



Warning that failure to act on video lottery terminals already approved for Aqueduct continues to cost New York state \$1-million a day, New York Thoroughbred Breeders Inc. is spearheading a grass-roots petition drive aimed at convincing Governor David Paterson and leaders of the state Legislature to expedite processing the next round of bids for these crucial electronic-gaming devices.

The petition language reminded Albany leadership that this innovative proposal was approved almost eight years ago, but political paralysis leaves it a plan unfilled. It reads: "We, the undersigned, call upon the [New York state] Legislature and Governor Paterson JEFFREY A. CANNIZZO

to finally approve the efforts to make video lottery terminals at Aqueduct racetrack a reality. Fulfilling the state's promise from nearly eight years ago to bring VLTs to Aqueduct will result in much-needed revenue for the horse racing and breeding industry and the state of

Nearly eight years ago, state government approved legislation that would allow video gaming at Aqueduct with the appreciation that it would generate \$1-million a day for the state treasury at a difficult time, in the aftermath of the September 11, 2001, terrorist attacks on the World Trade Center towers. During eight years of protracted negotiations, New York taxpayers have lost more than \$2-billion in potential revenue. Now, with Wall Street in meltdown, sales-tax collections



at historic lows, and a state deficit of staggering proportions, the continued delay in determining a VLT provider for Aqueduct is shocking.

This effort to bring VLTs to Aqueduct is crucial not only to the NYTB membership but also to every state taxpayer and every classroom as the vast majority of the dollars generated by the VLTs will go toward public education.


In an e-mail sent to NYTB members, President Barry Ostrager wrote: "E-mail everyone you know and ask them to do the same—your vet; your feed supplier; your blacksmith; your neighbors who don't want to see the farm next door turned into a development; your local school board, which has had to cut essential programs

because the state government has turned its back on generating tax $% \left\{ x_{i}^{2}\right\} =\left\{ x_{i$ revenues from VLTs at Aqueduct. And tell these people to tell other people, and so on." This will become a genuine grass-roots effort that touches everyone who loves Thoroughbreds.


The petition appears with an explanatory preamble on the website www.gopetition.com/petitions/save-our-family-farms.html.

Seminar and other fan-based events slated for first Fasig-Tipton Racing Festival

With an assist from the New York Thoroughbred Breeders Inc., Fasig-Tipton Co. and the New York Racing Association will team up for the first Fasig-Tipton Festival of Racing during the second weekend of the prestigious Saratoga Race Course race meeting.

The festival's dates are August 8 and 9, prior to the two-day

Fasig-Tipton Saratoga sale of selected yearlings and the Fasig-Tipton sale of preferred New York-bred yearlings. It will be geared not only toward those already involved in the industry, but also toward fans and with a significant tie to the upstate New York community of Saratoga Springs.

To meet that goal, Fasig-Tipton will join with NYTB, NYRA, and the fan-based organization ThoroFan to

host a free educational forum titled "From the Farm to the Finish Line: A Seminar on the Thoroughbred Industry" on August 8, the first day of the festival.

The 1½-hour seminar will feature a panel led by Racing Hall of Fame trainer D. Wayne Lukas to discuss how to get a young Thoroughbred from the farm to the sales ring and to the racetrack. Attendees of the seminar will interact with the panelists and will watch

a demonstration of a consignor showing a yearling to a prospective buver.

Another event specifically geared toward fans will be a "Best Turned-Out Filly" fashion contest at the racetrack, with the bestdressed woman awarded a gift certificate from a local merchant

> before the running of the Honorable Miss Handicap (G2) on August 9.

The \$750,000 Whitney Handicap (G1) on August 8 is the centerpiece of the weekend's stakes calendar, which also includes the \$300,000 Test Stakes (G1) for three-year-old fillies, \$250,000 Alfred G. Vander-bilt Handicap (G2) for sprinters, and the \$150,000 Honorable Miss for female sprinters.

Fasig-Tipton will sponsor two overnight stakes races during the weekend, with the John Hettinger Stakes on the main track on August 8 and the Finney Stakes on the turf on August 9.

The John Hettinger honors the industry stalwart often credited with rescuing the financially strapped Fasig-Tipton in the early 1990s. Hettinger, who ran the successful Akindale Farm in Pawling, New York, died at age 74 in September 2008. Hettinger was a strong supporter of anti-slaughter and equine rescue groups, and his initiatives earned him a Special Eclipse Award in 2000.

The Finney honors the late John M. S. Finney, the son of former Fasig-Tipton Chairman Humphrey S. Finney who himself went on to head the oldest sales company in North America. Very recognizable from his position at the auction podium with his reading glasses perched low on his nose, Finney served as president of Fasig-Tipton from 1968 to '89.

