



Plenty of Work Ahead for 2018

HAPPY NEW YEAR! Here at New York Thoroughbred Breeders (NYTB) we ring in the New Year by kicking off our annual membership renewal drive and forging ahead with our work on industry challenges for the coming year. As you know, NYTB's two-fold mission is to protect breeders' interests in Albany and promote New York-breds nationally. I urge you to take a little time to review the following items on NYTB's 2018 legislative agenda and reflect on what an important part member-supported NYTB plays in protecting your businesses and livelihoods every year.

In 2018, NYTB's legislative goals include completing the process of ensuring the racing and breeding industries receive fair revenue from the Nassau County OTB video terminal lottery machines at Genting. We have been working on this issue for more than a year and have seen some progress, but much work is ahead.

Specifically, NYTB and its partners spearheaded stand-alone legislation last session to clarify Genting's obligations to the racing industry. At present, additional payments to the industry are triggered only if revenue from Resorts World drops below the 2013 level. We want to ensure that the industry is made whole regardless of Resorts World's performance. The provision passed the Senate but did not make it out of committee in the Assembly. The upshot is that there is a live bill on the books going into the next session, and NYTB will focus its efforts on gathering support in the Assembly.

In a related matter, Genting, as promised, added 450 VLT machines at its Aqueduct racino to replace those whose revenue was diverted to Nassau County the prior year. We cannot yet tell whether the new machines will redress last year's

Nassau-related shortfalls in Fund revenue because November-December revenue is typically down. We will monitor the "Win Per Machine" rate (WPM) closely in the coming months.

We are already addressing the critical issue of legalized sports betting. The case for legalizing sports betting in New Jersey is pending in the U.S. Supreme Court, and if it becomes legal, New York will not be far behind. We have already made it clear to decision-makers that industry interests must be front and center in all such discussions.

Finally, we are keeping close tabs on the RFP issued by the state for the development of land surrounding Belmont Park. As always, my letters in this monthly publication will keep you updated on these matters and a host of others.

I can't emphasize strongly enough that NYTB would not exist without the support of its members and our work is wide-ranging. For example, early in the New Year you will see a concrete result of your support: a special break-out report on New York State in the 2017 Economic Impact Study from the American Horse Council. This will be an important tool in our efforts to promote the economic benefits of the horse industry to policymakers in our state.

In this, as in much of our work, we collaborate productively with groups with overlapping interests, such as the New York State Thoroughbred Breeding and Development Fund, New York Racing Association, Finger Lakes Horsemen's Benevolent and Protective Association, and the New York Thoroughbred Horsemen's Association. Still, member support is essential. On our side NYTB strives to give our members the best value possible for their dues. I urge you to visit the "member benefits" page on our website for a rundown.

So, please complete and return the renewal notice from our office, or use the membership application included in this month's issue of the *New York Breeder* (see page 8). The easiest and quickest way to renew is to visit www.nytbreeders.org. I also ask farms to make new clients aware that, as participants in the New York breeding program, their best interests are served by joining the organization.

Until next time, I wish you the best of luck with your mares and new foals and extend my personal thanks for your continued support.



TRINNIBERG OFFSPRING RUN 1-2 IN GREAT WHITE WAY

First-crop sire Trinniberg, who stands at Rockridge Stud near Hudson, was represented by his first stakes winner Dec. 19 when Aqua Bel Sar broke his maiden in the \$150,000 New York Stallion Series Great White Way Division. Trinniberg's Belleville Spring, who races for breeder Philip Birsch, ran second.

The one-two punch puts Trinniberg, a champion son of Teuflesberg, atop the first-crop sires list in New York and places him in the top 10 of the New York 2-year-old sires list.

Aqua Bel Sar, bred and raced by Ryan Racing, is trained by Bisnath Parboo, who trained Trinniberg.

Trinniberg—who will stand for \$3,500 in 2018 was named the Eclipse Award champion male spirnter of 2012 following major victories in Belmont Park's Woody Stephens Stakes (G2) and in the Xpressbet.com Breeders' Cup Sprint (G1) at Santa Park. Teuflesberg, a son of Johannesburg, stands at McMahon of Saratoga Thoroughbreds.

