractive individual, Heavy Breathing showed great promise with his ability over a variety of distances and track surfaces."



WHAT THE CASINO BILL MEANS TO BREEDERS

Whatever happens with a vote in November regarding a constitutional amendment authorizing new casinos in New York, the breeding industry has assurances that purses and incentive funds will be largely unaffected.

As outlined in the Upstate New York Gaming Economic Development Act, none of New York's Thoroughbred racetracks will be permitted to offer full-blown, Las Vegas-style casinos, and no one yet knows where any new gambling halls might be located. The legislation, however, does include protections against lower purses and cuts to other funds, leaving in place existing percentages from gaming. A hold-harmless provision preserves payments to breeding funds and purses at current, 2013 dollar levels, with inflationary adjustments, if existing video lottery terminal racino payments drop because of the new casinos. This provision will not affect the Thoroughbred industry in particular for years to come because New York City has been taken off the table as a new casino site, giving Genting's Resorts World Casino at Aqueduct exclusivity for seven years.

The New York Thoroughbred industry, therefore, will receive its current and future percentages for the next seven years as planned.

Gov. Andrew Cuomo made agreements with three Indian tribes with current casinos that, in the end, give those tribes new or expanded protections whereby no new casinos will enter their large geographic areas of western, northern, and central New York. That means Finger Lakes Casino & Racetrack will not be able to expand to a full-scale casino.

The final bill, which Genting backed, restricts the first four casinos to just three areas of upstate New York and prohibits any casinos in the city for at least seven years.

Industry officials predicted Genting's current racino will continue to flourish. They do not believe two

possible casinos in the Catskills—just 90 minutes from Manhattan—will eat into the Aqueduct facility's business, which heavily draws on New York City residents.

"The current metropolitan area of New York City and the accessibility to Aqueduct will always make Genting a desirable gaming destination," said Jeffrey Cannizzo, executive director of the New York Thoroughbred Breeders.

Unlike other jurisdictions, New York is showing interest in protecting breeding and purse levels, Cannizzo said.

"The legislation gives a level of assurance that people who want to get involved in New York's Thoroughbred industry can do so with a level of protection," he said.

Lawmakers took two casino actions. One is a brief resolution to amend the constitution that requires voter approval in the fall to permit up to seven new casinos in the state. The other is enabling legislation that provides the specifics of where casinos can go and how bidders will be selected.

Some racing industry officials are hoping for changes. Richard Violette Jr., president of the New York Thoroughbred Horsemen's Association, raised concerns about two new VLT-only facilities being

allowed to open on Long Island. Those facilities, to be run by off-track betting corporations and limited to 1,000 VLT devices apiece, will not be sharing proceeds with racetracks unless the Aqueduct racino's revenue-sharing amount falls below 2013 levels.

"We hope there are issues that can be massaged a little, such as revenues from VLTs on Long Island," he said. "We understand this is an unfinished product. The industry and the billion dollars in revenues the racing industry means to the state of New York are very important, and we hope everybody understands how vital it is and doesn't pull the rug out from under it."

Thoroughbred owners are pinning their optimism on the growth of Genting's Aqueduct casino, which by October will be providing 1.5% of revenues to the state's main breeding program. The New York breeders estimate the breeding fund revenues from VLT operations at Aqueduct and Finger Lakes will grow from \$9 million in 2012 to \$13 million in 2014. Racinos that become full-blown casinos, such as possibly those facilities in Saratoga Springs, Monticello, and Tioga Downs, must at least maintain minimum purse and breeding payments at 2013 dollar levels.

The biggest unknown, if polls are accurate, is whether voters will pass the casino plan. If the referendum fails, additional VLT facilities would be permitted in the three designated upstate areas that include the Catskills, southern tier, and the Capital area. In addition, one VLT facility will be allowed in Nassau County.

"The New York breeders are optimistic the governor will do what is necessary to assure that the New York Thoroughbred breeding and racing industries continue to be a multi-billion dollar driver of the New York state economy and continue to provide the tens of thousands of jobs these industries directly and indirectly support," said Barry Ostrager, president of the New York Thoroughbred Breeders. "Precisely how, when, and where full-scale casino gambling may be introduced into New York state is an intensely political issue, but we are confident that the governor is committed to the success of the New York breeding industry." —Tom Precious contributed to this article

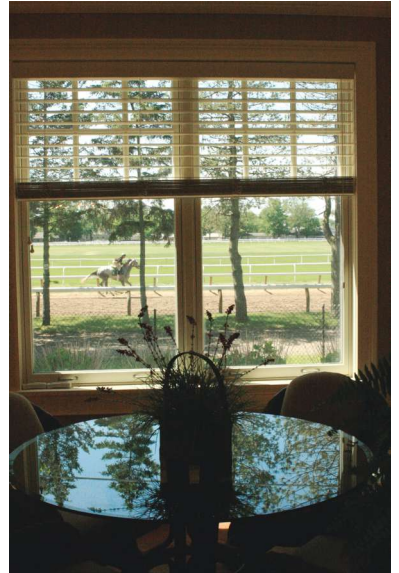

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UPSTATE on My Mind

A reflection on Saratoga

As the sun slowly moves west each evening toward the clubhouse turn, I am watching some of the best horses in the nation strut onto the Saratoga Race Course for that day's feature.

