

NYRA's Innovative Loyalty Program a Big Win for New York-Breds

IN ANY ESTABLISHED INDUSTRY, truly innovative ideas are few and far between. That being said, last month the New York Racing Association unveiled a program utterly new to North American racing.

NYRA's "2018-19 Starter Loyalty Program" is an idea first floated by board member C. Steven Duncker in a meeting of the NYRA racing committee. The program is intended to 1) address the critical problem of shrinking fields in New York over the winter, 2) mitigate the decline in handle concomitant with smaller fields, and 3) reward the stalwart horsemen and owners who keep the show on the road by competing in New York yearround. The icing on the cake is the connections of New York-breds will ultimately be the program's biggest beneficiaries.

The underlying idea is familiar. Suppliers of goods and services from grocery stores to airlines have long rewarded returning customers with cash bonuses and discounts. In this case, NYRA's "2018-19 Starter Loyalty Program" will give purse bonuses to connections of horses making multiple starts at NYRA tracks. The bonuses will range from 5%-15% based on an ascending scale of starts, from the Silver level (5-6 starts) through the Diamond level (12 or more starts).

Bonus points in the "2018-19 Starter Loyalty Program" are transferrable even if a horse is claimed or sold, and, importantly, the program contains essential safeguards for horses. No more than two starts within a 30-day span will count toward bonuses and horses beaten by 25+ lengths or put on the vet's list after the race will not earn points. The genius of the program lies in its time frame: April 2, 2018, through April 1, 2019. As a horse accrues NYRA starts, he is likely to hit more valuable benchmarks the deeper he gets into 2018 and during the first three months of 2019, providing a clear incentive to his connections to keep him in New York over the winter.

Another attractive feature of the loyalty program is that, in the era of the "super-barn," it levels the playing field for smaller outfits in a way a simple purse hike would not. In general, 20% of the trainers win 85% of the purse money at NYRA tracks. The loyalty program will give every New York trainer an equal opportunity to get a purse increase. At the same time, it will reward those "loyal customers" who already contribute to NYRA's bottom line year-round by wintering regularly in New York.

Best of all, from the point of view of NYTB and the Fund, New York-breds stand to gain the most added-value from the loyalty program. In 2017 at Aqueduct, the program's target racetrack, New York-breds accounted for 53% of all starts (3,332) and won 50% of the races (420) while taking home 45% of the purse money. Last year that amounted to \$20.25 million. The horses that race at Aqueduct next winter will have an opportunity to improve on those numbers.

Consider a New York-sired New York-bred that makes his seventh NYRA start in the program window. He runs for 7.5% more purse money than his non-New York-bred counterparts (who statistically will have less starts), which benefits his owner and trainer and generates increased program awards for his breeder and his sire's owner. One could view that this loyalty program offers an indirect way to create purses for New Yorkbreds equivalent or even greater than open races.

Taken as a whole, NYRA's new program holds the promise of being a big win for all; mitigating the racetrack operator's problems of field size, handle, and race quality in winter; leveling the playing field for smaller barns that already contribute to NYRA's bottom line year-round; and providing significant added-value for breeders, owners, and trainers of New York-breds and New York stallion owners.

I, for one, am eager to see how this program pans out in the coming year. \square

First Mares Reported in Foal to Union Jackson

First mares are reported in foal to multiple stakes winner Union Jackson at Sequel Stallions New York near Hudson.

Hoboken Honey, a winner by Rockport Harbor, was covered for Mr. Amore Stables. One Gun, a Malibu Moon mare out of graded stakes winner Necessary Evil was covered for Sequel Thoroughbreds. Gift of Giving, a Regal Classic mare with three winners and progeny earnings of \$182,613, was covered for Hidden Lake & Rapid Run Farm. Reiana, by Majestic Warrior, from immediate family of Canadian 2-year-old filly champion Fantasy Lake, was covered for Saratoga Glen Farm. All four mares are in foal.

"We've had an incredible amount of interest and support from top New York breeders for Union Jackson and

we believe he is going to reward them for it," said Becky Thomas. "The Sequel/Stonestreet venture is putting nearly \$500,000 in nice mares under him ourselves, so we are thrilled that he is proficient in his new role."

A 6-year-old son of Curlin—Hot Dixie Chick by Dixie Union, Union Jackson was bred in Kentucky by Barbara Banke's Grace Thoroughbred Holdings, campaigned by her Stonestreet Stables, and trained throughout his career by Steve Asmussen.

He won six races by a combined margin of 26¹/₄ lengths, including an 8¹/₄-lengths score in the Sam Houston Sprint Cup. He took his final outing, the six-furlong Iowa Sprint Handicap, in 1:08.75.

Union Jackson is standing as a joint venture between Stonestreet Stables and Sequel New York for \$5,000.

NY-BRED BRINGS \$550,000 AT OBS MARCH

New York-bred juveniles at the two-day Ocala Breeders' Sales' March sale got the state program's 2-year-old auction season off to a rollicking start.

Nine individuals, all colts, brought \$250,000 or more. The buy-back rate of for the state-bred contingent was far better than the overall RNA rate. Other key indicators were on a par with the sale's total figures.

From 37 individuals offered over the auction's two sessions March 13-14, 32 New York-breds changed hands. The resulting 13.5% buy-back rate was dramatically better than the 30% RNA percentage for the general population of the sale. As to the other indicators, New York-breds posted an average price of \$155,406, which was comparable to the sale average of \$164,854. Their \$102,5000 median was comparable to the \$105,000 sale median.

