A New York State of Mind

he following interview with NYTB Executive Director Jeffrey Cannizzo, which focuses on New York breeding and the future of the industry nationally, appeared in the "Breeders' Cup Forum," a regular feature on Ray Paulick's website the Paulick Report prior to the running of this year's Breeders' Cup World Championships. In addition to appearing on the site, a print version of the interview, which was titled "A New York State of Mind," was distributed at the Keeneland sales grounds Nov. 7.

The Jockey Club's 2012 Report of Mares Bred for New York showed a pretty big spike from the previous year, going up by 43.1%, from 1,147 to 1,641. Was this simply a matter of the long-awaited revenue from video lottery terminals finally arriving?

Actually, the 1,641 figure and the 43.1% increase only reflect mares bred by New York stallions. Every year 40-50% of New York mares are bred by out-of-state stallions, so the real mares-bred figure is going to be much higher for New York in 2012 when the New York State Breeding and Development Fund releases its registry report for this year. All of this growth is 100% directly correlated to VLT revenues in New York. People like to see real change before leaping. The influx happened immediately following the condition book reading purse increases by over 30% last year. This year's first race at Saratoga was a \$90k allowance. I saw many eyes open up.

Even with the 2012 increase, you're only back to 2009 levels and far behind the 2003 number of mares bred, 2,749. Considering

the overall retraction in breeding Thoroughbreds in North America, is it reasonable to think you can increase the number again in 2013?

I'm expecting to see our true 2012 mares bred number very close to the 2003 figure, given over 40% of our mares were bred in Kentucky. I truly believe the 2013 mares-bred figure will grow yet again. We're talking about year one of enhanced purses and awards. It's very reasonable to think year two will spike again, based on real experiences with racing here. The purses and awards speak for themselves; they are incomparable. Again, the strength of our program is the racing opportunity for state-breds. With 700-plus restricted races a year in the state worth upward of \$30 million and an extra set of conditions available to those horses, running in a reduced pool of foals, why wouldn't more people drop foals to simply have a NY attached to the name?

Why should someone breed Thoroughbreds in New York?

The saying, "The person who doesn't know where his next dollar is coming from usually doesn't know where his last dollar went" can be ap-

plied here. The money is here, and the opportunity to make it has never been better. New York has over \$150 million in available purse money between the New York Racing Association and Finger Lakes; roughly 30% of it is restricted to state-breds. There are over 50 overnight stakes for state-breds and an extra set of conditions for each foal. You cannot get this racing opportunity anywhere. Hence each foal is worth more on the ground at the track than the next as the earning potential is real. Add the fact breeder's awards are 50% higher than a year ago and the math simply makes sense. Two weeks ago at Belmont's New York Showcase Day the breeder's award was \$31,500 and the stallion owner's award was another \$10,500 for Hessonite, who won the Ticonderoga Stakes. The same day a New York-sired 2-year-old won a maiden race, and the breeders received \$12,000 and the stallion award was over \$4,000.

What indications do you have from Gov. Cuomo or legislators that the VLT revenue will continue to help fund the incentive program in New York?

Our governor's agenda is straightforward: spearhead economic development for our state. You need to look no further than the horse industry to fuel such development. I led a recent study commissioned by the New York Horse Racing and Agricultural Alliance to study the recent contributions the overall horse industry makes to the state's economy. The report came out this past month, and the figures are staggering.

The horse community has a \$4.2 billion effect on the state's economy: We employ 33,000 people and contribute more than \$187 million in annual taxes. The key stat is there is equine activity in every single county of the state (62) occupying more than 1.3 million acres. Every racehorse brings \$92,000 in revenue to the state, and every 100 racehorses equates to 80 jobs. The point is the horse industry is big business for New York. The trickle-down effect is dramatic. This study was delivered to more than 300 legislators and staff: They get the message. We are too big not to support when the agenda is to grow business in the state. We'll ensure this message keeps getting hammered at the Capitol.

What effect has the turmoil with NYRA management and board reorganization had on New York breeders?

Our only enemy has been uncertainty. However, we can not go backward anymore. So looking forward, the new NYRA board is constructed with many high-profiled faces who are extremely successful in large commercial practices. The board also has people who have an interest in making breeding and racing better in New York. With the governor now having a vested interest in our success, I'd like to believe positive change will be made for us all.

State incentive programs have

been criticized by some who say that, while helping create jobs and encouraging agricultural activities, they reward mediocrity by running so many races restricted to statebreds. Do you feel New York's program avoids that criticism?

The reality is New York would not be able to run six days a week with nine-plus races without New Yorkbreds. The horse population here is heavily state-bred; thus the condition book reflects it. It's a science of supply, and open races don't fill today like they used to. If you studied the field size based on conditions for a week, you would quickly see that New York-bred racing generates more handle on a daily basis in contrast to the same open races. So, in reality, New York-breds support handle that fuels the purse account for open races.

However, don't let the restricted races fool you. New York-breds win every day in open company and stakes. It's a fallacy to think otherwise. You must understand quality is even more important when factoring in long-term commercial breeding, and at the end of the day, that's how breeders make money: selling horses. So mediocrity is a thing of the past in our business today.

Are breeders improving the quality of horses they are breeding today in New York?

Absolutely, 100%, and that's been happening for years. Fact: To date there are 103 stakes won by New York-breds in 2012, 14 of which were graded events. We have four grade I winners in 2012 and counting. Breeders who breed to sell have to keep improving to move their horses at auction. Knowing that most people can not afford to race their foals, the commercial market dictates better breeding. Breeders who breed to race

keep having to improve their product in order to compete on the track, and further competition is coming. They need to step up or be out of business. The stallion population is improving in quality, and the mare base is being upgraded. This year we passed legislation that permits stallions to be more transitional, requiring only one year in-state, which is already providing dividends.

How do you measure the success of the program?


Success is not simply measured; it's earned. In my opinion it's not a quantity check but rather a quality measurement. On the racetrack it's measured by performance. If you see the stakes and graded performances trending upward, breeders are progressing. In the sale ring, if the average price continues to grow, the New York-bred is further in demand. If you see more stallions relocating, farms being built by commercial operations, boarding farms at capacity, and the foal crop rising, we've been successful at making New York a better place for the industry.

What goals do you have for the program and New York-breds in general?

I'd like to see a stallion "made" in New York again. People coming to New York to get to him. It will happen; we just need a ground-breaker. I'd like to see New York lead the country on many major initiatives besides our own program, however. Reforms to regulations, facility advances and overhauls, new fan development, customer improvement, true prime time television production, and finally a fully financed system to support Thoroughbred retirement. New York is in the position to lead all of these fronts. It only takes leadership to get there. The entire industry is depending on it.