QUEZON KEYS NY-BRED TRIFECTA IN GARLAND OF ROSES

Marc Keller's Quezon (by Tiz Wonderful) added a fourth stakes win to her career mark—and a first open score—when she rallied to victory Dec. 9 in the \$100,000 Garland of Roses Stakes for older fillies and mares against the backdrop of a snowy Aqueduct. Fellow New York-breds Picco Uno and Absatootly followed Quezon across the line to complete an all-New York-bred trifecta.

All three of the New York-breds in the Garland of Roses were exiting the Oct. 21 Iroquois Stakes at Belmont Park on Empire Showcase Day. Newman Racing's Absatootly was best that day, outfinishing Quezon from well off the pace following a heads-up rally at the rail. Picco Uno, owned by Kennesaw Mountain Racing, had chased the pace early and faded to fifth.


Partnered for the first time with Joe Rocco Jr. to go six furlongs in the Garland of Roses as the 7-5 favorite, Quezon started alertly but backed off for the first half-mile, racing down on the rail three lengths off pacesetter Absatootly (2-1), who carved out opening splits in :23.35 and :47.26. Picco Uno (2-1) pursued a length back in second in the closely bunched field of five.

Quezon found room in upper stretch to maneuver into the three-path and found a seam in the final furlong to launch a strong rally in the clear.

The chestnut mare ran down new leader Picco Uno to win by three-quarters of a length. Absatootly had to settle for third, another 2½ lengths back. The final time for the six snowy panels over a track labeled "good" was 1:11.75. (continued on page 12)






NYTB BOARD ELECTION RESULTS

Whittemore, Dowen & Ricciardelli, LLP reported the official results to NYTB in a letter dated Dec. 14, 2017.



Quezon has been a consistent runner throughout her career, having finished on the board in 10 of her last 11 starts dating back to July 2016. However, the mare came into the Garland of Roses with a win drought. She last had visited the winner's circle in October 2016 when she won the Iroquois Stakes.

Bred by Apache Farm and foaled at Apache Farm North near Mt. Morris, Quezon is the only foal produced by Kalookan Dancer, a multiple stakes-winning daughter of Olympio. Quezon was a \$90,000 purchase by Riverside Stable at the 2013 Fasig-Tipton Saratoga New York-bred preferred yearling sale.

At Sequel, **Union Jackson** will stand for \$5,000. The Stonestreet Stables-raced son of Curlin—Hot Dixie Chick, by Dixie Union is a 50-50 partnership. Trained by Steve Asmussen, he won six of 11 starts and earned \$273,874.

Hot Dixie Chick was an exceptional 2-year-old, breaking the five-furlong track mark at Churchill Downs when she broke her maiden, and later winning Saratoga's Schuylerville Stakes (G3) and Spinaway Stakes (G1). Out of the graded stakes-winning and grade 1-placed In Excess mare Above Perfection, Hot Dixie Chick is a half sister to Kentucky Derby Presented by Yum! Brands (G1) winner Always Dreaming.

A maiden winner at Keeneland going six furlongs in October 2015, Union Jackson was a good third in Churchill's Aristides Stakes (G3) the following June and later won the Iowa Sprint Handicap at Prairie Meadows in July 2017.

"He's got a great hip and shoulder, and he looks really fast," Thomas said.

"I talked to John Moynihan (agent for Stonestreet), and he said, 'Just go look at the horse,' " Thomas said. "He was stunningly beautiful. The main thing is I talked to Steve and his quote was, 'Becky, he's a *TDN* Rising Star; he's so brilliant. I had his mother and Curlin; they're all brilliant. All three of them.' Then he told me to call him back.

"He said, 'Becky, there's not a better horse than Curlin. He's a great horse. He (Union Jackson) was a brilliant horse out of a brilliant horse by a great horse.' He cared enough to call me back to tell me that.

"Tve had so much respect for Stonestreet and how much they've done for the industry," Thomas continued. "And the fact they have supported their horses from A-to-Z. Look at what has happened with Maclean's Music and what they did with Kantharos down in Florida.

