

New York's Juvenile Program Drives Yearling Sale Market

I CAN BARELY WAIT for the Saratoga New York-bred preferred yearling sale later this month. I think all the pieces are in place for a truly spectacular auction.

The market for New York-bred yearlings in Saratoga has undergone a revolution in the past few years. In 2010—the last of the "lean years"—94 yearlings sold at the New York-bred sale for \$3.6 million, bringing an average price of \$39,106 and a median of \$30,000. In 2013 a record-breaking 196 yearlings changed hands in Saratoga for \$14.2 million. The yearling average was \$72,480 and the median was \$55,000. Forty-three yearlings brought \$100,000 or more.

Conceivably this summer's New York-bred sale could even eclipse last year's blockbuster edition. Not only did the sale attract a record number of more than 300 entries, but the New York-bred yearling pool is so deep that in the course of the inspection process Fasig-Tipton added an open session of New York-bred yearlings to the Oct. 7 fall mixed sale.

Why are both end-users and pinhookers finding New York-breds so attractive these days? First and foremost is the high quality of the individuals being bred by New York breeders. The horses themselves make the point on racetracks across the country virtually every weekend. So far in 2014 New York-breds have won 10 graded stakes, often in some very high-profile settings, like Belmont Stakes (gr. I) weekend and the New York Racing Association's inaugural Stars and Stripes Day July 5.

I think another huge factor is that people are finally understanding the opportunities afforded by breeding and racing in New York, especially the lucrative restricted stakes schedule, which is now laid out, in black and white, for the entire year. Prospective buyers have also noticed that the racing opportunities for New York-bred 2-year-olds are second to none.

Fourteen races for New York-bred juveniles worth \$2,150,000 will be run at NYRA tracks in 2014, and five races worth \$500,000 will be run at Finger Lakes Gaming & Racetrack. NYRA has boosted stakes purses for New York-bred 2-year-olds this year by \$1,050,000.

There are compelling reasons to buy New York-breds, and as Fasig-Tipton president Boyd Browning said, prospective buyers will find the "cream of the crop" at this summer's sale. I think that this may create a perfect storm from which both buyers and sellers walk away as winners. A



JULY A HOT MONTH FOR STATE-BREDS IN GRADED STAKES

Thomas Coleman had a decision to make. The Thoroughbred breeder/owner could hang out at the Hamptons to polish off his Fourth of July weekend, or come into town to Belmont Park to see his statebred outsider Zivo in the \$500,000 Suburban Handicap (gr. II).

The morning of July 5 trainer Chad Brown urged him to hit the road.

"I said, 'The horse is training well enough and he loves Belmont. Let's try it,' "Brown said.

It was a brash call considering Zivo would go postward that afternoon at 13-1...but it was the right one.

Coleman went to the track to see his 5-year-old horse move from last to first in the Suburban, topping top-level runners such as Moreno, Prayer for Relief, Mylute, and Last Gunfighter by an impressive three lengths in the historically significant race.

The win was Zivo's sixth consecutive victory, a streak stretching back to an allowance/optional claiming win Dec. 14, 2013, at the Big A. He came into the Suburban off a neck score under 123 pounds in the \$200,000 Commentator Handicap on Big Apple Showcase Day May 31. Earlier in the year he posted photo-finish wins in the Whodam and Kings Point stakes against New York-breds at Aqueduct.

Zivo, who was stretching out farther than in previous starts for the 1¼-mile Suburban, began the race in a characteristically unhurried fashion under Jose Lezcano, taking back and lingering in last through strong early fractions of :23.58 and :46.92.

Passing his first horses along the inside around the far turn, Zivo advanced quickly, making his way between rivals into fourth, leaving only three lengths to make up in upper stretch. Diving back down toward the rail, he continued his relentless rally to the front, cleared the pacesetting Moreno in the final furlong.

"Jose rode Zivo perfectly," said Brown. "We've always put him in races we think fit him. This horse has really come around well, and it was time to step out of New York-bred company and try him in an open company race with a big purse.

"Once I saw the strong pace, I knew he'd come running. That last eighth was definitely as strong as I've seen from him.

But then again, he's a horse that's only gotten better."

Foaled at Keane Stud near Amenia, Zivo is out of American Skipper, a three-time winner by Quiet American bred in Kentucky by Brereton C. Jones and campaigned by Stronach Stables. American Skipper, who earned \$202,211, has produced three winners from three foals to start. Her 4-year-old Officer filly named Clean Eleven is a New York-bred and her 2014 colt by Eskendereya was also foaled in New York.

Zivo's sire True Direction stood in New York from 2007 to 2008 at Keane Stud. A 15-year-old son of French Deputy—Ms Paragon, by Tank's Prospect, True Direction now stands at Haras Los Aguacates in Venezuela.

Never out of the trifecta in 15 career starts, Zivo has won four of six starts at Belmont Park. His record now stands at 9-2-4 and his bankroll stands at over three-quarters of a million dollars (\$782,300).

The following Saturday, July 12, Steve Taglienti's homebred Hangover Kid got to hang up his first graded stakes win while winning a tight photo in the Bowling Green Handicap (gr. IIT).

Third choice in the six-horse field at 9-2

and with Lezcano up, Hangover Kid was content to save ground early, tracking the pace in third as the race unfolded. Meanwhile, 18-1 longshot Horvat Clan enjoyed an uncontested lead, clocking comfortable fractions of :25.63, :51.93, 1:17.53 and 1:42.03 for a mile.

Caught behind a wall of horses in upper stretch, Hangover Kid found a seam just inside the eighth pole and scooted into second behind the new leader and 3-5 favorite Gran-(continued on page 10)

deur, who had rallied three wide. Hangover Kid and Grandeur battled head-tohead to the wire, with Hangover Kid just getting the nod. It was another three-quarters of a length back to Sky Blazer, who rallied for third while Boisterous, Reflecting, and Horvat Clan completed the order of finish. The final time for 12 furlongs was 2:28.18.