Three hours later I am hearing the first notes of a Beethoven symphony float through the darkness of the Saratoga Performing Arts Center; that evening's featured performance by the Philadelphia Orchestra.

The combination of these events makes Saratoga, the racecourse and the community, unique to the American landscape.

Horses have been running at Saratoga for 150 years; the 112-year-old orchestra has been performing since

SPAC opened 47 years ago to help revitalize a stagnant community.

The original racecourse opened near what is now the Oklahoma training track in 1863, while the Civil War was still raging. A year later it moved across the road eventually to be named Union Avenue for the armies of the North. It quickly became clear that the first track was too short, the turns too sharp, and the viewing too limited. That it would be successful, however, was never in doubt; 15,000 people paid \$1 to attend the inaugural four-day meet. That success prompted the raucous ex-prizefighter and gambling visionary, John Morrissey, to solicit enough backing, primarily from Commodore Cornelius

Vanderbilt, to move the track across the avenue to its permanent location.

Vanderbilt was a frequent visitor to Saratoga Springs to "take the waters" at one of the dozens of natural mineral springs throughout the city. He and others also frequented the elegant casinos where gambling had long been a mainstay of the community's economy.

Through the years some of the country's most prominent horse racing families—Whitneys, Vanderbilts, Belmonts, Phippses—have guided and supported the racetrack to such prominence that owners and trainers point their horses to races on the mile oval and turf courses in hopes of adding prestigious Saratoga

black-type wins to their résumés.

I wasn't around to see Onion, whose wily trainer Alan Jerkens that morning told a local businessman he didn't enter him in the 1973 Whitney Stakes (gr. I) to lose to Secretariat.

But I have witnessed races I'll never forget.

Among them wire-nipping victories by two great fillies: the late trainer Bobby Frankel's You coming from last to catch front-running Carson Hollow in the 2002 Test Stakes (gr. I)—a race that caller Tom Durkin declared "doesn't deserve a loser"—and, of course, Rachel Alexandra's 2009 Woodward Stakes (gr. I) victory that emotionally drained the 31,000 fans who stood and applauded the horse far longer than the 1:48 and change it took her to run the 1½ miles.

Frankel, by the way, stamped his unique persona on the Oklahoma track when he posted on the fence in front of his barn a white sign with red painted "Frankel Parking." The back of the sign, with the words "Do not wash horses in storm drains" made it clear that he had "borrowed" it from the New York Racing Association.

And how could I forget the countless turf stakes races with six across the line—finishes so tight that watching reruns still failed to sort them out?

I have seen just about everything mighty New York-bred gelding

Fourstardave ("The Sultan of Saratoga") did on that track, including an unpopular DQ, and years ago, made early morning visits to his barn No. 61, near the Horse Haven section of Oklahoma, where the 150-year-old ice house, a few wood barns, and portions of the 1863 dirt track and white splintery fence still stand. More recently I have visited Dave's headstone in Clare Court, where he is buried among the lofty elms of that peaceful galloping track.

New York-bred horses have fared well at Saratoga, many of them stabled on home farms a short van ride away from the track. Horses trained by small outfits run by Glenn DiSanto of Summit View farm near Greenwich, and Jim Hooper of Haven Oaks, Ft. Edward,

N.Y., are often the first to test the deep, lush surface of the Oklahoma training track in April when the barns open and the last to leave in November.

Perhaps the most memorable state-breds have come from the barn of Linda Rice, who snatched the Saratoga trainer title from Todd Pletcher in 2009 with 20 wins to his 19. Eleven of the 20 were New York-breds, including Mother Russia, Gitchee Goomie, Fort McCoy, and Hoop Me Up. Rice also made history in the 2008 Mechanicville, an overnight stakes at Saratoga, when her four New York-breds completed the superfecta.

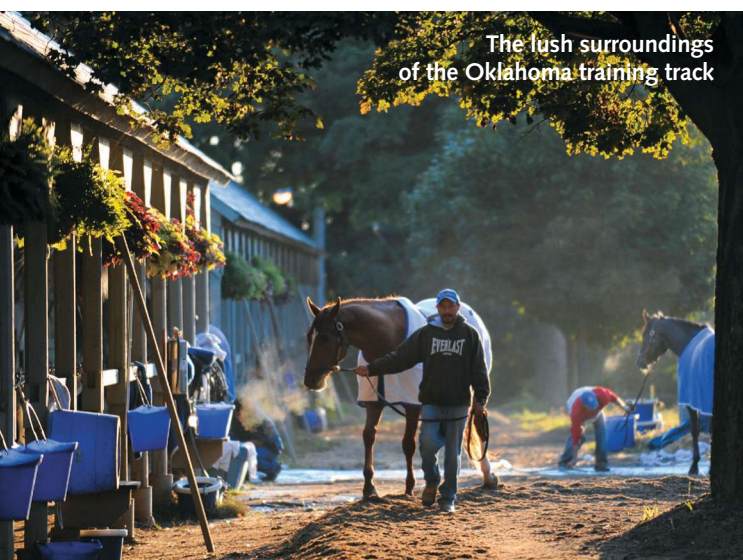
This summer Rice's stable, a private little enclave across Nelson Avenue from the main track backstretch, has about 25-30 New York-breds among the 50 she'll have at Saratoga.