"They own their horses 50-50 in partnerships, and we're

bringing in breeders that I think are very important to New York, and (Stonestreet's) Barbara Banke and I are going to partner on a group of mares that we are going to pick out to be able to breed to the horse. It's not just a horse: The only thing that matters is the support. For me the ability to be involved with Stonestreet and have the caliber of mares that they have and handpick some mares to be able to go to, that's pretty special."

Market Rally (\$3,000) will set up shop at Irish Hill & Dutchess Views Stallions (standing at Irish Hill Century Farm) near Stillwater, N.Y. For trainer Wayne Catalano and Gary and Mary West, Market Rally won his debut in August 2015 and was sold to Sheikh Ahmed bin Rashid Al Maktoum.

"He really 'wowed' the right people, and they went ahead and acquired him and took him to Dubai," said stallion manager Bill Leak.

In Dubai he landed last year's UAE Two Thousand Guineas Sponsored by Gulf News (G3) and later added the Al Bastakiya Sponsored by Emirates Skywards. In all, Market Rally won three of four starts and earned \$324,270.

"He's a great-looking chestnut son of Unbridled's Song, which is something that is not very common," Leak said. "He's the miler type. His motor is fantastic, and he stands over a lot of ground. He moves so well...out in the field he's great to see."

A half brother to stakes winner Watchyourownbobber, Market Rally is out of black-type-placed Boodles, by Mr. Greeley, whose dam is a Phone Trick half sister to Canadian champion A Fleets Dancer.

"We have had a few people coming by looking at stallions," Leak said, "and we bring him out and they are very impressed. Some of the comments we've got are: 'I didn't expect him to look so good,' and 'I'm going to have to check my mares to see if I can get a match for him, or maybe I'll go get a mare for him.'"

DAVID CASSIDY

(1950-2017)

Pop star supported New York breeding program

MENTION THE NAME DAVID CASSIDY and most people would immediately respond "I Think I Love You," followed by "The Partridge Family," and indeed, his iconic hits of the early 1970s and his television show marked the heights of his career as an actor and singer. But the one-time teen heartthrob went on to perform for decades, and his early success allowed him the means to become involved with his childhood love of horses and racing. His death in November from liver failure at the age of 67 was noted widely in various Thoroughbred publications, and he established his own reputation on the racing scene.

Cassidy was born in New York City and grew up in West Orange, N.J. He was introduced to horse racing by his grandfather and learned to ride as a teenager in California. According to published reports, he purchased his first Thoroughbred yearling in 1974 at the height of his Partridge Family days-and steadily grew his bloodstock holdings over the course of the next few decades. Cassidy became an enthusiastic supporter of the New York breeding program and lent his celebrity to a commercial promoting Thoroughbreds bred in the Empire State. He boarded some of his broodmares at the Waldorf Farm of Dr. Jerry Bilinski, with whom he formed a close friendship.

"I met David through Kenny Noe, when he was with NYRA, and Kenny recommended my farm," Bilinski recalled. "We had some very engaging conversations on the phone, and he wound up bringing some broodmares here. Eventually he came up and would stay at our farm for the August meet at Saratoga. We would spend time on the porch, smoking cigars and joking and enjoying each other's company. He was very passionate and very knowledgeable about bloodlines. We raced horses together; they were in David's name and my wife's name. He just loved horses, and he loved the game. He did have some horses that did very well and got involved in the New York breeding program fairly heavily initially. But as time went on, there was an economic decision that he had to make and it became a bit difficult financially after his divorce, and he stopped having horses. It's always a conflict when you're more involved than the rest of your family. With horse people, you're either all in or all out; it's one of the two."

While Cassidy might not have bred or owned an Eclipse Award winner, he was instrumental in the production of several high-quality runners. He owned a stakes-winning Ack Ack mare named In Neon, who was sold privately while in foal to Storm Cat to John Franks in 1993. The filly she was carrying at the time turned out to

be Sharp Cat, a multiple grade 1 winner who earned more than \$2 million. Cassidy later purchased a mare named Sand Pirate, who became one of his best producers. The daughter of Desert Wine produced four successive stakes winners by four different stallions, and was sold at auction for \$150,000 several months after foaling Sweet Vendetta in 2005.

