

## **Working for you**

The month of May has given me an opportunity to get creative about enhancing the benefits for New York Thoroughbred Breeders members. I am pleased to announce a new partnership between NYTB and *Thoroughbred Daily News*, a publication for breeders, owners, trainers, and just about anybody with a stake in our business.

As you probably already have noticed, beginning the second week in May, you began to receive free daily delivery of the newsletter via e-mail. I hope you are enjoying the national and international daily racing and sales coverage, and the frequent informative articles on pedigree, which are especially valuable for you. The NYTB-TDN partnership includes another special feature I think you will really appreciate. Every NYTB member in good

standing will receive one free advertisement in the *TDN*, a \$650 value. Anyone who promotes a stallion, runs a boarding operation, does sales prep, or simply wants to get a little extra exposure for a sales horse should take advantage of this benefit.

On the legislative front, although we are not fighting the fierce battles of 2010, we are still keeping active. NYTB has found a sponsor for its 2011 "Fund Bill." State Sen. John J. Bonacic, chairman of the Senate Racing, Gaming, and Wagering Committee, has sponsored our bill to extend the provisions included in last year's Breeding Fund bill, which was scheduled to sunset with the opening of the Aqueduct racino. The bill amends the language of last year's

bill to extend its provisions to "one year after the commencement of the operation of a video lottery facility at Aqueduct." The two main provisions of the bill are 1) required quarterly payments to the Fund, and 2) increased cap on breeders' awards. The purpose of removing the sunset on the legislation is to provide continued revenue to the Fund during this transitional year, after the closure of New York City Off-Track Betting Corp. and before the year-round operation of the Aqueduct racino.

In other news, on behalf of NYTB, I will participate in the first-ever International Summit on Race-Day Medication, EIPH, and the Racehorse, which will take place on June 13-14 in New York City. The event is jointly sponsored by the American Association of Equine Practitioners, the National Thor-

oughbred Racing Association, and the Racing Medication and Testing Consortium. Panels will offer wide-ranging discussions on regulatory issues surrounding race-day medication, veterinary viewpoints on the management of exercise-induced pulmonary hemorrhage, and the management of EIPH from the perspective of trainers. Participating will be representatives from major racing jurisdictions from around the world, including Europe, the Middle East, Asia, and Australia, as well as the U.S. and Canada. I am pleased to be involved with this important educational exchange. Its outcomes will provide input for objective decision-making about race-day medication in the U.S.



## Strong numbers at Aqueduct

NYRA's initiatives boost on-track wagering and convenience betting

Healthy results from Aqueduct's winter-spring season indicated that the New York Racing Association captured a substantial percentage of the bets that formerly flowed through the New York City Off-Track Betting Corp., which closed its doors in early December.

While average total wagering for the January 1-April 23 season was down a slim 1.6%, probably a result of the New York City OTB closure, the increases in on-track and NYRA Rewards wagering appeared to benefit NYRA's financial picture because those bets provided more revenue to the track operator than OTB play. NYRA received roughly 2.5% on New York City OTB bets, while on-track and NYRA Rewards wagers reap close to 10%.

Capturing the displaced New York City OTB wagers was by no means an easy task, and NYRA utilized a four-prong campaign to grab the bets that formerly went into OTB betting parlors or Internet wagers. The components were:

Susan Wagner said. "That was historic. Sadly, the bill was blocked in the Senate and did not become law, but members of Congress, as well as tens of millions of Americans, became aware of the horse slaughter issue as a result of what he did.

Actress and 2009 honoree Bebe Neuwirth will present Duchossois

"Equine Advocates knows and understands the real value of racehorses to the world and understands the inhumane slaughter must be prevented," Duchossois said. "I am very honored and privileged to be recognized by such a worthwhile organization and I salute Ellen and Herbert Moelis for their contributions to this great program."

Actress Bo Derek will present an award to Racing Hall of Fame jockey Kent Desormeaux recognizing efforts to prevent injury and save horses' lives.

The gala will take place in the new state-of-the-art wing of the Saratoga City Center on Broadway. General tickets are \$250 per person. Tickets at front-tier tables are \$500.

- A campaign to build NYRA Rewards membership, with several sign-up promotions;
  - Full-card simulcast wagering at Belmont Café;
- Chartered bus service from the city's five boroughs to get former OTB players to the track; and
- Simulcasts of NYRA and out-of-town races on Time Warner's basic cable service. The races were carried on Channel 71, which formerly provided New York City OTB content.

