

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Upward climb

New York-bred foal renaissance

The story I'm about to tell won't have an ending until the conclusion of this year's foaling season, but I'm so positive that the ending to this story will be happy, I can't keep it to myself.

The New York State Thoroughbred Breeding and Development Fund reports that as of May 31, nearly 40% more Thoroughbred foals were born in the state than by the same date last year.

Last year, the foal crop (1,450) fell off dramatically in New York, reaching its lowest level in more than a decade after four straight years of decline. Through the first five months of 2011, there were only 725 Thoroughbred foals on the ground in New York. In the same time frame this year, 1,011 foals were born.

As tempting as it is to project final numbers on the basis of this interim report, I suspect that demographic changes in the state's mare population this year would make this a bad idea, but I encourage you at least to do a "back of the envelope" calculation for yourself. I think you will agree with me that the 2012 New York-bred foal crop is very likely to make up a good deal of ground in the direction of the record highs seen in the years right after Funny Cide's Triple Crown bid of 2003 (more than 2,000 foals).

We don't need to look far to find the explanation for a heightened interest in producing New York-breds. The same cause is

also responsible for the dramatic across-the-board improvement in New York-bred performance in the sales ring over the past 12 months: infusion of video lottery terminal revenue from the Aqueduct racino into New York's breeding and racing programs.

VLT revenue has made the 2012 purse structure at the three NYRA racetracks by far the most generous in the country, and enabled the fund to increase all categories of incentive awards—in the case of breeders' awards by 50%. Not only will there be more New York-breds in the state, each and every one of them, whether a sales or racing prospect, will be more valuable than it was a year ago.

This is good news not only for breeders and owners of New York-breds. As I keep trying to drive

home to our elected officials, what's good for the breeding and racing industries is good for all New Yorkers. A single mare supports four FTE (full-time equivalent) jobs, making such a dramatic increase in the New York-bred foal crop a significant factor in the vital area of job creation. An influx of new mares into the state also stimulates further investment in the agricultural sector by way of farm reopenings and renovations.

The story of the foal crop of 2012 is still a work in progress, I know, but I feel confident that the final numbers will put a smile on the face of every breeder in the state.

Added bonus

Proposed legislation could provide significant boost to New York breeding programs

Two bills designed to support the New York State Thoroughbred Breeding and Development Fund have passed both houses of the state Legislature and are now expected to be signed into law by Gov. Andrew M. Cuomo, while two other bills are making progress through the Legislature.

A bill extending a raised cap on breeders' awards and a bill amending the definition of a New York stallion both passed the New York State Senate and New York State Assembly.

"This was by far our most successful session, considering the number of bills we introduced and the number that passed," New York Thoroughbred Breeders Executive Director Jeffrey A. Cannizzo said. "The Legislature heard what breeders' interests were and was looking to support them."

The breeders' awards bill is designed to provide continued revenue to the Breeding and Development Fund by extending earlier legislation setting a raised cap of 65% on awards. The original law put this cap into effect for one year following the opening of the long-awaited Resorts World Casino New York City at Aqueduct on October 28, 2011. The extender bill—which Cannizzo says is an item that has been passed for the last several years—would extend the cap to a two-year term.

"Thoroughbred breeders use this funding to invest back into breeding, thereby keeping that money in the local economy and creating more jobs, and strengthening the horse racing industry in New York," the Assembly bill states. "The industry has seen significant declines in handle year after year. With that, the Fund's revenue has rapidly fallen. ... This proposal would extend [the 65% cap] for an additional year and provide the board of directors of the Thoroughbred Breeding and Development Fund the ability to allot Fund revenue based on the current state of the Thoroughbred industry. [This] proposal is strictly a house-keeping modification that has no financial impact on any other organization or segment of the industry."

The breeders' awards bill also requires payments to the Breeding and Development Fund to be made on a quarterly basis; increases the amount of money used for promoting the breeding industry in the state by 1% up to 6%; and increases administrative allotments from the Fund from 4% to 5%.

The bill is sponsored in the Senate by John Bonacic (R-Mt. Hope) and in the Assembly by Gary Pretlow (D-Westchester).

Pretlow is the sponsor of the bill amending the definition of a New York stallion, which is sponsored in the Senate by Roy J. McDonald (R-Saratoga).

Currently, a stallion standing in New York who is owned by a farm or resident from another state must be leased by a New York farm or resident for a minimum of two years—a term the bill's supporters feel discourages owners from standing stallions in-state. The new bill reduces the minimum lease to one year in an effort to increase the number and quality of stallions in the state.