NY-BREDS START WITH AN ADVANTAGE

FOURSTAR CROOK LANDS **GRADE 2 HILLSBOROUGH**

Benefiting from a beautifully judged ride by Irad Ortiz Jr., Fourstar Crook rallied strongly down the center of the course to win the grade 2 Hillsborough Stakes March 10 at Tampa Bay Downs. It was the second graded stakes victory and 10th lifetime win from 15 starts for the New York-bred 6-year-old



mare, who has earned \$813,166 for owners Michael Dubb, Gary Aisquith, and Michael Caruso's Bethlehem Stables.

A \$110,000 purchase by Dubb from the Parrish Farms consignment at the 2014 Fasig-Tipton Midlantic sale of 2-year-olds in training, Fourstar Crook marked a milestone for her sire Freud in 2016, when she became the Storm Cat horse's 50th stakes winner by winning the Yaddo Stakes at Saratoga.

Fourstar Crook, trained by Chad Brown, was bred by Kathleen Feron from Avril a Portugal, a non-winner but a full sister to listed stakes winner Jav's Crown. Their sire D'Accord, a grade 2-winning son of Secretariat and 1970 Canadian Horse of the Year Fanfreluche, was a useful New York stallion, while their dam, the Damascus mare Emiress, is a full sister to graded stakes winners Honorable Miss, Bailjumper, and Syrianna and to multiple graded stakes producer Avichi.

Avril a Portugal is also the dam of Fourstar Crook's 2-year-old full sister Kitty's Legacy, a \$110,000 yearling at the 2017 Fasig-Tipton Saratoga preferred New York-bred yearling sale.




First Winner for Heavy Breathing

New York sire Heavy Breathing was represented by his first winner March 25 when 3-year-old filly Status Asthmaticus rallied from off the pace to win the fourth race at Aqueduct. Status Asthmaticus is owned by her trainer Collin Maragh in partnership with the filly's co-breeders Sunrise Stables and Golden Goose Enterprises.

Status Asthmaticus is the first foal out of the Silver Train mare Pylortes, who was purchased as a yearling by Steven Howell for \$2,200. She has produced two full siblings to Status Asthmaticus and was bred last year to Cornerstone.

Heavy Breathing, by Giant's Causeway out of Takesmybreathaway, is a full brother to Frost Giant, New York's leading sire of 2018. A graded stakesplaced runner, Heavy Breathing stands for a partnership that includes Andrew Cohen's Sunset Stables, Gary Tolchin's Golden Goose Enterprises, and Well Found Management. He is located at Irish Hill & Dutchess Views Stallions where he stands for a private fee.

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

To put earnings on par, all Japanese progeny earnings are multiplied by 47% before being credited to a sire's progeny earnings. Hong Kong earnings are adjusted by 15%; Singapore by 68%. Current year stakes winners include all Northern Hemisphere black-type stakes results from all available countries. *Foal counts include Southern Hemisphere. Lumulative stakes winners include all countries.

The Fund as Family

The people behind the New York State Thoroughbred Breeding and Development Fund

ASKED ABOUT HER POSITION with the New York State Thoroughbred Breeding and Development Fund, comptroller Jill LaBoissiere downplays her behind-the-scenes role in an industry known for its fast, beautiful athletes; its history and traditions; its thrilling contests.

"My job is pretty boring," she said with a laugh, speaking from the Fund's office in Schenectady, N.Y. "It's all counting and numbers. I track deposits, I create financial reports, and every two months, I get the breeders' awards in the mail."

Despite her modest demurral, that last responsibility might make her one of the most popular people in New York's breeding industry, which stretches from farms just outside the New York metropolitan area to the Canadian border and across the 300-mile width of the state.

Established by state law in 1973, the Fund created an incentive to breed and race horses in New York rather than ship them to other states. It sets and enforces rules for New York-bred status, oversees the New York-bred registration process for foals and stallions, and distributes financial awards to breeders and owners of New York-bred horses and New Yorkbased stallions.

The Fund also provides purse money for races for New York-breds at Aqueduct Racetrack, Belmont Park, Saratoga Race Course, and Finger Lakes Race Track.

Executive director Tracy Egan's road to a leadership position in the state's breeding industry began, as she tells it, in her crib. "I can remember the wallpaper in my nursery," she said. "It was a fantastic foxhunting scene, with horses and hounds, and I wanted to be in that picture."

As she got older, she'd watch racing from Aqueduct with her father on television, and when her parents denied her request for a pony, saying they couldn't afford it, she started saving and at age 15 came home with a Quarter Horse mare that took up residence in a barn on their property in Ballston Lake.

Through her years as a reporter and anchor for news stations in New York City and Albany, she never stopped thinking about owning a racehorse. She began studying pedigrees and race results, and in 1990 she launched a modest racing and breeding operation when the first foal was born on her farm.

"At that time," she said, "my bills matched the purses. For a small breeder like me, the only way to make money was through breeders' awards."

Deciding it was time to leave the news business—"I was 39, and they told me I was too old to be on TV"—she got a call from John Sabini, a former chair of the New York Racing and Wagering Board, who encouraged her to get involved with racing and breeding on an organizational level, and she joined the Fund as executive director in 2010.

She became part of a team with decades of experience at the Fund, some members of which, like her, came to the Fund from other professional roles in horse racing, some of which came with less official connections to the sport.