Trainer Jason Servis has big plans for Hangover Kid, who races for Four Tags Stable.

"We'd like to go to the Breeders' Cup with him," Servis said. "I don't know where he'll go next, but the Breeders' Cup is the ultimate goal."

Winner of the West Point Stakes for New York-breds last summer in Saratoga, Hangover Kid also placed in a pair of graded stakes in 2013. He came from last in a field of 12 to finish second in Aque-

duct's Red Smith Handicap (gr. IIIT) and rallied late to finish third in the United Nations Stakes (gr. IT) at Monmouth Park. Before his win in the Bowling Green, he had run second in the nine-furlong Monmouth Stakes (gr. IIT).

Hangover Kid, whose record now stands at 7-7-3 from 24 starts with \$625,203 in earnings, is the most successful of four winners out of Absolute Patience, an unraced Maryland-bred daughter of Rakeen. Absolute Patience has a 2-year-old filly by Munnings named Hold the Nutmeg and a yearling colt by Lookin At Lucky that are both registered New York-breds. The yearling is cataloged for the Fasig-Tipton New York-bred preferred yearling sale (Hip 218).

Although she did not produce a foal this year, according to Bruce Grossman, who manages Four Tags Stable, Absolute Patience was bred back to Lemon Drop Kid in 2014.

LA VERDAD ROLLS IN DANCIN RENEE

Lady Sheila Stable's La Verdad bounced back from her win in the Critical Eye Stakes May 31 on Big Apple Showcase Day to win the \$100,000 Dancin Renee Stakes July 3 at Belmont Park. It was the fourth consecutive stakes win for the daugher of Yes It's True trained by Linda Rice.

Sent off at 1-5 as she cut back to six furlongs from the one-mile Critical Eye, La Verdad got the trip in 1:09.99 over a "good" track, defeating stakes winner Willet by 1¾ lengths. Stakes winners Risky Rachel and Clear Pasaj were third and fourth, respectively.

Sheila Rosenblum raved about her talented filly.

"I'm usually not speechless, but with this filly...she's unbelievable," she said. "She's a dream come true. She just speaks for herself—she's all about New York."

La Verdad has won nine of 11 starts and has earned \$606,700.

La Verdad was bred by Eklektikos Stable, who sold her privately to Rosenblum following her second allowance victory last Nov. 7. Foaled at Chester and Mary Broman's Chestertown Farm near Chestertown, she is one of two winners out of the Hook and Ladder mare Noble Fire, a stakes-placed runner bred by the Bromans and also trained by Rice, who purchased her for \$115,000 at the Ocala Breeders' Sales Co.'s April sale in 2007. Noble Fire is also the dam of speedy Rice-

trained Eklektikos homebred gelding N. F.'s Destiny (by Cuvee), a four-time winner. Noble Fire currently has a 2-year-old filly by City Zip named Hot City Girl and delivered a filly by Freud May 22.

FOX RULES TOPS IN GENESEE VALLEY BREEDERS

Langpap Stables homebred Fox Rules (Roman Ruler), winner of five of six prior starts at Finger Lakes Gaming & Racetrack including the lucrative New York Derby in 2012, notched a sixth victory at the Farmington track on the Fourth of July when he held off Awesome Vision to win the \$50,000 Genesee Valley Breeders' Stakes

for New York-breds by a nose.

Fox Rules came into the 11/6-mile contest on the heels of a successful seasonal debut at Finger Lakes May 12. The 5-year-old gelding was the 2-1 second choice behind West Point Thoroughbreds' even-money favorite Awesome Vision.

Fox Rules led throughout but had to dig

deep to hold off Awesome Vision late. Talk Therapy held on for third, 2¾ lengths back. The time of the race was 1:45.42.

The victory improves Fox Rules' career record to 9-2-2 from 25 starts and increases his earnings to \$337,453

Bred by Langpap Stables' Dennis and Deborah Petrisak and foaled at Cornell University Research Park in Ithaca, Fox Rules is out of the Petrisaks' homebred state-bred champion Shesastonecoldfox. Voted top New York-bred 2-year-old filly in 2001, Shesastonecoldfox won three stakes races that year, headlined by a victory over males in the New York Breeders' Futurity.

As a broodmare, Shesastonecoldfox has produced five winners from five starters. Residing at Tom and Mia Gallo's Blue Stone Farm near Cambridge, she has a yearling filly by Lonhro and a weanling filly by Lookin At Lucky.

Clean Jean Makes 'Rite' Move at Finger Lakes

Neal M. Allread's 6-year-old mare Clean Jean, named Finger Lakes Gaming & Racetrack's horse of the meet in 2012 when she won eight of 15 starts there, won her first stakes victory July 5 in the \$50,000 Jack Betta Be Rite Stakes for New York-bred fillies and mares run at Finger Lakes.


Claimed by Jeremiah Englehart for \$20,000 in May, Clean Jean was the 2-1 second choice under Wilfredo Rohena. She won by 2½ lengths, getting the trip in 1:47.03.

A daughter of Ecton Park, Clean Jean made headlines in 2012 when she finished the year in a three-way tie nationally for most wins in the year with 10. With a pair of stakes placings, her record stands at 15-3-5 from 40 starts with \$231,795 in earnings.

Clean Jean was bred by Fran Ubbink, who named her as an affectionate tribute to her mother, who, as she reported, was always careful each week to make sure the house was immaculate before the arrival of the cleaning lady.

Clean Jean is one of two winners out of Easter Buddy, a winning daughter of Buddy. She has a 2-year-old gelding and a yearling filly by Stonesider and a weanling colt by Pomeroy.



Five Questions for...

Terence Collier has worked for the Fasig-Tipton sales company since 1976, when he came to the U.S. from England after being offered a job by Fasig-Tipton president John Finney. The sales company's affable director of marketing and one of its auctioneers, Collier has seen a lot of great horses sell to good people from his perch above the sale ring through the years. Before heading to Saratoga, he took a few minutes after the Fasig-Tipton Kentucky July yearling sale to chat with Evan Hammonds of *New York Breeder*.