Courageous Cat to Questroyal North


rade I winner and millionaire Courageous Cat, a 6-year-old son of Storm Cat out of multiple grade I winner Tranquility Lake, will stand at Questroyal North near Stillwater for the 2013 breeding season. Questroyal has set his stud fee at \$6,000 live foal.

Courageous Cat, who entered stud at Lane's End Farm in 2012 after his retirement, won six races for his breeders Martin and Pam Wygod, including the Shoemaker Mile Stakes (gr. IT). Other victories include the National Museum of Racing Hall of Fame Stakes (gr. IIT), Canadian Turf Stakes (gr. IIIT), and the Poker Stakes (gr. IIIT). Courageous Cat also came just a neck short of winning the \$1 million Ricoh Woodbine Mile Stakes (Can-IT). As a sophomore, Courageous Cat finished second, beaten a half-length, behind the great filly Goldikova in the TVG Breeders' Cup Mile (gr. IT). His career earnings totaled \$1,165,760.

Courageous Cat is a full brother to multiple grade I winner After Market who stands at Lane's End, and Jalil, a group II winner in Dubai, who was a \$9.7 million Keeneland September sale yearling

William S. Farish of Lane's End, which purchased an interest in Courageous Cat after he retired, said, "Lane's End has the highest expectations for Courageous Cat at stud because of his impeccable breeding, race record, and conformation.

"Lane's End is excited to partner with

Questroyal Stud in standing Courageous Cat in New York at Questroyal North," Farish continued. "Lane's End and Martin and Pam Wygod, who bred and campaigned Courageous Cat, plan to continue to support Courageous Cat during his second year at stud and welcome the opportunity to participate in the New York breeding program."

Barry Ostrager, principal owner of Questroyal North, added, "With the arrival of Courageous Cat at Questroyal North, New York breeders are going to have the rare opportunity to breed to a magnificent grade I-winning son of Storm Cat out of a grade I-winning Rahy mare.

"Courageous Cat was one of the top milers of his generation, and Questroyal North is absolutely thrilled to stand Courageous Cat for such marvelous connections."

Ostrager also noted that Courageous Cat's full brother, After Market, is off to a tremendous start at stud with his first crop racing as 3-year-olds this year. After Market has sired six stakes winners from his first two crops to race.

Courageous Cat will be joining new sire Boys At Tosconova, El Corredor, Patriot Act, and Roaring Fever on the roster at Questroyal North.

New York-breds Command Attention at Kentucky Sales

New York-breds drew attention from buyers at the November breeding stock sales.

At the Nov. 5 Fasig-Tipton Kentucky sale in Lexington, Bella Dorato, the dam of Xpressbet Breeders' Cup Sprint (gr. I) winner Trinniberg, brought a final bid of \$460,000 from Stonestreet Thoroughbred Holdings.

Consigned by Romans Racing & Sales, agent, the stakes-placed Bella Dorato (Goldminers Gold—Witchkin, by Salem) was not in foal. Bred and raced by John and Joseph Marino's J M Stables and foaled at their farm, she ran third in the 2005 Finger Lakes Juvenile Fillies Stakes. Trinniberg's full sister, Ostourah, who sold for \$450,000 at the Fasig-Tipton Midlantic 2-year-olds sale in May, broke her maiden at Belmont Park Sept. 26.

New York-bred Final Mesa, in foal to Giant's Causeway, sold to Woodford Thoroughbreds for \$370,000 later in the sale. Bred by Carmine Telesca and John Guerrera and owned by Ice Wine Stable, the grade III winner is a half sister to grade III winner Uncle Camie.


Six-year-old Karakorum Fugitive, in foal to champion Uncle Mo, sold for

\$100,000 to Townley Hall Bloodstock. Bred by Stone-bridge Farm, the multiple stakes-placed mare is a half sister to multiple stakes winners Lady On the Run and Mr. Windjammer.

At the Keeneland November breeding stock sale, a pair of New York-bred graded stakes winners commanded top dollar and will be delivering their foals in Japan.

Don't Forget Gil, a grade III-winning daughter of Kafwain, New York-bred champion 3-year-old filly of 2009, and grade I-placed, sold to Teruya Yoshida's Shadai Farm for \$360,000. Don't Forget Gil was pronounced in foal to Candy Ride. Earlier this year she delivered a filly by first-crop sire and Kentucky Derby Presented by Yum! Brands (gr. I) winner Super Saver.

Multiple graded winner I Lost My Choo, in foal to Tiznow, sold to the Yushun Company for \$145,000. Part of Carl Lizza's Flying Zee Dispersal, the 7-year-old mare is a half sister to stakes winner Kevin's Decision. By Western Expression—Fairy Queen, by Tom Rolfe, I Lost My Choo won Colonial Downs' Virginia Oaks (gr. IIIT) and the Honey Fox Stakes (gr. IIIT) at Gulfstream Park.

Kelli Got Frosty, by first-crop sire Frost Giant, shows off in the Stallion Series

hen seven 2-year-old fillies went to the post Nov. 11 in the Fifth Avenue division of the New York Stallion Series, there was a pretty good chance that the winner would be by Frost Giant.

Not only were four of the fillies sired by the New York-based stallion, but the performances of the first crop by the grade I-winning son of Giant's Causeway rightly have owner expectations high, expectations that were met when Kelli Got Frosty (out of Nick's Honor, by Jump Start) won the \$125,000 race.

Eric Bishop manages the racing and breeding operations of Andrew

Cohen, who bred the filly and owns her in partnership with Lee Sacks (owner of Nick's Honor), Aubrey Flanagan, and Gary Tolchin. Bishop didn't stint in his praise of the successful new sire.

"Frost Giant won at a distance, he won short, he won overseas," said a jubilant Bishop in the winner's circle. "His lines are great: he's got Storm Cat running through him and Mr. Prospector on (his dam) side."

Kelli Got Frosty's victory helped move Frost Giant to fourth on the national first-crop sire list, with nine winners, two stakes winners, and two stakes-placed runners from 14 starters in a crop of 30 2-year-olds. His progeny earnings are more than \$675,000, and his West Hills Giant earned \$148,403 in the New York Breeders' Futurity at Finger Lakes in September.

"It's amazing what he's doing," said Bishop.

According to Bishop, Kelli Got Frosty is one of eight Frost Giant progeny owned by various configurations of her ownership group; the entity includes Sus Annmaries Gold, undefeated in two starts, and Giant Finish, a first-out winner earlier this month.