A filly by Stephen Got Even, Sweet

ed in buying her, and David wanted to stay in on her."

Contessa had met Cassidy a decade prior at a yearling sale.

"I wound up training a filly that he had bred," Contessa explained. "He came up to me after we purchased the horse. We started talking, and our friendship just grew over the next 20 years. I did train his horses, but I also stayed at his house in Florida, and


Vendetta provided a racetrack highlight for Cassidy when she captured the Black-Eyed Susan Stakes (G2) at Pimlico in 2008. The victory was surely sweetened by the fact that she was trained by Cassidy's good friend, Gary Contessa.

"It was a very special moment, and the fans were going crazy," Contessa said. "This was a horse that David had sold as part of a breeding partnership. I had trained her half sister Half Heaven, so I knew the family very well, and she was a big, good-looking filly. I had an owner that was interesthe and I went out together. We both covered one another; I was there if he needed me, and he was there for me, too. We developed a great friendship over the years, and our families did as well."

Contessa believes that Cassidy viewed time spent with horses as a relief from his show business career.

"The racetrack was David's escape from a crazy life," Contessa reflected. "I think it was overwhelming at times. You could come to my barn any given day and David would be sitting in my office, reading the paper, handicap-

ping, smoking a cigar. My help and everyone knew-don't talk to him like he's David Cassidy, talk to him like he's David the horse guy. We always avoided the rock star issue with him, and I think he truly loved that. If you took one step outside of my barn, there was always someone waiting to talk to him or take his picture. There were days that I would have to block for him; there were people pulling at him. There were definitely days that he didn't feel happy about his celebrity, and I think that caused him even more to hang out with me and do his thing. Being around the horses really helped him. The racetrack was almost like meditation for him, an escape from his reality. I think he would have loved to switch places with me at any given time. But he was born a rock star, and you don't go from being a rock star to being a horse trainer. So he lived the life that he loved through me."

Cassidy delivered the keynote address at the 2005 induction ceremony for the National Museum of Racing's Hall of Fame, which he said at the time was "one of the highlights of my entire adult life and career to...articulate my passion for racing."

"David was such a presence in

Saratoga that he had become a quasispokesman for horse racing over the years," Contessa explained. "A lot of people sought David out. The New York Breeders did a video with David about the breeding program. I don't think he was surprised—he knew the players, he loved the business, and there wasn't a better guy to give that keynote speech than David Cassidy. His heart was so into it."

Whether or not Cassidy felt overwhelmed by his status as a celebrity, he was more than willing to lend his cachet to a host of causes. He was a spokesperson for Alzheimer's Foundation of America and the Alzheimer's Research & Prevention Foundation, and also participated in fundraisers for charitable causes such as the Thoroughbred Retirement Foundation and the Columbia-Greene Humane Society.

"When we approached him about helping the TRF and explained the mission, it was such a natural conversation and he just said, 'I'm all in,' "said Diana Pikulski, the TRF's national director of major gifts. "He came to the events, sang at the events, and he donated very unique experiences tied into whatever he had going on in show business at the time. He was always so

incredibly nice. Celebrity involvement is so important. You can see it more and more on social media that it really helps get the word out for people to hear about your work and your mission because it goes far beyond just horses that are involved in racing. It has a broader impact and helped us a lot to reach a wider audience."

Cassidy was also remembered fondly by Barry Weisbord, the president of *Thoroughbred Daily News* who met the entertainer in the 1980s.

"We realized very quickly that we both loved horses and the theater," Weisbord said. "He was dabbling in bloodstock when I first met him, and he was very active in the New York program for a while. He enjoyed his racing and breeding; he enjoyed the sales activity and he enjoyed betting. We enjoyed so many aspects of the horse business together. Part of our friendship was that we were equally at home at a racetrack, at a horse sale, or a Broadway theater. We shared a lot of great moments together, and I was close enough to him to experience some of the highs and some of the lows."

Cassidy wrote several books about the toll taken by stardom and substance abuse, and his friends offered their support.