"This is a piece of legislation that's been talked about for [years]," Cannizzo said. "[When the two-year requirement was

first mandated], not only New York but the stallion market itself was different. Stallions weren't as fluid and maneuverable as they are now. ... The intent is to encourage and provide an ability for outside stallions to maneuver into New York."

A purse enrichment incentive, sponsored in the Senate by McDonald and in the Assembly by Pretlow, passed the Assembly but did not come to a vote in the Senate prior to the conclusion of the legislative session. Cannizzo said the Senate could vote on the bill this fall. The bill is designed to give the Breeding and Development Fund greater flexibility in distributing its resources by amending racing law to clarify that existing purse enrichments and incentives may be awarded to New York-breds regardless of the type of race they enter, open or restricted.

McDonald and Pretlow are also the sponsors of a breeding fund carryover bill, which was referred to the Racing, Gaming, and Wagering Committees of both houses but has not come to a vote in either house. The bill would eliminate the cap of \$75,000 that the Breeding and Development Fund is allowed to carry over into the following calendar year. Currently, any amount amassed over that limit is divided between state and regional off-track betting corporations, based on level of contribution to the Fund during the year by racing corporations and regional OTBs.


By instead allowing the Breeding and Development Fund to carry over any money amassed in excess of the cap, the bill could provide greater financial stability by giving the Fund the flexibility to adapt to a changing economy.

Grade 2 winner Yawanna Twist euthanized

Only days following the death of 2011 New York Horse of the Year Giant Ryan, the state lost another star in Grade 2 winner Yawanna Twist, who was euthanized after a post-surgical accident in mid-June at Rood & Riddle Equine Hospital in Lexington. The five-year-old son of Yonaguska out of the stakes-winning Oliver's Twist mare Twist and Pop fractured his femur while coming out of anesthesia in the wake of a routine procedure to remove ankle chips.

Yawanna Twist was foaled on February 26, 2007, at Hickory Hill Farm Thoroughbreds in upstate New York, and was bred by the Steel Your Face Stables partnership of Frank Argano, Jeffrey Bonner, and Jim Riccio. He failed to meet his reserve at the 2008 Keeneland September yearling sale, and was subsequently withdrawn from the Ocala Breeders' Sales Co. March sale of selected two-year-olds in training, after which his breeders opted to race him in the colors of their Steel Your Face Stables. It was a decision they would not regret.

After scoring impressively in his first two starts for trainer Richard Dutrow Jr.—both in six-furlong state-bred company at Aqueduct—Yawanna Twist moved up in both distance and class to finish second in the $1^1/_{16}$ -mile Gotham Stakes (G3), second in the $1^1/_{16}$ -mile Illinois Derby (G3), and fourth behind champion Lookin At Lucky in the $1^3/_{16}$ -mile Preakness Stakes (G1), beaten less than three lengths each time.

At four in 2011, he continued pounding on the door in stakes company, finishing second in the $1 \ensuremath{^{1/8}}\text{-mile}$ Kings Point Stakes

and third in the seven-furlong Carter Handicap (G1). His lone black-type victory finally came this year on February 20 at Laurel Park when he defeated stablemate This Ones for Phil and Grade 1 winner Toby's Corner in the seven-furlong, \$200,000 General George Handicap (G2). In his last career start, he was sixth in the Pimlico Special Stakes (G3) in May.

Yawanna Twist had been a gem of consistency throughout his career, winning five of 13 starts, with three seconds and two thirds, and earnings of \$525,467.



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

Rood & Riddle satellite facility opens

Renowned Lexington-based Rood & Riddle Equine Hospital has opened an ambulatory satellite division in upstate New York. New York foal crop rises

Through mid-spring, the number of foals born in New York was up by nearly 40% over a similar time frame in 2011, according to a report released by the New York State Thoroughbred Breeding and Development Fund in early June. From January 1 through May 31, 2012, 1,011 foals were born in the Empire State as compared with only 725 at the same time last year.

Through the first decade of the new millennium and the recession of recent years, New York's foal registrations had declined overall by 15.4%—a significant decrease, but modest when compared with other major racing and breeding states such as Maryland, Florida, and California, which saw declines in foal crops of 61.1%, 49.7%, and 47.1%, respectively.