"This is my home base," she said of NYRA tracks. "Because I'm New York-based year long, I'm pretty aggressive in purchasing New York-breds. They protect my clients financially." She's well-positioned for Saratoga 2013. "Will I have a good meet—yes," she said, with a laugh. "To win the training title—well, maybe not."

New York-based trainer Gary Contessa, who won the 2006 and 2007 NYRA trainer of the year titles, will have a slew of New York-breds.

"New York bred—they're a way of life," said Contessa, 55, who remembers coming to Saratoga as a teenager and trying to pick up Skidmore College co-eds at lakeside bars. "To buy a nice Kentucky-bred to win at Saratoga, you have to spend serious money. But you can be an average Joe and buy a New York-bred and win here. They're the great equalizer."

A case in point was the Contessa-trained Go Mikey Go, who won the 1998 Albany Handicap. "It was a great day—all the politicians were there...I won't forget it."

The history and passion make Saratoga special. The city's mansions with large wraparound porches are reminders of the Victorian era and recall the days of grand hotels, flag-draped avenues, elegant gambling parlors, and appearances by such as Enrico Caruso, John Philip Sousa, Diamond Jim Brady, and Lillian Russell (the 29-year-old landmark restaurant on Broadway is named for her). Underworld bosses Meyer Lansky, Lucky Luciano, and Frank Costello were regulars at the casinos, which eventually moved to Saratoga Lake until reformists and anti-crime legislators shut them down in the 1950s. At one time the city was so vibrant, one historian called Saratoga "the Disneyland of the 19th century."

And yet Saratoga has eased into the new century with renewed vigor.

Pricey condos are springing up everywhere, Broadway businesses

are thriving (merchants say August is a second Christmas season), a multiplex movie theater is planned for downtown, and expensive restaurants come and go like the wind, though perhaps none as elegant as the one Richard A. Canfield opened in the early 1900s in his Congress Park casino.

"If you made money in the casino, you'll lose it in the restaurant," he told his high-end customers.

As has been true for decades, from July through early fall, horses crossing over to the main track stop traffic on Union Avenue, their vans grind up Nelson Avenue to deposit their valuable commodities, and their grooms and exercise riders enjoy nightly fiestas on the Oklahoma backstretch where grills and salsa music sizzle as they relax before their alarms go off in the pre-dawn darkness.

Mornings start with trainers holding stopwatches clicking off workout times and with maintenance crews on lumbering tank

trucks watering the large pots of red and white impatiens that stretch from the window boxes and planters on downtown streets to the winner's circle.

These streets also are home to sculptures, reflecting the city's passion for art and horses—sculptures accessible to the public instead of hidden in glass cases.

Several years ago artists decorated life-sized fiberglass statues of horses—motifs included ice cream cones, glittery mirrors, bricks and cement, a black sky with a white galaxy—that were placed throughout Saratoga.

This season, 5-foot-tall decorated fiberglass ballet shoes will dance their way into the public view, a project, "Saratoga en Pointe," sponsored by the National Museum of Dance to remind

visitors of the community's connection to the arts. Come early September the horses and the pointe shoes, funded by a supportive business community, will remain as permanent reminders of the last season and the ones to come.

But I don't need reminders.

Months after the track has closed, the SPAC performers have moved to indoor venues and snow begins falling on the sculpture, I will return to Saratoga for a glimpse of the last horse to glide around the Oklahoma track before the barns close for the long cold winter ahead.

