

In fewer than six months, the dream became a reality: Blowen leased the Peppers' farm and worked with them to get things







## New York City OTB files for bankruptcy, seeks changes in mandated payments to horsemen

As expected, the New York City Off-Track Betting Corp. on December 3 filed for Chapter 9 bankruptcy protection from its creditors, including the state's racetracks, state agencies, and the New York State Thoroughbred Breeding and Development Fund, which distributes breeder awards from racetrack wagering.

The filing, authorized on September 1 by Gov. David Paterson, is likely to result in a significant downsizing of New York City OTB, including the closing of marginal betting shops and a sizable reduction in its unionized work force. At the time of its filing, New York City OTB employed roughly 1,365 workers in the city's five boroughs.

Also, the quasi-governmental agency, now managed by the state after New York City Mayor Michael Bloomberg threatened to shut it down in mid-2008, promised a new business plan for the agency—but one that would require approval of the New York General Assembly.

In response to the New York state comptroller's report on New York City OTB operations in August, New York City OTB contended that, to be profitable, it must reduce its mandated payments to racetrack purses and breeder awards. (See sidebar, "OTB troubles: Revenues or costs?")

Wagering contributions for purses and breeder awards traditionally have been based on total handle. Under a net-income scheme, contributions to purses and other horsemen's payments would decline if the betting operation's costs suddenly rise without a parallel increase in wagering.

The bankruptcy filing may slow payment of breeder awards scheduled for February 4. The filing "is a negative for New York breeders as OTB payments to the New York Breeding and Development Fund will likely be delayed, and any unpaid obligations to the fund may be [cut]," said Barry Ostrager, president of New York Thoroughbred Breeders Inc.

In announcing its Chapter 9 filing, New York City OTB said specifically that it will not seek reductions of its payments to the state and city. However, it raised the specter of closing if it does not receive relief from payments for its other mandated expenses. "Without this change, [New York City] OTB may be forced to cease operations, which would cause the city, the state, and horse racing industry to lose all revenues that could be provided

by [New York City] OTB," the corporation said in announcing its Chapter 9 filing. New York City OTB handles approximately \$1-billion in wagers a year.

"[New York City] OTB took the serious step of filing a Chapter 9 case, after careful deliberation, with three principal objectives in mind—creating a sound basis for future operations, using the business model to access capital in the financial markets without any taxpayer support, and paying all its obligations," said Chairman Meyer "Sandy" Frucher, who was appointed by Paterson in June.

New York City OTB said it would seek \$250-million in financing through private credit markets to pay its creditors, continue operations, and advance its restructuring. Frucher, former chairman and chief executive officer of the Philadelphia Stock Exchange, said the business plan would seek to attract new customers, most likely through increased Internet wagering and a revised bricks-and-mortar strategy aimed as building its clientele.

The part of the proposed business plan that requires legislative approval is a change in the formula for horsemen's payments, which are calculated as a percentage of total wagering. Frucher advocated for a calculation based on net wagering income, after the operation's costs have been paid.

"[New York City] OTB generates hundreds of millions of dollars annually for the region, but it has been hobbled by statutes

that make it impossible for the corporation to cover its own operating expenses," Frucher said. "We have never taken a single dollar from taxpayers in our history, and our plan does not request a single tax dollar to transform [New York City] OTB into a powerful, sustainable economic engine. We just require the common-sense legislative changes that will allow this important state asset to grow.'

Wagering contributions for purses and breeder awards traditionally have been based on total handle. Under a net-income scheme, contributions to purses and other horsemen's payments would decline if the betting operation's costs suddenly rise without a parallel increase in wagering.

In its Chapter 9 filing, New York City OTB listed obligations to racetracks and governmental agencies exceeding \$54-million. Total indebtedness is more than \$200-million, according to the filing, but that total includes future pension obligations and lawsuits for employment discrimination and personal injury that are being litigated.

The largest debtor is Yonkers Racing Corp., the racino-Standardbred track in Westchester County, which is owed \$18million. Next on the list of the largest creditors is the New York Racing Association, with a \$14.7-million claim. The New York State Thoroughbred Breeding and Development Fund is owed \$1.8-million for statutory payments. Oak Tree Racing Association, host of the Breeders' Cup World Championships in early November, has a \$283,826 claim for unpaid host fees and wagering settlement. Other out-of-state tracks with sizable claims are Calder Race Course (\$174,906), Keeneland Race Course (\$157,790), Turf Paradise (\$127,944), and Thistledown (\$112,699).

New York City OTB said that it had no timetable for emerging from bankruptcy protection and that its successful exit would depend on legislative action.

## NYRA sets anti-slaughter policy

The New York Racing Association instituted an antislaughter policy in December that imposes penalties to violators of the policy and encourages horse rescue and adoption programs.

Under the policy, any owner or trainer stabled at a NYRA track found to have directly or indirectly sold a horse for slaughter will have his or her stalls permanently revoked at all NYRA tracks.