The rebound in numbers of the current-year crop appears to indicate an increased interest in New York's thriving Thoroughbred racing and breeding industry, based on the infusion of millions of dollars of video lottery terminal revenues into purses at state tracks and owner, breeder, and stallion incentives. The Resorts World Casino New York City, with slots and electronic table games, opened at Aqueduct in October. The New York Racing Association predicted at the time that the casino could generate close to \$45-million in increased purse money for its tracks and approximately \$7-million in breeder and stallion awards.

Equine Advocates Dinner to honor Strawbridge

Lael Stables owners Gretchen and Roy Jackson, whose late, great champion Barbaro inspired the nation, will receive the Ellen and Herbert Moelis Equine Savior Award for Philanthropy for their generosity in support of equine protection causes and veterinary institutions and their outspoken views against horse slaughter and all forms of equine abuse.

Also being honored that night will be jockey Edgar Prado, who will receive the Bo Derek Award of Merit for his heroic acts of bravery in protecting horses as well as his fellow riders.

The event will be chaired by Arlington Park's Richard L. Duchossois, who received the Moelis Philanthrophy Award from Equine Advocates in 2011, and Victoria McCullough, horsewoman and owner of Chesapeake Petroleum who spearheaded the passage of Florida's historic Horse Protection Bill of 2010.

The gala will take place in the new state-of-the-art wing of the Saratoga Springs City Center. The evening will include cocktails, a silent auction, sit-down gourmet dinner, awards presentation, and an exciting live auction headlined by an original portrait of Zenyatta and her first foal by the renowned equine artist Katie Upton. Bustin Stones' first winner

Undefeated New York-bred champion Bustin Stones made an impressive debut as a sire on May 23 when his first starter, Bustinattheseams, won at first asking. The chestnut filly, who races for Bourque Goldstein Thoroughbreds, rushed




Bustin Stones stands at Waldorf Farm

to an early lead in a five-furlong state-bred maiden race at Belmont Park, quickly opened daylight on the field, and got to the wire 13/4 lengths the best under a hand ride under John Velazguez. Her final time on the muddy track was 1:00.56.

Bred by Eaton and Thorne Inc., Bustinattheseams sold for \$87,000 at the Fasig-Tipton Saratoga New York yearling sale, and again for \$150,000 at the Ocala Breeders' Sales Co. March sale of selected two-year-olds in training. At the latter sale, she was purchased by Eclipse Award-winning trainer Todd Pletcher on behalf of her current owners. She is the fifth foal and fourth winner out of the unraced Silver Deputy mare Land On Your Feet.

Bustin Stones, who is represented by 32 first-crop juveniles, stands for a \$2,500 fee at Waldorf Farm in North Chatham, New York. During two seasons of racing, the son of City Zip won all of his six starts, including the 2008 Carter Handicap (G1), and \$480,150. He was voted champion New York-bred male sprinter at four.





Horse of the Year Giant Ryan euthanized

Grade 1 winner succumbs to laminitis after injury

Giant Ryan, the reigning New York-bred Horse of the Year, was euthanized on June 14 at the University of Pennsylvania's New Bolton Center, as a result of complications to injuries he sustained in the True North Handicap (G2) at Belmont Park.

Giant Ryan, a six-year-old by Freud, broke both sesamoids in his left front fetlock and suffered vascular damage when he broke down in deep stretch of the True North, one of the events on the Belmont Stakes (G1) undercard on June 9. He was shipped to the New Bolton Center two days later, but surgery was delayed for several days because of concerns about the blood supply to the injured area. The surgery was never able to be performed, as laminitis began to set in.

"They couldn't do the surgery right away because there were problems with blood flow to his ankle; he had a clot," said owner Shivananda Parbhoo, who campaigned the horse under the Shivananda Racing banner. "They treated him and [on June 13], the clot went away, but by [June 14] there was a 10% trace of laminitis, the horse was starting to feel pressure, and we had to make a decision.

"I didn't want him to suffer at all. He was happy until the end, he was eating and drinking, but there was nothing more to do. It was a part of the game that we never really see—or, we see it, but before this we didn't know how it feels. We look at racing in a different way now ... it makes you think about how fast they go and it's very, very scary."

Giant Ryan's career was a family affair for Parbhoo, who named the horse after his young son, Ryan. Not only are a number of family members involved in Shivananda Racing, Parbhoo's 72-year-old father, Bisnath Parboo, trains the horses.