"I am very encouraged by the hard work that everyone at NYRA has done since the shutdown of New York City Off-Track Betting to encourage customers to attend our live races and wager on our product," NYRA President Charles Hayward said. "It has been a total team effort and has demonstrated NYRA's ability to react quickly and decisively to what could have been a very negative occurrence for the racing industry as a whole."

Hayward credited New York State Racing and Wagering Board Chairman John Sabini for expediting approvals for the expansion of the NYRA Rewards program.

The Aqueduct numbers indicated that NYRA had succeeded in getting people to the track and to its NYRA Rewards website. Average attendance rose more than 50%, to 4,413 daily from 2,908, and average on-track handle was up more than threequarters to \$1,978,955 a day. On-track handle on NYRA's races only rose 42.1% to \$804,677.

The only cautionary statistic was total wagering on NYRA's races, which declined 11.4% to \$5,741,639 daily. Still, the numbers were running in NYRA's favor. NYRA receives roughly twice the income from a bet placed at one of its facilities on an outof-town race as it collects from simulcast outlets for a wager on a NYRA race.

Belmont Café, which opened for everyday simulcasting and was expanded to accommodate larger groups, had total attendance of 31,864 and wagering of \$16.4-million.

The big gains, however, were scored by NYRA Rewards. Its Internet activity more than doubled, to \$20.3-million from \$8.2million. Phone wagering to NYRA Rewards increased 95% to \$13.2-million.—Don Clippinger

## **Finger Lakes decimates New York-bred stakes schedule**

With supplemental purse funds cut sharply by the New York City Off-Track Betting Corp. closure, Finger Lakes has instituted a drastic reduction in its stakes schedule, all for New York-breds.

The Farmington, New York, track cut nine of the 13 stakes races from this year's schedule because a 70% cut in purse supplements from the New York State Thoroughbred Breeding and Development Fund. The reduction totaled more than \$700,000, funding plummeting from \$1.05-million to \$280,000.

"The loss of over \$700,000 in purse supplements from the [Thoroughbred Breeding and Development Fund] has necessitated this unfortunate step," said Chris Riegle, president and general manager of Finger Lakes Casino & Racetrack. "While it is very disappointing to lose many of our stakes for 2011, we are pleased that we were able to find a way to keep our average daily purse distribution at the same level for now.

"The demise of New York City Off-Track Betting late last year has already begun to have a dramatic negative impact on the landscape of Thoroughbred racing in New York state, first by reducing Finger Lakes racing revenues by over \$4-million annually and now by severely impairing the ability of the Breeding Fund to promote the advantages of racing New York-breds."

The nine stakes eliminated were the George W. Barker Handicap, Susan B. Anthony Handicap, Niagara Stakes, Arctic Queen Handicap, Ontario County Stakes, Genesee Valley Breeders' Handicap, Leon Reed Memorial Handicap, New York Oaks, and the

Jack Betta Be Rite Handicap. All were \$50,000 races except the New York Oaks, which had a \$75,000 purse.

Remaining on the 2011 schedule are the \$150,000-added New York Derby on July 16, the \$100,000-estimated Aspirant Stakes and \$100,000-estimated Lady Finger Stakes on September 5, and the \$200,000-estimated New York Breeders' Futurity on October 1.


## Cuomo, NYRA squabble over outsourcing deal

The New York Racing Association received permission from the New York State Racing and Wagering Board in late April to close its NYRA Rewards call center and outsource the work to Churchill Downs Inc.-owned TwinSpires, but the deal quickly drew criticism from Gov. Andrew Cuomo.

NYRA said the increased call volume after the New York City Off-Track Betting Corp. closure in December was straining its phone-betting system and obtained approval on April 25 for the shift to Twin-Spires, whose call center is located in Oregon. No jobs would be lost because call-center workers would be assigned other duties, NYRA said.

Cuomo said the racing operation should increase its New York hiring.

"NYRA's decision to locate these activities and the potential

jobs out of state is extremely troubling given the extraordinary investment New York state has made to maintain NYRA's viability over the years," the governor said in an April 28 letter to NYRA President Charles Hayward.

"My first priority as governor is to create jobs in New York state. As such, I expect you to do everything possible to ensure that these telephone wagering activities are conducted within New York state by New York state taxpayers."