"I think the elephant in the room was his drinking and other medication, and that was something that we here did not want to enable him," Bilinski added. "It's something a lot of people struggle with. I went down to visit him in Florida when he was in rehab, and it was ultimately the problem that led to his demise. It was quite sad to see it happen, but there's a lot of people in the world with those problems. It's a sickness, an illness."

Bilinski said the tranquil setting of Waldorf Farm brought peace to Cassidy during his stays at the property in North Chatham, N.Y.

"He used to watch the horses brought back and forth from the fields from the porch. It was why he loved to come up here," Bilinski said. ?

Longshots rule in Fifth Avenue, Great White Way **WHENEVER TRAINER JAMES FERRARO** places the tack on a Thoroughbred in the paddock, he is continuing a long-established family tradition.

"My father (also James Ferraro) trained horses, and his uncle before him trained horses. So our family has been in the game for more than 100 years," said Ferraro, standing in the Aqueduct winner's circle Dec. 16. "This month is my 40th anniversary of being a trainer, and I couldn't think of a better way to celebrate."

Ferraro, who is based at Finger Lakes, was celebrating with a 39-1 upset victory by Louis P. Ferrari's homebred 2-year-old filly Aunt Babe (by Desert Party) in the \$150,000 Fifth Avenue Division of the New York Stallion Series Stakes.

"I was supposed to get this filly back in April but just took over at the beginning of November from (former trainer) Carlos Martin, who put a lot of work into her," said Ferraro. "We got the right spot when this race came up light. There were more than 300 fillies who were eligible, but only six of them showed up. That was a little surprising."

Though the field might have been small in number, it was certainly large in talent. Roddy Valente's homebred Miss Hot Stones (by Bustin Stones) was the 4-5 choice in the six-furlong sprint for state-bred freshmen fillies, after a decisive 7¾-length maiden romp Nov. 18 at the Big A. The second-choice, Twin Creeks Racing Stables' homebred Pure Silver (by Mission Impazible), had compiled a résumé that boasted a dominating score in Saratoga's Adirondack Stakes (G2) among her three victories.

Approaching the sixteenth pole in the Fifth Avenue, the Todd Pletcher-trained Pure Silver rallied along the rail to seize a short lead beneath Chris DeCarlo. Miss Hot Stones, who had chased the early pace while wide, was in the midst of making her bid in the three-path.

Aunt Babe, however, who had trailed the field early, put in a sustained run for jockey Eric Cancel. The pair had come off the rail in upper-stretch and gathered momentum while four-wide through the final stages. Cancel, a protégé of Hall of Fame rider Angel Cordero Jr., then drove her to the wire, nosing out Pure Silver in the last jump.

"I decided to make my move at the quarter pole," said Cancel, who booted home three winners on the day. "I knew I had horse at the end, so I just tried to go outside and get a little bit of an advantage. She kept on running, and the trip worked out really well."

The final time was 1:12.92 over a track labeled "good" due to a snow storm the previous day.

Aunt Babe, out of Bella Silver, by Silver Deputy, notched her second win from four starts and the \$90,000 prize money nearly tripled her previous earnings to \$127,500.

"I trained the mother for a while. She had a lot of class, too," noted Ferraro. "Louis (Ferrari) still owns her, and she's still producing."

Pure Silver had displayed need-the-lead type speed in her first four races. But she has seemingly learned to rate beneath Pletcher's expert tutelage. Her record stands at 3-2-0 from seven starts, and she has earned \$286,367. Out of Jehan (by Forest Wildcat), Pure Silver has a 3-year-old full brother, Midnight Mission, almost ready to make his debut for Pletcher. There is also a yearling full brother in which Twin Creeks Racing Stables' Steve Davison and Randy Gullatt see a lot of promise.

It was a half-length farther back to the Ollie Figgins III-trained Miss Hot Stones.

UPSET IN THE MAKING

The big prices continued at Aqueduct the following day when Ryan Racing's homebred Aqua Bel Sar (by Trinniberg), a 37-1 longshot, broke his maiden in the \$150,000 Great White Way Division of the New York Stallion Series Stakes while making his second career start.