After battling a foot fungus that limited him to a total of three starts in 2009 and 2010, Giant Ryan blossomed as a five-year-old, winning six consecutive races in 2011. The streak included victories in the Vosburgh Invitational Stakes (G1) at Belmont and the Smile Sprint Handicap (G2) at Calder Race Course, as well as the Hamlet Stakes at Aqueduct and Ponche Handicap at Calder. In addition to earning New York-bred Horse of the Year honors for that campaign, he was named New York's champion older male and champion sprinter.

In the True North, Giant Ryan was making his first start since finishing a creditable fifth—the best effort by any of the American-based runners—in the Dubai Golden Shaheen (UAE-G1) in March.

In all, he won eight of 17 career starts, earning \$686,841.

Out of the winning Dayjur mare Kheyrah, Giant Ryan was a half or full brother to three winners, including Sentiero Rosso, a stakes-placed runner in England. Giant Ryan was bred by Becky Thomas and Lewis Lakin, and foaled at Sequel Stallions New York.

Parboo is also the trainer of graded stakes winner Trinniberg, winner of the Swale Stakes (G3) at Gulfstream Park and Bay Shore Stakes (G3) at Aqueduct earlier this season and winner of the Woody Stephens Stakes (G2) at Belmont about 90 minutes after Giant Ryan's injury.

"The whole family is kind of leaning on Trinniberg because of what happened to Ryan," Parbhoo said. "It was very sad and very hard."

Seriously good

A look at the career and pedigree of multiple graded stakes winner Get Serious

On his 42nd birthday in 1948, star Negro League pitcher Satchel Paige signed a contract with Bill Veeck's Cleveland Indians and became major league baseball's oldest rookie. But age was never more than a number for Paige, who would continue playing professionally into at least his 60th year, and who once famously wondered: "How old would you be if you didn't know how old you were?"

The same might be asked of four-legged athletes. Although top racehorses today often topple early on like dominoes, they do have their polar opposites—those hickory individuals for whom time seems to stand still.

It makes sense that most such runners would be geldings, who, with no residual breeding value, are free to run, rest up, recover from ailments, then run again and again. Some have been national, even international stars; others, regional standouts. A few, like recent 22-in-a-row winner Rapid Redux and 1930s fan favorite Malicious, were not even close to stakes class for much of their careers, yet were embraced nationally for their consistency and longevity.

"You don't have no steadier horse than a good, mean gelding who wants to win," the late Racing Hall of Fame trainer Sherrill Ward once said. He should know; he trained the great Forego to two of his three Horse of the Year titles, back in 1974 and 1975.

While actual "meanness" might not be a concrete prerequisite to long-term racetrack success, toughness and resilience—both mental and physical—are. John Henry, The Tin Man, and John's Call each had what it took to win in Grade 1 company at age nine. Hall of Famers Kelso, Native Diver, Ancient Title, Exterminator, and Parole remained at the top of their game as eight-year-olds. Champions Roamer, Armed, Fort Marcy, Buck's Boy, Cardmania, and Kona Gold were class personified at seven and beyond. Were they all superstars? No. But all were appreciated by fans who were inspired by their exploits.

When Kelso finally departed the track in 1966 after eight seasons of racing, one New York railbird glumly summed up the feelings of many: "Hell, it just won't seem like Saturday if Kelso's not around."

A new old-timer

New York tracks have hosted many of the above-named iron horses, and the local breeding industry has generated a few of its own through the years. Graded stakes-winning state-bred millionaires Fourstardave and Gander made 100 starts and 60 starts, respectively. Win, a multiple Grade 1 victor, ran 44 times. Eclipse Award winner Funny Cide was best at three, but still winning important races at seven. Commentator, though not heavily raced, competed for six seasons, banked more than \$2-million, and at seven won his second Whitney Handicap (G1). New York champions Banrock, Draw Shot, Well Fancied, and Dave all enjoyed reasonably long, distinguished careers in the past decade or so.

The block may now be witnessing the arrival of a new "kid" in the form of eight-year-old Get Serious, New York's standout turf horse of 2010. The City Zip gelding is on the comeback trail after being sidelined for 8½ months on the heels of a brilliant 2010 campaign and a brief, disappointing one in 2011. He returned on May 19, 2012, to his favorite track and surface—Monmouth Park's

lightning-fast grass course—in the one-mile Elkwood Stakes and finished ... sixth. While that may not sound particularly scintillating, his connections were ecstatic after the old fellow prompted scorching fractions and was beaten less than two lengths in a 1:32.70 mile.