"We are fully committed to protecting our sport's equine athletes," Charles Hayward, NYRA president and chief executive officer, said on December 10. "This policy sends the message that horse slaughter will not be tolerated and that those participating in this practice, either knowingly or for lack of due diligence, will not be welcome at Aqueduct, Belmont Park, or Saratoga [Race Course].'

Within the past year, NYRA also has donated to horse welfare organizations such as the Thoroughbred Retirement Foundation, the Columbia-Greene Humane Society, the Grayson-Jockey Club Research Foundation, and the Exceller Fund

### OTB troubles: Revenues or costs?

Any consideration of New York City Off-Track Betting Corp.'s proposal to change the method of calculating its contributions to purses and breeder funds will almost certainly focus on the longstanding debate over the huge betting operation and its inability to operate

The key question is: Is the root of New York City OTB's problems

its cost structure or its revenue stream?

A similar dialogue played out in the New York state comptroller's review of New York City Off-Track Betting Corp. 's operations. The Di-vision of State Government Accountability, in a report released on August 13, made the case that New York City OTB should pay more attention to its expenses.

The New York City OTB responded in May to a draft of the report that the real problem was its revenue stream. New York City OTB officials contended that changes in the law and revenue allocations did not permit it to keep enough of its operating revenues to remain viable. Among the areas mentioned by New York City OTB officials were contributions to racetrack purses and breeder programs

The corporation, now owned by the state after a threatened 2008 shutdown and operating out of Manhattan offices, maintained that some of the cost savings would be minimal. The comptroller's office, with the final word in the discussion, acknowledged improve-ments in OTB cost management but noted that no cost savings should be regarded as too small to pursue.

Moreover, the report concluded that New York City OTB "has not conducted a staffing study since 1981, prior to its initiation of telephone and Internet betting and prior to the installation of automated betting terminals at its branch locations. We believe such a study should be conducted."

The state watchdog and the beleaguered OTB agree on one point,

however, that conditions are bad and getting worse. In the 2007-'08 fiscal year, the corporation had operating revenues of \$244.7-million (down from \$255.9-million in the previous year) and a net loss of \$17.8-million, resulting in a cumulative loss of approximately \$38-million over four years. The deficit, mostly covered by accumulated surpluses, almost certainly increased in the 2008-'09 fiscal year, when wagering through OTB facilities declined by

roughly 10%.
While New York City OTB officials complained over their mandated payments to horsemen through purses and breeders' allotments, those totals have declined in three consecutive years, from \$100.9-million in fiscal 2006 to \$93.2-million two years later.

Over the same period, operating expenses increased, from \$128.2-million to \$133.9-million. The comptroller's report noted that two-thirds of that expense went for salaries and fringe benefits of a largely unionized work force.

At the time of the report, New York City OTB operated 68 loca-tions, comprising 57 branch offices, eight locations in private restau-rants, and three teletheaters. The corporation had 1,366 employees: 806 at the branches, 274 at its headquarters, 236 at a phone-bet-ting center, and 50 at a warehouse where OTB employees maintain wagering machines. In addition, New York City OTB carries a \$228million liability for pensions on its balance sheet.

The comptroller's report noted a wide disparity in revenues generated by branches in fiscal 2008, ranging from 6% of total wagering to 27%. "It thus appears that there is need for management to review branch operations and determine whether actions can be taken to reduce associated costs," the report said. Approximately 45% of all OTB wagering occurred through automated terminals

In addition, the comptroller's report asserted that phone and In-ternet wagering, which handled 21% of all wagers through New York City OTB, were more cost-effective than branch operations with operating costs of \$13.2-million, 6.4% of the handle they processed. Handling the remaining 79% of wagers, the branches cost \$76.8-million to operate, which was 9.7% of the handle they processed.

The corporation's handle totaled approximately \$1-billion for the year.

The report also said that New York City OTB had failed to act on a consultant's recommendation that it automate the phone operation to save a substantial portion of its \$13.2-million annual cost. The OTB corporation said that idea was put on the shelf when the shutdown was imminent in 2008, but it was seeking ways to increase Internet wagering.-Don Clippinger

## NYRA forecasts cash-flow crunch

The New York Racing Association said on December 10 that it will run out of cash before the 2010 Saratoga Race Course meeting unless an Aqueduct gaming operator is named soon.

NYRA received \$30-million in September 2008 when the state renewed its franchise to operate Aqueduct, Belmont Park, and Saratoga, but that money was meant to last only until video lottery terminals began operation at Aqueduct, which then was anticipated in the first half of 2010. A gaming franchisee—still not selected—will operate 4,500 VLTs at the Queens track, with NYRA receiving 7% of the net revenue.


NYRA still has \$15-million left, but declining handle and rising costs might tap out the organization before the middle of

"We're projecting handle will be down 9% at Aqueduct and Belmont in 2010 and 5% at Saratoga," NYRA President Charles Hayward said, "so revenue is going to continue to decline."