Fasig-Tipton will sponsor "Best Turned-Out Horse" awards for each of the overnight stakes, and winning grooms will receive cash prizes of \$500.

The two-day festival also will feature jockey and trainer contests with sizable donations tied to the competition. The 21 races run over the two days will be included in the separate jockey and trainer contests, with each compiling points based on a 5-3-1 system for win, place, and show, with double points offered for Fasig-Tipton graduates.

NYRA plans to donate \$5,000 to the Permanently Disabled Jockeys Fund in the name of the winning jockey, and the first-, second-, and third-place riders in the contest will receive \$3,000, \$2,000, and \$1,000, respectively. Fasig-Tipton will donate \$11,000 to equine-related charities chosen by the trainers, including \$6,000 in the name of the winning trainer, \$3,000 in the name of the second, and \$2,000 in the name of the third.

The festival will extend itself to the following weekend with the first running of the Fasig-Tipton 5K and one-mile fun run that start in front of the Humphrey S. Finney Pavilion in Saratoga Springs. (For further details, see story at left.)—*Tom Law*

will start outside the Humphrey S. Finney Pavilion, with the fun run beginning at 7:30 a.m. and the 5K race a half-hour later. Awards will be presented to the top runners in each age division of the 5K

All proceeds from registrations will be divided equally among the New York Racing Association's four charities: the Anna House, Backstretch Employee Service Team, New York Race Track Chaplaincy,

and the Backstretch Education Fund. For further information and to register, visit the Fasig-Tipton website, www.fasigtipton.com.

"Fasig-Tipton is very excited about this event," said Fasig-Tipton President Boyd Browning. "We are becoming more involved with the community of Saratoga, and we are pleased to be able to help support the backstretch employees who make horse racing possible. NYTB members urged to support petition

(2) GoPetition

Barry Ostrager, president of the New York Thoroughbred Breeders Inc., has called upon the organization's members to sign an online petition seeking quick action on the long-delayed Aqueduct video lottery terminals, and he urged the NYTB membership to spread the word about the petition.

"E-mail everyone you know and ask them to do the same—your vet; your feed supplier; your blacksmith; your neighbors who don't want to see the farm next door turned into a development; your local school board, which has had to cut essential programs because the state government has turned its back on VLT revenue. And tell these people to tell other people, and so on," he wrote in an e-mail announcing the petition drive.

Ostrager pointed out that every New York citizen has a stake in the health of the state's public school system,

which would be a principal beneficiary of VLT revenues from Aqueduct. The petition is at www.gopetition.com/petitions/save-our-family-farms.html. (Executive Director Jeffrey A. Cannizzo discusses the effort in his letter to the membership on page 6.)

The NYTB launched its grass-roots effort in the midst of the deadlock in the New York Senate. The revolt by Re-

publicans, who briefly took control of the chamber on June 8 when two Democratic senators joined the GOP caucus, became an impasse when one of the lawmakers returned to the Democrat fold, resulting in a 31-31 tie.

The impasse ended on July 9 when Democrats reassumed control of the Senate. (See story on page 12.)

To focus further attention on the need for quick action, the NYTB has scheduled a July 27 rally for noon on the Capitol steps in Albany. In announcing the rally and urging NYTB members to attend, Cannizzo said that the organization's members will "stand in solidarity outside the Capitol on State Street and demand that the state of New York fulfill its promise to install VLTs at Aqueduct. We are going to make sure they understand that, after eight years, inaction is no longer acceptable."

The NYTB members will visit the Legislative Office Building and the governor's Executive Chamber

Office to deliver horseshoes signifying breeders' dismay over the lack of progress on awarding the VLT contract.

State Senate's long deadlock ends

The New York Senate, paralyzed by a 31-day deadlock in which at earnd casts a vote to break any ties, but the position has been vano legislation was passed, returned to business on July 9, perhaps paving the way for the long-awaited naming of an Aqueduct racino operator.

The decision on the company to operate video lottery terminals at the Queens track requires unanimous approval by Governor David Paterson, Assembly Speaker Sheldon Silver (D-Manhattan), and the Senate president. For a month, it was unclear who the Senate president was, if indeed the body had a president after it split into two rump caucuses despite pleas by Paterson to end the impasse and several special sessions called by the governor.

The Senate deadlock began on June 8 when two disgruntled Democratic senators, Pedro Espada Jr. of the Bronx and Hiram Monserrate of Queens, switched

to the Republican caucus, giving the Republicans a one-vote majority. Within days, however, Monserrate returned to the Democratic caucus, creating the 31-31 deadlock that lasted for a month.

To break the deadlock, Paterson appointed a lieutenant governor on July 8, but Republicans and Attorney General Andrew Cuomo, a Democrat, said they did not believe that his action was constitutional.