They were even happier when he returned on June 10 with an impressive third-place effort behind a pair of Grade 1 winners in the Monmouth Stakes (G2), a $1^{1}/8$ -mile event he had won in 2010. The fire still burns.

Get Serious races for James Dinan and Phantom House Farm, a limited partnership formed by top New Jersey-based trainer John Forbes. The trainer acquired him as a yearling at the 2005 Fasig-Tipton Midlantic sale for \$130,000—top price for a New York-bred at that October sale.

According to Forbes, Get Serious turned out to be an "obstreperous, very uncooperative" youngster. He clearly had talent and nobody wanted to cut him, but the willful colt eventually forced the issue. As a gelding, he made the races midway through his three-year-old season and has since won more than a third of his starts: 13 of 36. Eight of those wins have come in stakes and ten on grass.

Three times he has burned a 1:32-and-change mile on Monmouth's glib turf course, setting then twice breaking his own course standard. Even after tossing a shoe early in the 2009 Red Bank Stakes (G3), he still managed to hit the wire first in 1:33.02— a clocking most runners could achieve only with rockets tied to their tails. A year later, after four wins and three graded stakes triumphs in five 2010 starts, Get Serious was at the top of his game, with dead aim on the TVG Breeders' Cup Mile (G1), only to have his season ended with an ankle injury.

Whether Get Serious completes his comeback in high fashion remains to be seen. For now, he is just another promising eight-year-old multiple graded stakes-winning, course-record-breaking millionaire, the 24th New York-bred to surpass that financial milestone.

Vain pursuit of an answer

One might wonder what goes into the making of a horse like Get Serious. Pedigree ... intricate planning ... smart handling ... blind luck? Some combination of all of the above?

In fact, such questions remain among life's enduring mysteries. The most dedicated of racing pundits may analyze, theorize, hypothesize, and scrutinize, measure widths and lengths, and contemplate X, Y, and Z factors to their heart's content, yet still come up with no real answers as to why one horse runs like the wind year after year while a full sibling languishes in its stall, only contributing to the feed bill.

Even knowing that a brick wall awaits at the end of the quest, it's nevertheless fun to ponder a pedigree—in this case, that of Get Serious—and try, however vainly, to calculate the how and why of its end product. Certainly, he possesses the proud lineage of a runner, though on the surface not much of it shouts of racing longevity, overt turf proclivity, or the ability to win at a mile and an eighth—all qualities he possesses.

Our subject was bred by Virginia-based Morgan's Ford Farm

and foaled in New York on May 8, 2004, from the second crop of then in-state stallion City Zip, out of Java Gal, by Java Gold. His sire raced 23 times, winning nine times; his dam won once in four starts. Neither won on turf or beyond a mile.

Get Serious has the dosage of a speed horse, one skewed heavily toward the brilliant end of the aptitudinal scale ... and, surely he has been one of the most consistently fleet turf milers seen in a long time. In top form, he is a free-wheeling front-runner, a blaze-faced, flame-coated competitor cut very much in the mold of his sire—but with the above-noted key differences.

City Zip himself has been an interesting case study. Excellence on-track or at stud

did not seem his destiny in 1999 when Adena Springs consigned him to the Keeneland January sale and he was purchased by Carl Bowling's Straightaway Farm for just \$9,000. He was the least-expensive male yearling by Carson City sold at auction that year ... and, ultimately, one of the great modern sales bargains.

The following summer, City Zip won four consecutive New York graded stakes in a nine-week span, culminating in a deadheat score (with Yonaguska) in the Hopeful Stakes (G1). He was co-ranked sixth-best of his generation on the 2000 Experimental Handicap, at 121 pounds.

A Grade 2 winner at three, City Zip retired in 2002 to Contemporary Stallions in Coxsackie, and for three breeding seasons was a highly sought-after young prospect. After his half brother Ghostzapper uncorked a Horse of the Year dream season in 2004, City Zip departed New York for bluer fields of grass. He has since 2005 been a marquee stallion at one of the world's most important Thoroughbred nurseries, Lane's End, in Kentucky, where as of June 19, he ranks fifth on the Thoroughbred Times 2012 general sire list.

City Zip's three New York-conceived crops generated 185 foals, 155 starters, 129 winners, and 32 black-type runners. His 13 stakes winners from that group include undefeated Grade 1 winner Bustin Stones, Grade 2 winner With a City, and Grade 3 winners Acting Zippy and Get Serious. It's not been all roses for the best of these: Foot problems ended Bustin Stones' meteorically spectacular career after just six starts and he now stands in New York; With a City died of a mysterious illness early in his sophomore season; Acting Zippy, another gelding, retired after run-

ning last in the 2010 Shadwell Turf Mile Stakes (G1). Only Get Serious remains in competition.