Kelli Got Frosty made her debut

in the Lady Finger Stakes at Finger Lakes in September, finishing fourth, and came back to win a maiden special weight at Belmont Oct. 4 by more than 14 lengths. Two weeks later she was third, beaten three-quarters of a length, in the \$125,000 Joseph A. Gimma Stakes on New York Showcase Day.

In her third start in a little over five weeks, the dark bay or brown filly stalked favored P J's Superego in the Fifth Avenue, overcoming a half-length deficit in the stretch to win by a half-length. She ran the six furlongs in 1:09.91, more than a second faster than the colts and geldings had earlier in the day in the Great White Way division. Nonnie Connie, another daughter of Frost Giant, finished third.

Cohen was one of Frost Giant's owners when the chestnut horse was racing and bought out his partners in Frost Giant's first season at stud in 2009.

"He had won the Suburban (Handicap, gr. I), and I knew they had been talking about the casino getting New York racing back to where it should be, one of the top places to race horses," said Cohen. "I was a little optimistic as the casino was 10 years in the making, but I thought New York was a good spot for him and things just

fell into place pretty much perfectly. We got slot machines at Aqueduct, and the whole structure is terrific, especially breeding and being a stallion owner with a horse doing well. We're hitting on all cylinders."

While Kelli Got Frosty is Cohen's first homebred stakes winner, he's no stranger to success at racing's highest levels, having been a partner in Big Brown, Benny the Bull, and Kip Deville, all multiple grade I winners. Not bad for a man who didn't get involved in racing until five years ago.

"I've had a lot of crazy luck," he acknowledged.

Cohen bred "a bunch" of his own mares to Frost Giant in the stallion's first season at stud, at Vinery at Sugar Maple. He owns pieces of nine 2-year-olds, seven yearlings, and a handful of weanlings, and he intends to breed his mares to the stallion again in 2013, when Frost Giant stands at Keane Stud near Amenia, N.Y.

Frost Giant was bred to 34 mares in 2012, a number that Dr. Winslow Stevens, Keane's veterinarian and general manager, expects to increase significantly in 2013.

"Next year is looking great," said Stevens. "With any young stallion, everyone waits on that first crop of 2-year-olds to see how he's going to do. Given what Frost Giant has done this year, he's proven himself pretty effectively at the track. We've had numerous phone calls from people from all over wanting to breed to him."

Cohen hopes Frost Giant covers 130-140 mares next year; he expects to keep some of the foals and sell a group of others...if he can bring himself to.

"I love the racing part, and I fall in love with the horses," he admitted. "I don't want to sell them, but I've got to run it a little bit like a business."

After starting his career in Europe, where he won two stakes races, Frost Giant got his only U.S. stakes victory in the 2008 Suburban under jockey Rudy Rodriguez; the race was also Rodriguez' only grade I win, and now he trains a daughter of the horse that brought him that achievement.

"I was very glad the owner gave her to me to train," he said.

After three starts in a relatively short period of time, a next race has not yet been determined for Kelli Got Frosty, but the excitement she and Frost Giant's other progeny have brought their connections is likely to continue over the upcoming New York winter, even as sporting success has lately eluded a local team that shares a name with the new, successful sire.

Quipped Bishop, "His offspring are the only true New York Giants winning in New York."

The winner of the other Stallion Series race Nov. 11, Meeker Avenue, also has a connection to Keane Stud: At the time he was bred in 2010, his sire, Read the Footnotes—a New York-bred himself— stood at Keane for Sequel Stallions after standing at Sequel New York from 2006-09. Read the Footnotes has since been moved to River Oaks Farm in Oklahoma.

Meeker Avenue was bred in New York by Fred W. Hertrich III, a Delaware-based automobile dealer. Involved in Thoroughbred breeding for two decades, Hertrich has bred graded stakes winners Sir Greeley (Westchester Handicap, Toboggan Handicap, gr. III) and Got the Last Laugh (Arlington-Washington Breeders' Cup Futurity, gr. III). He is the cobreeder with McCarthy Livestock of Boys At Tosconova, who won the 2010 Three Chimneys Hopeful Stakes (gr. I) and who will stand at New York's Que-

stroyal North in 2013.

Purchased for \$135,000 at the 2011 Fasig-Tipton Saratoga New York-bred preferred yearling sale by Brooklyn Boyz Stables, Meeker Avenue—named for a street in Brooklyn—is very much a family affair. The gelding is owned by Brooklyn Boyz and MeB Racing Stables, representing respectively Anthony Bonomo Sr. and his wife, Mary Ellen.

Their son, Anthony Jr., worked for a time in the barn of Dominick Schettino, who trains the family's horses, and he recently became the manager of his parents' racing and breeding operations.

"My son and my trainer pick out the horses," said Anthony Sr. after Meeker Avenue took the six-furlong Great White Way division of the Stallion Series. "I pay for them."

The son and the trainer were both impressed by Meeker Avenue (out of the Silver Deputy mare Age of Silver) when they saw

him at Saratoga.

"There was just something about him," said Anthony Jr. "He had a really nice chest on him; a nice shoulder; a nice back end. Overall I really liked his breeding, and a lot of times when we're at the sale, something stands out. He just strikes you."

"He's a nice size," added Schettino, "and pretty smart."

Still, the bay gelding is only a 2-year-old, the Stallion Series only his second start, and as Anthony Sr. pointed out, the horse is still learning. He won his first start on the lead, which is where jockey Ramon Dominguez expected to be in the Great White Way. The race didn't, however, unfold according to plan.

"When he didn't get away that well," said Dominguez, "I was concerned because he was on the inside, a little shy, with a horse outside. Turning for home, he had to squeeze through a pretty narrow hole. He kept on trying. He's already a pretty decent horse, but he's going to prove to be even better."

Meeker Avenue ran the six furlongs in 1:10.96 and won by a nose. He's likely to start next in the Damon Runyon Stakes for New York-breds Dec. 9 at Aqueduct.

Mary Ellen Bonomo wasn't at Aqueduct to see her family's latest win-

ner, one of the few races that she'd missed. It's clear that no matter whose name is listed as owner, happiness over their horses' victories is shared by all members of the family...which is not to say that they're not above a little friendly rivalry.

"I'm kind of jealous because MeB has been outperforming us," joked Anthony Sr. "Usually Mary Ellen is the one who walks them into the winner's circle. She's been walking in a lot more than I've been."

Fortunately, the undefeated Meeker Avenue races in both of their names, and if he keeps up his winning ways, they'll each have plenty of opportunities to lead him in to get his picture taken.