Hayward quickly responded with a letter of his own in which he said the outsourcing would provide customers with better service during the busy Triple Crown period. He reiterated that no union members would lose their jobs because of the change

and noted that NYRA has added teller positions since New York City OTB closed.

## **Bred in New York for the world**

Berkshire Stud's Flatter colt tops the OBS selected sale and goes to Bob Baffert

On its website, Berkshire Stud describes its horses as "bred in New York, bred for the world."

Certainly, some Berkshire homebreds have ventured outside the state's borders, but few if any have made as big a splash as a flashy colt who has yet to race.

The colt, by Flatter out of Berkshire's Quiet American mare Silence Please, was the talk of the Ocala Breeders' Sales Co. March sale of selected two-year-olds in training, where he led the sale with a price of \$925,000. The next-highest price was \$500,000.

Signing the sales slip on March 16 was Racing Hall of Fame trainer Bob Baffert, who was acting for Kaleem Shah. Baffert is to train the colt, said Shah, founder and president of Calnet Inc., a diversified technology company with offices in Virginia and California.

While the Flatter colt, now named Brigand, was a home run for New York breeding, it was by no means the only one. New York-bred horses sold well throughout the juvenile auction season, an indication that the state is producing horses that run well and possess commercial pedigrees.

Still, Brigand took the March selected sale by storm. Consigned by Florida-based Eisaman Equine, the colt had been purchased for \$90,000 by Cobra Farm at the Fasig-Tipton Saratoga New York-bred preferred yearling sale in August. Berkshire had consigned the colt through Craig and Holly Bandoroff's Kentucky-based Denali Stud.


The colt was the fifth-highest price at the August auction, at which a Denali-consigned Tale of the Cat colt topped the sale at \$140,000. Repole Stable was the buyer.

New York-bred horses sold well throughout the juvenile auction season, an indication that the state's industry is producing horses that run well and possess commercial pedigrees.

The OBS sale topper was the result of several factors, most immediately a striking appearance, a fast presale workout, and a bidding duel. The Flatter colt painted a striking picture before the auction session, and he breezed a quarter-mile in :20.60, which tied for the sale's fastest time at that distance.

Baffert encouraged Shah to bid on the colt, and the trainer swapped bids with John Ferguson, whose bloodstock company represents Sheikh Mohammed bin Rashid al Maktoum in the IJS

"I'm glad Sheikh Mo wasn't here," quipped Baffert, who said he believed the colt could have topped the Fasig-Tipton Florida sale of selected two-year-olds in training earlier in March. Its sale topper, an Empire Maker filly, went for \$1.35-million to Ferguson.

Baffert conceded that the Flatter colt was expensive but worth

"It would be a lot of money if he hasn't run, but we already know he can," Baffert said.

The sale horse ultimately is a reflection of its breeder and the breeder's decisions. The sale topper in many ways was the product of a solid philosophy and an insightful move to invest in a \$5,000 season to Flatter, who stands at Claiborne Farm in Paris, Kentucky.

#### **Retains some fillies**

Berkshire, a 550-acre farm in Pine Plains managed by Douglas Koch, D.V.M., primarily is a commercial operation that sells at Keeneland and Saratoga. But it retains some fillies each season to race and, ultimately, to join the farm's broodmare band.

Silence Please, the sale topper's dam, followed that pattern, although she never raced. She was bred by Berkshire out of the Distinctive mare Notice Me, who had enough quality to win five races, including one of the rare "Q" races, unrestricted handicap or allowance races with purses of \$30,000 or more that qualified for black type only in 1985.

Notice Me proved to be a quality broodmare, with ten winners, including one stakes winner and two stakes-placed runners, one of whom was a stakes producer.

Silence Please, a foal of 2001, followed Berkshire's pattern of breeding to quality commercial sires. She was by Quiet Ameri-


can, and she was bred in 2008 to Flatter, a graded stakes-placed stallion by A.P. Indy out of the Mr. Prospector mare Praise.

To be sure, Brigand sold himself at OBS with his athletic appearance and his blazing workout. But his catalog page also improved over the course of seven months. Flatter gained stature by adding three stakes winners, including Super Derby (G2) victor Apart, for a total of 12.

Silence Please's page also showed a notable improvement. At the Fasig-Tipton sale, she was credited with a four-year-old Successful Appeal filly, Not a Peep, who had won twice and earned \$69,374.