Heroes to hunters

Like her best son, Java Gal was a New York-bred. Unlike him, she seemed to have little passion or aptitude for racing. She walked a mile in 1:39.74 to win her Meadowlands debut in 1996, but was removed from competition after losing three subsequent starts by a combined $48\frac{1}{2}$ lengths.

Her first two foals accomplished little. Spirit of Mike (1998, by Buddy) began well but drifted down the class ladder and ended up a \$5,000 claimer, while Gourmet Japan (1999, by Langfuhr) won only two of 30 starts in the country he was named for (though he earned \$249,525 in the rich racing offered there). Her second foal died as a yearling, and her third foal, Java Warrior (2002, by Cape Town), was stakes-placed at Delaware Park as a two-year-old before himself plunging off the class cliff rather dramatically. Two later foals failed to win at all, while another scored in maiden claiming company at Pimlico.

Not including Get Serious, Java Gal's six starters to date have won 11 of 113 starts, with but a single restricted stakes-placing

to their collective credit. The mare died in 2009 after producing a Rahy colt, who was later sent to Europe and is as-yet unraced.

Java Gal was decently bred. Her sire, Java Gold, had been a splendid racehorse in the mid-1980s, though a somewhat less than splendid sire. Her dam, a maiden-winning daughter of Bold Reasoning, had previously produced German champion Allez Milord (a New York-bred by Tom Rolfe), for whom 1½ miles was a sprint and who easily captured Santa Anita's grassy 1½-mile Oak Tree Invitational Handicap (G1) in 1987.

The distaff line hereafter slips underground for a few decades, resurfacing down in the fifth generation with Flaring Top, a 1947 Menow mare bred by A. B. Hancock. Al-

though herself rather undistinguished on the track, her 1959 Bull Page filly, Flaming Page, was anything but, becoming a Canadian champion and later the dam of international superstar Nijinsky II, Irish champion Minsky, and second dam of 1977 English Horse of the Year The Minstrel.

Continuing backward in time, sixth and eighth dams Flaming Top and Summit produced American champion fillies in Double-dogdare and Apogee, respectively. *Torpenhow, the ninth dam of Get Serious, was brought here from England in 1915 by Kentucky horsewoman Elizabeth Daingerfield, and this ancestress of numerous notable racehorses is today regarded as one of the most significant bloodstock imports of the early 20th century.

However, as anyone who has studied it knows, genetics can be an inconsistent, unpredictable, inexact science ... and what works swimmingly in one generation can flop like a beached fish in another. Some things, even Gregor Mendel and James D. Watson would have difficulty explaining.

Case in point: Legendary *Torpenhow's fifth dam (and the 14th dam of Get Serious) was registered in England's *General Stud Book* as Young Agnes. She was bred in 1863 by Isaac Newton Wallop, the Fifth Earl of Portsmouth, an important racing man of his day. Her sire was 1850 Epsom Derby winner and influential progenitor Voltigeur, her dam by two-time leading British sire Birdcatcher. But Young Agnes was flawed, unable to race and apparently an unimpressive producer, at least as far as Lord Portsmouth was concerned. When she came up barren in 1870, he'd had enough of her, and according to the *General Stud Book*, the beautifully bred seven-year-old was "given away and hunted."

New York State Breeding and Development Fund NY-Breds Award Program

Breeder, owner, and stallion owner awards are based on purse money earned (first through third) while competing in pari-mutuel races run in New York state.

BREEDER AWARDS

Beginning in 2012, breeder awards for New York-breds sired by registered New York stallions will be increased to 30% for first-place finishes and 15% for second- and third-place finishes. Awards for non-New York-sired New York-breds will rise to 15% for first-place finishes and 7.5% for second- and third-place finishes.

In addition, the cap on breeder awards for New York-sired New York-breds will be increased in 2012 by 300%, to \$40,000 per horse per race, and the cap on breeder awards for non-New York-sired New York-breds will be increased by 100%, to \$20,000 per horse per race.

STALLION OWNER AWARDS

Stallion owner awards are paid to owners of registered New York-based covering stallions (at time of conception) at up to 10% of earned purses from first through third positions. All stallion owner awards are capped at \$10,000 per horse per race.