A Good Day for Favorites

A pair of the Stallion Series races run at seven furlongs—the Staten Island for fillies and mares and the Thunder Rumble for older males both offered short fields and shortpriced favorites. Both were winners.

Saul and Max Kupferberg's Sunny Desert, an astute claim for \$35,000 out of a maiden race at Aqueduct last December, was a 2½-length winner of the Staten Island after being bumped on both sides at the start.

"Nothing stops her right now,"

trainer John Parisella said. "She's special. You don't have many fillies like that. They have that one style and everything has to come up right. That's what makes her special—things don't have to come up right."

Her four-race win streak, which began against maiden special weight company March 25, was the reason she was sent off at 3-10 against four rivals. She won the 6½-furlong Park Avenue division of the New York Stallion Series in early May and the onemile Judy Soda Stakes Sept. 14 by 6¼ lengths.

Bred by Breed of Characters, she made her first three starts for Drs. K.K. and Vilasini Jayaraman and trainer Matt Peebles after being purchased as a weanling at the Ocala Breeders' Sales Co. The Jayaramans are best known as the breeders and owners of Summer Bird, winner of the Belmont Stakes, Shadwell Travers Stakes, and Jockey Club Gold Cup (all gr. I) in 2009.

A 3-year-old filly by Wild Desert, Sunny Desert is the second foal out of the winning Louis Quatorze mare Hoping for Sun. Her first foal, Bound by Humor, ran third in last year's Corma Ray Stakes at Belmont Park for Parker Lightfield Farm and trainer Tom Albertrani.

Hoping for Sun is a half sister to eight-time stakes winner High Expectations, a Peaks and Valleys gelding who landed all of his stakes wins at Arlington Park and Hawthorne Race Course in Illinois.

Two races after the Staten Island, Michael Dubb and Michael Imperio's Sportswriter had to work to earn a three-quarters of a length victory over 29-1 shot Anaphylaxis in the Thunder Rumble. Sportswriter, a 3-year-old gelding by Maybry's Boy, was the 1-5 favorite based off a series of good performances in stakes against a field of runners void of any stakes winners.

Bred by the late Carl Lizza's Flying Zee Stables, Sportswriter was a \$60,000 purchase by Dubb out of the Fasig-Tipton Midlantic December mixed sale in 2011 as part of the Flying Zee dispersal. Sportswriter had four starts under his belt including a debut win at Saratoga.

"He's been very good since we got him, and he's always trained very, very good," said winning trainer Rodriguez. "We were lucky to buy him. He's as solid as they come and tries every time."

Dubb, a 56-year-old Long Island homebuilder, has been on quite a roll in 2012. He is also the co-owner of Grace Hall, winner of this year's Gulfstream, Delaware, and Indiana Oaks (all gr. II); Excelsior Stakes (gr. III) winner Marilyn's Guy; and My Happy Face, winner of the Nov. 4 Tempted Stakes (gr. III) at Aqueduct.

The Thunder Rumble winner is the second foal out of Point Spread, a 9-year-old winning daughter of Point Given out of the Conquistador Cielo mare Schaum's Class. Point Spread was bred in New York by Dr. Jerry Bilinski and Martin Zaretsky. Point Spread is a half sister to Holy Capote, a four-time stakes winner.

Maybry's Boy, a 13-year-old son of Broad Brush who stands at High-cliff at Mill Creek Farm, will stand for \$2,500 in 2013. Sportswriter is from Maybry's Boy's first crop, which featured only five foals.

Barry Schwartz talks about owning, breeding, and building up racing in New York

e's going to be OK. When a trainer offers this assessment of a first-time starter, he's not likely to generate too much excitement for the owner, except when it's uttered by Michael Hushion.

Coming from a man of few words, being OK put longtime New York owner/breeder Barry Schwartz on notice about the Jan. 28 debut of a promising homebred colt by Grand Slam. What Schwartz heard, given Hushion's economy of words and having witnessed the trainer's high-degree of success with first-time starters over the past 20 years they've worked together, was "You'd better watch this race."

"You have to understand that Mike doesn't just praise a horse," Schwartz said. "When he says a horse is good, then you multiply that by 10."

The dark gray colt named The Lumber Guy commanded the lead quickly just a few strides out of the gate, rolled through five furlongs in :58, and had the field 9¼ lengths behind him at the wire.

"Wow, we really got excited," said Schwartz, who watched the race on TVG from a house he rents regularly in Santa Barbara, Calif. "I got a few offers to sell him right afterward. Someone had offered me \$700,000. A friend of mine at Santa Barbara kept saying to me: 'It's a big offer; you've got to sell him.'

"It was a lot of money, but I'm in racing to run a horse like this," he said. The Lumber Guy was named after lumber industry magnate and owner/breeder Aaron Jones, who has co-owned horses with Schwartz. The colt would more than deliver on the promise of that first race and take Schwartz; his wife, Sheryl; and Hushion on a remarkable ride.

The Lumber Guy won a \$75,000 stakes by 4½ lengths in his second start, ran off the board in the Resorts

World Casino New York Wood Memorial Stakes (gr. I), but followed up with a victory in the grade II Jerome Stakes. The colt would go on to earn a spot in the Xpressbet Breeders' Cup Sprint (gr. I) at Santa Anita Park Nov. 3 by taking the "Win and You're In" Vosburgh Invitational Stakes (gr. I). The Vosburgh was Hushion's first victory in a grade I stakes.

The colt finished second by threequarters of a length in the Sprint behind Trinniberg.


"I got a lot of congratulations and the horse ran a great race, but it is all about winning," said Schwartz after the Breeders' Cup World Championships. The Lumber Guy was Schwartz' fifth starter in the Breeders' Cup since 1998 as an owner and his first as an owner/breeder. One consolation Schwartz took away from the race was that The Lumber Guy, because he had a wide trip, actually ran faster than the winner, according to Ragozin Data, which rated him .67 compared with the winner, who got a 0.98 rating. With Ragozin figures, the lower the number, the better the performance. Kentucky Derby (gr. I) winners typically run in figures between 0 and 4.5.

By three-quarters of a length,

Schwartz missed two important goals: owning a Breeders' Cup trophy, and being the first to win a Breeders' Cup race with a New York-bred runner.

"New York is my home. I believe in breeding in this state," he said.

Breeding, Buying, Selling

Schwartz has a band of around 15 broodmares on his Stonewall Farm, a picturesque spread of 741 acres in northern Westchester County, about

50 miles north of New York City. About 400 acres of the property is pasture while the other 300 acres is woodlands populated by deer, turkeys, coyotes, and foxes. He bought the farm in 1979, a year after he got into racing. Schwartz decided to make the farm his main residence after he sold the American fashion company Calvin Klein, a business he co-founded and co-owned with the company's namesake, to Philips-

Van Heusen for \$730 million in cash, stock, and royalties in 2002.