How long have you been in the business of selling horses?

I joined Fasig-Tipton in 1976 and started working with the New York Breeders Fund immediately as a marketing and advertising consultant for Bill Welch who at that time was the head of the New York Thoroughbred Breeding and Development Fund.

Did you have a mentor in the sales company?

My overall patron saint was John Finney. Because he was the president of the company and moving around a lot, it fell on Larry Ensor's lap to take care of me. Both of them had a tremendous influence on my career at Fasig-Tipton. I learned my horsemanship from Larry, and I learned my business sense in the horse business from John. John never looked upon himself as a consummate horseman. He always trusted Larry's judgment, and Larry was much more involved in the selection processes and the


physical management of the sales. John was always involved in the higher mechanics of the sales company. John was the big thinker, and Larry was the everyday 'doer.'

What is it about Saratoga that makes it so special?

It wouldn't be special for me if Fasig-Tipton wasn't active there. As much as I enjoy Saratoga, the enjoyment that I get is being involved with the sales. It was such a seminal part of Fasig-Tipton's activities in the '60s and '70s. Things have changed. The whole perspective of us being the sales point of pretty much everybody outside of Kentucky was how I was brought up at Saratoga. Through the late '70s, '80s, and '90s, that has changed as a lot of the stud farms in the outlying areas have gotten out of the select yearling market and we have been recruiting mainly from agents. It changed, but it's special because it's always been Fasig-Tipton's number one sale and it's been held for longer than any other sale that Fasig-Tipton has held.

Any standout horses you've seen sold or memorable bidding


There have been so many I couldn't even begin to single one out. What makes it special is the arena (Humphrey S. Fin-



ney pavilion) is one of the smallest sales facilities to put a large crowd together and when you get in there, there is a buzz of excitement that you don't feel in any other sales arena in the world. It makes the hair on my neck stand up every time when I get up there in that seat on the first night of the sale.

What's the outlook for the New York-bred preferred yearling sale this year?

Our expectations with the way the market seems to be heading is for a very strong sale in both sections (Saratoga select sale and New York-bred sale). With the input from a number of well-thinking breeders and commercial breeders in the state of New York, they have created pretty much the "perfect storm" of circumstances to benefit from all of the money that is available to them from the New York State Thoroughbred Breeding and Development Fund. They have not tied it too tightly to residential restrictions and breed-backs. They are flexible on that, within the framework of their rules. And they have some spectacular racing available to them year round in four locations. I think they have managed the amount of money available to New York-breds extremely well, and I think that is going to pay them huge dividends. They've made all the right moves.

Sale Preview



ONE HAS ONLY TO flip through the first few pages of the catalog for this year's New York-bred preferred sale of yearlings to see the auction has become a major stop on the yearling sales calendar. Once home to mainly local consignments peddling to New York-based owners and trainers, Fasig-Tipton's sale now has a national presence.

In addition to the state's top sellers and the strong Kentucky consignors such as Craig and Holly Bandoroff's Denali Stud and Paramount Sales that have made their mark in upstate New York in recent years, have come more Kentucky consignors such as Bluewater Sales, Darby Dan, Gainesway, Lane's End, Warrendale Sales, and Winter Quarter Farm.

Last year's two-night sale saw 196 yearlings change hands for \$14,206,000, an average of \$72,480. Just three years prior 94 juveniles had sold for \$3,676,000 for an average of \$39,106. The growth of the New York-bred program is bringing out the heavy hitters.

"That's one of the biggest changes in the sale," said Jeff Cannizzo, executive

director of New York Thoroughbred breeders. "Now we have people who are national figures buying and selling at the marquee sale for New York-

breds."

The reason is pretty simple: The demand for New York-bred runners at Saratoga, Belmont Park, Aqueduct, and Finger Lakes Gaming & Racetrack is such that it is well worth the sellers' while to stick around a few days after the Fasig-Tipton Saratoga select yearling sale to market state-bred yearlings.

"In the early days you had to drag an agent there kicking and screaming because of the expenses of Saratoga,"

said Terence Collier, Fasig-Tipton's director of marketing. "It never justified these large agencies staying up there for an extra week and being there for a bunch of lower-priced yearlings, but now the market has caught up; they're all there and it's raised everything. The

competition between local agents and national agents has made everybody work harder and put on a better show."

And a better show it should be. This year's sale, Aug. 9-10 at the Humphrey S. Finney pavilion, has a record 316 yearlings cataloged. And it's not just sheer volume; the quality level of the New York breeding program has advanced over the last few years to support the quantity on offer.

"The perception of New York-breds has certainly changed and rightfully so," said Boyd Browning, president of Fasig-Tipton. "The quality of horses being pro-

duced is competitive with any horse in the world."

That statement can be backed by the success of New York-breds in open company this year. Two New York-breds made their way to the starting gate for the Kentucky Derby Presented by Yum! Brands (gr. I); La Verdad is a grade II winner this year in New York; Zivo won the Suburban Handicap (gr. II) July 5 at Belmont Park; and the next weekend New York-bred Hangover Kid took the Bowling Green Handicap (gr. IIT).

Up Arrows


The amount of money coming in to purchase New York-breds over the last few years has been substantial. Last year \$28 million was spent on state-bred yearlings, up 84% from the year before, and the average rose 24%. According to Cannizzo, 83 New York-bred yearlings sold for at least \$100,000 in 2013. Forty-three of the six-figure yearlings were sold during the preferred sale. Seven other New York-bred yearlings sold at the select sale for an average of \$192,857.

"Those are astronomical numbers when you look back on prices for New York-breds," he said.

Cannizzo, along with most everyone else, figures this year's marketplace can top that, based on the quality of offerings and the sire power from both Kentucky- and New York-based stallions (for a profile of New Yorkbased sires represented in the sale, see page 28).