By March, Silence Please had added stakes winner Sky Music, a Sky Mesa colt who won the Restrainor Stakes at Aqueduct and finished third in the Champagneforashley Stakes. Her 2007 foal, the Malibu Moon gelding Swinging at Siro's, also became a winner.

Until Brigand sold for \$90,000 during the Fasig-Tipton auction, the family had shown steadily rising sales prices. Not a Peep sold for \$75,000, Swinging At Siro's went for \$135,000, and Sky Music topped out at \$140,000. All were sold at Fasig-Tipton Saratoga's New Yorkpreferred auctions.

#### **Back to Flatter**

Silence Please's 2010 foal, a Bluegrass Cat colt, sold for \$60,000 during the Keeneland November breeding stock sale, and she produced a Bernstein filly this year. She was to be bred back to Flatter, who stands for \$7,500 in 2011.

Brigand was by no means the only notable New Yorker at the

OBS March sale. The next-highest price was \$180,000 for a Harlan's Holiday filly offered by Becky Thomas' Sequel Bloodstock and purchased by leading New York trainer Linda Rice, acting for Mark Vondrasek.

Overall, 22 New York-breds went through the OBS March ring, and 19 of them sold, an 86% clearance rate, with 13 New York-

> bred two-year-olds withdrawn from the sale. The New Yorkers boasted an average price of \$133,737 and a median price of \$80,000. The sale average was \$104,766, and the median price was \$70,000, with a 76% clearance rate.

> The New Yorkers also fared well at the Fasig-Tipton Florida auction of selected yearlings, held for the first time at Frank Stronach's Palm Meadows Training Center.

> The top-priced New York-bred at \$500,000 was a Medaglia d'Oro colt out of Bubbling Heights (Fr), by Darshaan, purchased by Ferguson for Sheikh Mohammed.

> Bred by Lawrence Goichman, the two-yearold is a half brother to Goichman's J'ray, a multiple graded stakes winner who carted off multiple New York-bred championships in 2005 (two-year-old filly and turf female) and 2008 (older female and turf female). He

clocked the fastest furlong on the turf before the March 3 sale.

Overall, New Yorkers fared well at the Fasig-Tipton Florida sale. They averaged \$255,000 for five sold from seven through the ring (71.4% sold), and the median price was \$225,000. As a whole, the sale averaged \$244,840, with a \$200,000 median price and 56.6% clearance rate.



## **Strike up the Bandbox**

New York-bred stakes winner is a triumph for line of hard-knocking mares

Some broodmares are highly prized for producing champions and stakes winners. Other broodmares are prized because, while operating on a lower level than the sport's elite, they consistently produce hard-knocking horses that outearn the industry standard.

Those consistent mares rarely hit a home run, but the product of one of those hearty families, Empty the Bases, at least has had an extra-base hit with Bandbox, a New York-bred colt who has been making a lot of noise in New York and Maryland.

The three-year-old by top-shelf Kentucky sire Tapit won the Private Terms Stakes at Laurel Park in March after a productive juvenile campaign in which he won the Charles Town Juvenile Stakes and Belmont Park's Sleepy Hollow Stakes.


Bandbox's maternal line traces back to Kentucky and a leading figure in the breeding industry there, former Kentucky Gov. Brereton C. Jones, co-owner of Airdrie Stud with his wife, Libby. The maternal family rarely hits the long ball but it has produced consistency, often when paired with Airdrie stallions.

Jones' association with the family actually reaches into Texas, to Girl Lt., a Truxton King mare bred in Texas by W. Cal Partee, an oil and timber tycoon from Magnolia, Arkansas, who raced 1992 Kentucky Derby (G1) winner Lil E. Tee.

Lil E. Tee was by At the Threshold, a New York-bred who also raced for Partee and was trained by Lynn Whiting, who also guided the career of Lil E. Tee. Third to Swale in the 1984 Derby, the Northcliffe colt won the Ohio Derby (G2) that year and concluded his racing career with consecutive victories in the Arlington Classic (G1) and American Derby (G1), both at Arlington Park.

#### **Prolific, consistent family**

Girl Lt. was a modest winner on the racetrack. Her two career victories for Jones were consecutive at Churchill Downs in the spring of 1977, and she finished out her racing career in allowance races at Churchill and Delaware Park that year. From nine starts

in two racing seasons, she earned \$10,687. She was worth retaining because her family was prolific and highly consistent.