The lieutenant governor constitutionally presides over the Sen-

cant since Paterson, who was elected lieutenant governor in 2006, became governor when Eliot Spitzer resigned the post in early '08

in a call-girl scandal.

The Senate impasse ended suddenly on July 9 when Espada returned to the Democratic caucus with the title of majority leader. Malcolm A. Smith, a Queens Democrat, regained the title of Senate president.

Six groups have submitted bids for the contract to run Aqueduct's racino with 4,500 VLTs. The state Lottery Division, which will control the machines, has said that it will allow electronic table games as well.

The bidders are The Peebles Corp. partnered with MGM Mirage; Delaware North Cos.; Aqueduct Entertainment Group; SL Green Realty Corp./Hard Rock Entertainment; Penn National Gaming; and Las Vegas casino

developer Steve Wynn. Mohegan Sun Casino of Connecticut also submitted a proposal to run the facility if the state builds it, but it made no financial offer to the state. The contract was put up for rebidding after Delaware North said it could not raise the funds for its \$370-million franchise-fee commitment to the state by a March

From strength to strength

New York-bred preferred yearling sale keeps getting better

In its current format, the Fasig-Tipton New York-bred preferred yearling sale officially began in 2002, but the auction has been around in various configurations since 1981.

It has stood alone as its own sale, and it has been part of the horses of racing age sale. It has been restricted to New Yorkbreds, and it has been open to all yearlings.

But one theme has been a constant since Fasig-Tipton and the New York Thoroughbred Breeders Inc. came together in the mid-1980s to establish the preferred sale as its own auction: a pattern of steady improvement.

"It's been a tremendous growth sale. It's been on an almost constant upswing since 1985. It really has done extremely well,'

said Joe McMahon of McMahon of Saratoga Thoroughbreds in Saratoga Springs. "It was a big thing when we hit a \$1-million gross and then to \$2-million, and then from one night to two. It's given New York breeders a tremendous marketplace to showcase their nicer horses."

McMahon was chairman of the NYTB sales committee in the mid-

1980s when Fasig-Tipton Co. and the New York-bred program were struggling to find their identities.

"Fasig-Tipton had tried several different sales for New York-breds, but none were that well supported, and they had eliminated them from their calendar for a couple years," McMahon said. "Fasig was having a terrible time, and it was before John Hettinger had stepped up and bought in.

"Essentially what Fasig-Tipton said to me was if we want to put a sale on, we needed to recruit the horses and get commitments from the people. And if we got a representative number of horses, they'd put on a sale for us. So with that in mind, that's what I did. I worked the phones and got people to commit to the sale.'



Thanks to cooperation between Fasig-Tipton and the NYTB, the sale quickly formed a market niche.

National sellers

"After a few years, the New York breeders had less and less to do with the organization of the sale because it took on a life of its own and started getting better and better all the time," McMahon said. "We started getting people who previously only sold in Kentucky or Florida, and they started to put better horses in our sale, and that's what really got it going in the direction it is in today."

One of those new consignors was Summerfield Sales, a top Morriston, Florida-based selling agent. Summerfield, as agent for breeders Petelain Stables and John P. Savin, sold eventual Grade 3 winner Scottish Halo for \$60,000 at the 1998 New York preferred yearling sale.

Two years later, Summerfield sold eventual Grade 2 winner Quantum Merit for \$32,000 on behalf of breeders Mr. and Mrs. Gerald Nielsen.

"I've got some very dedicated New York breeders that breed some pretty nice horses, and they've been doing it for years," said Summerfield's Francis Vanlangendonck. "The guys that race up there have strongly supported that market, and they like to come to the New York-bred sale and pick out a nice horse.'

Vanlangendonck said the New York market has done nothing but improve due to the quality of horses, sales prep, and earning potential at the track.

"With the purses they provide in New York, the trainers and owners can come in there and feel comfortable buying a horse and having a reasonable shot at getting their money back," Vanlangendonck said. "The New York breeders have done a better job bringing their horses in looking the part. The improvement is dramatic on how they're prepping their horses and the types of horses they're bringing in there. The learning curve is definitely going the right way for the New York breeders."

Vanlangendonck said Summerfield plans to bring about 16 horses for this year's sale, scheduled for the evenings of August 15 and 16.

Game changer

One horse, Funny Cide, changed the reputation of New York-breds and the New York yearling sale forever. The Distorted Humor colt out of Belle's Good Cide, by Slewacide, was bred in New York by

the partnership of WinStar Farm and McMahon of Saratoga.

Consigned by McMahon as agent, Funny Cide sold for \$22,000 at the 2001 Saratoga preferred yearling sale. He went on to win the Kentucky Derby (G1) and Preakness Stakes (G1) and was voted champion three-year-old male of 2003. He retired with \$3,529,412 in earnings.