At one time Schwartz had up to 60-65 mares, but he cut back along with everyone else when the economy went south in 2008. Now he supplements his breeding program by buying yearlings. He said he's got about 20-25 2-year-olds for 2013.

The yearlings Schwartz buys don't represent specific sire lines, nor is he focused primarily on fillies to replen-

ish his broodmare band. Instead his team—trainer Hushion, farm manager Peter Moore, and Irish agent Hugo Merry—simply look for athletes.

"I thought I wanted to buy mostly colts last year and I bought mostly fillies," Schwartz said. "It was just the horses that appeal to you. This year I bought some really nice fillies, especially among the more expensive, well-bred ones. Between my 2-year-olds of this year and 2-year-olds of next year, I know I have the basis of a really nice group of broodmares."

Schwartz said he will build up his broodmare band some but will likely keep it around 20-25 mares.

"Manny Gilman, a terrific guy who managed Harbor View for Lou Wolfson, once told me you need two mares to make one 2-year-old," Schwartz said. "So my breeding program will produce about 10 runners a year, and I'll buy about 10-12 yearlings."

Schwartz breeds some mares to New York-based stallions, but many of his best mares at Stonewall still go to Kentucky.

"I believe in breeding in the state,

but I also believe in quality breeding," he said. "All the foals, however, are dropped in New York; the program is phenomenal and will continue to be if they don't take it away, because politicians have a history—you saw it in Pennsylvania where they created something better than they expected."

Schwartz said he believes the New York-bred program will grow stronger, despite recent "saber rattling" by New York Gov. Andrew Cuomo about taking money generated by the Resort World Casino at Aqueduct away from purses or the breed incentive programs, and opening new casinos and not sharing any of that revenue with horsemen.

"If it stays anywhere near what it is, with 1 to 1¼% going to the New York breeders, the value of a New York-bred is going to be higher at least for several years. People are going to want to race there, and they're going to want to breed there because there is so much money through the breeding program," Schwartz said.

Schwartz does sell some horses,

though he isn't a commercial breeder. First and foremost, he loves racing, but he said everyone—even breed-to-race operations—has to sell horses sometime. Selling his stock was a struggle early on, not because of quality but because buyers assumed Schwartz was selling only horses that had problems. Over time his horses found success in other hands, and the market became more forgiving to his consignments.

"You can't win Breeders' Cup races every year, and you can't make stallions every year," he said. "You have to sell to raise some revenue. Over the last few years I've been able to sell and get legitimate prices for them."

Schwartz even dabbled successfully in pinhooking this year. He bought a Distorted Humor colt for \$180,000 at the 2011 Keeneland September yearling sale and sold him last March at the Fasig-Tipton Florida 2-year-olds in training sale for \$1.2 million to Sheikh Mohammed's bloodstock agent John Ferguson.

The auction market offers its own kind of excitement, but Schwartz leaves no doubt that he is involved in Thoroughbreds because he loves racing.

His favorite races are long distance contests on the grass.

"A horse that can go 1½ miles, I get very excited about a horse like that—to the chagrin of my trainer. It makes him pull out what hair he has left," he joked. One of his favorite races has been the 1991 Sword Dancer Handicap (gr. IT), a 1½-mile turf race at Belmont Park he won with a homebred named Dr. Root. As much as Schwartz loves turf racing, however, he knows he'd go broke with a stable full of turf specialists.

"When you have as many 2-yearolds as I have, you can have a little of both," he said. "Certainly the stable is pretty well-balanced, all kinds of horses."

Racing: Promote Thyself

Because Schwartz continues to be so passionate about the racing

game, he also finds himself increasingly frustrated by what he sees as not enough focus on promotion. He is particularly frustrated with the New York Racing Association, for which he served as chairman and chief executive officer between 2000 and 2004.

"We know that racing is having a hard time throughout the country," he said. "But you can have a marketing effort. You can promote."

Schwartz said despite NYRA's recent turmoil, he sees some real opportunity created by Cuomo's recently seated NYRA Reorganization Board. In particular, Schwartz supports the appointment of David Skorton, president of Cornell University, as chairman of the new board.

"It was a wonderful choice," Schwartz said. "This is an organization that has a connection to New York racing. It is the best vet school, to me, in the country. So I think he'll be terrific, but he has to bring in the right CEO. There are a lot of good people out there; they just have

to choose wisely. Start with a white piece of paper and look at each area that needs help."

Marketing is one of those areas Schwartz said that definitely need help.

"When I was chairman, that was the big push, marketing," he said. "We got editorials in *Town & Country* and all sorts of magazines that a wide variety of people read. We advertised on billboards. We did some bus stop shelters. We went into magazines that young people read."

Schwartz said he doesn't want to beat up too much on New York racing. After all, he said, the best of New York stakes are still among the most outstanding races in the

country. Case in point: Though he is keeping The Lumber Guy in California with trainer Neil Drysdale for the winter and aiming next for the Dec. 26 Malibu Stakes (gr. I) at Santa Anita, the long-range plan is for his star to be back in New York for the spring.

The race Schwartz is most keen to win is the Metropolitan Mile Handicap (gr. I) at Belmont Park in late May.

"That is one of the premier races in the country, and I think he is a miler, though Mike thinks he could stretch out to 1½ miles," he said. Schwartz acknowledges he will view The Lumber Guy's 4-year-old campaign with the thought he may have a stallion in the making. A victory in

the Met Mile, he said, would be an important milestone toward that end. "He doesn't have a deep pedigree, but he could make the pedigree. His dam was unraced but she produced three stakes winners."

The Lumber Guy's dam is Boltono, a daughter of Unbridled's Song, who also produced stakes winners Magical Solution (by Stormin Fever) and Bold Deed (by Anasheed). Unfortunately, Boltono died the day after she gave birth to The Lumber Guy, her first graded stakes winner.

Nothing energizes a racehorse owner like an exceptional horse, and Schwartz can't wait for The Lumber Guy's next race. It is an infectious enthusiasm he desperately wishes all racetracks could broadcast more ef-

fectively to the sports-loving masses. With some relatively minor changes, like cutting two races a day off a card and replacing low-end claiming races with higher-value, higher-quality races, Schwartz believes racing can improve its product and begin to grow its audience.


"I love racing so much. I think it is the greatest game in America, and we need to let everyone know that," he said.