"It's the reality or reflection of what the marketplace is producing," Browning said. "The good news is there are some very prominent and popular sires living in the state of New York that are

very well received commercially and are successful as stallions."

And it is not just the top-line of the pedigree that has buyers looking at New York-breds.

"The quality from a pedigree standpoint has jumped unbelievably, but more importantly, in the last five years the quality of the horsemanship has skyrocketed," said Harry Landry, who has six cataloged to the sale. "Early on there were some horses on the sale grounds that should not have been appearing. It has really improved. That's a feather in the cap of the breeders."

Landry has a history with New York-breds. The long-time vendor will be selling yearlings for the 45th year this summer and has been selling state-bred yearlings in upstate New York since they started selling them in the mid 1970s.

"Back in the day, even when we had that little fledging New York Breeders' Sales Co., we tried to put on seminars to encourage people to do a better job of prepping their horses," he said. "I don't know what paid off, but in any case in the last few years it has been evident that the level of horsemanship has improved."

Browning concurs.

"The bar has been raised in New York," he said. "The level of expertise of the breeders has skyrocketed in terms of preparation, and the quality of horses that are being raised. The ancillary services are getting better—the veterinary care, the blacksmiths, all those things have increased exponentially, and as a result the finished product on the sale grounds is outstanding."

Landry has also seen a shift in the buyers.

"Pinhookers have seen that they have a lot easier time of turning over and making a profit on a New York-bred rather than other horses they pinhook," he said. "If you have the pinhookers interested in a horse, it gives you a nice base under the horse; and if the end user wants to go ahead and purchase the yearling, they have to bid a little more."

And bidding a little more is hopefully what buyers will have to do to procure a New York-bred yearling this year. Based on the purse structure at New York Racing Association racetracks and purse structure for the New York-bred program, the sale is earning its spot on the calendar.

"It's become a profit center for everyone involved in the New York-bred program from the breeder all the way to the owner," Cannizzo said. "And that's what it is supposed to be and that is what makes it so successful."





SEVERAL YEARS AGO, EXHAUSTED from the Saratoga meet and needing a few days to chill before heading downstate, trainer Linda Rice asked her landlord there if she could keep her apartment an extra day or two.

"No," came the immediate response. "You have to be out by noon Tuesday."

She decided after 18 summers it was time to have a permanent home in Saratoga so she wouldn't have to go through the frustration of finding a new rental every year. She purchased a condo in the city and now has a place to relax during the meet, in the off season when her horses are stabled there, and for sales and other events that take her upstate for a few days.

Rice's decision to buy her own place in Saratoga—even though the meet lasts only six weeks—is similar to that of other trainers and owners who have added the 12866 zip code to their list of residences because they were tired of the constant hunt for a summer rental as well as paying exorbitant fees for such a short period of time

"The rental issue is a problem," said realtor Linda Dickstein, who is with Coldwell Banker in Saratoga Springs. "People who own property and want to rent it for a year try to make up the difference for what they may lose during the race meet."

Dickstein said she has sold houses to some trainers who also must find housing for their staffs. "This can be very expensive—you could be looking at \$10,000 for the meet."

Trainer Shug McGaughey is among those who own a house near the Oklahoma training track across the street from the racetrack. About a dozen years ago he was prepared to put up with expensive leases, "meddling" landlords, and the hassles of moving every summer.

But that all changed when his wife, Alison, in Saratoga to find a rental, phoned him out of the blue with some surprising news.

"She just called me up and said she'd bought a house," Mc-Gaughey said. "I never did see it. She just bought it."

He was fine with the decision. The house was renovated, and although they don't use it in the offseason, the couple is comfortable in their own place for six weeks each summer.

Nick Zito was one of the first "name" trainers to move his entire operation and his family to Saratoga, about a dozen years ago. He has no qualms about shipping downstate the same day if he's in at Aqueduct or Belmont—stakes races included. He says the Oklahoma training track is better for

his horses, especially the 2-year-olds, as is the peace and quiet of the area as opposed to the urban tracks. In the winter he keeps horses at Belmont, of course, as well as at Gulfstream Park.

"When I went there as a kid, I knew there was something special about Saratoga," Zito said. "The community—that's what I really like. I adapted so well to this town they accepted me...not that I was a foreigner but upstate is not the city."

Zito has his regular haunts for coffee, the newspaper, sandwiches, banking.

"What I've been doing is getting a lot of relationships over the years. I know every restaurant in town."

Trainer Todd Pletcher sends his 2-year-olds to Saratoga as soon as the barns open in mid-April. While there, he doesn't have to pay exorbitant hotel bills; he stays in his newly acquired house on Saratoga Lake, his family headquarters for the meet and the off-season. For the past two years his family has spent Thanksgiving in Saratoga, and his wife

and kids come up from Long Island in June as soon as school is out.

"We actually rented for a long time, but we started spending more and more time there so it made sense (to purchase a home) for a number of reasons," he said.

Trainer Bill Mott and his family also live on the lake. The Motts made Saratoga Springs a permanent home several years ago when it was in the best interest of their daughter to attend the same high school every year instead of moving back and forth. Tina Mott said they feel more at home in Saratoga than downstate because it is more reminiscent of the rural environments where they both grew up.

Pletcher's former assistant, George Weaver, bought a home in Saratoga 12 years ago when he left Pletcher to go out on his own. Weaver is based in Florida and Saratoga; when he is at Belmont or Aqueduct, he stays in a hotel.

His son goes to school in Florida, but as soon as it's out, the whole family migrates to Saratoga.

"It's nice to have a place where you can just open the door and go right in," Weaver said. "You don't have to worry about furniture or anything like that."

Among the owners who have homes in Saratoga is Paul Oreffice, who has been in partnership with Cot Campbell's Dogwood Stables for 25 years.

Oreffice, retired CEO of Dow Chemical Corp., and his family started coming to Saratoga for the summer meet 24 years ago, but "renting for six weeks was not very satisfactory at such a high price," he said.