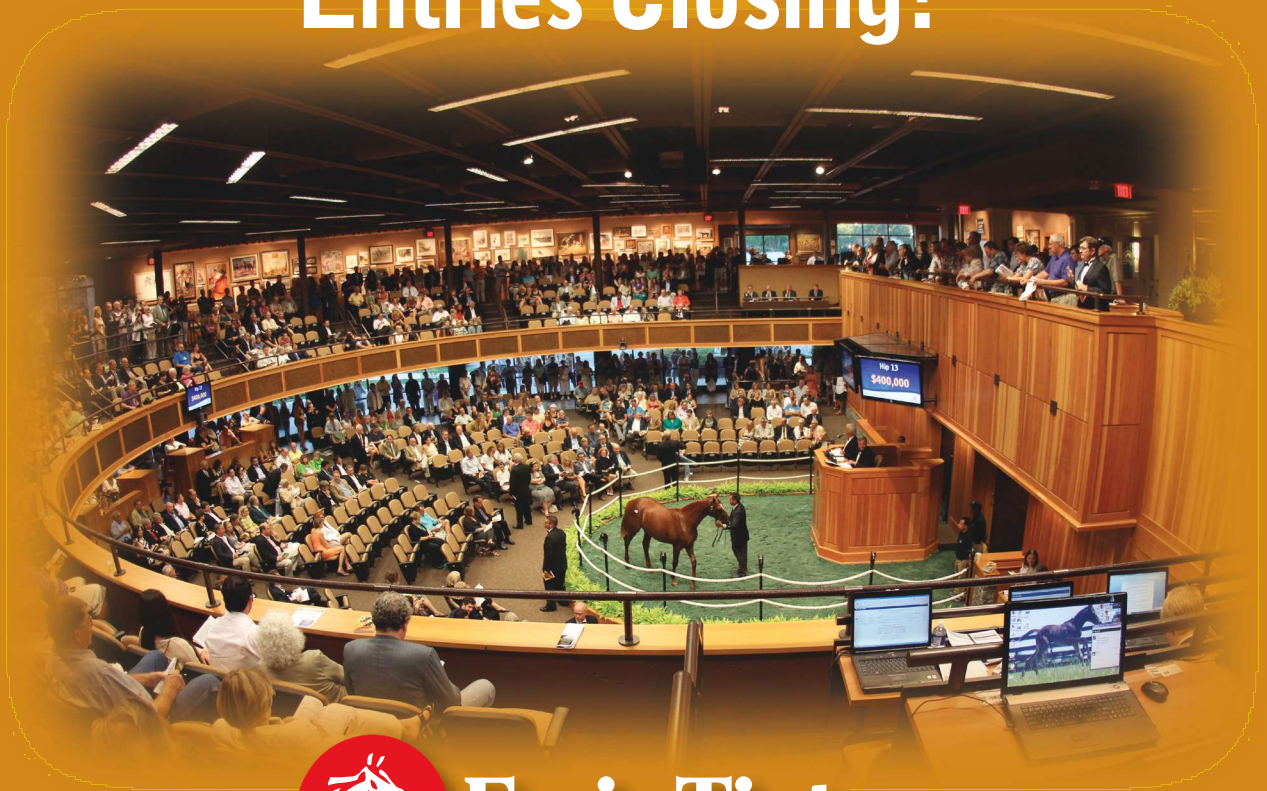
When I drive back home to Connecticut, the Berkshire trees will be bare and a few flakes will drift down. That night when I remove my sneakers, I will find a small strip of gold hay in the tread. My hand will hover over my shoe, reluctant to pull it out—still with all that's in me trying to hold on to summer, Saratoga, and the golden memories of just a few months past. 🐾