Registrar Adam Lawrence grew up in Saratoga Springs and describes himself as a "lifelong racing fan," going to the harness and the flat track in Saratoga since he was 8 years old. A technical writer in his previous job, he was recommended by a friend to the Fund, which hired him as assistant registrar in 2008. He was promoted to his current position in 2013, and it is he who determines that all the qualifications to be a New York-bred have been satisfied and that a given horse is eligible for breeder and owner awards.

"It's fun for me to be able to see the sport from this perspective," he said,



"and now it's my job to stay up on it."


Among his favorite New York-breds is Cluster of Stars, a multiple graded stakes winner who retired in 2013 at 3 with an undefeated record in seven starts. She sold in 2014 for \$300,000, and her first foal, Kenzie, a 2015 filly by Graydar, is undefeated in two starts this year at Hollywood Casino at Charles Town Races after debuting on the New York circuit last year.

out and then begin to increase steadily, Lawrence has also witnessed, and been instrumental in, moving the Fund into the digital world.

Over the last few years Lawrence worked with a software team to develop programs and databases for information that used to be handled manually; he remembers having to scour spreadsheets for registration information that he can now access with a couple of keystrokes, an essential efficiency upgrade, especially given the rising foal crop in

the state. While much of Lawrence's work can be done at his computer in the Fund's Schenectady office, he not uncommonly takes field trips with the twoman farm inspection team, on whose eyes and information he relies to determine Fund eligibility.

Registry compliance team inspectors Tom Reynolds and Tom Conley's tools include digital technology and old-fashioned legwork as they visit the state's breeding farms. They go to each farm twice a year, monitoring whether mares and stallions meet the state's requirements for eligibility by traveling as much as 40 weeks a year.

Reynolds, who started working at the Fund 26 years ago and whose territory includes the Hudson Valley and Capital Region, got his start in the racing business fetching water buckets at Belmont Park, across the street from the high school that the Floral Park native attended. He worked for Hall of Famer Woody Stephens before deciding that the life of a trainer wasn't for him and headed to work in the New York Racing Association's racing office.

He's on the road for several days most


weeks, visiting farms to ensure that the mares are meeting the residence requirements for New York-bred foals. He uses records and foal papers from The Jockey Club, inspects tattoos, and reviews shipping paperwork to verify that the mares supposed to be on a given farm are in fact there, or were there when they were supposed to be.

"My job is to make sure that all the farms are on an even playing field," he

said. "It's about integrity and making sure that everyone knows that we're not looking the other way."

When Reynolds began working for the Fund, his former employer had just been given shares in the stallion Danzig by owner Henryk de Kwiatkowski.

"Woody loved the idea of being able to breed mares and get an awards check," Reynolds recalled. "He talked to me for an hour about it when I got

this job. He never talked to me when I worked for him."

Farms such as Gallagher Stud and Bill Wilmot and Joan Taylor's Stepwise Farm are relatively easy to inspect; they don't have a lot of horses, and their mares don't do a lot of traveling.

"A farm like Sequel Stallions or Mc-Mahon Thoroughbreds, that's a different story," Reynolds said. "They have stallions, so there are a lot of mares coming in and out, and we have to keep track of whether the mare has been bred back to a New York stallion."

Conley, a former Standardbred trainer at Roosevelt Raceway who went on to work as a horse identifier for NYRA, covers the state west of the Hudson River, and he adds another factor that can prove challenging to the job: the weather.

"This week I was checking mares in a paddock with a couple of feet of snow that had frozen into glaciers," he joked. "I try not to visit the Buffalo farms in January and February."

However, both are quick to point out the perks of the job, especially for horse lovers. On a recent visit to Milfer Farm near Unadilla, Conley snapped a photo of the snow-covered grave of Spectacular Bid, noting not many people remember or know the horse often called "the greatest horse to look through a bridle" is buried there, the last farm at which he stood as a stallion.

"Tm in awe of some of the horses I get to see," said Reynolds. "I go to Edition Farm and I get to see La Verdad, and at Stepwise, I see all those mares producing good horses for Bill Wilmot and Joan Taylor."

After 20 years on the job, Conley will retire later this year, so he'll miss the introduction of microchips into the identifying process; beginning last year, The Jockey Club required that all registered foals be microchipped. Now, Conley relies primarily on horses' markings, using papers from The Jockey Club to match registration to the mare. He's also armed with horses' tattoo numbers, but their tendency to fade makes them an unreliable and, at times, im-

possible confirmation of a horse's identity.

Since becoming the Fund's director, Egan has made it a priority to tighten procedures and introduce protocols to ensure the program's integrity.

"We are darned strict about following the rules, inspecting farms, and making sure that mares are there," she said. "The awards in New York are great, and if you're going to have access to them, horses ship around."

LaBoissiere admits everything she's learned about horses, racing, and breeding has come from the Fund.

"I've learned a lot," she said, "but it's been a steep learning curve."

After attending school part-time and earning a degree at Siena College, La-Boissiere passed the exam to become a certified public accountant; after working as a CPA, she decided, "That's not for

you have to contribute something to New York State, whether it's boarding or foaling or breeding to a New York stallion."

"Nobody that I know of ever tried to intentionally put one over on me," said Conley. "Sometimes people make honest mistakes, such as when horses ship from Florida and the halters get switched, but once I look at them, I know that's not the right horse. It can get confusing when me," and took a year off to travel around the United States with her husband. She started with the Fund in early 2014 on a temporary assignment, which turned into a permanent position.