In addition to major expenses such as utilities, labor contracts, and capital improvements, the bankrupt New York City Off-Track Betting Corp. owes NYRA \$14.7-million. "We think we're going to run out of cash sometime in the June-July time frame," Hayward said.

Although the VLTs will generate needed revenue not only for NYRA but also for horsemen and breeders, NYRA only needs the state to name an Aqueduct gaming operator to obtain some funds, because the state has stipulated that NYRA will receive an upfront payment. Hayward said that NYRA, the chosen operator, and the state would negotiate the amount of the payment.

"We've been communicating with the state Division of the Budget; [it is] aware of the situation," Hayward said of NYRA's potential cash flow issues. "I don't believe it's a crisis; I think there will be an orderly resolution."

NYRA's upfront payment most likely will come out of the minimum \$200-million that the chosen operator must pay to the state for the 30-year VLT franchise. The state's deficit reduction plan is dependent on that payment, and the fiscal year ends on March 31, 2010, so the state is working against that deadline.

Still, Hayward said he has no idea when to expect a decision. "I've given up making those kinds of projections," he said.—Paul Post

### Twilight Meteor to New York

Graded stakes winner Twilight Meteor, a son of leading sire Smart Strike, has been retired from racing and will stand the 2010 breeding season for Saratoga Stud at Dan and Kathy Barraclough's Saratoga Glen Farm in Schuylerville.

An earner of \$575,291, Twilight Meteor won at Saratoga Race Course in his first start as a two-year-old and also won the 2006 Woodford Reserve Bourbon Stakes at Keeneland Race Course. He was graded stakes-placed at three and four and won the 2009 Canadian Turf Stakes (G3) at Gulfstream Park as a five-year-old.

His dam, One Over Prime, is a half sister to Grade 1 winner Citronnade and Canadian champion two-yearold females Poetically and Primaly.

"Twilight Meteor is a beautiful, well-balanced horse with tons of heart and Grade 1 talent," said Todd Pletcher, who trained him for John Fort's Peachtree Racing Stable.

"Smart Strike has been an extremely versatile sire on all surfaces with horses running at every age and distance like Grade 1-winning two-year-olds Square Eddie and Lookin At Lucky, top sprinters like Fabulous Strike, champion turf male English Channel, and Horse of the Year Curlin," said Harlan Appleby of Saratoga Stud. "With Twilight Meteor's impeccable conformation, his ability to score big stakes wins from two through five, and his incredible pedigree, we expect him to follow in his father's footsteps."

"Twilight Meteor is an 'A' physical and was a great racehorse. One of the best-looking horses I've owned. If his foals look like him, we'll be bidding," Fort said.






## Weathering a difficult year

Uncertainty over Aqueduct gaming adds to the woes of a battered economy

The New York breeding industry was buffeted by powerful head winds in 2009, first by the precipitous declines in the general and Thoroughbred economies and then by further delays of video lottery terminals (VLTs) at Aqueduct. Adding further uncertainty was the Chapter 9 bankruptcy filing of the New York City Off-Track Betting Corp. in early December. The year also was marked by the loss of two industry legends and by a young champion.

But the year also had its bright spots. Another industry legend, trainer John Nerud, was honored by the New York Thoroughbred Breeders Inc. for a lifetime of accomplishment, while New York-breds shone brightly throughout the racing season and contributed significantly to a solid Saratoga Race Course season, which will expand to 40 dates this year.

The continuing melodrama surrounding the VLTs at Aqueduct spanned the calendar, and their importance to New York state and the Thoroughbred industry made the Aqueduct morass the year's most significant news story.

The long, heavily burdened climb to VLTs at Aqueduct has become an exercise in Sisyphean futility; every time the summit is in sight—in this case, ready to turn over that first spade of dirt in Queens—the opportunity rolls away, and the industry is left to begin its existential struggle all over again.

At the beginning of the year, it appeared that New York had a deal for 4,500 VLTs at Aqueduct, probably by the spring of 2010. In October 2008, Gov. David Paterson had announced that

Buffalo-based Delaware North Cos. would be the VLT operator at the New York Racing Association track.

The state already was counting its money; Aqueduct alone was expected to generate \$1-million a day for the tattered state budget, purses were to increase strongly, and New York breeders were to receive 1% of the net win from the machines, rising to 1.5% after three years. Paterson went so far as to include slots revenue from Belmont Park—which with Saratoga was excluded from having VLTs under the 2001 legislation—in his executive budget.

To win the franchise, Delaware North had pledged an upfront payment of \$370-million, and the first sign of trouble was the company's failure to sign a memorandum of understanding by January—despite a projected spring groundbreaking. By February, legislators and racing officials were becoming nervous about the Aqueduct deal, much less Belmont.