Her dam, Girl Next Door, produced eight winners, including four stakes horses. Girl Lt.'s stakes-placed half sister, Rough Girl, by Lt. Stevens, was the dam of Meadowlands listed stakes winner Ready Jet Go and two stakes-placed runners.

Girl Lt. was the dam of five winners, including stakes-placed Wilhelm. One of her daughters, Four Straight, produced the modest stakes winner Straight Sets.

Jones bred Girl Lt. to San Feliou (Fr), an unheralded stallion by Lyphard, and the result was Dancing Lt., who never made it to the races. But Jones retained Dancing Lt., and his faith in the family paid off when she produced 14 foals. Of those, 13 raced and 11 were winners. In general, they were true to the family's

past performance, producing a stakes winner, three stakes-placed runners, and several winners who earned more than \$100,000.

Dancing Lt.'s stakes winner, Harlan Honey, and stakes-placed More Silver and Officer Hawk, were by the Airdrie stallion Silver Hawk, who enjoyed a long, fruitful career at the Midway, Kentucky, farm. The Roberto horse won a Group 3 race in England and had 77 stakes winners from 862 foals.

Jones bred Harlan Honey and placed her with trainer Phil Hauswald. She possessed a high cruising speed over longer distances and never was headed once she was put on the lead. She won her maiden victory at three on Gulfstream Park's main track in February 1993 and led at every call in her remaining three starts, all on the grass. After scoring in a Gulfstream allowance race, she won two Keeneland Race Course stakes races, the Appalachian and Palisades Stakes, within two weeks.

Her record in the Airdrie broodmare band reflected the family's history. She has had

12 live foals three or older, and seven of them have raced, with six winners. She has produced one stakes winner, 2000 Appalachian winner Impending Bear, by Farma Way, and stakesplaced Siphon Honey, by Siphon (Brz).

#### **Deputy's Honey**

One of her unraced offspring was Deputy's Honey, by lead-

ing sire Deputy Minister. With the family well established and a stakes win after her dam's name, Deputy's Honey had entered the commercial arena. Jones sold her for \$250,000 to Louisville residents Bea and Robert Roberts at the 1997 Keeneland September yearling sale.

Deputy's Honey was unraced and the Robertses sold her for \$55,000 in foal to the Robertses' tough, talented Judge T C to Arch Bloodstock at the 2000 Keeneland November breeding stock sale.

Deputy's Honey ended up in the broodmare band of Hargus and Sandra Sexton, who bred her to speedy, stalwart Grand Slam, winner of the 1997 Moet Champagne (G1) and Futurity (G1) Stakes at Belmont Park. The result was Empty the Bases, who was purchased for \$150,000 at the 2004 Keeneland September yearling sale by the Jay Em Ess Stable of Mace and Samantha Siegel.

By the following fall, however, it was clear that Empty the Bases would not manage even a bunt single and was destined to be unraced. She was sold for \$7,500 to Sez Who Thoroughbreds at the Ocala Breeders' Sales Co. fall mixed sale.

With two consecutive strikeouts, it appeared that the family of Girl Lt. had lost its magic. But Empty the Bases found new vitality in New York.

Her first foal, Princess Kayla, a filly by Outofthebox, was bred in New York by Sez Who and Aron Yagoda, whose Aron Streit Inc. is a producer of kosher food products. Princess Kayla won her first two starts at Charles Town Races in 2009 but is winless since then.

Empty the Bases' second New York-bred foal was Bandbox, who was bred by Yagoda and New Dawn Thoroughbreds. He

was offered at the 2009 Fasig-Tipton Midlantic Eastern fall yearling sale and was purchased for \$105,000 by Hillwood Stable.


Hillwood's owner, Ellen Charles, sent the Tapit colt to Rodney Jenkins, one of the two best show-jumper riders ever produced by the U.S. (The other is Michael Matz.) His unbeaten streak ended with a fourth-place finish behind To Honor and Serve in the Remsen Stakes (G2), and he subsequently finished second by a neck in Laurel's Miracle Wood Stakes before his Private Terms victory.


Bandbox's sale as the fifth-highest price at the Timonium auction did little to help the fortunes of Empty the Bases, who was offered by Casse Sales as agent at the 2009 OBS fall mixed sale a few days later, when she sold for \$1,500

to Fundament Buck, the breeding operation of Louisiana horseman Forrest Lanning.