OPEN OWNER AWARDS

Owner awards for registered New York-breds sired by a registered New York-based stallion is up to 20% of purses earned from first through third positions in races run for a claiming price of \$30,000 and upward, with a cap of \$20,000 per horse per race.

If the New York-bred is by an out-of-state stallion or non-registered stallion, the award is up to 10% of purses earned from first through third positions in races run for a claiming price of \$30,000 and upward with a cap of \$20,000 per horse per race.

NEW YORK-BRED RACES

More than 45 stakes races exclusively for registered New York-breds are run at New York Racing Association racetracks (Aqueduct, Belmont Park, and Saratoga Race Course) and Finger Lakes racetrack with total purses exceeding \$4-million. On average, there are more than 700 overnight races exclusively for registered New York-breds annually held at the four New York racetracks.

Good off a layoff

Fiddlers Patriot excels with rest

If patience is a virtue, the connections of Fiddlers Patriot might be among the most virtuous people in racing.

The son of Proud Citizen, trained by George Weaver and owned by James F. Olson and R. A. Hill Stable, got his first stakes victory in May, at age six and in his fourth year on the track, when he won the Jim McKay Turf Sprint Stakes at Pimlico.

"It was nice to see it all come together at Pimlico," Weaver said. "I've always believed in his talent."

Bred and originally owned by Fiddlers Green Stable, Fiddlers Patriot came to Weaver as a three-year-old. He began his career in an off-the-turf maiden special weight race for state-breds. Racing over a sloppy track, he finished second by eight lengths, then came back at Belmont nearly three weeks later and won by 11^{3} /4 lengths, again over a sloppy track. Following three more starts on dirt in which he finished fourth, first, and second, he made his turf debut at Saratoga Race Course in August 2010, winning a 5^{1} /2-furlong sprint by five lengths.

That turf start was Fiddlers Patriot's first race off a nearly eightmonth layoff, beginning a pattern of racing and rest that has characterized the chestnut gelding's career.

"He's high maintenance," Weaver said. "He's not the type of horse that's going to run 12 times a year. He's never had surgery, but when he gets a little sore, we just back off. When he's doing well, we run him. We let the horse tell us when he's ready to run back."

He seems to be talking loud and clear. Fiddlers Patriot has had three layoffs of six or more months in his career, and each time, he's won in his first start back.

Following the victory at Saratoga, Fiddlers Patriot was sold privately to his current owners, who left him in Weaver's barn. He stepped into stakes company off that win, running tenth in the 2010 Woodford Stakes (G3) at Keeneland Race Course; he won two optional claiming races before finishing second by a nose in the Highlander Stakes (Can-G2) at Woodbine a year ago, the closest he previously had come to winning a stakes race.

"He's always been seriously talented," Weaver said, "and the win at Pimlico was very gratifying. The owners have been very patient with me and with the horse, and they were there for the win."

Given Fiddlers Patriot's record on turf (four wins in eight starts with one second and one third), Weaver has no plans to move his lightly raced horse back to dirt.

"We'll come up on off-the-turf situations, but at this point, I believe he's one of the top turf sprinters in the country," he said.

"We believe he's capable of running against faster and better horses."

Given that one of the horses that finished behind Fiddlers Patriot in the Turf Sprint was Ben's Cat, who's earned more than \$900,000 and who came back to set a course record for five furlongs (:54.96) in the Parx Dash Handicap on June 17, Weaver's faith in his horse seems to be well-placed.

"If I can keep him at five or six furlongs on the turf and if he can run as well as he did at Pimlico, I hope he can stay healthy enough to show how good he is," Weaver said.

I Bet Toni Knows takes Cupecoy's Joy

The New York Stallion Series resumed at Belmont Park on June 3 with the Spectacular Bid Stakes for three-year-olds and the Cupecoy's Joy Stakes for three-year-old fillies, both at seven furlongs on turf.

The Cupecoy's Joy was won by I Bet Toni Knows, making just her second start on turf. Bred by Sunriver Partners and owned by Entourage Stable, I Bet Toni Knows is from the first crop of Sunriver, who died in 2009 and is the sire of multiple Grade 1 Southern California winner Weemissfrankie.

I Bet Toni Knows won her lone start at two, over Aqueduct's inner track in December. Making three more starts over that surface, the dark bay filly notched one additional victory before switching to turf at Belmont, finishing sixth in a one-mile optional claiming race over a yielding course in May. Winless at a mile or beyond, I Bet Toni Knows returned to her winning ways by cutting back in distance and running on a good Belmont turf course in the Cupecoy's Joy.