"It's just going on and on," said New York Assembly member Audrey Pheffer, a Queens Democrat whose district includes Aqueduct. "We went down this road before with MGM Mirage."

Indeed, legislators and the Thoroughbred industry had been down that long, lonesome road. NYRA had reached a deal with MGM Mirage to build and operate a slots emporium, but dithering, delays, and downright deviousness by the administration of Gov. George Pataki had led MGM Mirage to pull out while NYRA was in the midst of a struggle to win renewal

of its racing franchise.

As it turned out, the result would be the same with Delaware North, which also operates Finger Lakes Gaming and Racetrack. The frozen credit markets—a crucial piece of the economic crisis in the fall of 2008—made it impossible for Delaware North to raise the \$370-million it had pledged for the franchise, and on March 10 the company said it could not meet a March 31 deadline for payment.

Company officials offered to move forward with construction and make the payment when the credit markets loosened, but Paterson declined and reopened the bidding. Racing interests and legislators urged a rapid rebidding, and new offers were submitted by May 8. Among the bidders were MGM Mirage, Delaware North, Penn National Gaming Inc., SL Green Realty Corp., Aqueduct Entertainment Group, and casino entrepreneur Steve Wynn.

Despite a petition drive by the NYTB and a well-publicized rally outside the Capitol in Albany, the summer was notable for absolutely nothing happening. Any deal required the assent of the governor, Assembly speaker, and Senate president, which proved difficult to secure. For more than a month beginning in early June, the Senate had two presidents as Republicans seemingly gained control of the House with the help of two Democratic defectors and then lost control when the defectors returned to the Democratic caucus. In the interim, no state business was conducted in the Senate.

After the Saratoga meet concluded, Paterson ordered a new round of bidding and added a requirement that the successful bidder had to put up at least \$200-million for the franchise. Penn National previously had disclosed that it would make an upfront payment of \$250-million, but even that was not enough to make it an ironclad front-runner.


Reportedly frustrated by the open-ended bidding process, Wynn dropped out only two days before the November 6 deadline. More than a month after the deadline, no winner of the VLT franchise had been named.

#### **Economic woes**

The national economic crisis that began in October 2008 was quickly followed by the crash of the bellwether Keeneland November breeding stock sale and panic within the commercial breeding markets. The big problem, as one Kentucky breeding consultant noted, was "empty stalls." To fill those stalls, Kentucky breeders went fishing for regional mares, including those based in New York. Also challenging New York breeders was the lure of big dollars to the south in Pennsylvania, which quickly has reaped the wealth pouring out of the state's racetrack casinos.

To be sure, Kentucky and Pennsylvania lured away some New York mares, but aggressive action to keep mares in the state certainly reduced the outflow. The results of the Report of Mares Bred, released by the Jockey Club in October, confirmed the decline in New York breeding activity. The state's industry remained the sixth-largest Thoroughbred breeding jurisdiction—Pennsylvania vaulted over it into the fifth spot while Texas dropped below New York to seventh—but the New York declines were measured in double digits, with the number of state stallions falling 32.7% and the number of mares bred to them off by 17.6% to 1,561.

In some ways, the New York numbers can be read favorably. Fewer stallions and fewer mares partly represented a culling of


marginal breeding prospects, and the average stallion book increased 22.4% to 22.3 mares, the highest figure ever recorded in New York

Compounding the economic problems were reduced revenues flowing to the New York State Thoroughbred Breeding and Development Fund; by spring, the fund for breeder awards had a projected \$1.6-million deficit. To return the awards to solvency, the Fund and NYTB developed a payment protocol that retained 20% awards to New York-sired state-breds but reduced the payments for second- and third-place finishers by half to 10% of the applicable purse. New York-breds sired by stallions standing outside the state receive awards of 10% and 5%, respectively. Effective with the percentage changes on July 1, all breeder awards were capped at \$10,000 per race.

#### **OTB** bankruptcy

New York City OTB is a betting behemoth, and—like New York's largest financial institutions—is too big to allow it to fail. The operation generates roughly 5% of all U.S. pari-mutuel betting on horse racing, and wagering approaches \$1-billion each year. It also is a lumbering dinosaur, locked into numerous betting parlors, some less than suitable for mixed company, and a unionized work force. It has been bleeding red ink for some time, and in 2008 New York Mayor Michael Bloomberg threatened to shut it down, thus forcing New York state to take it over—deficits and all

Chairman Meyer "Sandy" Frucher to head the New York City OTB, but by September the governor had authorized a rare Chapter 9 bankruptcy protection filing for the quasi-public corporation

When the filing actually occurred in early December, Frucher promised that all debts—including \$14.5-million to NYRA and approximately \$2-million to the New York State Thoroughbred Breeding and Development Fund—would be paid in full, but the bankruptcy could delay breeders award payments in February. (See story on page 10.)