The first New York-bred to win the Derby, Funny Cide now resides at the Kentucky Horse Park in Lexington.

"The eventual success of Funny Cide was the high point for us from all these years we've been in the horse business, and to have him come out of that sale, it gave it more credibility," McMahon said. "To

have a top horse come out of this sale, it made people realize this was a serious place to come buy a horse."

The year after Funny Cide sold, Fasig-Tipton converted the sale strictly to New York-breds.

"It was pretty much New York-breds even when it wasn't a closed catalog," said Fasig-Tipton's director of marketing, Terence Collier. "But by 2002, the numbers had expanded, and the quality of the New York crop had improved so much, it was clear they could stand on their own feet."

The stream of graded stakes winners continued after Funny Cide with such top-quality runners as 2006 champion older female Fleet Indian, Grade 1 winner Behaving Badly, Grade 2 winners The Daddy and Capeside Lady, and Grade 3 winners Don't Forget Gil and Mr. Fantasy. Since 2001, total sales have dipped below the \$5-million mark just once.

In 2008, the New York-bred sale set a record average price of \$54,390 $\,$

and tied its all-time high for median at \$45,000. Unfortunately, the sale also reflected the overall market's selectivity and set records with 90 buy-backs and an all-time low 52.6% clearance rate.

"The New York-bred sale is part of the larger market and reflects its trends and expectations," Collier said. "The fact they are being sold in Saratoga in great surroundings doesn't excuse or give any benefits to an un-commercial yearling.

"But going back quite some time, the New York sale basically has gone from strength to strength in numbers and quality."

Aqueduct's New York-bred races

Winter-spring season offers average purse of \$33,424, and races attract large fields

Belmont Park's spring season is already in the books, the annual hegira to Saratoga Race Course is well under way, and the rigors of the winter-spring season at Aqueduct are a fading memory. But the heat of the summer is as good a time as any to look back on what New York-breds accomplished at Aqueduct in the dead of winter.

New York-breds are an important part of any New York race meeting, but they appear to be especially important to Aqueduct's winter-spring meet, when many stables have abandoned the Northeast for the warmth but slightly lower purses in Florida. (East of the Mississippi River, Aqueduct again

was king of the hill this past winter, with an average purse of \$35,160 compared with Gulfstream Park's \$34,650.)

For its 79-date winter-spring meet, Aqueduct staged 720 races, and 231 (32.1%) of them were limited to New York-breds. To be sure, many New York-breds competed in open races and won their share of stakes races, including several graded stakes, but the restricted races accounted for nearly one-third of all races run at the Oueens track.



An analysis of all races restricted to New York-breds at Aqueduct's most recent meet revealed these statistics and insights:

- In all, those 231 races offered purses totaling \$7,720,905, or slightly more than 30% of the meet's \$25.3-million in total purses;
- The average purse for New York-bred races was \$33,424, less than \$2,000 below the meet's overall average purse;
- The median purse—half of the purses were above that amount and half below—was \$41,000, which indicates that New York Racing Association Director of Racing P. J. Campo was writing races for better-quality New York-bred runners, and those races were filling;

for the races restricted to New York-breds was 8.2 runners, well above the entire meet's average of 7.7 runners per race. New Yorkbred maiden claimers attracted almost nine starters per race;

· The average field size

- A majority of New Yorkbred races were run at six furlongs;
- Events for maidens accounted for a majority of the races, with 48 maiden special weight races and 91 maiden claimers at various
- While older runners predominated, New York-bred three-year-olds had ample opportunities, accounting for 30% of all races;
- The largest average field

purses were in stakes races, but they had the smallest average field size;

- Of the two horses who won three restricted races in the meet,
 Mor Chances accounted for three stakes scores;
- Freud was the leading sire in winter-spring restricted races, with ten wins by nine individuals. Hook and Ladder and Wiseman's Ferry each had nine wins and nine individual winners; and
- Five stallions, including New York legend Cure the Blues, accounted for five wins each as broodmare sires.

New York-breds know no seasonal limitations, and their races were spread throughout the four-month season. They filled 57 races in January, 55 in February, 65 in March, and 54 in April up to closing day on April 26. On six occasions—January 9, February 19, March 14, April 2, April 8, and April 18—five New York-bred races were on the card.

Conditions

Although maidens filled the majority of the New York-bred races, the overall program was well balanced and offered opportunities at all levels. Among the maiden claiming races, 45 were for \$12,500 or \$15,000 tags, and the remaining 46 were for levels ranging up to \$50,000, with eight races at the peak claiming price. Purses ranged from \$14,000 for the bottom level to \$28,000 at the top, except for one \$25,000 maiden claimer with a \$29,000 purse.