Empty the Bases has been catalogued twice at Kentucky bloodstock sales since Bandbox reached the races and was withdrawn both times. She now has an unnamed Value Plus two-year-old filly and a Bellamy Road colt at her side.

Once more, the family of Girl Lt. is on the march and striking up the band.





## **Straight Story gets it straight**

#### Gallagher's-bred colt wins Fort Marcy for first graded stakes victory

Richard T. Santulli, founder and retired chairman of NetJets Inc., holds advanced degrees in applied mathematics, and he honed his skills in the calculus of horse racing with an acknowledged master, Jules Fink, a controversial figure in New York racing from his time as one of the "Speed Boys" in the 1950s.

A former investment banker with Goldman Sachs, Santulli was one of the partners who joined with Fink to form Jayeff B Stables in the late 1980s, and he and George Prussin carried on after Fink's death.

Jayeff B raced champion Safely Kept in partnership with Barry Weisbord, and the operation also raced Jules, a Grade 3 stakes winner and sire. The remaining Jayeff B partners named the Forty Niner colt for their late mentor. Both Safely Kept and Jules were trained by Alan E. Goldberg, who has had a long association with Santulli and Weisbord.

Although Damon Runyon called Fink and his associates the "Speed Boys," they actually were value handicappers who looked for situations where speed would determine a race.

One of those situations presented itself in the \$98,000 Fort Marcy Stakes (G3) on May 7, and Santulli's Straight Story took advantage of the circumstances to win his first graded stakes race

Ridden by Carlos Marquez Jr., New York-bred Straight Story set an unpressured pace through the first half-mile of the 1½-6-mile race on Belmont Park's turf course and had enough left to prevail when the pressure arrived in the last quarter-mile, winning by a neck over 1.45-to-1 favorite Hudson Steele, the 2010 Jersey Derby winner.

The Fort Marcy victory marked a breakthrough for Straight Story, who had been knocking at the door of a graded victory for nearly two years. As a three-year-old in 2009, he finished second by a head in both the Colonial Turf Cup Stakes (G2) and the Virginia Derby (G2). Later that year, he finished second, again by a head, in Belmont's Jamaica Handicap (G1).

Goldberg and Santulli put their horse on a slightly less demanding path last year. After confidence-building victories in a Belmont optional claimer and a Monmouth Park allowance race, Straight Story ran fourth in Monmouth's Betfair/TVG United Nations Stakes (G1). In his next start, he won the restricted West Point Stakes at Saratoga Race Course.

Unplaced in the Woodbine Mile Stakes (Can-G1), Straight Story clearly was past his best form when he tired to finish second in the Mohawk Stakes on the New York Showcase program at Belmont on October 23.

Goldberg put Straight Story away for the year and returned him to racing fitness with a series of workouts at the trainer's Colts Neck Stables in New Jersey, concluding with a sevenfurlong breeze in 1:29 on April 27.

The trainer told Marquez to go to the front because he detected a lack of early speed in Straight Story's four opponents and because the Giant's Causeway horse runs well when he is fresh. Marquez broke him sharply from the outside post position and had a two-length lead after a quarter-mile in :24.25.

Although the race's longshot, 10.10-to-1 Mikoshi, closed the gap to a length, Straight Story still was able to gallop on his own through a half-mile in :48.78. "They let me go the half in :48

[and a fraction], and that made all the difference," said Marquez.

On the final turn, Mikoshi ranged up on the outside, but he was unable to pass the front-runner, and then Hudson Steele made his move along the rail through the final three-sixteenths. A length back at the furlong pole, Hudson Steele drew within a neck but flattened out in deep stretch as Straight Story maintained his lead. "When he saw the other horse inside, he kept digging, digging, digging, fighting," Marquez said. "Class showed up."

Sent to the starting gate as the 3.15-to-1 third betting choice, Straight Story ran the Fort Marcy's  $1\frac{1}{16}$  miles in 1:41.84 on firm turf.

Goldberg said after the race that he had no firm plans for Straight Story, although New York-bred races may be a part of the 2011 campaign.

"He's an honest horse, and he is what he is," the trainer said. "He caught a good race today. There wasn't much pace in there, and it set up for him."