Since her arrival, the Fund has adjusted the way it pays out awards to partnerships.

Formerly each individual partnership in a horse would receive an awards check. For big syndicates such as Cen-

tennial Farms or West Point Thoroughbreds, with a number of horses all with different partnership groups, the process could get unwieldy. well, courtesy of the Fund's backing.

Board chair John Poklemba who was appointed to the New York State Gaming Commission by Gov. Andrew Cuo-

"Now one check goes to the managing partner, along with a letter breaking down the awards by horse, and the managing partner can distribute the money to the individual partners," LaBoissiere said. "It's a lot more efficient."

Under the board of director's leadership, the Fund has instituted a number of other initiatives, including a \$7,000 first-place bonus to New York-sired horses that break their maiden at Finger Lakes. Further purse enhancements are expected at New York tracks this year as mo, said the Fund continues to support Thoroughbred aftercare in the state and hopes it can do more.

"We need to address this issue and make sure that after their racing careers are over, horses are taken care of appropriately," Poklemba said.

A breeder who has some of her own retired horses on her farm near Ballston Lake, Egan echoed Poklemba's sentiment.

"I truly believe the tipping point has come," she said. "Before agreeing to get

into racing, most people want to know that the horse is always going to be cared for and can move on to a good, safe place to transition to another career."

"It's costly to keep retirees," she acknowledged, "but we need to show as an industry that we really do care what happens to the horses."

At the suggestion of Wilmot, the Fund has also introduced a scholarship program of which Egan is particularly proud.

"I love the fact that since I came here the Fund started giving scholarships to equine studies students as part of our legislative stated mission," she said. "We started programs to get young people interested in horses, supporting Cornell's Cooperative Extension program and 4-H programs. We also have a fellowship program for equine studies students in New York.

"Students have told me that they've raised their horsemanship and really learned to admire and appreciate the people who work on the backstretch," she said.

Over the last 10 years the Fund's revenue and its awards disbursement have increased by nearly 100%, thanks in large part to casino revenue. While gaming revenue for racing has sometimes come under fire at times from New York State government officials, chair Poklemba, a Gaming Commission appointee, suggests that criticism is likely to come from people unaware of the advantages of the state's racing and breeding industries.

"They have not familiarized themselves with the number of farms involved, the jobs created, the entire industry that the Fund supports," he said. "If you look at how much individual farms have been improved by these resources and how many people are employed, you'd see that the state's agricultural business is enhanced by this Fund."

According to a recently released study by the American Horse Council, the equine industry is second only to the dairy industry in economic impact in the state, with \$5.3 billion in economic output. Added Poklemba, "The governor is very committed to maintaining New York's breeding industry."

"I think that one of the reasons that the amount of awards has gone up is that one of our main focuses is to tell the public, through racing and breeding periodicals, in print and online, how well New York-bred horses do on the track and in the sales ring," said Egan. "It's no longer unusual to have a New York-bred win a grade 1 stakes race."

Awards are calculated as a percentage of a race's purse, and even though individual race awards are capped, with \$40,000 the highest possible breeder award for a single equine performance, at one point, she said, the Fund considered purchasing insurance to cover the cost if a New York-bred won a race such as the Travers Stakes (G1) or the Kentucky Derby (G1), a race with an unusually high purse, which would result in an unusually high award.

"We were told that, basically, we couldn't afford the insurance because New York-breds so commonly win grade 1 races."

The mission statement of the Fund is "to promote by monetary incentives the responsible breeding of quality Thoroughbred racehorses in keeping with the founding legislation to preserve New York's irreplaceable farmland," said Jeff Cannizzo, the executive director of New York Thoroughbred Breeders.

"The Fund's \$15-plus million dollar awards system, along with NYRA's \$40-plus million dollar restricted racing program, is what drives the breeding industry in the state. The value of a New York-bred is directly related to its value on the racetrack. Here in New York our state-breds are worth so much via racing that it has established a commercial market, where these days we see yearlings at Fasig-Tipton average \$90,000. Essentially every other regional state in the country has modeled its breeders' program off what New York's been doing since the 1970s. Their problem is that they can't offer the same opportunities on the racetrack or the subsequent commercial value that New York can."

to promote the benefits of racing and breeding in New York for the Fund.

"Our numerous events like the Divisional Champions Awards, our various print media (including this publication), online with our website and weekly electronic newsletter, social media, advertising, our seminars, all of that is a result of our promotional services contract with the Fund," he explained.

Much like Poklemba, Bennett Liebman has served in several roles related to New York racing, and, much like Poklemba, he has an easy answer for critics of the Fund. Currently a government lawyer-in-residence at the Government Law Center at Albany Law School, Liebman has also served as Gov. Cuomo's deputy secretary for racing and gaming and is an authority on the history of New York racing law.

"You'd be hard-pressed to find an independent, academic economist who would argue that funding sports enterprises such as stadiums or horse racing is good economics or good for the state," he said. "But in the real world, where every state is competing against each other, the Fund has created a legitimate industry that provides real jobs."

You'd get no argument from the owners and breeders that will, on occasion, get a call from comptroller LaBoissiere, usually because an awards check hasn't been cashed.

"There's no reason you wouldn't want to talk to me," she said with a chuckle. "I'm calling because I want to give you money."