A look at the incoming stallions/sires in New York for 2013

he Jockey Club's Report of Mares Bred that came out last month showed a 40% increase for the state of New York. With such a sizable jump in the mare population and a heightening demand for New York-bred foals and yearlings in the auction ring, an influx of stallions was sure to follow.

In alphabetical order the following stallions will be standing their first seasons in New York—or will have moved to new locations in the Empire State.

Bob and John, a grade I winner among the leading second-crop sires of 2012, will relocate from Josephine Abercrombie's Pin Oak Stud near Versailles, Ky., to Highcliff Stallions at Mill Creek Farm near Stillwater, N.Y., for the 2013 breeding season. The son of Seeking the Gold will continue to stand as a partnership between Magnolia Racing and Pin Oak Stud.

The 9-year-old Bob and John is the sire of three stakes winners in 2012:

Greed and Fear, Lady Candidate, and Lady Jensen. He has 52 winners from his first two crops on the track and his progeny have earned more than \$1.6 million in 2012.

Bob and John is out of the graded stakes-winning Deputy Minister mare Minister's Melody and is a half brother to stakes winner Connie Bell. His third dam, Too Bald, is the dam

of top sires Baldski, Capote, Exceller, and American Standard. Hidden Talent, the dam of Too Bald, is the third dam of successful stallion Broad Brush.

On the track Bob and John put together a 5-3-3 slate from 14 starts and earned \$996,330. At 2 he placed in the Hollywood Futurity (gr. I) and at 3 won the Wood Memorial Stakes (gr. I) and Sham Stakes (gr. III) while placing in the San Felipe Stakes (gr. II). As

a 4-year-old, Bob and John won the Lone Star Park Handicap (gr. III) and ran second in the Texas Mile Stakes (gr. III).

"We feel Bob and John will be recognized by New York breeders as a serious opportunity," said Pin Oak Stud manager Clifford Barry.

While **Boys At Tosconova** didn't make many starts in his three years

in training, he made the most of them and that is why the son of Officer will bring some buzz to Questroyal North near Stillwater.

Racing for a partnership headed by Samantha Siegel's Jay Em Ess Stable, Boys At Tosconova made his debut in stakes company and ran a bangup second in the Kentucky Juvenile Stakes (gr. III) at Churchill Downs on Kentucky Oaks Day 2010. After breaking his maiden by 12 lengths in July, he topped Stay Thirsty in the Three Chimneys Hopeful Stakes (gr. I) prior to running second to champion Uncle Mo in the Grey Goose Breeders' Cup Juvenile (gr. I).

Given time off with an ankle injury that didn't require surgery, Boys At Tosconova resurfaced in October of his 3-year-old year, running third to Tapizar in a Belmont allowance-optional claiming race. An allowance-optional claiming win would follow at Aqueduct, then two more wins at Gulfstream, the latter coming against Groupie Doll going a flat mile. His last start would be a second-place effort to To Honor and Serve in the grade III Westchester Stakes.

Officer is the sire of more than 25 stakes winners. After starting his stud career at Gainesway Farm in Kentucky, he moved to Taylor Made Stallions for five seasons, then was sold to the KRA Jeju Stud Farm in Korea. Boys At Tosconova's dam, the Conquistador Cielo mare Little Bonnet, placed in the Sands Point Stakes and is out of the two-turn grade III stakes-winning Valid Bonnet.

After serving his initial season at stud at William S. Farish's Lane's End Farm near Versailles, Ky., **Courageous Cat** makes the move to New York to stand at Questroyal North near Stillwater.

Courageous indeed on the track, the 6-year-old son of Storm Cat was a major player on the turf and excelled at a mile while racing for his breeders, Martin and Pam Wygod. At 3 he won the National Museum of Racing and Hall of Fame Stakes (gr. IIT) and was second to mighty Goldikova by a half-length in the TVG Breeders' Cup

Mile (gr. IT). At 4 he won the Canadian Turf Stakes (gr. IIIT) and ran third to dual champion Gio Ponti in the Shadwell Turf Mile Stakes (gr. IT).

As a 5-year-old, he shipped to California and beat them all in the Shoemaker Mile Stakes (gr. IT), having won the Poker Stakes (gr. IIIT) at Belmont Park. He also ran a gallant second in the Ricoh Woodbine Mile Stakes (Can-IT).

By a sire of sires and the sire of 180 stakes winners, Courageous Cat is out of two-time grade I winner Tranquility Lake. By Rahy, Tranquility Lake is out of a Danzig mare making Cou-

rageous Cat inbred to Northern Dancer 3x4. Courageous Cat is bred on the same Storm Cat/ Rahy cross as leading sire Giant's Causeway and leading New York sire Freud.

Courageous Cat has two full brothers that have made major impacts on the track and in the auction ring. After Market, was a two-time grade I winner on turf (and also stands at

Lane's End), and Jalil won a group II event in Dubai after commanding \$9.7 million at the 2005 Keeneland September yearling sale.

Tranquility Lake is a half sister to Benchmark, a perennial leading sire in California and the sire of 33 stakes winners.

With two seasons at stud in Kentucky under his belt, **Desert Party** moves from Darley near Lexington

to Sequel Stallions New York near Hudson.

Desert Party, who was a \$2.1 million sales 2-year-old, is a son of Darley's Street Cry, who commanded a fee of \$150,000 last year, and for good reason, as he's the sire of 2007 Kentucky Derby Presented by Yum! Brands (gr. I) and champion Street Sense, 2010 Horse of the Year Zenyatta, and 59 other stakes winners. Two of

those stakes winners are Street Hero and Street Boss who both won at the grade I level and are both showing great promise as sires while being ranked among the top 20 first-crop sires of 2012. Street Boss is the sire of Capo Bastone, who ran third in the Nov. 3 Grey Goose Breeders' Cup Juvenile.

On the track Desert Party was precocious, breaking his maiden at first asking, then taking Saratoga's six-furlong Sanford Stakes (gr. II) as the even-money favorite. At 3 he won two of three starts in Dubai including the one-mile Gulf News U.A.E.

Two Thousand Guineas (UAE-III). Ambitiously spotted in the Kentucky Derby, he ran 14th behind Mine That Bird but returned at 4 to win two of three starts, taking a six-furlong stakes at Meydan in Dubai and the seven-furlong Donald LeVine Memorial Handicap at Philadelphia Park.

From the Mr. Prospector line, Desert Party has but one line of Northern Dancer in his five-cross pedigree. His

initial book of mares in Kentucky drew 121 mares.

The highest-profile stallion to enter the New York market for 2013 is **El Corredor**, who will make his stand at Questroyal North near Stillwater for a fee of \$7,500. The 15-year-old stallion previously stood at John Sikura's Hill 'n' Dale Farms near Lexington.