#### **Industry losses**

The New York industry sustained losses among both people and horses in 2009. In January, the dean of American Turf journalists, Joe Hirsch, died in Manhattan from the effects of Parkinson's disease at age 80. As the executive columnist of *Daily Racing Form* until his retirement in 2003, he literally covered the world of Thoroughbred racing, but his home and his heart were with New York racing and its horsemen. The Saratoga press box, in which he labored for many years, was named in his honor in 1999, and Belmont fall season's premier turf race was renamed the Joe Hirsch Turf Classic Invitational Stakes (G1) in 2004.

At the end of the year, Brooklyn native Bobby Frankel died of lymphoma at his California home. He was 68. Frankel began his career in New York and prospered at its tracks—he shared the training title at Saratoga in 1970—before moving to California in '72. He was inducted into the Racing Hall of Fame in 1995 and increasingly ran his top horses in New York stakes races over the past decade.

One of the brightest racing prospects in years, Tin Cup Chalice, was killed in a training accident at Finger Lakes only hours before the track opened its 2009 season on April 17. The gelding, who was preparing for his first start as a four-year-old, was slammed into by a horse who had bolted during a workout. Only four days earlier, Tin Cup Chalice had been honored as the 2008 New York-bred champion three-year-old male after sweeping the Big Apple Triple and the Indiana Derby (G2). Eight days after his death, his half brother Mr. Fantasy won the Withers Stakes (G3) at Aqueduct.

#### **Bright spots**

Although the year was in many ways dominated by loss, several favorable events filled the calendar. Racing Hall of Fame trainer Nerud, one of the savviest horsemen of any century, was honored with a lifetime achievement award by the NYTB at its annual awards dinner in Saratoga Springs on April 13. Best known for training Hall of Fame member Dr. Fager, Nerud was based in New York for much of his career and has been a strong supporter of the New York-bred program. He serves as director emeritus of the NYTB.

New York breeding continued to attract top sires from Kentucky. Catienus, who had ruled as the state's leading sire in 2006 and '07, will return to New York from owner Ken Ramsey's Kentucky farm for the 2010 breeding season and will be based at McMahon of Saratoga Thoroughbreds. Moving from Vinery Kentucky to Empire Stud are Posse and Repent. Relocating to Highcliff Farm from Adena Springs Kentucky will be Congaree, while Flying Zee Stable's Cosmonaut will retire to Highcliff.


Although New York racing generally was mauled by the recession and the sharp drops in wagering that accompanied the downturn, one bright spot was the Saratoga meet and the New York-breds that filled so many of its races.

Although Saratoga experienced declines in key statistical measures in 2009, all-sources betting was down only 1.7%, while on-track attendance and wagering were off by 2.1% and 2.2%, respectively.

Races restricted to New York-breds accounted for nearly one in every four races at the 36-date meet, and they filled well—averaging 8.9 starters per race compared with the meet average of 8.6 runners per race. New York-breds also performed well in open contests, winning 15 races plus the two contests restricted to New York-sired runners.

Saratoga's stellar figures over the decades have been rewarded with longer racing seasons, beginning with an increase to 30 dates in 1991 from 24. In 2010, the Saratoga meet will grow by four dates, to 40, and will run from July 23 through Labor Day, September 6. New York-breds almost certainly will be featured in the expanded Saratoga schedule.

## All in the family

Edward L. Shapoff carries on family tradition and races stakes winner Weathered

Thoroughbred breeder and owner Edward L. Shapoff is a thirdgeneration horseman, son of the prominent New York trainer Stanley "Skippy" Shapoff and grandson of Mose F. Shapoff, who trained horses in Kentucky.

His twin brother, Cary Shapoff, D.D.S., also breeds and owns horses, and his two adult sons, Edward A. Shapoff, 29, and Christopher A. Shapoff, 27, are both licensed owners.

Skippy Shapoff's only children were not supposed to follow in their father's training footsteps, and for a while it appeared that they would not have much direct involvement in horse racing despite growing up in Albertson, just a few miles from Belmont Park.

After high school, Edward L. Shapoff joined the U.S. Marines Corps Reserve, graduated from Case Institute of Technology in Cleveland, earned a master's of business administration degree from New York University, and went on to become a vice president in the investment banking division of Goldman Sachs Group Inc. His brother graduated from Case Western Reserve University (also in Cleveland), attended dental school there, and became a periodontist.

The Shapoffs just could not resist the allure of the Thorough-

bred world, however. In 1971, Edward Shapoff purchased his first horse. Naturally, he hired his father as trainer, and there was no turning back, especially after the \$5,000 purchase earned \$35,000 within a year. Since then, Shapoff has made Thoroughbreds a big part of his life. At one point in the early 1990s, he said, his Chevalier Stable totaled about 60 horses at every level, from breeding and buying to raising and racing.

"Horse racing has always been a business, but an avocation opposed to a vocation," he said of his approach to the game. "We've been in it, and we know all sides of it. We've spent enough time as children who were near the track, but it didn't interfere with our schooling.