Drs. Bill Wilmot, Joan Taylor catch Oaks fever with Midnight Disguise

Spring in Their Steps

WHILE DRS. JOAN TAYLOR AND BILL WILMOT were still in veterinary school back in 1981, the couple purchased a plot of land on Fitch Road near Saratoga Springs, N.Y. They named it Stepwise Farm to reflect their ongoing and patient renovation of the property. Patient, indeed. Their first Thoroughbred didn't set foot on the property until 1990. In the decades that have passed since, the hardworking duo has found their way among the state's most recognized breeders. The couple is responsible for breeding such New York-bred standouts as Incurable Optimist, Naughty New Yorker, and Twisted Tom.

Taylor and Wilmot are currently riding high on the racing scene with their second-generation homebred Midnight Disguise, a towering sophomore daughter of Midnight Lute, out of Thin Disguise, by Yes It's True.

Authoritative winner of both the Jan. 25 Busanda and March 3 Busher stakes at Aqueduct, Midnight Disguise, who stands at 17.2 hands, has all but assured herself a stall in the starting gate (amassing 60 qualifying points) for the May 4 Longines Kentucky Oaks (G1). But first the stretch-running filly is scheduled to compete April 7 in Aqueduct's Gazelle Stakes (G2). Both the Gazelle and Oaks are at nine furlongs.

"Holiday Disguise (by Harlan's Holiday), a 4-year-old half sister to Midnight Disguise, was a very pretty well-made filly that fit the bell curve at 16 hands," said Wilmot. "A lot of people liked her. She brought \$70,000 as a weanling at Keeneland."

Holiday Disguise was pinhooked to the 2015 Fasig-Tipton Saratoga sale of preferred New York-breds where trainer Linda Rice went to \$220,000 to buy her. The filly has won the Bouwerie and Biogio's Rose stakes for Lady Sheila Stable. "But Midnight Disguise was more of an ugly duckling," Wilmot continued. "Gangly and long-legged. Thin Disguise throws offspring that look just like the stallion. And Midnight Lute stands at 17.1. She was definitely outside of the bell curve. She also had some early issues that stopped her from going into a sale."

That was an incredibly fortuitous set of circumstances for Taylor and Wilmot, who eventually sent Midnight Disguise to Rice, and now own one of the early favorites for the Kentucky Oaks.

"We were so happy Thin Disguise finally got her stakes winner (first in 2017 with Holiday Disguise, then in 2018 with Midnight Disguise). She'd been producing really nice foals that were just falling short of winning stakes," said Taylor. "With broodmares, it's better to sell them before they reach age 13. For many buyers that's the cut-off age. And as we've gotten older, we're sort of reinventing our breeding business. So we thought it was the right time to test the waters with her."

Thin Disguise was purchased earlier this year at the Keeneland January mixed sale by Mike McMahon for Mc-Mahon & Hill Bloodstock (from Denali Stud) for \$100,000. Taylor and Wilmot promptly reinvested, purchasing a lessthan-majority share in the mare who is in foal to Bodemeister.

"We remember Mike from when he was a 10-year-old kid, and we did vet work at the McMahon's farm (McMahons' of Saratoga). He'd walk into the barn and say 'Hello, doctors,' wearing a Yankees cap. At the Keeneland sale (in January), we were looking for seats in the lunchroom. We finally scoped some out and a few minutes later, Mike and his mother, Ann, sat down beside us. It was fate," said Wilmot, who proceeded to tell them the virtues and strong progenv record of Thin Disguise. "After the mare sold. I watched to see where the ticket was going, and it landed with Mike."

Taylor and Wilmot have a well-structured breeding philosophy for their broodmares that has cultivated strong success.

"Generally, when we get a new mare, we send her to a proven stallion. We first

sent Thin Disguise to Quiet American and got a beautiful weanling (a 2011 colt named American Creed, who won eight races and earned \$298,909)," said Taylor. "We consider both pedigree and physical characteristics. We're old-fashioned in that we try to keep a mare for generations, to learn about the physical types she produces. Bill has an outstanding knowledge of pedigree that goes back a long way."

"I've been a student of pedigree since the 1960s, stretching back to Dr. Fager and Damascus. I try to keep aware of patterns that seem to work," said Wilmot, who as a trainer saddled Gold and Myrrh to victory in the 1975 Metropolitan Handicap, G1, defeating Forego.

Wilmot's knowledge of breeding patterns led the couple to purchase the mare Naughty Natisha (by Known Fact), who was in foal to Unbridled (by Fappiano) in November 1998. They were specifically enthralled by the Fappiano/In Reality cross (In Reality being the sire of Known Fact). That future offspring turned out to be Pupil, winner of more than \$200,000.

In 2002 Naughty Natisha produced Naughty New Yorker, a grade 3 winner of more than \$1 million and named 2007 New York-bred Horse of the Year.

"He (Naughty New Yorker) was so cool. He was tough and sound, the ultimate racehorse, who placed in the Hill 'n' Dale Cigar Mile (G1, finished third in 2007)," said Wilmot.

Correspondingly, Naughty Natisha was named New York Broodmare of the Year in 2007. That was one year after she'd produced Thin Disguise through her mating with Yes It's True.

"Yes It's True was one of the most handsome horses I've ever seen, and Thin Disguise looks like just him," said Wilmot.

Taylor and Wilmot named Thin Disguise for a lyric in the song "Lyin' Eyes" by their favorite band the Eagles. The couple had paid tribute to the Eagles before by naming a 2003 filly by Thunder Gulch—Miss Turlington, by Seattle Slew—Tiffany Twisted, for a phrase from the song "Hotel California."