He'll offer good looks and a good pedigree for New Yorkers. Inbred 3x4 to Mr. Prospector, El Corredor offers but one dose of Northern Dancer through his first five generations. He is a son of Gone West's top son Mr. Greeley, who really found his best stride as a stallion—especially in the commercial market—later in his career before his untimely death in 2010 at the age of 18.

El Corredor is out of the Silver Deputy mare Silvery Swan, who is also the dam of grade III winner Silver Tornado and Roman Ruler. Roman Ruler, winner of the Haskell Invitational Handicap (gr. I), also stands at Hill 'n' Dale and also hails from the Mr. Prospector line. Roman Ruler is the sire of last year's Belmont Stakes (gr. I) winner Ruler On Ice.

With nine crops of yearlings, El Corredor has had 450 of his yearlings sell for an average of \$61,425. The sire of seven grade I winners, El Corredor has 31 stakes winners. His

grade I-winning filly Crisp, winner of the Santa Anita Oaks in 2010, sold for \$1.2 million last November at the Fasig-Tipton Kentucky mixed sale while in foal to Bernardini. His two other U.S. female grade I winners— Adieu and Backseat Rhythm—both landed their big wins at Belmont Park.

Include, who carries the torch for the Domino sire line in North American pedigrees at Airdrie Stud near Midway, Ky., will be joined at stud this year by his full brother, **Encaustic**. Encaustic (Broad Brush—Illeria, by Stop the Music) will set up shop at Foggy Bottom Farm near Genesco for a fee of \$2,000.

Maryland-bred Encaustic was certainly hardy, making 46 starts over five years in training, and won 12 times and placed in another 17 races. He won five stakes over four different

tracks and was placed in nine added-money events including the grade III Texas Mile Stakes. A middle-distance runner, his biggest payday came in the 2009 Mountaineer Mile Handicap, and he set a track record of 1:42.13 for about 11/16 miles at Laurel Park.

Include has sired 26 stakes winners with the majority of them being two-turn types. Include's son Redeemed, a sharp winner of Belmont Park's Brooklyn Handicap (gr. II) in

June, was a leading contender for this year's Breeders' Cup Marathon (gr. II) until his retirement in September. Include's five grade I winners include Panty Raid, Her Smile, Cash Included, and 2012 grade I winner Include Me Out, third in the Nov. 2 Breeders' Cup Ladies' Stakes (gr. I).

Encaustic has a stout female family as well. In addition to Include, he is a full brother to two other stakes winners. Illeria, is a granddaughter of Hail to Reason, whose stamina is found in pedigrees today through the sons and daughters of Halo, Saint Ballado, Dynaformer, and Kris. S. Encaustic is also inbred 4x4 to blue hen Hidden Talent through her stakes-winning daughters Turn to Talent and Too Bald, dam of useful sires Baldski, Capote, Exceller, and American Standard.

FROST GIANT HEADING TO KEANE STUD

Frost Giant is no stranger to breeders in New York—the grade I winner has stood at Vinery New York for his first four breeding seasons but moves to Keane Stud near Amenia for 2013. His fee will be \$7,500.

With nine winners through Nov. 13, Frost Giant is the leading freshman sire in New York and ranks fourth on the national freshman sire list with progeny earnings of more than \$675,000 despite only having 30 named 2-year-olds. Lightning struck recently with his Kelli Got Frosty, winner of the Nov. 11 New York Stallion Series Stakes. Leading the charge for Frost Giant is

West Hills Giant. Talk about versatility: West Hills Giant broke his maiden going 1½ miles on the turf at Saratoga, then cut back to six furlongs Sept. 29 to win the \$247,338 New York Breeders' Futurity at Finger Lakes.

His sire was the same way. Frost Giant won a group III race in Ireland at 2 going seven furlongs, then won a 10-furlong group III race the following year and at 5 landed the 1¼-mile Suburban Handicap (gr. I) at Belmont Park in 2:01.58.

Frost Giant is a son of Giant's Causeway (a full brother to leading New York sire Freud) out of a Gone West (Mr. Prospector) mare. His female family traces back to one of the very best from the Phipps family. Frost Giant's fourth dam is Numbered Account, champion 2-year-old filly of 1971 and the dam of top sires Private Account and Polish Numbers, and of grade I winner Dance Number, the blue hen responsible for 2010 Kentucky Derby winner Super Saver, Bluegrass Cat, and Girolamo. Also included in this elite group is Mutakddim, whose 109 career stakes winners put him in an elite group of sires.

Frost Giant is inbred 4x4 to both Northern Dancer and Secretariat.

Following a run in the Nov. 23 Clark Handicap Presented by Norton Healthcare (gr. I), Twin Creeks Racing Stables' **Mission Impazible** is slated to set up stud duty at Becky Thomas and Dennis Narlinger's Sequel Stallions. The good-looking gray/roan by Unbridled's Song has gray/roan by Unbridled's Song has gray with the best, having made 16

Hot on the Kentucky Derby trail ⁵ following a three-quarter-length score in the Louisiana Derby (gr. II) in 2010, he ran ninth in the slop underneath the Twin Spires and was given the remainder of the year off.

For the next two racing seasons he would run nearly exclusively around two turns and perform best at nine furlongs. At Fair Grounds he won the New Orleans Handicap (gr. II) and then became a tad unlucky with runner-up efforts in the grade I Stephen Foster Handicap (by a neck to Pool Play), Clark Handicap (to Wise Dan), and the Donn Handicap (to Hymn Book).

So far he's put up a 3-8-2 slate and has earned \$1,272,075.

Unbridled's Song has sired 15 grade I winners and is quickly approaching the century mark for added-money winners. La Paz, the dam of Mission Impazible, is responsible for two other graded winners: Forest Camp (by Deputy Minister), and Spanish Empire (by Pleasant Colony). Forest Camp is the sire of 21 stakes winners and spent the first five years of his stud career at Airdrie Stud in Kentucky.

Mr. Sekiguchi, an \$8 million Keeneland September sale yearling, relocates to McMahon of Saratoga Thoroughbreds. By sire of sires Storm Cat, Mr. Sekiguchi hails from one of the most important female families in North American racing today. He is out of grade III winner Welcome Surprise, a half sister to classic winner, Horse of the Year, and leading sire A.P. Indy; dual classic winner and top sire Summer Squall; and graded stakes-placed and sire Honor Grades. Their dam, Weekend Surprise, was named Kentucky Broodmare of the Year in 1992.