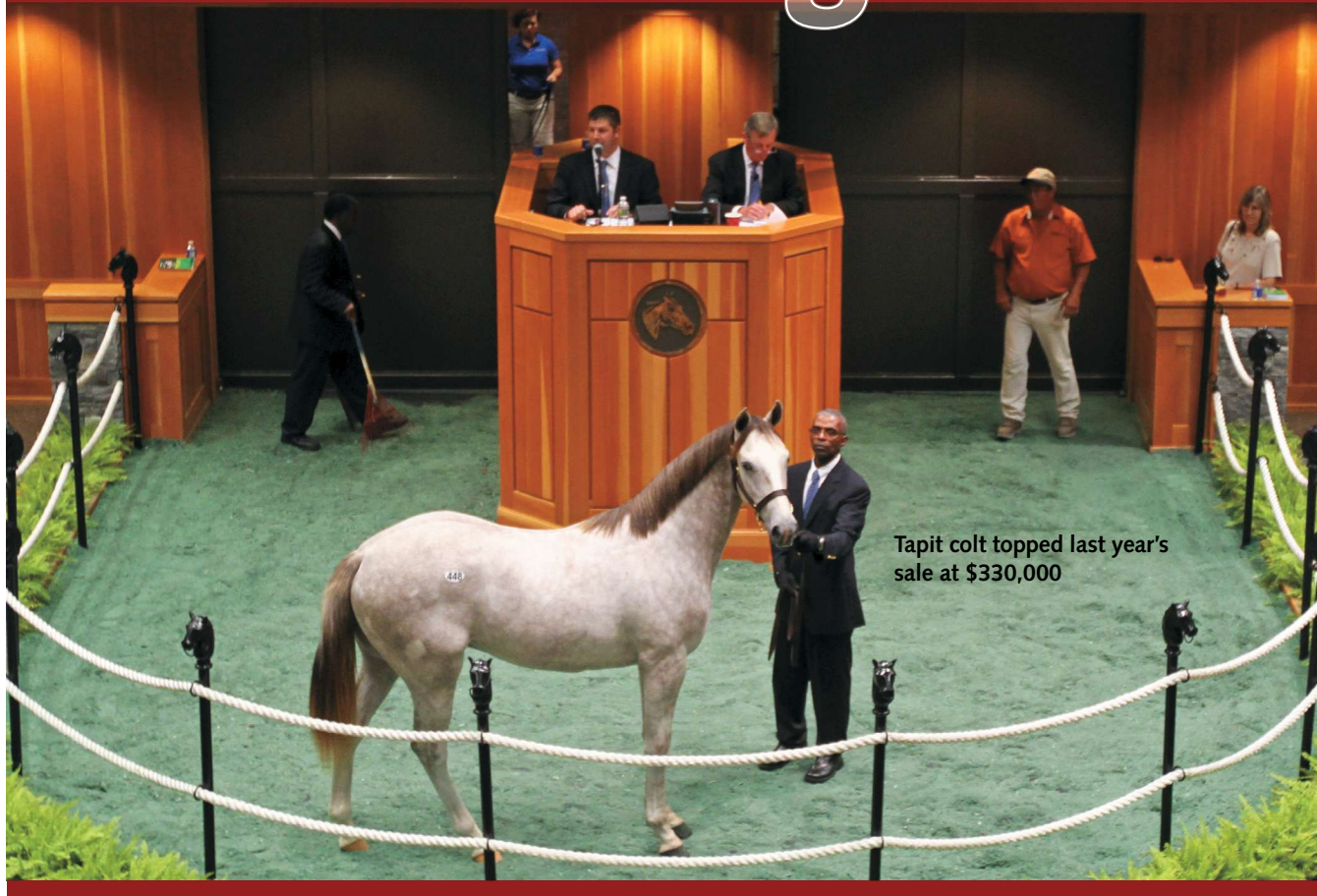


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Storm Surge

New York-bred preferred sale has look of 'perfect storm' of buyers, sellers, and horses

A warning for those about to brave the Fasig-Tipton New York-bred preferred yearling auction Aug. 10-11 in Saratoga Springs. The sale has the potential to bring together a "perfect storm" of buyers, sellers, and horses.

A rebounding economy, a strong market already this year for sale 2-year-olds, and a double-barreled shot of earning potential for state-breds should make for plenty of buyers interested in acquiring and racing New York-breds. That interest has brought competition, with new consignors entering the fray and more

established sellers bringing stronger consignments to the marketplace.

The sale, which takes place over two evening sessions at the Humphrey S. Finney Pavilion, has always been the premier spot to buy and sell New York-breds. As the state-bred program's purse and stakes structure grow, so do expectations for the sale to produce a third year of heady advances.

In the year prior to the opening of the Resorts World Casino New York City in late October 2011 at Aqueduct, the New York Racing Association was floundering and the

state-bred program hit a modern-day nadir. The average price of a New York preferred yearling in 2009 sank from \$54,390 the previous year to \$40,687—a 25.2% drop—and the median fell from \$45,000 to \$27,000. In 2010 the average price dipped to \$39,106.

"You had to have had a vivid imagination to see any bright spots in the NYRA program a few years ago," said Highclere's Jeffrey Morris, who has been selling horses at Saratoga for four decades.

As purses began to rise—dramatically due to the gaming revenue—the

average price at the Saratoga preferred sale rebounded to the 2008 level in 2011, and last year it advanced 15.3% to \$62,551.

This year, with additional sire power, a stronger catalog, and plenty of blue sky ahead for the program, expectations are for interest in New York-bred yearlings to climb further.

"The recent news about the restricted purses being bumped up at Belmont Park for the last two weeks of that meet and what they'll be at Saratoga...the average purse and restricted race structure in New York has never been higher," said Jeffrey Cannizzo, executive director of New York Thoroughbred Breeders. "The earning potential is unparalleled."

That potential for New York-breds is not lost on horsemen and figures to be a key influence on the performance of this year's sale.

"People are not going to be afraid to spend money on a New York-bred," said trainer Gary Contessa. "The better New York-breds, 10 years ago made \$100,000; now it is easy to make \$250,000-\$300,000 with a New York-bred going through their conditions and picking the right spots and running in a few New York-bred stallion stakes. There are a lot of opportunities for a New York-bred."

Buyers at this year's sale will have plenty of opportunities as well: 499 yearlings have been cataloged.

Last year's sale had 260 yearlings cataloged. Adding more horses to a sale has traditionally meant a watering down of the product, but this year's crop of yearlings appears to be the best yet as local breeders, as well as incoming Kentucky breeders, have sought out stronger pedigrees and reached out to use new sires. Top New York-based sires such as Bluegrass Cat, Freud, Frost Giant, and Posse are joined this year by New York-bred yearlings by top guns City Zip, Congrats, Ghostzapper, Giant's Causeway, Kitten's Joy, Midnight Lute, Proud Citizen, Pulpit, Tale of the Cat, and War Front.

"They (Fasig-Tipton) took more horses this year, which is always a bit of a concern, but the quality has been getting better every year," said Derek MacKenzie, director of public sales for Vinery, last year's second-

leading consignor by gross. "The pedigrees are stronger, sire power is stronger, plus there are some hot young Kentucky sires—this should be a solid sale."

Young, up-and-coming sires represented this year include Desert Party, Discreetly Mine, Eskendereya, Hold Me Back, Lookin At Lucky, Midshipman, Pioneerof the Nile, Super Saver, and Warrior's Reward.

"The catalog bears out that they've moved way up in terms of sire power," said Morris. "I don't think there is any question you are going to see a higher profile of buyer coming in at the top and in the middle."

2YO Market Should Spur Yearling Sales

The national market for 2-year-olds earlier this year showed remarkable growth because of heightened demand for ready-made runners. Gross receipts of juveniles soared northward of \$155 million for the first time since 2008, and the average and median were both all-time North American records.

Pinhookers, who make their livelihood by purchasing yearlings and then selling them as juveniles, had a strong season and figure to be back at the yearling sales looking to reload. A New York-bred tag on a potential runner should hold a pretty sizable premium this year.