> In 2014 Tiffany Twisted produced Twisted Tom (by Creative Cause), a multiple

stakes winner of more than \$600,000 during the gelding's sophomore campaign.

The couple had previously bred 1998's New York Horse of the Year, Incurable Optimist. That came as a result of sending their broodmare Miss Turlington to longtime New York leading sire Cure the Blues (by Stop the Music), producing the turf-loving and multiple stakes-winning runner, who flourished in the barn of trainer David Donk.

Wilmot became a staunch fan of Seattle Slew, Miss Turlington's sire, after being stabled beside Billy Turner's barn during the Hialeah Park meeting of 1977, and seeing the eventual Triple Crown winner on a daily basis.

As the racing season edges forward and Midnight Disguise ascends the ladder into graded stakes competition, Taylor and Wilmot see a bright and welldeserved future for their runner and her dam, Thin Disguise, who will be bred to 2017 Horse of the Year Gun Runner.

Still, the experienced owner/breeders understand that nothing is guaranteed in the Thoroughbred game, and relying on yesterday's laurels can land you nowhere fast tomorrow.

"Luck plays a large part in breeding, but I do think we have an advantage in being vets," said Taylor. "There are transitions in the industry, and things change every 10 years or so. It's very easy to get humbled in this business when you start to believe that you know everything. You have to continually keep your eyes open and study."

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INHERIT LIGHTNING SPEED IN YOUR FOALS

RIGHT ON TIME

Split Time rallies to take one-mile Maddie May

BECKY THOMAS, OWNER OF SEQUEL NEW YORK near Hudson, watched Aqueduct's March 24 Maddie May Stakes from Gulfstream Park while preparing for the Fasig-Tipton Florida selected 2-year-olds in training sale. Thomas' gaze was focused on the even-money favorite Split Time (by Take Charge Indy), racing in the silks of Tic Stables and bred by Sequel Stallions New York.

"The scenario (of how Split Time came to be bred by Sequel) could have played out 10 times over and not turn out this well for us. Most of the time I probably would have had to donate the mare to a rescue farm," she said.

Split Time's dam, Speed Dating, shipped to Thomas in foal to Take Charge Indy. Her original owner had suffered some serious economic setbacks. After some back-and-forth negotiations, Thomas agreed to take possession of the Not For Love mare.

"It turned out to be a good cross, and we're very pleased with the success of Split Time," said Thomas, who'll breed Speed Dating later this year to multiple stakes winner Union Jackson (by Curlin), a Sequel stallion.

During the early stages of the \$98,000 Maddie May, Split Time looked to be sitting on ready while racing down the backstretch. The Linda Rice-trained 3-year-old filly sat a perfect trip at the rail behind a pair of early pacesetters in the field of five.

But as the field moved around the far turn, after an opening half-mile in :46.97, the seemingly ideal trip jockey Junior Alvarado had engineered for Split Time suddenly became much more challenging.

Lauren Linn's Our Super Nova (by Boys At Tosconova), with jockey Kendrick Carmouche in the saddle, sidled up on the outside of Split Time, effectively taking away the option of swinging wide for the drive.

Into the lane Our Super Nova, who is also trained by Linn, seized a short lead from the outside as the field came into the stretch and began to edge clear nearing the furlong marker.

Alvarado, who had come slightly off the rail spinning into the stretch, dove back down to the inside in search of a seam. When that opening didn't immediately materialize, Alvarado wheeled Split

Time to the middle of the track, where she suddenly found clear sailing and kicked it into high gear.

The determined Split Time surged past a game Our Super Nova in the final 70 yards, registering a half-length victory at the wire.

The time for the one-turn mile over the "fast" main track was 1:38.50.

"It was an interesting trip. Split Time is very tactical, and I think she has more natural speed than my other filly (in the race). I just told (the riders), whoever breaks well needs to take it, and the other needs to sit off (the pace) and settle," said Rice. "(Split Time) had some great, easy trips in her two previous wins. I was pretty impressed with her grittiness today. She had a difficult trip."

The Maddie May was the third straight victory for Split Time, who had broken her maiden by 6¼ lengths in her second career start in January, following that effort with a 5¼-length allowance optional claiming win in mid-February—all against state-breds.

Split Time, a \$62,000 purchase at the 2016 Fasig-Tipton Saratoga sale of preferred New York-bred yearlings, has earned \$138,200.

Our Super Nova was a solid runner-up in the Maddie May, finishing 3½ lengths ahead of Reddam Racing's Cause We Are Loyal (by Creative Cause), who rallied belatedly for third.

The race is named for So Madcapt Stable's Maddie May (by Not For Love), a multiple stakes winner who captured eight of 19 starts from 1999-2002 and earned \$408,551 under the tutelage of trainer Todd Pletcher.



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

REMEMBERING YOUNG PETER, MR. RIGHT, AND SILENT SCREEN

YOUNG PETER

Young Peter (1944; Peanuts—Mary Jane, by Pennant), bred by Robert L. Gerry, won several stakes for Gerry's wife, Martha, while competing against some of the best of his generation as a 3-year-old. He had an abbreviated 2-year-old campaign,

winning one race in four starts. After beginning his sophomore season by losing an allowance race at Jamaica, he won three straight allowance races in a two-week period from April 21-May 5. That modest winning streak was snapped when Young Peter finished fourth in the Peter Pan Handicap at 7-1. Greentree Stable's Tailspin was the winner at 37-1, while C.V. Whitney's 9-10 favorite, Wood Memorial Stakes winner Phalanx, was third. The Peter Pan was the first of four times that Phalanx and Young Peter would hook up in stakes races that season.