So 19 years ago "we saw this budding neighborhood where houses were being built," and he added his name to the list for the new construction.

Now the Oreffices and their extended


family make use of the home from May through September. But once the temperatures start to drop, they're back in sunny Phoenix until the following spring.


"I wouldn't come in the winter if they paid me. I lived in Michigan for 30 years...I'll never do something like that again," he said, referring to the constant snowstorms in upstate New York.

The Oreffices hold an annual opening night party each year. Among the guests are close friends John and Teresa Behrendt, who also own property in Saratoga.

Unlike their friend's newer development, the home of the Behrendts is one of the oldest in the city, an 1868 sprawling Victorian at Phila and Court streets. The Behrendts are in partnerships on a number of New York-breds and also race and breed horses in Argentina. Their most successful was Incurable Optimist, a New York-bred horse of the year who banked \$271,310 in six starts until he was retired to stud in Argentina in 1999.

The Behrendts' house was built for Benjamin Franklin Judson, a printer and eventual postmaster of the city whose publication, *Temperance Helper*, was renamed *The Saratogian*. A so-called mother-in-law cottage adjacent to the main house burned down and remained a vacant lot, giving the Behrendts a large corner property with plenty of open

space. The home also belonged to a prominent physician, Dr. George Scott Towne, whose offices were in the basement. Teresa Behrendts said she runs into people whose grandparents were Towne's patients.

The Behrendts, who also have an apartment in New York, bought their Saratoga house in 2000.

"We'd come up very summer and rent, and one year I said, 'I'd love a house up here,' " Teresa Behrendt said. "We talked to a real estate agent and found this house.

"We consider Saratoga our home," she said. "There isn't a season that isn't beautiful in Saratoga, even when there's snow on the track."

Starlight Racing principal Jack Wolf and his family will have plenty to celebrate in their Saratoga home this summer when Ashado, two-time Eclipse-winning mare, is inducted into the National Museum of Racing's Hall of Fame Aug. 8.

"We'll have a big shindig," said Wolf, whose home is within walking distance of the racecourse.

Some 15 years ago, when he and his wife, Laurie, first attended the Saratoga meet, they stayed at the historic Gideon Putnam Hotel in the Saratoga Spa State Park.

Gideon Putnam, one of the city's earliest developers (Congress Park, the Broadway area) named Phila Street for his daughter.

"Then we rented a house for the next two years" before deciding to purchase one, Wolf said. "It's great. It's been an annual trek up there."

The Wolfs, who are based in Kentucky most of the year, usually visit the city a few times in the winter as well.

"We have some good friends we see," he said.

Wolf's extended family usually spends time there during the meet, and this summer he anticipates a brand new grandson might make his first trip to Saratoga.

Not only do some owners have residences in Saratoga Springs, but they have their businesses there as well.

About a year ago West Point Thoroughbreds moved its New Jersey operation to Saratoga Springs, now the sole headquarters of the partnership group. West Point president Terry Finley said he and his wife also bought a home near the track and sold their New Jersey property.

"We're empty-nesters now, so it was time to consolidate," Finley said one busy morning as he answered calls and went through papers in the second floor office of his small frame office on the Saratoga-Wilton town line.

His son is a professional soccer player in California, and his daughter is based in Lexington, where she helps run West Point Thoroughbreds from her home.

"I know we made the right decision," Finley said. "Everybody who spends time in the horse business knows what a special place Saratoga is."

Keeley De Salvo, who lives and owns The Savory Pantry in Hot Springs, Ark., also knows how special Saratoga is and hopes to increase her connection with the community when she opens a branch of the specialty food store this summer in the heart of the Saratoga commercial district. She and her husband, Steve, race their horses in partnerships with Team Valor (they owned part of Animal Kingdom) and Eclipse Thoroughbreds. Several months ago she leased a building at 486 Broadway for the store and although she is still renting a home, intends to purchase a residence once the new business takes hold.


"Right now we're renting (a house) in Saratoga, but we'll probably buy one when the business starts up because we'll be here six months a year," she said during a recent visit.


For those like De Salvo and Teresa Behrendts and Nick Zito, the facts that the heat must be cranked up in October and the flowers aren't in bloom until late spring aren't deterrents to living some or all of their time in Saratoga.

Zito calls Saratoga "a gift from God," especially the Oklahoma training track. Others use different words in singing the city's praises.

"It's nice to have a place to go home to," said Weaver. "It's pretty up here."

"Saratoga is a magical place," said Behrendts. The

THERE WERE NO TWIN SPIRES and no blanket of roses, and far fewer than 160,000 were in attendance at Finger Lakes Racetrack July 12, but that didn't seem to make much difference to West Point Thoroughbred's Tom Bellhouse.

"To heck with Kentucky. We won the New York Derby!" he exulted after the \$161,000 event.

Empire Dreams wins

Though his comment was perhaps slightly tongue-in-cheek, Bellhouse's excitement was genuine after West Point's Empire Dreams won the second leg of the Big Apple Triple Crown.

"He's a partnership dream come true," said Bellhouse of the 3-year-old dark bay Patriot Act colt.

Empire Dreams drew post six in a six-

horse field following the scratch of Effinex, which turned out to be a blessing when Fox Rox, breaking from post one, veered out and bumped Eye Luv Lulu. From post three Free Mugatu broke in, and while the inside horses were sorting themselves out and trying to make up ground, Empire Dreams, well in the clear under jockey Manuel Franco, maintained a stalking position before overtaking pacesetting Lady's Smart Alec in the stretch to win by 21/4 lengths, running the 11/16 miles in 1:45.55.

Fox Rox finished second but was disqualified and placed fifth.

"A group of us went to Finger Lakes for the race," said Bellhouse, who lives in Saratoga Springs, "and we were getting a little nervous the way the track was playing, favoring speed. Manny did a great job on him; he was pretty cool on him, and he rode him perfectly."