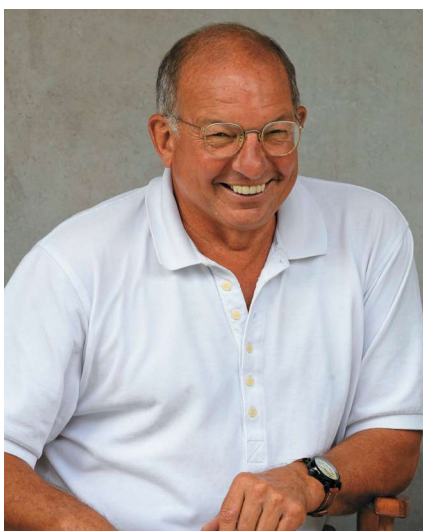

“How well the 2-year-olds sold this year should have a positive effect,” Cannizzo said. “What we saw this spring should carry forward into the yearling market. From 2010 to 2013, the 2-year-old market for New York-breds has progressed.

“The pinhookers had a great year with horses that were bought out of this preferred sale, and I’d like to believe more people in that market will be diving in and diversifying their portfolios by having a few New York-breds to sell. That should drive the prices up for all parts of the market—the low, middle, and high.”

Morris agreed.

“Based on how the 2-year-old market went, everybody is really, really optimistic that the sales will be much more resilient. You have to think the market for the high-end horse will be there, and my hope is to see the middle stiffen up,” he said. “The last

couple of years it was a tough play because you didn’t know if you could reserve them for more than \$30,000 and have any confidence you could sell them...and you had to sell them.

If that is how the open market plays out, there is no reason why the New York-bred market can’t double down. Hopefully, it will be a solid 25-40% premium for New York-breds.”

Strength from Top to Bottom

Cannizzo points to a new market that is being created by Fasig-Tipton’s fall mixed sale that got under way last October in Saratoga as several were active in weanling-to-yearling pinhooking out of that sale into preferred yearling auction.

“It is going to be interesting to watch how they do,” he said. “Their success will dictate how that October sale is going to progress. It was something new when those horses were purchased at a discount because that was a market that hadn’t developed yet.”

At the upper end of the state-bred market and not showing up in the tally for the preferred sale will be the select sale that runs Aug. 5-6. In that catalog are a remarkable 11 New York-breds. Last year nine New York-breds were cataloged; in 2011 eight; and only two in 2010.

“That’s a tell-tale sign as well,” Cannizzo said, referring to the advances in the New York breeding program. “Some of the standouts are so nice that people are taking chances by putting them in the open sale. Those are 11 extremely well-bred, well-conformed horses.”

Cannizzo hopes the strength of the New York-bred catalog will have owners sticking around from the select sale to make their way around the barns when the New York-breds ship in later in the week.

Trainers, such as Contessa, will definitely make their way to inspect the yearlings.

“It’s just such a positive to have a New York-bred these days,” Contessa said. “I believe the New York sale really gives us opportunity, value, and quality. Every single buyer at every single level can find the horse they are looking for in that sale—I know I always do.” 🐾

Chilling Results

Frost Giant offspring rule the June 30
New York Stallion Series races

When Frosty Bay won the \$100,000 Cupecoy's Joy division of the New York Stallion Series June 30 at Belmont Park, owner/breeder Robert Rosenthal was so excited he couldn't remember his phone number.

Reciting numbers to a reporter after the race, Rosenthal was interrupted by his wife, Jodi. "No...that's your home number, not your cell number," she interposed.

"I've been breeding in New York for 20 years," he said by way of explanation. "This is a big win for me."

A 3-year-old daughter of Frost Giant out of the Wild Again mare Bay-

mont, Frosty Bay picked up her third victory and first stakes win in the Cupecoy's Joy, pushing her career earnings to \$152,579. She ran the seven furlongs over a firm turf course in 1:22.61. Trained by Dominick Schettino, she was ridden by Javier Castellano, who brought Rosenthal his first stakes win when Exclusively Wild won the Nijana Stakes at Aqueduct in February 2004.

Frosty Bay is Baymont's third and most successful foal, though all three not only made it to the races but to the winner's circle. Rosenthal purchased Baymont privately in 2004 and raced her for three years before

she was retired with earnings of nearly \$190,000.

"She was a great little filly," said Rosenthal of Baymont. "She always ran from way back, virtually last, and made a big run at the end."

"She was a small filly, and she had to make up a lot of ground; she was exciting to watch because she closed rather dramatically."

Baymont is out of Gold Fleece (by Deputed Testamony), and it was her pedigree and running style that led Rosenthal to breed her.

"Given her breeding and her athleticism, I thought she'd make a good broodmare," he explained.

Baymont's 2011 foal is Missy Bay, a filly by Posse, and she has a 2013 filly by Golden Missile. She is currently in foal to Eskendereya.

Rosenthal was an early supporter of Frost Giant, New York's leading first-crop sire in 2012; he has another 2010 Frost Giant runner, Gee Linz, whom he lost to a claim and recently claimed back.

Frosty Bay is co-bred and owned by Rosenthal's brother, Peter.