Young Peter's next start came in the Belmont Stakes, in

which he finished fourth at odds of 18-1. Phalanx, the 2-1 second choice with his stablemate Khyber Pass, was first by five lengths, and Calumet's Faultless, the 3-4 favorite after winning the Withers Stakes and the Preakness Stakes in his two previous starts, finished fifth. After taking a 35-day breather, Young Peter won the Providence Stakes at Narragansett Park followed by the Choice Stakes on a sloppy track at Monmouth Park. On Aug. 16 he won his third straight stakes, and his second straight race on a sloppy track, when he took Saratoga's historic Travers Stakes.

Due to the sloppy conditions only two other colts competed against him, with Phalanx, the 1-2 favorite finishing a close second and longshot Colonel O'F bringing up the rear, 2½ lengths farther back.

Young Peter became the fourth New York-bred to win the Travers, the others being Ruthless (1867), Glenelg (1869), and Sun Flag (1924). He ended the 1947 season by finishing sixth in the Discovery Handicap, with Phalanx finishing third.

Young Peter did not race in 1948 because of foot problems, and he won only one race, a handicap, in nine starts before he was retired to stud duty.

MR. RIGHT

Solomon G. Zauderer, a millionaire hotel owner and real estate operator, acquired horses for his racing stable at Fasig-Tipton sales or by breeding his own at trainer Tom Waller's Tanrackin Farm in northern Westchester County. By the latter method he came up with New York-bred Mr. Right, whom he gave to his daughter Cheray as a wedding present when she married the entertainer Peter Duchin.

Trained by Waller, Mr. Right (1963; Auditing—La Grecque, by Tehran) was a typical late developer, compiling one win, a 2-year-old claiming race, in 11 starts in 1965 (he did run second in the New York Breeders Futurity at Finger Lakes).

He began his 3-year-old season by winning two of four allowance efforts. On July 5 he won a one-mile allowance race at odds of 7-2, which served as a prelude to his emergence as a horse to be reckoned with in his division, On July 16 he won the Dwyer Handicap at Aqueduct at 3-1. Weight made a difference, as Mr. Right carried the lowest in the field at 110 pounds while the 9-5 favorite, Amberoid (coincidentally, trained by Waller), that year's Belmont winner, toted 126 pounds.

Mr. Right lost his next six starts after the Dwyer, breaking that losing streak Nov. 12 by taking the Roamer Handicap on a sloppy track at Aqueduct. He ended his 1966 season by finishing second in the Stuyvesant Handicap, giving him a record for the year of five wins, four seconds, and one third in 16 starts with earnings of \$133,079.

Mr. Right's 1967 campaign was, for the most part, a disappointing one. He only had two allowance wins in his first 11 starts. He faced stiff competition in

some of his stakes races, however, finishing fifth to Buckpasser in the Metropolitan Handicap and third to Handsome Boy and Buckpasser in the Brooklyn Handicap. He ended the season by taking the first of his three Trenton Handicaps at Garden State Park and winning the Queens County Handicap at Aqueduct. He defeated the 1966 Kentucky Derby-winning Proud Clarion in the latter while getting a 10-pound weight concession. Mr. Right's 1967 record was four wins and four thirds in 13 starts with earnings of

\$108,470, helping keep the wolf away from the Duchins' door.

After a month and a half rest Mr. Right traveled to California to prepare for the 1968 Santa Anita Handicap. After losing two turf stakes, he returned to the main track with a second in the



San Pasqual Handicap at 7-2. However, his last race before the Big 'Cap was not encouraging, as he finished last of 10 in the San Antonio Stakes.

On March 9 all memories of the San Antonio were forgotten as Mr. Right won the biggest race of his career at

that point when he took the Santa Anita Handicap at 19-1. Quicken Tree, the second favorite, finished fourth, and the co-favorite, the Australian Tobin Bronze was far back.

The effect of the win on New Yorkbred racing was not overlooked on the East Coast: "Mr. Right's achievement lends encouragement to a small but rapidly growing breeding industry in the Empire State" commented the *New York and Brooklyn Daily*.

Mr. Right followed his Santa Anita Handicap by returning home and losing his next seven races. Included were a seventh and last in the Excelsior Handicap, a sixth in the Grey Lag Handicap, a second in the Amory L. Haskell Handicap (with Bold Hour first and Damascus, the 3-5 favorite third), and a third in the Brooklyn Handicap (with Damascus first and Dr. Fager, second).

He traveled to Saratoga and finished sixth in an allowance race as the evenmoney favorite.

After winning an allowance race and finishing second in Belmont Park's Stymie Handicap, he won what arguably was the best race of his career when he beat the 1-10 favorite Damascus at equal weights in the Woodward Stakes at Belmont. Joe Nichols of the New York *Times* called it "one of the most startling upsets of the Thoroughbred season."

The only other horses to win the unique coast-to-coast Santa Anita Handi-

cap and Woodward double are National Hall of Fame inductees Affirmed (1979), Spectacular Bid (1980), and Alysheba (1988), along with Shaman Ghost (2017).