Trained by Bisnath Parboo and ridden by Trevor Simpson, the Trinniberg colt, who is named for the three tracks on the New York Racing Association circuit—Aqueduct, Belmont, and Saratoga—benefited from an intense pace duel on the lead between oddson favorite Stoney Bennett (by Bustin Stones) and Dezzer (by Desert Party).

tacular Kid (by Mission Impazible) was another two lengths back in third.

The final time for the six furlongs was 1:13.43 over the "fast" main strip.

"He was due to win. And more than win. His father was a champion, an Eclipse Award winner. I want to go to Dubai, and this horse is going to take me there," said Parboo, who also trained Trinniberg, the 2012 Eclipse Award-winning sprinter. "(This) horse was green (in his debut, a fourth-place finish in a maiden special weight sprint Dec. 1). I couldn't expect less from him.

The ambitious and embattled pair rattled off an opening quarter-mile in :22.50. On the latter portion of the far turn, the stalking Aqua Bel Sar rallied wide to seize the lead, turning for home with a 2½-length advantage in the field of seven freshmen, after a half-mile in :46.65.

Through the lane Philip Birsch's Belleville Spring (by Trinniberg), from the barn of trainer George Weaver, kicked it into overdrive along the rail, taking a momentary lead inside the final sixteenth of a mile beneath jockey Manny Franco. But Simpson and Aqua Bel Sar surged again to secure the triumph by a neck. Alex Kazdan's Spec-

This was only a small part of him. He has to go up to the top. You talk about pedigree; I think he has that."

Parboo plans on pointing the winner to the races his sire ran at Aqueduct, including the seven-furlong Bay Shore Stakes (G3) April 7.

"His father, Trinniberg, won (the Bay Shore) like it was nothing. I think (Aqua Bel Sar) will win it too," Parboo proclaimed.

Runner-up Belleville Spring was also a maiden trying winners, while making his first start for Weaver. Belleville Spring had been second in his debut at Churchill Downs for trainer Wayne Mackey. Enter . . . the 'GOLDEN' gene pool

SANFORD STUD FARM

WITH THE POSSIBLE EXCEPTION of the English-bred steeplechaser Golden Meadow, no Sanford Stud horse was more popular than the diminutive filly Molly Brant (1900, Clifford—Ballyroe, by Ellerton). As Walter Vosburgh stated: "She...became such a favorite from her sterling honesty and courage the sturdy yeomen of the Mohawk Valley never failed to come in hundreds to see her race and never failed to cheer her to the echo."

Molly Brant broke her maiden in her third start, winning the Adirondack Stakes at Saratoga. After a sixth-place finish as the favorite in a 2-year-old handicap at Saratoga and a runnerup placing in the Willow Stakes at Gravesend, she ended her season with a victory in a 2-year-old handicap at Gravesend and a fifth-place finish in Morris Park's White Plains Handicap.

She began her sophomore season with a second to the

4-year-old two-time Horse of the Year Hermis in an all ages handicap at Saratoga, aided by a 25-pound pull in the weights. She then stamped herself as a filly to be reckoned with when she won the Saranac Handicap for 3-year-olds.

Again, she enjoyed a weight concession, getting 20 pounds from the favored Shorthose, who finished second, and 27 from the fourth-place finisher, that year's champion 3-year-old male Africander.

The New York *Morning Telegraph* felt she would have won at equal weights: "When Molly Brant won the Saranac Handicap this afternoon, she took the measure of Africander, winner of the Suburban Handicap, the Saratoga Cup, the Lawrence Realization and Belmont Stakes, and accepted 3-year-old champion; and Shorthose, winner of the Withers and Tidal Stakes... She won so cleverly that no one could say she would have been beaten had she carried scale weights."

Her next race further burnished her reputation as she lost to Hermis by a half-length in the Ocean Handicap at Sheepshead Bay. The rest of of the year was not Molly Brant at her best, as she won only one of six starts, the Hunter Handicap at Morris Park.

Molly Brant's 1904 season was the best of her career at the Spa. After an easy win in a handicap for 3-year-olds and up, a week later she won the one-mile Delaware Handicap just as easily. Five days later she ran an even better race, taking

the 11/4-mile Merchants' and Citizens' Handicap, beating that year's Travers Stakes winner and future Hall of Famer Broomstick, despite conceding five pounds to her younger foe. New York Morning Telegraph writer John Baden described her as "one of the greatest young mares this country has seen in recent years."