"I dragged him into the business several years ago," Robert Rosenthal said. "I thought it would be a good thing for him and me to do together."

Chairman, CEO, and CIO of First Long Island Investors, Robert Rosenthal has had many clients in the racing business, and after 20 years in the racing and breeding industries, he remains committed to the New York program.

"We hung in there during the downturn and kept breeding mares, and we hoped and prayed that the racino would become a reality and that the breeding industry would be rejuvenated, and that's exactly what happened," he said.

Frosty Bay is pointing next to the Statue of Liberty division of the Stallion Series Aug. 8 at Saratoga Race Course, a race won last year by the Rosenthals' My Jopia, co-bred and owned by Bernice Waldbaum.

My Jopia is out of Rosenthal's My Jodi Lynn.

"We wanted to run My Jopia in the Cupecoy's Joy last year," said Rosenthal. "She was supposed to be the favorite, but she had a little bit of a problem and we had to scratch her. It was heartbreaking, but she went on to win at Saratoga, and we hope Frosty Bay can win it for us this year."

The offspring of Frost Giant continued their winning ways when West Hills Giant (out of Outtawesthills, by Take Me Out) took the \$100,000 Spectacular Bid division of the Stallion Series the same day.

After winning two of four races at 2, including the New York Breeders' Futurity at Finger Lakes, West Hills

Giant had yet to win this year. His success last year and a second-place finish in the Gotham Stakes (gr. III) earned him a spot on the Kentucky Derby trail, but after finishing 12th in the Toyota Blue Grass Stakes (gr. I), he returned to state-bred company in May, finishing a disappointing fifth in the Mike Lee Stakes.

Facing 11 other horses including former Stallion Series winners Meeker Avenue and Belief System, also sired by New York stallions, West Hills Giant returned to the winner's circle with a comfortable 2½-length victory. The post time favorite ran the seven furlongs in 1:21.71.

Bred by Robert Castelli and owned by his Long Island Racing Stables in partnership with Sunrise Stables and Gina Bentivegna, West Hills Giant began his career on grass, breaking his maiden over the Saratoga turf last year, but he had not returned to the green since finishing seventh in the Pilgrim Stakes (gr. IIIT) at Belmont last fall. Thrilled by his stakes wins on dirt and turf, his connections are undecided about on which surface his future lies.

A podiatrist with an office on Jamaica Avenue in Woodhaven, Queens, Castelli became friendly with Sunrise Stables' Eric Bishop, when Bishop, a former sergeant in the New York Police Department, used to walk by his office. Bishop now manages the rac-

ing and breeding operation for Sunrise Stables' Andrew Cohen, who also owns Frost Giant.

Castelli and his wife live in West Hills on Long Island, on a property that had a barn but no horses, so when Bishop told Castelli about a program for retired mounted police horses, he and his wife adopted several retirees.

Bred and owned by Castelli, Outtawesthills joined those retirees when she bowed a tendon after breaking her maiden in 2008. At first she lived a life of leisure, but several years into her retirement, Castelli decided to breed her, and because of his friendship with Bishop, he chose Frost Giant as the stallion.

An earner of \$345,069, West Hills Giant is Outtawesthills' first foal. He's got a 2011 half sister by Big Brown, Outtacypresshills, currently being broken, along with a 2012 full brother. Outtawesthills was bred back to Frost Giant this year.

Castelli and Bishop expect West Hills Giant to race in the July 20 New York Derby at Finger Lakes, but they've yet to decide where they'll go with him after that. They plan to race him at Saratoga, but whether he'll run on turf or dirt remains to be seen.

"We think he can run on either surface," said Bishop. "He's made more money on grass than he has on dirt." 🐾

Gives Thoroughbreds Options in the Show Ring

When Adele Einhorn was approached two years ago by Rick Violette Jr.—a top trainer and president of the New York Thoroughbred Horsemen’s Association—asking for her help with his idea to make Thoroughbreds more of a presence on the show horse circuit, she was skeptical.

“As someone who has been part of the sport for a long time and who used to ride Thoroughbreds, my first reaction was that it wasn’t going to happen,” said Einhorn, executive director of the Skidmore College Saratoga Classic Horse Show. “Warmbloods have become so much easier for people to work with.”

To her surprise Einhorn found a lot of support for the idea of helping Thoroughbreds stage a comeback in a sport they once dominated. The United States Hunter Jumper Association and other major players became involved, and a task force co-chaired by Einhorn aided in the expansion of the TAKE2 program that Violette and others had started in New York. This year TAKE2 is sponsoring classes restricted to Thoroughbreds at nearly 50 shows in 17 states. Prize money is expected to total around \$120,000.

TAKE2 came about when the New York Thoroughbred Breeders, New York Racing Association, and NYTHA com-

bined to sponsor Thoroughbred-only classes last year at horse shows around New York, as well as in New Jersey and Texas. The idea was that show jumping could provide an important career option for retired racehorses, and for Thoroughbreds that did not race. The sponsored shows include Skidmore’s Saratoga Classic, which ended its annual two-week run over the weekend.