"We found out that she seems to flatten out in two-turn races

or races past a mile," trainer Eric Reed said. "Seven furlongs is the optimum distance for her."

The soft ground didn't help in that first turf start, either.

"She's not the biggest fan of soft turf," he said. "I think it's one of the biggest reasons she tired out."

Reed has not yet selected I Bet Toni Knows' next race, though the next turf race in the New York Stallion Series is under consideration, the Statue of Liberty Division at Saratoga on August 9 at a mile on turf.

"The sire stakes series is to her advantage, and I want to try her one more mile on the turf if we get a chance," Reed said. "She also seems to do well with some time between races."

King Kreesa takes Spectacular Bid

King Kreesa, winner of the Spectacular Bid, didn't begin his racing career until March, over Aqueduct's inner track, finishing fifth in his first start. Trainer Jeremiah Englehart switched him to grass for his next race, a maiden claiming event that he won by $1\frac{1}{2}$ lengths.

Bred by Horse Partners and owned by Gerald and Susan Kresa, King Kreesa has finished first or second in all three starts on turf, at distances ranging from seven furlongs to 11/8 miles. Sired by grass-loving King Cugat, King Kreesa showed some promise on dirt as he trained at Finger Lakes as a two-year-old.

"When I started breezing him at Finger Lakes," Englehart said, "I didn't think he would mind the dirt, but he didn't train as well when I got him to Belmont in the winter.

"So running him on the dirt became suspect, and then, of

course, after we ran, I figured that would be one of the last times he ran on it. He made a little run, but he didn't like the dirt hitting him in the face."

Still, Englehart hasn't ruled out dirt racing in King Kreesa's future.

"Even in his races now," said the trainer, "he still does some things that suggest that he's still learning. I'd need to try him on it a couple of more times."

For the moment, though, King Kreesa will stay on the grass, said Englehart.

EXPLANATION OF INDEXES

Racing Index (RI)

RI is based on the average earnings per start for all runners in the U.S., Canada, England, Ireland, France, Italy, Germany, Puerto Rico, and United Arab Emirates. RI is determined by calculating the average earnings per start, divided into males and females, of all starters in each individual country, and the average for each individual year is by definition 1.00. Median RI, however, is much lower. Actual distribution of RI is detailed below.

Sire Index (SI)

The Sire Index (SI) is an average of the Racing Index (RI) of all foals by a sire that have started at least three times. For SI to be calculated, a sire must be represented by a minimum of three crops and 25 starters lifetime.

AUCTION INFORMATION

Auction information is for North American sales from 1980 to the present and includes the following:

 Subject horse (stakes winner): All auction activity—weanling, yearling, two-year-olds in training, or horses of racing age sales-found after the winner's name under the first dam.

• Sire of stakes winner: The sire's lifetime and current year yearling auction information is reported, with number of crops offered at yearling sales (lifetime), number of yearlings sold (lifetime), and average price (lifetime, including yearlings sold in current year), followed by information for the current year. (Current-year information is reported beginning October 1; current-year information from January 1 through September 30 is in the previous year's auction information.)

· Dam of stakes winner: most recent sale, either as weanling, yearling, or two-year-old in training. Also reported is most recent sale as broodmare (including covering sire) or broodmare prospect, plus any sale of the dam while subiect horse was in utero (including covering sire).

Symbols preceding or following names of horses in pedigrees are used to identify horses that were imported into North America for racing or breeding, and to indicate country of birth. Equal signs preceding a horse's name indicate that a horse was foaled outside the U.S. or Canada and has never been imported to North America; a horse's country of birth appears in parentheses following its name. An asterisk preceding a horse's name indicates the horse was born outside the U.S. or Canada and was imported to North America prior to 1976 (no country codes are included for such horses). Names of horses imported since 1976 include a country code in parentheses following their name and are not preceded by equal signs. Horses that do not have a symbol preceding their name or a country code following their name were foaled in North America.

Breeding Rules

To qualify for registration as a New York-bred, the mare must foal in New York state and meet the following domicile requirements:

Resident Mares: Must be continuously in residence in New York state from within 90 days after last cover in the year of conception and thereafter remain in residence until foaling the following year, with no breed-back required.

Non-Resident Mares: Must foal in New York state and be bred back to a registered New York-based stallion and remain for a continuous period of 90 days after foaling.