One week later she capped a perfect four-for-four season at Saratoga by winning the 1½-mile Champlain Handicap, while conceding 15 pounds to the second-place finisher, the 3-year-old gelding Dolly Spanker.

After her superlative Saratoga season Molly Brant shipped downstate, where she finished the year with two second-place finishes. The first, an all-ages allowance at Sheepshead Bay, featured another grueling race against Broomstick, with the 3-year-old colt getting revenge for his loss at Saratoga. Over a month later she finished a disappointing second in a 3-year-olds and up handicap, giving 21 pounds to the winner, Carbuncle.

She began her 1905 season with a sixth to her stablemate, Caughnawaga, in the Saratoga Handicap. Eight days later she notched her only win of the season, capturing her second Delaware Handicap. Second was Dolly Spanker while finishing fifth and sixth were two future National Hall of Fame inductees, Beldame and Roseben.

Molly Brant followed that with a disappointing second in the Champlain as the 10-7 favorite. Although the winner, Dolly Spanker, received 13 pounds from his distaff rival, most Turf writers thought she had no excuse. She finished her career with a second in an all-ages allowance at Sheepshead Bay to the brilliant 4-year-old speedball Hamburg Belle.

Although the Sanfords had bred talented male horses, even the best had some drawbacks, e.g. distance limitations (Chuctanunda) or lack of early speed (Caughnawaga). By the end of the

1905 season, most turf experts thought the Sanfords had a colt that had both speed and stamina in a 2-year-old half brother to Chuctanunda and Caughnawaga named Mohawk II (1903; Rockton-La Tosca, by St. Blaise). In fact, before his debut, the Flash Stakes on opening day at Saratoga, many bookies had made him the favorite. He lost the Flash but rebounded by winning a 2-year-old maiden race three days later. His reputation was further enhanced when he won the Saratoga Special on Aug. 5. One week later he won the Hopeful Stakes, his third victory in the span of nine days.

One year later the *Daily Racing Form* was still impressed: "Mohawk II was so penalized that he had to carry 130 lbs. This and the impression that his success in the Saratoga Special was a matter of pure luck (because of the poor start by Tangle), served to make him an outsider in the betting, he going to the post with 9-1 posted against him. The other starters carried 115 lbs. Mohawk II ran in second place to the stretch and then forging into the lead, won by a length in 1:13%, putting up a magnificent performance that won him hosts of friends and admirers."

After his Hopeful win Mohawk II became the advance book favorite to win the Futurity at Sheepshead Bay, at that

time the richest horse race in the country. Unfortunately, he suffered a slight injury during the running of the Hopeful, and he was put on the shelf for the rest of the year.

The Hopeful would be the last win of his career. The *Daily Racing Form* gave this pre-Travers Stakes assessment of his four-races: "Mohawk II is expected to be one of the star attractions of the nearby Saratoga meeting...He was a big, fine colt of great speed, taking action and gamecock courage, and it is hoped that as a 3-year-old he retains the form that won him

fame as a 2-year-old."

He opened his 1906 season with a second-place finish in the Travers at odds of 10-7. The 6-5 favorite, Gallavant, who had won two stakes as a 2-year-old but was winless at 3 prior to the Travers, won by eight lengths. The general opinion was Mohawk II's poor performance could be attributed to rust. Four days later he finished fifth in a 13/16-mile handicap. One Daily Racing Form writer blamed his loss on the high weight he was assigned, 126 pounds, and his participation in a suicidal speed duel. "Mohawk II's race demonstrated that he is a top-notcher among the 3-year-olds and should prove invincible from now on in almost any company."

The fallacy of that statement was shown three days later when he finished fifth and last in the Great Republic Stakes. A chart writer said that he "looked drawn and overdue."

Mohawk II did not race again until 1908 due to a skin condition. On Aug. 3, 1908, his first race since the 1906 Great Republic, he broke down and was subsequently retired to stud.