The 48 maiden special weight races had an average purse of \$41,946, and the median was \$41,000.

The maiden races filled well. The maiden claimers averaged 8.7 starters per race, and the maiden special weights drew fields averaging 8.5 starters.

Straight claimers were a relatively small factor in the winter-spring program. They accounted for only 16 races and had an average purse of \$25,063. Claiming prices ranged from \$12,500 to \$25,000, and exactly half were at the \$14,000 and \$15,000 level; the \$25,000

claimers had six opportunities. Overall, the straight New York-bred claimers averaged 7.9 starters per race.

Allowance races also were an important part of the New York-bred racing program. Purses ranged from \$43,000 to \$54,000, although most were concentrated at the lower levels. The average was \$44,238 for 42 allowance races, and the median was \$44,000. Those races also filled well, averaging 7.9 starters per race.

Optional claiming races, which have become important parts of the racing programs at many tracks, offered slightly better purses than allowance races but were not as numerous—a total of 24 in the winter-spring season—and did not fill as well as other nonstakes races, with an average field of 7.5 starters. All but two had an optional claiming price of \$25,000, and the others were at \$30,000. The average purse was \$45,996.

The winter-spring meet offered nine restricted stakes races, and they paid an average purse of \$67,489. At six starters per race, the stakes had the smallest average fields of any New York-bred category. Winning one-third of the New York-bred stakes was Mor Chances, a five-year-old American Chance horse who accounted for the Kashatreya, Hollie Hughes, and Kim's Chance Stakes in succession.

Age conditions

As with any winter meet, older horses predominate, and the New York-bred races at Aqueduct followed that pattern. Early in the season, races for horses four and older were common, and Aqueduct staged 35 races open to all New York-breds in that age category and 20 restricted to fillies and mares. The open races, mostly filled with male runners, averaged eight starters per race and had an average purse of \$40,933, the highest of any age group. The fillies and mares averaged 7.9 starters and a purse of \$38,450 per race.

The largest age condition by far was three and up, totaling 105 races, with 48 restricted to fillies and mares. The races open to all sexes had average fields of 8.3 runners and a \$32,366 average purse, and the filly and mare races averaged 7.9 starters and a \$30,029 purse.

Spring is the time when many three-year-olds make their annual debuts, and Aqueduct carded 70 races restricted to New York-breds in this age group. The three-year-old races filled well, with the open heats having an average of 8.9 starters and the filly races averaging 8.3 starters. The filly races paid slightly higher average purses, \$31,533 to \$31,100.

Distance

Sprint distances predominate in North American racing, and the norm at Aqueduct was six furlongs on the winterized track. Of the 231 total races, 127 were at six furlongs, and the vast majority of them were on the inner track. Only 15 races at that distance were run on the main track, which opened at the beginning of April.

Sprints tend to have lower than average purses, and that pattern held true for the New York-bred races at Aqueduct. Still, they offered very good money. The average for all six-furlong races was \$31,194, and the median was \$28,500.

Purses uniformly grew larger as the distances increased. For 53 races at a mile, the average purse was \$34,368, and for ten1½-mile races—including six on the turf—the average pot was \$39,295. The highest average purse was for two 1½-mile races, both stakes, at \$68.188.

Field size

In general, Aqueduct's New York-bred races were well patronized. As noted earlier, the average field size was 8.2 runners, and median field size was eight starters. Indeed, races with eight runners represented the largest group, 60 of the 231 races. Close behind it was nine starters, with 53 races. Ten New York-bred runners went to the starting gate in each of 32 races.

Full fields were as rare as short fields. Only five races fielded 12 betting interests, and fields of four showed up in three races. Of the short-field races, two were optional claimers. Two of the three four-horse fields had been scheduled as turf races but were moved to the main track, leading to several scratches.

Surface

A wet spring thwarted efforts to offer many turf opportunities for New York-breds. In all, 17 races were carded on Aqueduct's turf course, but six of them were moved to the main track because of soggy conditions.

From January through March, 177 races for New York-breds were run on the inner track. In the final four weeks of the spring meet, 37 New York-bred races were carded for and run on the main track.

Winners

Besides multiple stakes winner Mor Chances, Dark Ops collected three victories in New York-bred races during the winter-spring meet. Dark Ops won his first career victory in a \$15,000 maiden claimer in January, and the three-year-old son of Strategic Mission subsequently won two \$25,000 straight claiming races. Another 22 horses scored two victories each in the winter-spring season.

Sires

Freud, the leading New York sire in 2008 by progeny earnings, got off to a good start in the current season with a meet-topping ten victories by his progeny in Aqueduct's winter-spring races for New York-breds. Future Prospect accounted for two of those victories, a win on the inner track in March and a score in a \$25,000 optional claiming race on the main track in April.