"We understand the difficulties of trainers and what they give up and the fickleness of [things being] great when the horses are winning and not so great when they aren't."

Now 63, recently retired from Goldman Sachs and living with his wife, Joanne, in Savannah, Georgia (he still has an apartment in New York and a house in Vermont), Shapoff just might have his best horse of all in Weathered, a Key Contender mare whom he bred in New York. Shapoff and his longtime business partner, New York lawyer Ronald Rolfe, own Weathered's dam, Thunder Stand.

#### Multiple stakes winner

Trained by Karl Grusmark, Weathered has won ten of 23 career starts, including the 2009 Next Move Stakes (G3), and has earned \$519,723 through December 1. At Belmont on September 24, Weathered won the \$67,500 Belle Born Stakes at 11/16 miles for New York-breds. In the next start of her four-year-old campaign, Weathered challenged males in the Empire Classic

Weathered came back in a week and ran second to Unbridled Belle in the Turnback the Alarm Handicap (G3).

"Weathered is likely to become the biggest

horse in my lifetime. You don't find too many that have won that many times and have so many stakes wins," Shapoff said. "She's very consistent, very good, and very versatile."

From his first horse to Weathered, Shapoff has enjoyed considerable success as a breeder and owner. Among the top horses to come out of Shapoff's Chevalier Stable are Expensive Decision, Forever Silver, Silver of Silver, and Dare to Be Great.

Shapoff was part of a syndicate that owned a breeding interest in Explosive Bid, who was retired following his six-year-old campaign in 1984 after winning 17 of 59 starts and earning nearly \$500,000. The horse's progeny have earned more than \$8.7-million, with Caltech (\$726,944), Expensive Decision (\$485,419), and Bidding Proud (\$456,390) the leading earners.

Shapoff's homebred Expensive Decision ran a North Americanrecord turf mile (1:32.40) in winning the 1990 Kelso Handicap (G3), finished fifth in the '90 Breeders' Cup Mile (G1), and earned \$485,419 with a record of nine wins, four seconds, and seven thirds from 32 starts. He is the sire of \$191,441-earner Dare to Be Great, who is out of Thunder Stand and was stakes-placed before he was claimed away from Shapoff, who bred him.

them in Florida. Forever Silver was a Grade 1 winner (1989 Brooklyn Handicap) and topped \$1-million in earnings before being retired at age five in 1990 with a record of eight wins, nine seconds, and nine thirds from 47 starts. Shapoff purchased him for \$33,000 at the 1987 Ocala Breeders' Sales Co. selected Floridabred two-year-olds in training sale at Calder Race Course.

#### Won 1992 Remsen

Silver of Silver won the 1992 Remsen Stakes (G2) and earned \$494,868 with a record of three wins and four thirds from 13 starts. He finished eighth in the 1993 Kentucky Derby (G1) won by Sea Hero. Shapoff purchased Silver of Silver for \$27,000 at the 1992 OBS two-year-olds in training sale.

After Skippy Shapoff's death in 1996, his sons tried several New York-based trainers before settling on Grusmark, a veteran based at Finger Lakes and until recently at Suffolk Downs. He has moved his winter operation to Belmont.

Shapoff said Grusmark reminded him of his father's approach to training. "We find a remarkable simpatico with Karl, with the kind way he treats his horses and his owners," Shapoff said. "I feel very good about that. He's been the right person at the right time, and he has handled Weathered very well. He has to get a lot of credit for our horses' success on the track."

Shapoff said his stable now totals about a dozen horses, including broodmares Thunder Stand (who resides at Grusmark's Albright Thoroughbreds in Ontario, New York) and Margin for Error (who resides at Ellen Bongard's Rojan Farms near Saratoga Springs) and seven others in training with Grusmark.

In addition to Weathered, Grusmark trains Shapoff's and Rolfe's

New York-breds Thundered, Reversible Error, Two Decades, and Thunder Reigns. Thundered, a half sister to Weathered, ran third in the Finger Lakes Juvenile Fillies Stakes on October 17, her first stakes placing in three starts.

Grusmark appreciates Shapoff's knowledge of the business. "He sure has all the background in the game you could have," the trainer said. "He certainly understands the trials and tribulations of all this. He has good patience and is real easy to work for."

Rolfe, who met Shapoff in 1987 when both were buying a villa at the St. James's Club in Antigua, does not mind taking a back seat to his partner. The results, he said, speak for themselves.

"He is a person with the pedigree in the horse business," Rolfe said. "We talk over everything and rarely disagree. I have great confidence in him, and we decided from the beginning that we would also have a majority [ownership] so he and I could decide what to do. We recognize this is run as a business and not a hobby. We try not to overspend; we'll sell off horses who don't do anything, but we won't jump to sell, either."