Mr. Sekiguchi is inbred 3x3 to 1973

Triple Crown winner and racing icon Secretariat. Welcome Surprise, one of 92 stakes winners by Seeking the Gold, is inbred 3x3 to Buckpasser.

A two-time winner for Fusao Sekiguchi and trainer Bob Baffert, Mr. Sekiguchi started his stud career at Hill 'n' Dale Farms in Kentucky. He also stood at Arthur I. Appleton's Bridlewood Farm in Central Florida and at Park Stud in Canada. His 3-year-old daughter Rose and Shine is a two-time stakes winner in 2011.

The built-for-speed **Pomeroy** moves from Vinery Florida to Vinery New York for 2013.

Following a stellar racing career in which he won three major one-turn races at Saratoga: the grade I King's Bishop Stakes at 3, the Alfred G. Vanderbilt Handicap (gr. II) at 4, and the Forego Stakes (gr. I) at 5, the son of Boundary got off to an attention-getting start at stud, ranking in the top 10 on the freshman sire list in 2010. He led all first-crop sires, tied with Sharp Humor and Congrats, with 25 juvenile winners.

He was among the leading sec-

ond-crop sires for 2011 based on the success of Pomeroys Pistol, winner of grade II stakes at Belmont and Gulfstream Park. He is also the sire of Flashpoint, winner of the seven-furlong Hutcheson Stakes (gr. II) and the Jersey Shore Stakes (gr. III).

Pomeroy is bred on the Northern Dancer/Mr. Prospector cross, being a grandson of Danzig (sire of 202 stakes winners) out of a mare by Mr. Prospector's son Seeking the Gold, the sire of 92 stakes winners and broodmare sire of 125 addedmoney winners.

Pomeroy got 53 mares in the ultratough fourth year of stud duty, but once his 2-year-olds hit the track, he was able to attract a book of 131 mares in 2011.


Pomeroy will be standing alongside **Soaring Empire** at Vinery. The 5-year-old graded stakes winner by classic winner and 2012 leading sire Empire Maker will stand for \$2,500.

Out of the winning A.P. Indy mare Flying Passage, Soaring Empire is a half brother to multiple graded stakes winner Hungry Island, winner of this year's Churchill Distaff Turf Mile Stakes (gr. IIT).

Second dam Chic Shirine won the Ashland Stakes (gr. I) and placed in the Mother Goose Stakes (gr. I). Chic Shirine is a full sister to Queena, champion older female of 1991. Third dam Too Chic won the Maskette Stakes (gr. I) and ran second to stablemate Broom Dance in the 10-furlong Alabama Stakes (gr. I). The family also has produced graded stakes winners El Padrino, Al Khali, Somali Lemonade, and Tara Roma.

Bred by Emory Hamilton, Soaring Empire was a \$190,000 Keeneland September sale yearling. Raced by Ol Memorial Stable and C.E. Glasscock Racing, Soaring Empire won five times and placed in another five races. He was a three-time stakes winner and placed in five graded stakes.

He won his 2-year-old debut then placed in the Iroquois Stakes (gr. III) at Churchill Downs in his only other race that season. As a 3-year-old,



he won the Rutgers Stakes at Monmouth, going six furlongs in 1:08.27 and placed in the Pegasus Stakes (gr. III) to eventual Travers Stakes (gr. I) winner Afleet Express.

In his 4-year-old debut Soaring Empire won the mile Hal's Hope Stakes (gr. III) at Gulfstream Park earning a 106 Beyer Speed Figure. He then ran second in a pair of grade II events. Soaring Empire went on to win the Majestic Light Stakes at Monmouth. He was retired earlier this year.

Empire Maker is the sire of three grade I winners this year: Breeders' Cup Ladies' Classic (gr. I) repeat winner Royal Delta, Arkansas Derby winner and two-time classic-placed Bodemeister, and In Lingerie. Bodemeister enters stud for 2013 at \$30,000 at WinStar Farm in Kentucky.

Multiple graded stakes winner **Smart Bid**, bred and raced by George Strawbridge, will enter stud in 2013 at Highcliff at Mill Creek Farm. Smart Bid was a four-time stakes winner and put together a solid resume of 6-8-4 from 26 starts and earned \$1,008,309 in five seasons on the track.

Grade III-placed at 3 and winner of the Damascus Stakes at Santa Anita, at 4 Smart Bid won Fair Grounds' Mervin H. Muniz Jr. Memorial Handicap (gr. IIT) and ran second, beaten less than a length in the grade I Woodford Reserve Turf Classic Stakes at Churchill Downs.

Smart Bid returned to New Orleans earlier this year to win the Fair Grounds Handicap (gr. IIIT).

Smart Bid carries the tried-and-true Mr. Prospector/Northern Dancer cross being a son of Smart Strike, the two-time leading sire by Mr. Prospector. Smart Bid's dam, Recording, by Northern Dancer's top son Danzig, was a two-turn stakes winner for Strawbridge out of Ratings, a Strawbridge homebred who ruled the turf in her day winning the Diana Handicap (gr. IIT) and Sheepshead Bay Handicap (gr. IIIT).

Grade II winner **Teuflesberg** moves to McMahon of Saratoga Thor-

oughbreds for 2013 and will stand for a fee of \$3,500. The son of Johannesburg—the 2-year-old champion of 2001 on both sides of the Atlantic—is one of only three second-crop sires to sire a grade I winner in 2012.

Joining Hard Spun (\$40,000) and Scat Daddy (another son of Johannesburg standing for \$17,500), Teuflesberg is the sire of Trinniberg, an impressive winner of the Nov. 3 Xpressbet Breeders' Cup Sprint (gr. I) over older males. Trinniberg has three other graded wins to his ledger this year including a score at Belmont Park in the Woody Stephens Stakes (gr. II), a race annexed by Teuflesberg in 2007.

Teuflesberg hails from the Northern Dancer line of stallions, as his champion sire is a grandson of Storm Cat.

Teuflesberg traces to the same female family through both his sire and his dam: Claiborne Farm's blue hen Monarchy, a stakes-winning full sister to champion Round Table.

Teuflesberg is inbred 5x4 to Monarchy's daughter State (by Nijinsky II) through daughters Narrate (the third dam of Johannesburg) and Border, the third dam of Teuflesberg. This is the sire producing family of Pulpit, Tale of the Cat, and Minardi. Teuflesberg is also inbred 4x3 to Mr. Prospector.

Scat Daddy, the leading first-crop sire of 2011 and solidly in second position this year, is also inbred to Mr. Prospector.

Teuflesberg started his stud career in Kentucky, then moved to Journeyman Stud near Ocala where he stood for four years.