Santulli, who races Straight Story in his own name, found value in the family of Director, a Swaps filly who was bred by Leslie Combs II of Spendthrift Farm and the Fourth Estate Stable of John S. Knight. She raced from two through six, won ten races from 72 starts, and was stakes-placed a total of six times from 1969 to 1971.

At stud, Director produced six winners, including Grand Bonheur, a Blushing Groom (Fr) filly campaigned by Jerome Brody, the late owner of Gallagher's Steak House in Manhattan and Gallagher's Stud in Ghent with his wife, Marlene. Retired to Gallagher's broodmare band, one of her foals was unraced Felicita, by Rubiano, who produced multiple Grade 1 winner Take Charge Lady.

The Brodys kept Felicita's first foal, Eventail, by Lear Fan, a New York-bred stakes winner, and the family's success encouraged Marlene Brody to breed her in 2005 to Giant's Causeway, then in his fifth year at stud.

The result was Straight Story, who sold for \$400,000 to Mike Ryan, agent, at the 2007 Keeneland September yearling sale. Entered in the previous year's Keeneland November breeding stock sale, Eventail sold in foal to El Prado (Ire) for \$925,000 and was imported to Japan.

#### **EXPLANATION OF INDEXES**

#### Racing Index (RI)

RI is based on the average earnings per start for all runners in the United States, Canada, England, Ireland, France, Italy, Germany, Puerto Rico, and United Arab Emirates. RI is determined by calculating the average earnings per start, divided into males and females, of all starters in each individual country, and the average for each individual year is by definition 1.00. Median RI, however, is much lower. Actual distribution of RI is detailed below.

#### Sire Index (SI)

The Sire Index (SI) is an average of the Racing Index (RI) of all foals by a sire that have started at least three times. For SI to be calculated, a sire must be represented by a minimum of three crops and 25 starters lifetime.

#### **Breeding Rules**

To qualify for registration as a New York-bred, the mare must foal in New York state and meet the following domicile requirements:

**Resident Mares:** Must be continuously in residence in New York state from within 90 days after last cover in the year of conception and thereafter remain in residence until foaling the following year, with no breed-back required.

**Non-Resident Mares:** Must foal in New York state and be bred back to a registered New York-based stallion and remain for a continuous period of 90 days after foaling.

## New York State Breeding and Development Fund NY-Breds Award Program

Breeder, owner, and stallion owner awards are based on purse money earned (first through third) while competing in pari-mutuel races run in New York state.

#### **BREEDER AWARDS**

In 2010, the New York State Thoroughbred Breeding and Development Fund paid \$5,400,945 to breeders of registered New York-breds. A breeder is the owner of the mare at the time the mare foals in the state of New York. Breeder awards are determined by covering stallion. If the New York-bred is by a registered New York-based stallion, the award is up to 20% of the purse earned for a first-place finish and up to 10% for a second- or third-place finish.

If the New York-bred is by an out-of-state stallion or non-registered stallion, the award is up to 10% for a first-place finish and up to 5% for a second- or third-place finish. All breeder awards are capped at \$10,000 per horse per race.

#### STALLION OWNER AWARDS

In 2010, the New York State Thoroughbred Breeding and Development Fund distributed \$1,559,215 in stallion owner awards. Stallion owner awards are paid to owners of registered New York-based covering stallions (at time of conception) at up to 7% of earned purses from first through third positions. All stallion owner awards are capped at \$10,000 per horse per race.

#### **OPEN OWNER AWARDS**

In 2010, the New York State Thoroughbred Breeding and Development Fund paid \$859,621 to owners of registered New York-breds who earned purse money in open-company races. Owner awards for registered New York-breds sired by a registered New York-based stallion is up to 20% of purses earned from first through third positions in races run for a claiming price of \$30,000 and upward, with a cap of \$20,000 per horse per race.

If the New York-bred is by an out-of-state stallion or non-registered stallion, the award is up to 10% of purses earned from first through third positions in races run for a claiming price of \$30,000 and upward with a cap of \$20,000 per horse per race.

#### **NEW YORK-BRED RACES**

More than 45 stakes races exclusively for registered New York-breds are run at New York Racing Association racetracks (Aqueduct, Belmont Park, and Saratoga Race Course) and Finger Lakes racetrack with total purses exceeding \$4-million. In 2009, more than 900 overnight races exclusively for registered New York-breds were held at the four New York racetracks.