For now, Shapoff said he has toned down his breeding operation, but he added: "I anticipate remaining a New York owner and breeder, selectively upgrading the stock where possible. I anticipate Ron and I will continue this partnership as we have."

As for Weathered's future, Shapoff said: "Down the road, she will be a candidate to be bred. There's a lot of Kentucky folks calling about stallions they'd like to mate with her. For the moment, we are racing her."

## Haynesfield lives up to heritage

Empire Classic and Discovery winner carries a regal pedigree

The pedigree of the average New Yorkbred has improved markedly over the last two decades, but even now there are very few horses born in the Empire State with better pedigrees than Turtle Bird Stable's Haynesfield. Bred by Barry Weisbord and Margaret Santulli, Haynesfield put in his bid for New York-bred Horse of the Year honors with his victories in the Empire Classic Stakes and Discovery Handicap (G3).

From the first crop of 2004 champion sprinter Speightstown and out of stakes winner Nothing Special, by Tejabo, Haynesfield is one of many high-class runners descending from his fourth dam, the \*Mahmoud mare Happy Mood. Winner of the 1954 Acorn Stakes, Happy Mood produced stakes winners Cool Mood, by Northern Dancer, and Miss Suzaki, by Tompion, as well as stakesplaced Christmas Wishes, by Northern Dancer. All were ancestresses of high-class runners.

Haynesfield's third dam, 1969 Canadian Oaks winner Cool Mood, is responsible for the most prominent branch of Happy Mood's large and growing fam-

ily. Her daughter Passing Mood, by Buckpasser, won the 1980 Shady Well Stakes and was the dam of '89 Canadian Horse of the Year and good sire With Approval, by Caro (Ire), and '97 Belmont Stakes (G1) winner and successful sire Touch Gold, by Deputy Minister.

From the first crop of 2004 champion sprinter Speightstown and out of stakes winner Nothing Special, by Tejabo, Haynesfield is one of many high-class runners descending from his fourth dam, the \*Mahmoud mare Happy Mood.

Passing Mood also was the dam of stakes winners Bar U Mood, by Saratoga Six; Daijin, by Deputy Minister; and Sweeping Change, by Secretariat. Daijin, in turn, is the dam of 2009 Falls City Handicap (G2) winner Serenading, by A.P. Indy, and her multiple stakes-winning full sister, Handpainted.

Passing Mood earned Canadian Broodmare of the Year honors in 1989, and her half sister Shy Spirit, by Personality, duplicated that feat the following year, when her son Izvestia, by Icecapade, was named Canadian Horse of the Year after winning

the Canadian Triple Crown. Shy Spirit also was the dam of Grade 3 winner Key Spirit, by Key to the Mint, and stakes winners Introspective, by Kennedy Road, and Unduplicated, by Nodouble.

Cool Mood's daughter Princess Laika, by Blushing Groom (Fr), was the dam of stakes winner Cool Gold Mood, by Premier Ministre, and second dam of 2008 Monmouth Oaks (G3) and Bourbonette Oaks (G3) winner Maren's Meadow, by Meadowlake Princess Laika also was the second dam of 2006 Santa Margarita Invitational Handicap (G1) winner Healthy Addiction, by Boston Harbor.

Haynesfield's second dam, Moody Maiden, by Apalachee, was a winning half sister to Passing Mood, Shy Spirit, and Princess Laika. Her daughter Nothing Special, by the good Canadian sire Tejabo (like Touch Gold, a son of Deputy Minister), won seven of 30 starts, including the 1999 Cumberland Stakes at Laurel Park, finished second in three stakes, and was third in the '99 Barbara Fritchie Handicap (G2).

Haynesfield is Nothing Special's sixth foal and one of her five winners. His half sister Mama Theresa, by Carson City, earned \$240,898 and placed in two New York-bred stakes.

Denali Stud consigned Haynesfield to the 2007 Keeneland September yearling sale, where Maverick Racing bought him for \$100,000. That did not prove a profitable investment, since Vision Racing paid only \$20,000 for the handsome chestnut colt at the following year's Keeneland April sale of selected two-year-olds in training.

Vision Racing partners John Stephens and Brandon Perry undoubtedly turned a nice profit on that purchase when they sold the Speightstown colt privately shortly after he won his maiden

victory at Aqueduct in his second start. Haynesfield then won three straight stakes for Turtle Bird Stable before finishing unplaced to I Want Revenge in the Gotham Stakes (G3).

Off for almost seven months after the Gotham, he ran second in the Sir Keys Stakes before winning the Empire Classic and the Discovery.

#### Fast start at stud

Haynesfield's sire, Speightstown, was bred to be fast, but it took him a while to prove how fast he was. By the exceptional sire of sires Gone West out of 1995 Canadian champion juvenile filly Silken Cat, by Storm Cat, Speightstown is not a big horse, but he is beautifully made and elicited a bid of \$2-million from Eugene Melnyk at the 1999 Keeneland July sale of selected yearlings.