The Woodward was the last race Mr. Right ran in the Duchin silks. A day before the running of the Jockey Club Gold Cup he was sold to real estate developer Daniel Schwartz for \$400,000. Later some other backers were added, including Frank Sinatra, and the ownership name was changed to the Dansar Stable.

Almost one month after Mr. Right's stunning upset in the Woodward, he met Damascus one more time in the Jockey Club Gold Cup. He finished fourth to Quicken Tree, whom he had beaten in the Big 'Cap while the 6-5 Damascus finished sixth and last after bowing a tendon. It was the last race of Damascus' Hall of Fame career.

Mr. Right finished the year with his second Trenton Handicap victory and a seventh in the Queens County Handicap as the 5-2 favorite. He won four of 18 starts, with three seconds, and three thirds, with earnings of \$275,090.

Mr. Right began 1969 in California, the home of his new owners, splitting two turf allowances and finishing 11th in the Californian Stakes on the dirt. After returning to the East Coast, he finished second in an allowance race. On July 4 he captured another prestigious New York race when he won the Suburban Handicap at 3-1. The even-money favorite was the 3-year-old Dike, who had earlier won the Gotham Stakes and Wood Memorial Stakes. The rest of the year was an anticlimax, his only win in five starts being his third Trenton Handicap. After he finished third in the Queens County Handicap as the favorite, he was retired to stud.

His 1969 record was three wins, two seconds, and two thirds, with earnings of \$143,592. When he retired, his lifetime earnings of \$667,193 placed him in 31st place for total earnings of American race horses. Mr. Right was probably the most expensive wedding present in Thoroughbred history.

SILENT SCREEN

New York-bred Silent Screen (1967; Prince John—Prayer Bell, by Better Self) was bred by Albert R. Vesbo and his uncle, Dennis R. Noviello, at the Tilly Foster Stock Farm of Mr. and Mrs. Edward E. Benedict, located between Brewster and Carmel. He was bought for \$39,000 by Monmouth Park executive and New York Jets owner David A. "Sonny" Werblin, under the name of Elberon Farm, at the 1968 Fasig-Tipton Saratoga summer yearling sale.

He began his racing career Aug. 1, 1969, by finishing second in a 2-year-old maiden special weight race at Saratoga. That loss would be Silent Screen's lone setback that year. One week later he won a maiden race at Saratoga by 14 emphatic lengths as the 3-1 second choice. He was shipped to Chicago for the \$365,075, seven-furlong Arlington-Washington Futurity, at that time the richest race in America. The untested Silent Screen went off as the 4-1 third choice, with the Hopeful Stakes winner Irish Castle installed as the 9-5 favorite (a paperwork snafu had caused Silent Screen to miss the Hopeful). Silent Screen justified the comparatively short odds by winning by eight lengths, and the 2-year-old crop had a new leader.

The Arlington-Washington Futurity runaway got the attention of the bettors in his next race, the seven-furlong Cowdin Stakes Oct. 1 at Belmont Park, making him the 2-5 favorite. Although

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

he only won by a half-length, that close finish was the result of a stumble coming out of the gate. In addition, he nicked his right foreleg in the incident.

Ten days later he won the \$188,025 Champagne Stakes as the 9-10 favorite. With his handlers' sights on the Garden State Stakes, he was entered in the one mile and 70 yards Garden State Trial. He won easily as the 2-5 favorite, with the future 3-year-old star My Dad George finishing a non-threatening second. As it turned out, Silent Screen could not race in the Garden State because a filling discovered in his leg hours before the race, and the Trial became significant because it was the only time in his career Silent Screen won a race beyond a mile.

Silent Screen's 1969 record was five wins from six starts with earnings of \$397,966, which was the highest amount for a 2-year-old that year and the fourth highest for all ages. He was voted the best 2-year-old male in the country, the first time a New York-bred had been honored with what two years later would be

In his summary of Silent Screen's freshman season in the 1970 *American Racing Manual*, Charles Hatton saw nothing in his performances or breeding to indicate he would have problems in his quest for the Triple Crown, especially noting the staying influence of his sire, Prince John.

Despite his success as a 2-year-old and the appraisals of Mr. Hatton and others, Silent Screen's 1970 season was another example of a precocious 2-yearold whose distance limitations became evident when he advanced beyond a mile. He is a good reason why the term "the science of breeding" should be considered an oxymoron.

Silent Screen began his 3-year-old season on a high note Feb. 4 when he won the seven-furlong Bahamas Stakes as the 9-5 favorite. The race also extended his winning streak to six, and a run at the Triple Crown seemed promising. The optimism vanished March 3 when he finished eighth in the 1¹/₈-mile Flamingo Stakes at Hialeah. The winner was My Dad George, and Personality (the eventual Preakness Stakes winner and champion) finished fourth.

Silent Screen's troubles on the track continued when he finished third in the Gotham Stakes at Aqueduct. Observers found excuses, however. He conceded 12 pounds to the field, endured 36 hours on a van coming north, and had only one three-furlong breeze in preparing for the race. His next start, the Wood Memorial, resulted in a second to Personality, losing only by threequarters of a length.

His next three races proved his distance limitations. He finished fifth in the Kentucky Derby, third in the Preakness, and third in the 1¹/₈-mile Jersey Derby. After winning his second race of the year, the one-mile Saranac Handicap, he ended his season by finishing last in the 1¹/₁₆-mile The Minuteman Handicap at Liberty Bell. After losing three races in 1971, he was retired to stud duty, where he became a leading broodmare sire in Venezuela in 1992.