Out of the Thunder Gulch mare Ascended Dreams, Empire Dreams was bred by Pegasus Dream Stable and purchased by West Point Thoroughbreds for \$35,000 as a 2-year-old at the Ocala Breeders' Sales Co.'s April sale. Trained by Tom Albertrani, he's earned \$320,500, with three wins from nine starts. The only time Empire Dreams has failed to finish in the top three was his debut last summer at Saratoga.

"He was inexpensive, and he's never run a bad race," said Bellhouse.

After winning a New York Stallion Series race at Aqueduct last November, Empire Dreams shipped to Florida, where, said Bellhouse, he "didn't thrive at all."

"He just didn't seem to like it," he observed. "We were going to bring him back in January; then the weather got real bad in New York, so he stayed in Florida."

After a third-place finish at Aqueduct March 29 off a four-month layoff, Empire Dreams was second in two straight stakes races: a Stallion Series race at Aqueduct in April and the Mike Lee Stakes on Big Apple Showcase Day at Belmont May 31. Both races were won by horses trained by Mike Hushion, who won the New York Derby last year with Amberjack.

Empire Dreams was beaten by Captain Serious in the Mike Lee, who eschewed the New York Derby in favor of last week's Dwyer Stakes (gr. III). in which he finished a competitive second, a performance that would seem to flatter Empire Dreams. While Bellhouse doesn't put his horse quite up in the top flight of 3-year-old New York-breds, which includes Captain Serious and the graded stakes winner Samraat, he thinks Empire Dreams is not that far behind.

"I'd like to think we're in the top five on dirt," he assessed. "He's a really nice horse, big and sound, and I think I'm safe in saying he's the best Patriot Act there is."

After standing in New York, first at Questroyal at Dutchess Views Farm and Questroyal North, Patriot Act was sold last year and now stands in Saudi Arabia.

Having passed the two-turn test in the New York Derby, Empire Dreams will now point to the \$250,000 Albany Stakes at 1½ miles at Saratoga Racecourse Aug. 24.

"Now we know he can go the distance," said Bellhouse, while acknowledging the colt will need to step up his game a bit to win the third race in the Big Apple Triple series.

Empire Dreams is not West Point's first New York-bred stakes winner—still in training for the partnership is 5-year-old Awesome Vision, a \$65,000 year-ling purchase who's earned more than \$370,000.

"Whenever we can, we pick up a couple of New York-breds," said Bellhouse, "and this year is no different."

"With this guy," he went on, referring to Empire Dreams, "we got lucky. We got him last April, and he's just never missed a beat."

Not to be outdone in the consistency department, Flipcup got her fourth win in an eight-race career, taking the \$75,000 New York Oaks by a hard-fought neck.

A comfortable winner in her other three victories, Flipcup had to change her tactics at Finger Lakes, sitting closer to the pace than usual under jockey John Davila Jr. and challenging the pacesetting Alwaysinstilettos, hooking up for a head-bobbing stretch run that left at least one of her owners anxious about the outcome.

"I think my wife, Mary Ann, was nervous," said Shirl Penney of Team Penney Racing, who owns the Milwaukee Brew filly in partnership with Wachtel Stable and Brous Stable, to whom he sold interests over the winter. "I was

pretty excited once they started to duel. I thought we might have moved a little too soon, but in hindsight it was probably the right thing to do."

"(Storied Lady) got the jump on us last time (in the Bouwerie), and we couldn't quite catch her for second," he continued. "So we had to get the jump on her this time."

Storied Lady finished third in the Oaks, a nose behind Alwaysinstilettos.

Winless in two previous races at 11/16 miles, Flipcup got her first win beyond a mile and 70 yards, stopping the timer at 1:46.55. She's run at five tracks in her short career, winning at three of them—including over Woodbine's Polytrack surface—and she's never finished worse than third.

"She's a really cool filly," said Penney.
"And she's so easy—she thinks she's a lapdog. My kids, who are 5 and 8, walk right into the stall with her."

io-sired Flipcup started in the barn of Brian Lynch in Canada and moved to George Weaver when she began racing in the United States.

"It was a hard decision" to move her to Mott, admitted Penney. "George is a close personal friend, and Brian is a phenomenal trainer having a huge year. They've all done well with her. But none of them have huge egos as trainers, and they were understanding when we made the switches."

With earnings of \$214,209, Flipcup is the best of Dream Affair's progeny to date; though Penney has sold the mare, he has a half sister to Flipcup by Giant Surprise (stands at Rockridge Stud), whose first foals are yearlings this year.

While the Ontario-sired rewards program is enticing, so are New York breeding awards, as Penney, a former board member of New York Thoroughbred Breeders, well knows. And as a

Out of Dream Affair (by Touch Gold), the Penney homebred was making her third start for trainer Bill Mott, to whom she had been transferred following the sale at the suggestion of Adam Wachtel, who owned the Mott-trained grade I winner Ron the Greek in partnership with Nils Brous and others. The Ontarresident of Saratoga Springs, Penney is hoping his filly can get her next win at the Spa, in the Fleet Indian Stakes for New York-breds Aug. 24.

"We have so many friends in Saratoga, so it would be pretty special to have her go off as one of the top horses," he said. \(\overline{A}\)

WHEN HIS 2-YEAR-OLD FILLY Wonder Gal went to the gate for the \$122,500 Lynbrook Stakes at Belmont Park July 6, owner Jeff Treadway didn't really know what to expect.

"She'd put in a couple of nice breezes," he said, "and we thought she'd run well, but we didn't know if the distance was what she really wanted to do."

Six furlongs, 1:11.14, and a 14½-length victory later he had

tory later, he had his answer.

"Our jaws were on the floor, just watching her come down the stretch," he said.

Racing eight lengths off the lead after a quarter-mile, Wonder Gal began to move up entering the far turn, effortlessly sailing past her rivals to draw away under jockey Taylor Rice.