Last in his only start at two, he won four of his seven starts at three, but he suffered the first of several injuries when second to City Zip in the 2001 Amsterdam Stakes (G2). That kept Speightstown off the track for more than a year, but he won his first start at five before hurting himself again when second in the Jaipur Handicap.

Speightstown was clearly talented, but by 2004 he was a sixyear-old who had never won a stakes race. He erased that black mark on his record in his first start that year when he won the Artax Handicap at Gulfstream Park and then reeled off impressive victories in the Churchill Downs (G2), True North Breeders' Cup (G2), and Alfred G. Vanderbilt (G2) Handicaps.

The brilliant Pico Central (Brz) beat Speightstown in the Vosburgh Stakes (G1) but was not entered in the Breeders' Cup Sprint (G1) at Lone Star Park. Speightstown outgunned Kela down the lane to win the Sprint and the Eclipse Award that usually goes with it. The Breeders' Cup victory concluded

Speightstown's career with a record of ten wins in 16 starts for earnings of \$1,258,256.

Retired to WinStar Farm at a fee of \$40,000, Speightstown had a notable first crop of runners. Eight of the 99 named foals of 2006 have won stakes, led by 2009 Etihad Airways Prix Jean Prat (Fr-G1) winner Lord Shanakill and '09 Tom Fool Handicap (G2) and Woody Stephens Stakes (G2) winner Munnings. Gemswich Park and Despite the Odds have joined Haynesfield as Grade 3 winners, and Mullins Beach, Fufty Too, and Congor Bay have earned stakes brackets.

Bridgetown, from Speightstown's second crop, ran second in

the 2009 Breeders' Cup Juvenile Turf (G2) after winning the Summer Stakes (Can-G3), so it is extremely unlikely that Speightstown will be a one-crop wonder. His 2010 fee at WinStar is listed at \$35,000.

Like so many current stakes winners, Haynesfield is inbred to Northern Dancer, carrying a 5x5x4 triple of the greatest sire of recent decades. That inbreeding is backed up by more distant duplications of \*Nasrullah, \*Princequillo, and Native Dancer, leading to an inbreeding coefficient of 0.93%, which is near the current average for the breed

Haynesfield's pedigree would fit neatly among elite Thoroughbreds in any corner of the globe.

Resident Mares: Must be continuously in residence in New York state from within 90 days after last cover in the year of conception and thereafter remain in residence until foaling the following year, with no breed-back required.

Non-Resident Mares: Must foal in New York state and be bred back to a registered New York-based stallion and remain for a continuous period of 90 days after foaling.

Class of race is followed by the distance of the race, expressed in furlongs and fractions of furlongs, followed by first-place money earned by the winner.

Sires represented by their first foals to race in 2009 are preceded by the symbol ◆.

## New York State Breeding and Development Fund NY-Breds Award Program

on purse money earned (1st through 3rd) while competing in pari-mutuel races run in New York state.

#### **BREEDER AWARDS**

In 2008, the New York State Thoroughbred Breeding and Development Fund paid \$6,817,331 to breeders of registered New York-breds. A breeder is the owner of the mare at the time the mare foals in the state of New York. Breeder awards are determined by covering stallion. If the New York-bred is by a registered New York-based stallion, the award is up to 20% of the purse earned for a first-place finish and up to 10% for a second- or third-place finish.

If the New York-bred is by an out-of-state stallion or non-registered stallion, the award is up to 10% for a first-place finish and up to 5% for a second- or third-place finish. All breeder awards are capped at \$10,000 per horse per race.

#### STALLION OWNER AWARDS

In 2008, the New York State Thoroughbred Breeding and Development Fund distributed \$2,133,913 in stallion owner awards. Stallion owner awards are paid to owners of registered New York-based covering stallions (at time of conception) at up to 7% of earned purses from 1st through 3rd positions. All stallion owner awards are capped at \$10,000 per horse per race.

#### OPEN OWNER AWARDS

In 2008, the New York State Thoroughbred Breeding and Development Fund paid \$1,388,649 to owners of registered New York-breds who earned purse money in open-company races. Owner awards for registered New York-breds sired by a registered New York-based stallion is up to 20% of purses earned from 1st through 3rd positions in races run for a claiming price of \$30,000 and upward, with a cap of \$20,000 per horse per race.

If the New York-bred is by an out-of-state stallion or non-registered stallion, the award is up to 10% of purses earned from 1st through 3rd positions in races run for a claiming price of \$30,000 and upward with a cap of \$20,000 per horse per race.

#### **NEW YORK-BRED RACES**

More than 45 stakes races exclusively for registered New York-breds are run at New York Racing Association racetracks (Aqueduct, Belmont Park, and Saratoga Race Course) and Finger Lakes racetrack with total purses exceeding \$4-million. In 2008, more than 1,000 overnight races exclusively for registered New York-breds were held at the four New York racetracks.