“The goal is to create a demand for Thoroughbreds to be back at these shows,” said NYTb executive director Jeff Cannizzo. “The only way this is going to happen is for everyone to embrace the idea. It’s spreading by word of mouth. Horsemen and breeders in other states have copied New York’s example, and now it’s all over the place, which is really neat.”

European Warmbloods began replacing Thoroughbreds, especially at the sport’s higher levels, in the late 1980s. The reasons for this development included the widespread opinion that Warmbloods were easier to ride—especially for the amateur or “weekend” rider—and a perceived shortage of suitable Thoroughbreds. Acquiring a Warmblood became a fad, the thing to do because that’s what everyone else was doing.

The result, for longtime trainer and rider Betsy Joyce,

was that, “younger trainers were importing horses they didn’t have to train. It got to be much easier to go to Europe and buy a ‘made’ horse.”

Thoroughbreds have their passionate backers, especially among more experienced riders. One of them is Danielle Flavin, a former exercise rider for top flat-track trainers Neil Howard and Michael Matz, who has recently returned to the show ring.

“They’re very different to ride,” Flavin said of the two breeds. “Warmbloods are much bigger and stronger, also slower. Thoroughbreds kind of carry their own energy. I love my Warmblood, but Thoroughbreds have such a different feel and a different style. They try really hard, and they want to do well. A lot of people think Thoroughbreds are these hot, crazy horses, and they’re not.”

For her part Einhorn credits Thoroughbreds with making her a better rider:

“All of the older trainers who are around now grew up riding Thoroughbreds,” she said. “It’s so easy for me to do well on these other horses because I learned to ride on a Thoroughbred.”

Veteran trainer and rider Leann Kelly is another Thoroughbred advocate.

“In a lot of ways they’re more trainable,” she said. “Warmbloods can be a little spookier, a little tougher to convince. Thoroughbreds are a little more sensitive to ride, but they want to do the right thing. They have a lot of heart. And they give a lot back; they really do.”

Kelly is the owner and trainer of Michael, winner of the TAKE2 Thoroughbred Jumper division recently at the Saratoga Classic. The 23-year-old gelding, who looks and performs like a horse half his age, was purchased by Kelly 18 years ago after a brief career as a racehorse. Known then as McCouns Lane, the New York-bred son of Highbinder made one start at Finger Lakes before moving on to show jumping.

In his prime, a decade ago, Michael competed at the Grand Prix level, scoring at major events throughout the East. In the years since, he has been used to train scores of young riders. One of those young riders was Flavin, who was back aboard for the old-timer’s four flawless rounds in the jumper ring.

“When you’re on him at the ‘in’ gate, you feel like you could jump the moon,” said Flavin, who is also Kelly’s daughter. “He pushes confidence into you. He’s not a very big horse, but when you’re sitting on him, you can feel his total confidence. Anything you want, he’s right there for you.”

While Michael is presumably in the latter stages of his career—it is

almost unheard of for a horse his age to be competing at this level—Noiziman is a relative newcomer at 6. The Quiet American gelding won top honors in the TAKE2 Thoroughbred Hunter Classic at the Saratoga Classic.

Noiziman didn’t start out to be a show horse. Owner/breeder Teri Bohl of Ivory Times Stable sent him to trainer J.J. Pletcher in Florida late in his 2-year-old year, hoping he would develop into a racehorse. But things didn’t work out for the 17.2-hand gelding.

“He breezed once, and the time was so slow I had to call to make sure it wasn’t a misprint,” Bohl said.

Plan B was for Noiziman to try the show ring, and he has done well during his first three years. With his victory at Saratoga, “Noizi” has finished first in classes at six straight shows. He will compete in open events over the rest of the year.

“This is what he was meant to do,” said Bohl. “It’s so rewarding when you see a horse that you bred and developed get put in the position where they belong—and then to be able to watch them succeed. It’s really a thrill.”

Bohl, Flavin, and Kelly agree that the TAKE2 program is a step in the right direction.

“I think TAKE2 can make a difference,” said Kelly. “Some of the right people are getting involved. There is definitely more interest in showing Thoroughbreds now, and I think it will grow. But it’s not going to happen overnight.”

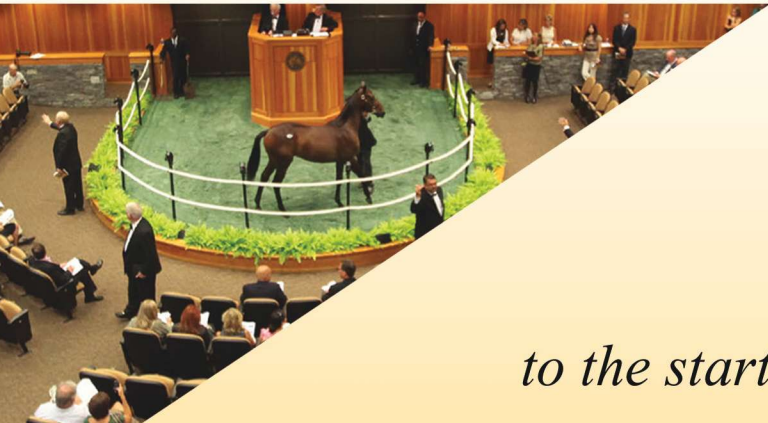