Out of the unraced Dixie Union mare Passe, Wonder Gal was bred in New York by Apache Farm. Passe, out of the stakes-winning Gal on the Go, is a half sister to multiple grade III winner Social Queen (by Dynaformer).

Treadway had purchased the Tiz Wonderful filly for \$210,000 four months earlier at the Ocala Breeders' Sales Co.'s select sale in March.

"Everything was very expensive at that sale, and we were getting outbid on a lot of things," he said. "She wasn't on our initial list; we weren't looking for Tiz Wonderfuls or even for New York-breds, necessarily."

Encouraged to check the filly out, he was impressed by what he saw. "She has a huge stride on her, and she did the breeze very easily," he said. "She looked like she was galloping."

Trained by Leah Gyarmati, Wonder Gal may make her second start in the Aug. 10 Adirondack Stakes (gr. II) at Saratoga.

Admitting that the purses for New York-breds at Saratoga are tempting, Treadway noted that running in the Adirondack would keep options open for running at the end of the meet in the Spinaway Stakes (gr. I), a race he and Gyarmati won last year with

Sweet Reason.

"The timing seems right," explained Treadway, "as much as anything to say where we are with her. Her race was impressive, and her speed figure came up pretty strong, but we're not sure what was behind her. We've got some nice New York-bred options in Saratoga as well."

Bustin Loose

After Michael Mareina's 2-year-old Bustin It finished second in a maiden special weight at Belmont Park June 13, his phone began to ring.

"We got three offers then," he said.

After a dominant, seven-length win in the \$122,500 Rockville Centre Stakes at Belmont July 13, he might need to hire an answering service.

Sent to the lead by jockey Rajiv Maragh, Bustin It never gave those who backed him down to even money an anxious moment; he led every step of the six furlongs, finishing geared down in a final time of 1:11.69.

Bred by Casey Newick. Bustin It was purchased by Mareina for \$70,000 at last year's Fasig-Tipton New York-bred preferred yearling sale in Saratoga as the agent for Kuehne Racing. S J Bee Stable later purchased an interest in the Bustin Stones colt out of the Intidab mare I Drink Alone.

"He looked a little like a Quarter Horse, like he could be fast," said Mareina of the son of an undefeated, graded stakes-winning sprinter. "He had a nice, long, fluid stride for a shorter horse. He's not very big.

"He had speed in his pedigree, and I just liked the way he was built. He also seemed pretty mellow."

That mellowness was tested in the Belmont paddock, where Bustin It had a few unruly moments, but when he got to the track, he was all professionalism, and Mareina wasn't concerned by the colt's behavior.

"He's been training in Saratoga, so it was all new to him," he said.


Mareina isn't tempted to step his charge up to Saratoga's prestigious 2-year-old stakes races, pointing him instead to the \$200,000 Funny Cide Stakes for New York-breds on Aug. 24, which is worth more than the grade III Sanford Stakes July 19 and equal to the grade II Saratoga Special Stakes Aug. 10.

"I'd rather save him for the Funny Cide," said Mareina. "He can run in open company eventually."

2014 marks the first year in a long time Allen Jerkens will miss the meeting at Saratoga

ONE OF THE MORE familiar sights on the Saratoga backstretch over the past half century has been trainer Allen Jerkens aboard his pony heading to and from the main track every morning. It seems as if Jerkens has been stabling his horses on either side of the jogging track that separates the main backstretch from the area known as Clare Court for as long as anyone can remember.

With each trip to the track usually came a lengthy period of conversation with whoever happened to be standing or walking by the rail. Jerkens, known as The Chief, has always had a story to tell, and his photographic memory delivered those stories with total recollection to the most minute detail.

Only during a four-year period in the 1980s when Jerkens' first wife, Anne, was very sick back home on Long Island and in 1966 and '67 did Jerkens not have his stable in Saratoga. Not a bad attendance record spanning 60 years.

But now the 85-year-old Jerkens will not be at the Spa, deciding instead to remain at Gulfstream Park with his 13-horse stable.

"I'll send two fillies for Mr. (Joseph) Shields to Jimmy (Jerkens' youngest son), but I probably won't be there at all," Jerkens said. "It feels very strange not to be there. It's easier for me to take care of myself and (wife) Liz, rather than shipping around. One of these days we have to sell our homes in Saratoga and on Long Island. That will give us a little money to live on. We don't have anywhere near the income we did when we were doing good. And it's tough maintaining three houses.

"It's been a long time since the last Saratoga meet I missed. I can't really remember why we didn't go up there in '66 and '67. The funny part is that in 1967, Hobeau Farm (Jerkens' main client for many years) had the leading money-winning outfit in the country. We won several big races with Handsome Boy and Mac's Sparkler that year."

Jerkens, who at age 45 became the youngest trainer ever to be elected to the Hall of Fame, has won a number of major stakes at Saratoga, including the Alabama Stakes

(gr. I), Test Stakes (gr. I), and Ballerina Stakes (gr. I) three times, Personal Ensign Stakes (gr. I) twice, and the Sanford Stakes (gr. II) and Adirondack Stakes (gr. II) for 2-year-olds.

But he will be mostly remembered for his shocking upset of Triple Crown winner Secretariat in the 1973 Whitney Stakes (gr. II), a race that perpetuated and in many ways sealed his nickname as "The Giant Killer," having already upset Kelso three times with Beau Purple; Buckpasser with Handsome Boy; Forego with Step Nicely; Cicada with Pocasaba; Numbered Account with Blessing Angelica and Poker Night; and Moccasin, Gamely, Lady Pitt, and Straight Deal with Mac's Sparkler. There would be a number of others that followed.

Also during that '73 Saratoga meet, Jerkens upset Forego with his recent acquisition Prove Out, who would go on to defeat both Secretariat and Riva Ridge later that year in the Woodward Stakes (gr. I) and Jockey Club Gold Cup (gr. I), respectively.

The Whitney was supposed to be nothing more than a showcase for Secretariat to add older horses to his already long list of victims. There certainly was nothing in the five-horse field that appeared capable of toppling Big Red.