Hook and Ladder and Wiseman's Ferry followed with nine wins each, all by different offspring. Gold Token, next with eight victories by his progeny, had two wins by Leap Day. Desert Warrior had six wins, with Lilly of Paradise and Spa Princess scoring two victories each. Also weighing in with six wins was Regal Classic. Accounting for five victories each were A. P Jet, American Chance, Artax, and Kelly Kip.

Broodmare sires

Five stallions were the broodmare sires of five Aqueduct winners each. Venerable New York stalwarts Cure the Blues and Scarlet Ibis were joined by Belong to Me, Quiet American, and Silver Deputy.

Focus on quality

Marlene Brody maintains productive families at Gallagher's

By many measures, 2000 was a highwater mark for Jerome and Marlene Brody's Gallagher's Stud, the breeding operation named after their landmark Gallagher's Steak House in New York City. Their homebred Adcat was New York's champion turf male; his dam, homebred Adorable Micol, was champion broodmare; and Gallagher's Stud was New York Breeder of the Year.

Jerome Brody died the following year, but Marlene Brody has carried on both the business and the breeding operation. In the ensuing eight years, she has continued the tradition of excellence that the couple established when—attracted by the advantages of the New York-bred program—they entered the breeding business in 1979.

Recent earnings statistics provide a snapshot of her success. In 2008, Gallagher's Stud ranked sixth overall among New York's breeders. Through the first half of 2009, it ranked fifth, and it led the list for June despite relatively few starters and starts.

Commenting on the farm's high winning percentage (73% winners from

starters in its 30-year history), Brody said: "Of course I breed to sell, but you breed to create a racehorse. I want everyone who buys a horse from us to have success."

Marlene Brody's background is truly international. As chronicled

in Lawrence S. Freundlich's A Time Well Spent: A Biography of Jerome Brody, she was born to Swiss parents in Indonesia and spent her girlhood on plantations in Ceylon (modern Sri Lanka), where she cultivated a love for farming and had her own horse. After she graduated from the Ecole d'Interprétes of the University of Geneva with a command of German, English, Spanish, French, and Italian, her first jobs included a three-month stint as secretary to John Steinbeck during his sojourn in Paris and as executive secretary to the president of the Compagnie Française des Grands Hotels Internationaux, which

took her to America where she met her future husband.

One of the hallmarks of Gallagher's Stud is its broodmare dynasties. The farm's current star product is Oiseau de Feu, who won the Prix Paul de Moussac (Fr-G3) on June 7 and just missed by a

head in the Etihad Airways Prix Jean Prat (Fr-G1) when second to Lord Shanakill on July 5.

The Brodys bred the dam, grandam, and great-grandam of the three-year-old Stravinsky colt. His dam was Slewadora, by Seattle Slew, who won at four in 2003. His grandam was unraced Adorable Minister, by Deputy Minister, and his great-grandam was Adorable Micol. Brody said she makes every effort to continue Gallagher's families when they are successful.

Another successful broodmare, Eventail, daughter of Gallagher'sbred Felicita, was a stakes winner on dirt and turf, a stakes recordsetter, and half sister to the \$2.4-million earner Take Charge Lady. By Lear Fan, Eventail has three foals three years old or older, three starters, and two winners. She also has a two-year-old unraced El Prado (fre) filly.

"I had offers for Eventail, but I wanted to get two fillies from her," said Brody, who sold her privately after she foaled her third filly. Her lone colt is Straight Story, second in this year's Colonial Turf Cup Stakes (G2) at Colonial Downs.

Brody occasionally adds young stakes-winning mares to the broodmare band and is "not afraid to get a mare by a relatively new broodmare sire," she said.

To her matings, Brody brings a wealth of experience and a desire to learn more. "You have to try to take in as much as you can from what's out there," she said. She maintains a thick notebook, which she referred to as her "hypo book," that is stuffed with paperwork relating to planned matings.

She also believes that a physical matchup of stallion and mare is paramount, and she and farm manager Mallory Mort always inspect stallions in person. The success of Gallagher's Stud with turf horses is not by design but comes from looking for versatility in a sire, she said. Beyond research, she also relies on instinct and Mort's eye for conformation. In the end, Brody makes the mating decisions.

Brody follows best practices for her business but also will ignore them when circumstances warrant. She sells her colts and will race only those that fail to meet their reserve prices. One such colt was Allez Milord, who was Germany's champion three-year-old in 1986, when he won the Puma Europa Preis (Ger-G1), and the following year won the Oak Tree Invitational Handicap (G1).

Gallagher's does not stand stallions—because it "complicates life and business," Brody said—but she does not rule it out entirely. In fact, Gallagher's Stud stood Intidab for three years and homebred Repeal for two.