Sanford Stud had two fillies born in 1904 who had comparatively brief moments of glory. One was Kennyetto (1904; Clifford—Princess Monmouth, by King Monmouth). After making her debut with a second in the Spinaway

Stakes at odds of 15-1 as part of an entry with Danoscara (who turned out to be a decent filly herself), she finished seventh in a 2-year-old handicap after being unruly at the post and undergoing interference and came in third in the Great Filly Stakes at Sheepshead Bay at odds of 50-1. On Sept. 12 she broke her maiden in the Belles Stakes at Sheepshead Bay and ended her season by winning the Sept. 21 Willow Handicap at Gravesend.

She opened her 3-year-old season with a win as the 8-5 favorite in the historic Alabama Stakes at Saratoga, much to the glee of the local populace.

latter win "established herself as one of the best in the country."

Her next race was a second in a 3-years-old and up handicap, in which the chart writer stated "Vails had a very rough journey for five furlongs and just failed to get up in a cyclonic finish."

One week later she won the 1½-mile Saranac Handicap in a canter. The *Daily Racing Form* exclaimed: "Vail's victory... was a notable achievement. Horsemen were greatly impressed with the running of the fast mile, 1:39 over a track that was far from fast."

Two days later she finished second

She stretched her 1906-07 winning streak to five by taking the Huron Handicap and a 3-years-old and up handicap at Saratoga, but after that her career went into decline. Kennyetto lost the last four of her races downstate, never hitting the board, and her only win in four starts in 1908 was in a selling race. In her two stakes races in 1908, the Champlain and the Merchants' and Citizens' handicaps, she acted up before both starts. Kennyetto was obviously a mare who had lost her taste for racing, and she was retired to be a broodmare.

The other filly was Vails (1904; Gonsalvo—Retaliation, by Juvenal). After a mediocre 1906 season, winning two allowance races in four starts, she began her sophomore season at Saratoga with two wins, a fillies and mares all-ages handicap and the Delaware Handicap.

The Daily Racing Form claimed the

in the Champlain after an exceedingly rough trip, as described by Daily Racing Form: "Vails was the best, and would have won had she not been herded before the start, and pocketed during the running. At the post (the eventual winner) Dandelion and Oxford bumped and shoved her about until she was in a high state of excitement, and during the first sixteenth of the race Radtke, who was riding Dandelion, eventually flourished his whip before her and seemingly striking her in the face a time or two. John Sanford complained bitterly of the treatment accorded his highly strung and nervous filly."

Sanford retired Vails after the Champlain because of her disposition.

ON TO THE JUMPS

Thracian (1923; Archaic—Sadaquada, by Rockton) was a Sanford Stud

homebred who rejuvenated his career by learning to jump over fences. His first race on the flat track was not auspicious, as he finished 11th and last in a 2-yearold maiden event at Saratoga. He took off 16 months and returned as an accomplished steeplechaser.

Thracian began the 1927 season by finishing fourth, third and second in steeplechase purse events, and in his first race as a 5-year-old, July 31, 1928, he broke his maiden in a big way by winning the Shillelah Steeplechase at Saratoga by a disqualification.

He followed that with a win in the Saratoga Steeplechase Handicap. After losing his jockey at the last jump in the Governor Ogle Steeplechase Handicap at Laurel and falling in the Manly Memorial Steeplechase at Pimlico, he faced the stiffest competition of his career in the Temple Gwathmey Memorial Steeplechase Handicap at the United Hunts at Belmont Park. He finished fourth, but the first and third horses, Fairmount and Jolly Roger, are enshrined in the Hall of Fame, and the place horse, Lorenzo, was one of the best steeplechasers of his time.

Thracian ran in three more events in the next four years, with a fourth in the Governor Ogle and wins in a handicap and a selling event. He began a trend for the Sanford family in which they became better known for steeplechasers than for horses on the flat track. In fact, a half sister to Thracian, Tuscaloosa (1916; Chuctanunda—Sadaquada) became the last New York-bred owned and bred by Sanford Stud to win what today would be considered a graded stakes on the flat track when she took the 1918 Schuylerville Stakes by 10 lengths, setting a track record of 1:04% for the 5½-furlong distance. She never won another race.