If Jerkens had any particular philosophy in upsetting champions and Hall of Famers, it was a simple one: "Never be afraid of one horse."

Jerkens usually went into these lopsided affairs figuring if the favorite had a bad day, he might have a shot to win. If he or she didn't, there was nothing wrong with finishing second.

Onion was a fast horse who had placed in three sprint stakes and had never run over a mile. The Whitney was 1½ miles, and he'd have to carry equal weights with Secretariat.

"He had run well early in the year," Jerkens said. "But it looked like he was tailing off a little. In an allowance race at seven furlongs, Jorge Velasquez for some reason let him run off to win by nine lengths. So I freshened him a little and pointed for the Whitney. There were rumors that Secretariat was going to run, so I figured it would be a small field.

"He had been breezing miles, and I also gave him a seven-furlong breeze in 1:31. We went to work Onion a week before the Whitney and I ran into Robyn Smith. She asked if she could work Onion, but I told her it was too important a work. She said, 'Why, do you think I'm gonna mess it up?' So I let her work him and he went a half in :47. Two days later we ran him in a 6½-furlong allowance race and he won by eight lengths in 1:15½, breaking the track record."

Jerkens, who has never done anything in the conventional manner, let him go out another eighth of a mile and then blew him out an eighth of a mile the morning of the Whitney.

A record crowd turned out on a beautiful afternoon, and for the first time ever the New York Racing Association opened the infield to the public and saddled the horses in the infield because there would have been a mob scene around Big Red's saddling tree behind the grandstand. Secretariat was sent off at 1-10, with Onion second choice at 5-1.

Spread out around the track were Jerkens' three sons, Allen Jr., Steve, and Jimmy.

Onion led every step of the way and knocked off the mighty Secretariat. Jerkens was now truly "The Giant Killer."

"I was interning at the time and watched the race on the roof with CBS producer Bill Creasy and some guy from Baltimore," Allen Jr. said. "CBS was broadcasting the race on radio, and when they came down the stretch, I was yelling and screaming so loud, Creasy had to put his hand over my mouth. I ran down to the winner's circle after the race. I saw the old man, and when he turned around and saw me he started bawling like crazy."

Steve and Jimmy both watched from the trainer's stand on the backstretch.

"Onion was a much better horse than most people think," Jerkens said. "What really disappointed me was that the following spring he bowed a tendon and was never the same. I really believed he was going to be a top handicap horse."

In thinking back at some of his other fond memories of Saratoga, Jerkens recalled, "One year Bobby Frankel and I were whipping and driving to be leading trainer. I wound up beating him by one winner on the last day. Another year, (Angel) Cordero wanted to be leading rider so badly, he talked Robyn Smith into taking off Beaukins, who was 3-5 on closing

day. I had told him, 'You ask her; I'm not going to ask her.' He did and she agreed to take off the horse and let him ride him, and he wound up getting beat by some longshot and he lost out on the title. But he became leading rider for 10 straight years after that.

Another race at Saratoga that stands out was November Snow's narrow victory over eventual 3-year-old filly champion Saratoga Dew in the 1992 Alabama.

"You talk about a big thrill, November Snow winning by a half a nose was as thrilling as it gets," Jerkens said. "I remember Tom Durkin calling, 'Herb McCauley begging for one more eighth of a mile on Saratoga Dew, but November Snow is breathing down on her neck.' That was so exciting."

Jerkens will never forget the Alabama victory the next year by Sky Beauty, who had swept NYRA's Filly Triple Crown, and was one of the greatest horses he ever trained.

"I was so worried about her the entire meet because she

didn't appear to be doing as good as she should, and I was hedging about whether I should give her a strong workout for the Alabama, which I always did before a big race," Jerkens recalled. "I was kicking it around, and then I thought, 'None of them ever won when I didn't give them a strong workout for the race.' So I gave it to her anyway, working her a mile in around 1:39 about four or five days

before the race, and for some strange reason she perked up and wound up winning the Alabama. Sometimes everything you do goes wrong, but this time everything went right. Bob Duncan, before he became NYRA's starter, was in her stall in the gate and she was pretty restless, and just when he had her head pointing straight they sprung it."

Two of Jerkens' most emotional victo-

ries at Saratoga came in 2012 when his stable was merely a shell of what it once had been when Jack Dreyfus had all his top-class Hobeau Farm homebreds.

For Emma's Encore, a \$2,000 yearling purchase at the 2010 Keeneland September sale, to give Jerkens a grade I win (in the Prioress Stakes) at age 83 following an illness and major slump was truly special. He became so teary-eyed and emotional in the winner's circle he could barely speak. To make it even more special was Emma's Encore turning in a spectacular stretch run to get up by a nose.

Also at Saratoga that year, NYRA ran the Saratoga Dew Stakes and Jerkens won it with Go Unbridled.

"All the old-timers were around that day and that was pretty emotional," Jerkens said.

Jerkens treasures the Saratoga memories he's accumulated over the years.

"I've always been around Clare Court, but ironically, when I won some races with Admiral Vee in 1956, the barn I was at is the same barn Jimmy is in now. It was nicer back then because you didn't see near as many people on the backside as you do now. Trainers only shipped in for the race meet, which was only four weeks. Now they're up there from April 15 to November."


The one major stakes at Saratoga that eluded Jerkens was the Travers (gr. I), but he got great satisfaction watching Jimmy win the Midsummer Derby with Afleet Express in 2010.

"That was such a close call," Jerkens said. "I was going to scream because I didn't think the other horse (Fly Down) ever did get by him, but I figured I better hold off."

Jerkens admits he misses being at Saratoga and fraternizing with friends but accepts the changes that have come with old age.

"Naturally I'd rather be in Saratoga, but I've made good friends here, too," he said. "It's a different life, but that's the way it's supposed to be.

"I would love to go up there and get on the pony again. That would be fun. But everything comes to an end sooner or later. And I had a longer string than most people do."