Brody sums up her guiding principles in one word. "I aim for quality," she said. "I try to improve always on what I do. I do cull." She feels that the farm, with its band of 17 active broodmares, is "just the right size. I wouldn't want it any bigger."

She also credits Gallagher's staff, including Mort, Bert and Stephanie Poucher, Mike Ransford, and Anne Jardine, who have been working at Gallagher's for 17 to 30 years.

She knows her mares well and visits the barns every day when she is on the farm, which is adorned with artistic tributes to some of its most important producers. One stall door has a small bronze portrait of Why Me Lord, dam of Allez Milord, and on the burial site of some Gallagher's mares is a boulder on which stands a sculpture of three mares and foals by Liza Todd.

Brody's reflections on the state of the industry are straightforward. She believes that "gambling is not the solution to our problem," and she describes Fred Pope's proposal that racing adopt a major league structure (Thoroughbred Times, June 6) as brilliant. Faced with the objection that it would be nearly impossible to get a consensus of industry leaders on Pope's plan, she responded: "Nothing is impossible."

Split decision in Big Apple Triple

Legal Consent takes the Mike Lee, and Pocket Cowboys wires New York Derby

On the same afternoon that Big Apple Triple winner Tin Cup Chalice was inducted into the Finger Lakes Hall of Fame, Pocket Cowboys took advantage of a wet surface at the western New York racetrack and broke up Legal Consent's bid to sweep the rich New York-bred series.

Tin Cup Chalice, who became the first horse to sweep the series last year and then went on to win the Indiana Derby (G2), died in a freak training accident on April 17 while he prepared at Finger Lakes for his first 2009 debut. He was the 18th member of the Finger Lakes Hall of Fame.

The Big Apple series, which offers a \$250,000 bonus for a sweep, kicked off on June 21 at Belmont Park with the \$103,500 Mike Lee Stakes, and Legal Consent lived up to his 3-to-10 odds, albeit with some difficulty. Lansdon B. Robbins III's homebred Officer colt out of the Mt. Livermore mare Flame Trick came into the seven-furlong race off a score in the restricted Professor Stakes, which was his second victory of the year.

Ridden by top New York jockey Ramon Dominguez, Legal Consent shadowed the pace of Lookin At Her through a half-mile in :46.67, grabbed the lead entering the stretch, and opened a 1½-length advantage over Lookin At Her at the furlong pole, after six furlongs in 1:11.22. As the pacesetter faded, 6.30-to-1 second betting choice Slevin advanced into the second spot and narrowed Legal Consent's margin to a half-length at the finish line. That's Rich, the longest price in the field of five New York-bred three-year-olds at 17.30-to-1, passed the tiring Lookin At Her to finish third, 3½ lengths farther back.

Trained by Carlos Martin, Legal Consent ran the Mike Lee's seven furlongs in 1:24.72 on a sealed, muddy track.

"After he took the lead, when he felt the other horses coming to him, he dug in," Dominguez said of Legal Consent repelling Slevin's challenge.

For the second leg of the Big Apple Triple, the action shifted to Finger Lakes, but the unusually wet summer continued without letup. The \$159,400 New York Derby at $11/_{16}$ miles on the main track was run on a sealed sloppy track, and the race attracted six starters, including the first two finishers from the Mike Lee.

Also going into the gate was Uncle T Seven, winner of the New York Stallion Times Square Stakes at Aqueduct on March 29. Dennis Carr rode Legal Consent as Dominguez remained at Belmont

and rode Gio Ponti to victory in the Man o' War Stakes (G1).

Pocket Cowboys, a Wild Event gelding bred, owned, and trained by Scott M. Schwartz, had won a Belmont allowance race in May and then was second in an optional claiming race on June 5.

While trainer Martin had expressed some concern about the New York Derby's distance for Legal Consent, the longer race fit the proclivities of Pocket Cowboys, who had scored his two lifetime victories at a mile and 70 yards and $1^1/16$ miles, respectively.

Shipped from his Aqueduct base, Pocket Cowboys picked up the services of jockey Paul Nicol Jr. and fully took advantage of sloppy tracks' tendency to favor speed. Breaking first from the inside post position, Pocket Cowboys jumped out to a half-length advantage over Momsboy through the first quarter-mile in :24.18 and by a length after a half-mile in :48.63.

Legal Consent, who went off as the 11-to-10 favorite, was fourth after the half, and Carr launched an attack on the final turn, but he was unable to advance any closer than 1½ lengths to the free-running leader. As Legal Consent's challenge faltered, 2.80-to-1 second choice Slevin and jockey John Davilia Jr. advanced on the leader, drawing within a half-length at the furlong pole. Pocket Cowboys shrugged off the competition and drew clear late to win by 1½ lengths. Uncle T Seven, third in the wagering at 3.40-to-1, closed some ground to finish third, a length behind Slevin and a neck ahead of Legal Consent in fourth.

Sent off as the 6.30-to-1 fourth betting pick, Pocket Cowboys won in 1:45.12. "He was a game horse today," Nicol said. "He did what I wanted him to do, and then he dug in." The New York Derby's \$95,640 first-place purse raised his career earnings to \$185,590.



EXPLANATION OF INDEXES

Racing Index (RI)
RI is based on the average earnings per start for all runners in the United States, Canada, England, Ireland, France, Italy, Germany, Puerto Rico, and United Arab Emirates. RI is determined by calculating the average earnings per start, divided into males and females, of all starters in each individual country, and the average for each individual year is by definition 1.00. Median RI, however, is much lower. Actual distribution of RL is detailed below.

Sire Index (SI)

The Sire Index (SI) is an average of the Racing Index (RI) of all foals by a sire that have started at least three times. For SI to be calculated, a sire must be represented by a minimum of three crops and 25 starters lifetime.

AUCTION INFORMATION

Auction information is for North American sales from 1980

Account information is for norm. Arterican sales from 1990 to the present and includes the following:

• Subject horse (stakes winner): All auction activity—wearling, yearling, two-year-olds in training, or horses of racing age sales—found after the winners's name under the first dam.

• Sire of stakes winner: The sire's lifetime and current year

yearling auction information is reported, with number of crops offered at yearling sales (lifetime), number of yearlings sold

PEDICREE SYMBOLS

Symbols preceding or following names of horses in pedigrees are used to identify horses that were imported into North America for racing or breeding, and to indicate country of birth. Equal signs preceding a horse's name indicate that a horse was foaled outside the U.S. or Canada and has never been imported to North America; a horse's country of birth appears in parentheses following its name. An asterisk preceding a horse's name indicates the horse was born outside the U.S. or Canada and was imported to North America prior to 1976 (no country codes are included for such horses). Names of horses imported since 1976 include a country code in parentheses following their name and are not preceded by equal signs. Horses that do not have a symbol preceding their name or a country code following their name were foaled in North America. North America.

Breeding Rules

To qualify for registration as a New York-bred, the mare must foal in New York state and meet the following domicile requirements:

Resident Mares: Must be continuously in residence in New York state from within 90 days after last cover in the year of conception and thereafter remain in residence until foaling the following year, with no breed-back required.

Non-Resident Mares: Must foal in New York state and be bred back to a registered New York-based stallion and remain for a continuous period of 90 days after foaling.



New York State Breeding and Development Fund NY-Breds Award Program

Breeder, owner, and stallion owner awards are based on purse money earned (1st thru 3rd) while competing in pari-mutuel races run in New York state.

BREEDER AWARDS

In 2008, the New York State Thoroughbred Breeding and Development Fund paid \$6,817,331 to breeders of registered New York-breds. A breeder is the owner of the mare at the time the mare foals in the state of New York. Breeder awards are determined by covering stallion. If the New York-bred is by a registered New York-based stallion, the award is up to 20% of the purse earned for a first-place finish and up to 10% for a second- or third-place finish.

If the New York-bred is by an out-of-state stallion or non-registered stallion, the award is up to 10% for a first-place finish and up to 5% for a second- or third-place finish. All breeder awards are capped at \$10,000 per horse per race.

STALLION OWNER AWARDS

In 2008, the New York State Thoroughbred Breeding and Development Fund distributed \$2,133,913 in stallion owner awards. Stallion owner awards are paid to owners of registered New York-based covering stallions (at time of conception) at up to 7% of earned purses from 1st through 3rd positions. All stallion owner awards are capped at \$10,000 per horse per race.

OPEN OWNER AWARDS

In 2008, the New York State Thoroughbred Breeding and Development Fund paid \$1,388,649 to owners of registered New York-breds who earned purse money in open-company races. Owner awards for registered New York-breds sired by a registered New York-based stallion is up to 20% of purses earned from 1st through 3rd positions in races run for a claiming price of \$30,000 and upward, with a cap of \$20,000 per horse per race.

If the New York-bred is by an out-of-state stallion or non-registered stallion, the award is up to 10% of purses earned from 1st through 3rd positions in races run for a claiming price of \$30,000 and upward with a cap of \$20,000 per horse per race.

NEW YORK-BRED RACES

More than 45 stakes races exclusively for registered New York-breds are run at New York Racing Association racetracks (Aqueduct, Belmont Park, and Saratoga Race Course) and Finger Lakes racetrack with total purses exceeding \$4-million. In 2008, more than 1,000 overnight races exclusively for registered New York-breds were held at the four New York racetracks.
